NOTIFICATION.

IT is hereby notified that the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty a copy of a Despatch, dated Her Majesty's Ship "Edinburgh," Kiel, December 8, from Rear Admiral Chads, commanding Her Majesty's Naval Forces in the Baltick, informing their Lordships that the blockade of the Russian ports undermentioned had been raised from that date, "Libau, Windau, Riga, and Bernau, and "all Russian ports, roads, havens and creeks, "from latitude 55° 53' N., longitude 21° 0' 3" E., "to Cape Dager Ort, in latitude 58° 55' N., longitude 22° 0' 5" E., the ports of Hapsal, "Warmso Islands, Port Baltick, Revel, and all "Russian ports, roads, havens, and creeks, from "Cape Dager Ort to Eckholm Light, situated in "latitude 59° 43' N., and longitude 25° 48' E."

"The ports of Helsingfors and Sweaborg, and "all Russian ports, roads, havens, and creeks to "the westward of Helsingfors as far as Hango "Head (inclusive), in latitude 59° 48' N., longitude 22° 53' E.; the ports of Aro and Abo, and "lastly, the whole of the ports, roads, havens, and "creeks, eastward of Helsingfors, on the Finland "Shore and Eckholm Light on the coast of "Esthonia, to Cronstadt and St. Petersburg, both "inclusive."

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the

"Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and "for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Woodford, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at Woodford Bridge, in the said parish of Woodford, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of your Majesty, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Woodford Bridge,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"On the south-east by the parish of Barking, on the north-east by the parish of Chigwell, and on the north-west and south-west by the remaining part of the said parish of Woodford, from which the said district chapelry is separated on the north-west by the proposed line of railway from Stratford to Loughton, from the point where such railway crosses the boundary line separating the said parish of Woodford from the said parish of Chigwell, and proceeding along such line south-westerly as far as Snakes-lane, and from that point leaving the said railway and proceeding by an imaginary straight line south-easterly to the road from London, where a bound stone is placed, and crossing such road, continuing in a straight line, still south-easterly, to another bound stone opposite Claybury Farm, at the point where the boundary line of the said parishes of Woodford and Barking meet, as such district chapelry of Saint Paul, Woodford Bridge, is more particularly
