Soldier, of the regular forces,—including the Officers of the Staff, and the officers and men of the Royal Artillery, and Royal Engineers, and Sappers and Miners, who actually served in the field against the enemy, in South Africa, at the periods alluded to,—excluding those who may have been dismissed for subsequent misconduct, or who have deserted and are absent;—
