THE following Addresses were presented to Her Majesty on the occasion of Her Majesty's Visit to Kingston-upon-Hull, Great Grimsby, and Boston, and were received very graciously :

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your dutiful and devoted subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Kingston-upon-Hull, humbly approach your Majesty to express our ardent loyalty and the pride and exultation with which on this auspicious occasion we hail the appearance amongst us of our beloved Queen, and Her Royal Consort and Children.

At any time would a visit from your Majesty to this borough be a source of very high gratification to all your loyal subjects within it, but more especially is it so at a time when your Majesty's arms, in conjunction with those of your Allies, have been blest with most signal success.

The existence of our town can be traced to a very remote period, and it has, with its inhabitants, from time to time been honoured with special manifestations of royal favour. The port with which it is connected having become, as early as the reign of your Majesty's famous predecessor King Richard the First, the sixth in importance in the kingdom, subsequently attracted, from its peculiar advantage of position, the notice of your Majesty's great predecessor King Edward the First, who changed its original name, honoured it with its present royal appellation of King's Town-upon-Hull, shortly afterwards created it a free borough, with many important privileges, and also conferred upon it the distinction, more than once, of a royal visit, towards the close of his long and glorious reign.

Since that period this borough (which in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty was constituted a county of itself) has been several times similarly distinguished by your Majesty's royal predecessors ; one of them, King Henry the Eighth, paid it two visits (each of several days' duration) in the year one thousand five hundred and forty-one, presenting to the Mayor on one of those occasions the sword which he himself then wore. The Mayor being then already authorised by a charter of one of your royal predecessors (King Henry the Sixth) to have a sword borne

erect before him in the name of the sovereign when out of the royal presence.

Upwards of two centuries have now elapsed since this borough received a royal visit ; this of your Majesty, at the commencement of the eighteenth year of your prosperous and happy reign, being the first that has been paid it by a Queen of England, so signal an event will constitute henceforth the highest among those which our annals record. With whatever splendour your Majesty has been, or may be, received elsewhere in your dominions, suffer us to assure your Majesty that we will yield to none of our fellow subjects in fervent love and loyalty to your Majesty and in gratitude for the memorable distinction which you have been pleased this day to confer upon us.

We trust that your Majesty will be pleased with such indications as you may see, of our persevering efforts to develop to the utmost those great local advantages which constitute the claim of this port to rank high in mercantile and maritime importance, we venture to remind your Majesty, that through the favour of your illustrious Grandfather King George the Third, those extensive walls and moats which had been constructed for warlike purposes several centuries before, and which extended from the River Hull to the Humber, were removed, in order that on their site might be constructed (happily more in accordance with the spirit and requirements of the time) those convenient and capacious docks now constituting the distinctive character of this important eastern seaport, which now ranks the third in the United Kingdom, being next to London and Liverpool in the amount of Customs received.

Wherever your Majesty moves, you are hailed as here by the enthusiastic acclamations of your subjects who have always seen everything to love and revere in your Majesty's personal character, and behold in you Her whom God has set to rule over one of the greatest empires upon earth ; your sceptre a sceptre of mercy and love, and your throne fixed in the affections of your people so immovably that it remained firm whilst many other thrones appeared insecure.

We believe that no sovereign ever sat on the throne of these realms, more distinguished than your Majesty by a personal and ever watchful interest in the welfare of every class of your subjects, and more anxious to secure to all, without any distinction, the fullest participation in the blessings of civil and religious liberty afforded by our incomparable institutions.

We humbly supplicate Almighty God, to whom the devout prayers of the nation constantly ascend on behalf of your Majesty, and your royal consort and family, that he, whose authority you have, may vouchsafe to your Majesty a long continuance of that favour and protection with which he has hitherto so evidently blessed your Majesty, and in you your happy people, long preserving to your Majesty and your Royal Consort and family the unruffled serenity of your private life, and so lightening the heavy pressure of your public cares by the unwavering love of your royal family and devotion of your loyal people; and we shall never cease to pray that after you have done his will upon earth, you may receive from the King of Kings a crown of glory that fadeth not away.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots Seamen of the Trinity House, in Kingston-upon-Hull, desire, with profound respect, to approach your Majesty, and to express the high gratification we derive from your Majesty's condescension in visiting this borough.

