> Before Sevastopol, January 6, 1855.

MY LORD DUKE, THE weather has been so bad since I wrote to your Grace on the 2nd instant, that I have not yet been able to disembark the 39th, with a view of encamping the regiment, and it still remains on board the Golden Fleece, in the harbour.

The ground is thickly covered with snow,

though not very deep.

All my endeavours are directed to the speedy disembarkation and getting up of the huts, which have now arrived in considerable numbers, and the establishment of the depôt of provisions, which I alluded to in my last Despatch, near head quarters, which I am now enabled to do, with the assistance of the 18th and 39th Regiments, the first encamped near Balaklava, the last still sleeping on board the Golden Fleece.

THE following Despatch and Enclosures have been received from Rear-Admiral Sir James Stirling, Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's ships and vessels on the East India and China station:

On the Repression of Piracy.

Winchester, at Hong Kong, Sir, November 25, 1854.

IN the fourth paragraph of my general letter, Number 78, of the 9th instant, I had the honour to report the existing necessity for rigorous measures in regard to piracy in this neighbourhood, complaints and representations on the subject of which were addressed to me daily, either by the local government or private persons; and I now beg leave to state the course I adopted for the repression of that evil.

2. In the first instance I requested Mr. Robertson, the Acting Superintendent of Trade, to call upon the Viceroy of Canton, to take certain measures for the capture and detention of the numerous vessels engaged in the business of robbery upon the waters within the imperial jurisdiction, but the Viceroy candidly admitted his want of force. I then requested Mr. Robertson to inform his Excellency that if he would send a mandarin of rank, instructed to co-operate with me upon this service, and would direct and authorise him to visit and examine every port and place upon the coast, known or suspected to be haunts of pirates, and every vessel of a suspicious character, I would provide for the safety of this officer and any junk accompanying him, and give him the aid and support of British vessels-of-war in the search; and that I felt assured, with the legal sanction afforded by an imperial officer's presence, and his acquaintance with localities and persons, a stop might be put to an evil which threatened to increase, if unopposed, to a most destructive extent.

3. To this proposal the Viceroy gave a hearty assent (Enclosure No. 1). I accordingly despatched a steamer to the Bogue, and on the 5th instant she brought back the mandarin commanding the station, and a war junk. In the meanwhile

I had directed Captain O'Callaghan to take charge of the intended operations under orders, copies of which are hereunto annexed; but before I proceed to report the proceedings of Captain O'Callaghan, after the mandarin arrived, I beg to place before their Lordships the following circumstances.

4. The Governor of Macao, whose acquaintance I have long had the satisfaction to enjoy, made me a cordial offer of all the aid he could afford; the American Commodore placed a steam vessel, the Queen, at my disposal; the leading native merchants at Canton transmitted to Messrs. Russell and Company 5,000 dollars, to be used as I might see occasion; an opulent Chinese trader chartered two steamers of the Peninsular and Oriental Company to accompany any expedition I might send; and the Lieutenant-Governor of Hong Kong gave every assistance in his power. These concurrent acts, I trust, will satisfy their Lordships of the necessity for action; and, accordingly, while waiting for the arrival of the mandarin, on the 3rd instant, I despatched Lieutenant Charles Fellowes with the boats of the Winchester and Spartan, the latter under Lieutenant Wray Palliser, both of whom had been so often previously reported as having been most creditably engaged in such enterprises, to enquire into a robbery committed that same day, in one of the channels leading to this harbour. Lieutenant Fellowes's report of proceedings I have herewith the honour to lay before their Lordships; and I venture to hope the entire success of that operation, and the very judicious and gallant conduct evinced by Lieutenant Fellowes, and the excellent behaviour of all who were employed under him, may meet with their Lordships' approbation.

5. On the evening of the 4th instant, Lieutenant Preble, of the American Navy, in command of the Queen, arrived, and informed me he had been fired upon by a squadron of piratical junks not far from this anchorage; and Captain O'Callaghan, who had been made aware of that circumstance, informed me he was then blockading that squadron and awaiting my instructions. I accordingly despatched a reinforcement to the place, as described in the margin,* and on the following day I had the satisfaction to receive the accompanying report of the entire success of Captain O'Callaghan and his force, in the destruction of all the piratical junks in the Bay of Tyho. In that report high commendation is given to Lieutenants Fellowes, Palliser, and Montgomerie (the latter of whom was highly distinguished at the Shanghae conflict in April last). It may here be added, that soon after our squadron left the Bay of Tyho, an imperial squadron entered it, and, having landed part of their people, they captured 60 pirates, whom they carried to the Bogue, and 48 of them having been convicted on the evidence of the other 12, were sentenced for execution.

