PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Act, or of the rules to be made in pursuance thereof, shall apply to all or any Court or Courts of Record in England and Wales, and within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette such provisions and rules respectively shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order, and any such Order may be, in like manner, from time to time altered and annulled; and that in and by any such Order Her Majesty may direct by whom any powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said Act, or "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," shall and may be exercised with respect to matters in such Court or Courts, and may make any orders or regulations which may be deemed requisite for carrying into operation in such Court or Courts the provisions so applied:

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that all the provisions of the said Act (except such as are hereinafter excepted), shall extend and apply to the Court of Record of the borough of *Liverpool*, called the Court of Passage:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, within one month after this Order shall have been published in the London Gazette, all the provisions of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," (except such as are contained in the sections of the said Act, numbered, respectively, 2, 17, 34 to 43, both inclusive, 75, 76, 77, 95, 97 to 102, both inclusive, and 104 to 107, both inclusive), shall extend and apply to the said Court of Record of the borough of *Liverpool*, called the Court of Passage.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to order, by and with the advice aforesaid, that all the powers or duties exercisable by the Court or a Judge under any of the sections of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1854" hereby extended and applied to the said Court of Passage,

shall, as regards matters and proceedings therein, be exercisable and exercised by the Court or Assessor; that all the powers or duties exercisable by a Master under any of the sections of the said Act as aforesaid, shall, as regards matters and proceedings in the said Court be exercisable and exercised by the Registrar of the Court or his deputy; and that the powers or duties exercisable by a Sheriff under any of the sections of the said Act as aforesaid, shall, as regards matters and proceedings in the said Court, be exercisable and exercised, within the jurisdiction of the said Court, by the Serjeant at Mace of the said borough of *Liverpool*.