As an ancient Guild, which has existed for upwards of five centuries, we have been entrusted by your Majesty's royal predecessors with the management of important maritime affairs at this port, and on the Humber and its tributary rivers.

Your Majesty's royal predecessor, King Charles the Second, was pleased to declare that the labours of our Guild had in his reign tended to the furtherance of navigation, the increase of shipping, and the well-breeding of seamen.

Our desire ever has been, and still is, to extend our sphere of usefulness. We receive the sons of poor seamen into our nautical schools, and train and educate them to serve as expert sailors; and when in old age we find the poor mariner worn out in the service of his country, and suffering from those misfortunes to which a seaman's life is incident, we provide him with everything necessary to comfort his declining years in our almshouses, where, after a long and toilsome life, he enjoys leisure and repose, and receives religious consolation and instruction to prepare him for that world where the weary at length find rest.

In the wars of your Majesty's predecessors, many of our brethren have distinguished themselves as able pilots, and some have lost their lives in the service.

Since the present war commenced, we have made twenty-five appointments of pilots to the Allied Fleet. Eighteen of our brethren are now serving in the Baltic, and it is to their honour that four of them have been selected for service in the ships of your Majesty's Admiral and that of the Admiral of the French.

We congratulate ourselves, that the mighty war which is now raging with a powerful foe does not disturb the perfect security with which the trade and commerce of this country is carried on. We acknowledge with gratitude your Majesty's mild and benignant sway in time of war and in that of peace; and earnestly pray that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, your Majesty's life may be

long preserved, and that future generations may long enjoy, under your royal line, such blessings as we now most gratefully acknowledge.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the Corporation of the Dock Company at Kingston-upon-Hull, venture humbly to approach your Throne, and to join with the general voice of gratitude and thanks to your Majesty for your condescension in visiting this ancient borough.

We present ourselves to your Majesty, as a private community deeply interested in the trade and welfare of the town, and entrusted with the important duty of providing the necessary accommodation for carrying on the shipping and commercial business of this great port.

Previously to our being called into existence as a body, by an Act of the Legislature, in the year one thousand seven hundred and seventy-four, the business of this port was conducted in the River Hull, from which the town, built upon its banks, derives its name; and the opportunities thereby afforded for evading the payment of the duties of Customs and Excise were such as to call imperiously for the establishment of a dock, with legal quays, for the landing of goods, as the only means of preventing the gross and extensive frauds which were at that time practised upon the revenues of the country.

The ancient walls and ditches then surrounding the town, which had long ceased to be required for its defence, were, by the liberality of the Crown, granted to the Company in aid of their undertaking, and their site now forms part of the extensive range of Docks which, with the Rivers Humber and Hull, have converted the old town into an island. To those Docks we have, within the last seven years, added one in the vicinity of the citadel of the town, of greater capacity than any of its predecessors, and which, at this moment especially, may be proud of the august and auspicious name which it bears, of "Victoria." We come before your Majesty with the full conviction that we have done our town much service in providing such accommodation and facilities for carrying on its commerce as have mainly contributed to enable it to take its rank as the third port in the kingdom.

We feel deeply impressed with gratitude to your Majesty for honouring the town with your royal presence, accompanied by your royal Consort and five of the family with which it has pleased the Divine Being to bless your happy union. We feel that the august presence in our town of your Majesty and of His Royal Highness the Prince, will give an impetus to the exertions of the inhabitants of the borough to profit by the elevation of its character as a town, which must be the necessary consequence of the present royal visit, by contributing its share to the general prosperity of the country at large, whether in relation to its commerce, its good government, or its deeds in arms, which, under the beneficent guidance of the Ruler of all Nations, have hitherto been rewarded by the most happy results.

The proprietors in the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway Company, the Owners of these Docks, and whom as Directors we represent, humbly beg leave to approach your Majesty, with every feeling of loyalty and respect, to express their sense of the encouragement afforded to them by your Majesty's notice of our undertaking, which they humbly conceive may be worthy to be ranked amongst the most useful, natural, and commercial works in your Majesty's dominions.

They feel justified in so regarding this new dock, from the fact that His Royal Highness Prince Albert assisted in the commencement of that work by laying the first stone, on the 18th of April, 1849, and from the circumstance that the Lords of the Admiralty deemed it necessary here to require the construction of the large lock through which your Majesty has just entered, and which is formed to admit the largest vessel in your Majesty's navy.

They trust that your Majesty will graciously permit them to commemorate this auspicious and most-gracious visit to our new dock by granting to us permission to designate it in future as the Royal Dock.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul, at Mobile, inclosing a Notice to Mariners (a copy of which is subjoined), issued by the United States' District Inspector of Lighthouses at Mobile, relating to buoys and beacons laid down at the entrance to that bay.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE following buoys, beacons, &c., have been placed to facilitate the entrance to Mobile Bay:—

A bell boat, striped black and white, is anchored in eight fathoms' water, half a mile outside the outer bar: Sand Island Light bearing N.W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., $2\frac{1}{2}$ statute miles distant. The bell is tolled by the action of the waves.

An iron buoy, striped black and white, is placed in mid channel, just within the Bar, ranging with the bell boat and Sand Island Light.

A black iron buoy on the west side of the main channel, near the north end of the "Sand Island Bank."

A red iron buoy on the east side of the channel, at the edge of the "East Bank," and opposite the black buoy just mentioned.

A black iron buoy on the west side of the channel, at the edge of the "West Bank," and opposite Fort Morgan.

An iron buoy, striped black and white, in mid channel, between Mobile Point and the "Middle-ground."

A red iron buoy on the east side of the main channel, at the west end of the "Middle-ground."

In entering the harbour, red buoys should be left on the starboard hand, and black buoys on the port hand.

Buoys, striped black and white, may be passed on either hand, but should be kept well aboard.

To enter in foggy weather, after passing the bell boat close aboard, run in by compass N.W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. to the first striped buoy, thence N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. till up with Sand Island Light, and thence the course along mid channel to the upper striped buoy is N. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. From this buoy, running N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. and passing the upper red buoy, we reach the upper anchorage ground of the lower fleet.

After passing the upper red buoy, it is well to steer N. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. till the ship comes to anchor.

Two wooden range beacons, twenty feet high, have been erected on the east end of Sand Island, and two on Mobile Point. All of them will be lighted at night, and will be visible on and near the ranges mentioned.

The seaward beacon at Sand Island is painted white, with a vertical red stripe on the seaward side. It will show a white light, and when ranging with Sand Island Lighthouse, it ranges also with the bell boat, and the striped buoy to lead in over the outer bar.

The inner beacon at Sand Island is painted red, and will show a red light. Its range with the outer beacon is the limit of the channel along the west bank northerly from Sand Island.

At Mobile Point, the seaward beacon is painted red, and will show a red light. This, in range with the inner one, leads up along the edge of the "East Bank," northerly from the outer bar.

The inner beacon at Mobile Point is white, and will show a white light, and when in range with the Mobile Point Lighthouse, leads to the upper striped buoy, and through the channel at the west end of the "Middle-ground."

A screw pile beacon is under construction, intended to mark the shoal at "Revenue Point," near the outer bar.

A black spar buoy has been placed on the south point of "South-east Pelican Shoal," in 20 feet water, the eastern woods on Dauphin Island, just on with the east end of Pelican Island.

The buoy marks the entrance to the "Middle Channel," that between Pelican and Dauphin Islands being closed. From the buoy the course in, over the bar, is N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

Light on the Cies Islands.

THE new lighthouse erected on the summit of Mount Faro, that being the most prominent point on the extreme south of the centre island, will be lit every night from sunset to sunrise, commencing with that of the 19th of November.

The lighthouse is situated in—

Latitude 42° 12' 23" N.,

Longitude 02° 41' 50" W. of the meridian of the Observatory of Saint Ferdinand.

Its apparatus is of the second order, catadioptrical, with eclipses from minute to minute. The light is raised 650 Burgos feet above the level of the sea; it produces a tangent of 31 miles; but it can be seen at more or less distance according to the state of the atmosphere and the height of the observer.