6. On the 17th instant, Captain O'Callaghan and his vessels returned to this place, and having received orders, copy of which is herewith annexed, he put to sea and proceeded on the service indicated, the importance of which may be estimated when I say that for the last four years Coulan has been the principal stronghold of the pirates in this neighbourhood. Captain O'Callaghan's proceedings at that place are fully described in his accompanying report, and in a private narrative published in the "Friend of China," of which I beg to annex a copy. My task is therefore limited to requesting in the strongest possible terms the attention of their Lordships to the skilful

and judicious manner in which the service was conducted by the officer commanding, Captain O'Callaghan, and to the zealous, steady, and gallant support he received from Commanders Parker and Woollcombe, and from the officers commanding the Portuguese lorcha, and the American steamer; and from Lieutenants Charles Fellowes, Wray Palliser, J. E. Montgomerie, H. W. Fox, R.N., and C. W. Burton, R.M., and from the gentlemen commanding the two Peninsular and Oriental steamers, and from all the officers, seamen, and marines employed, with only one solitary instance of inebriety, amidst a profusion of spirits.

7. Captain O'Callaghan's further proceedings on leaving Coulan are detailed in his report annexed (Enclosure No. 8); and I beg in conclusion to express the satisfaction I feel at the successes thus achieved, and that I shall continue to avail myself while here of every opportunity to carry out the views and intentions, thus happily so far successful, in repressing the depredations which threatened the very existence of this colony, and of all commerce on the coasts adjacent.

The Imperial Commissioner Yeh Ming Shin to Mr. Consul Robertson.

YEH, Imperial High Commissioner, Governor-General of the two Kwang provinces, &c., &c.,

makes this declaration in reply.

On the 13th day of the 9th month (3rd November) I received your representation to the following effect. [Here are quoted the principal portions of Mr. Robertson's letter of the date named.] With respect to the pirates who infest the river, I have to state that for some time past I have kept a fleet of several hundred vessels cruising against them and guarding exposed points. You mention that Sir James Stirling, the Admiral of your honourable nation, has arrived at Hong Kong, accompanied by war steamers, and you request that a vessel may be despatched to co-operate with them in scarching for and destroying pirates. I have, in compliance with this, sent directions to the Commandant on the Ta Pang Station to proceed on the service described with a naval force; and I now reply to acquaint you with the same.

Winchester, at Hong Kong, October, 31, 1854.

HAVING received from his Honour the flieutenant-Governor of this colony, and also rom Mr. Robertson, Acting-Superintendent of Trade in this quarter, representations setting forth the very serious and alarming extent to which piratical depredations have been recently carried on in this neighbourhood, it becomes necessary to

take such effectual measures as may be in my power to apply to the correction of this evil.

It is therefore my intention to employ you in H. M. steam-ship under your command, together with such further force as may be from time to time required upon that service. You will accordingly apply yourself with all possible assiduity to obtain from the proper quarters correct information in regard to the haunts and habits, resources and general condition of those who devote themselves to these criminal practices; and with this view you will use your own judgment as to visiting any place or anchorage within 100 miles of this port as you may deem expedient, keeping me informed of your motions, and communicating with me, if possible, before you engage in any operation of importance.

I have arranged already with his Honour the Lieutenant-Governor to afford you any aid you may desire in pilots and otherwise; and I send you herewith a letter addressed to his Excellency the Governor of Macao, who has given assurances that he will afford his valuable assistance in the

prosecution of this service.

Following up the general instructions herein given, you will, as soon as the Encounter shall be ready, proceed to Macao, and from thence to any part of the coast in this vicinity you may deem expedient for the purpose of reconnoitring.

On Saturday next, the 4th proximo, you will rejoin me at this anchorage, by which time I expect important communications on the subject

from the Viceroy at Canton.

I need scarcely remind you, in the execution of this service, of the necessity of conforming to the 8th article, page 23, chapter 10 of the standing printed orders of this station, or that it is absolutely necessary to distinguish between acts of piracy committed in view upon the high sea upon British subjects, and acts of robbery within the waters and jurisdiction of China, by Chinese upon their fellow subjects. In the former case you have full authority to interfere, but in the latter case the right and duty of interference belongs to the authorities of China, to whom our aid may be given to a reasonable extent.

H.M. Ship Winchester, Hong Kong, November 3, 1854.

I HAVE to report the return of the boats of Her Majesty's ships Winchester and Spartan, which you did me the honour to place under my command on the evening of the 1st instant, and the result of their proceedings, The boats being manned and armed, and officered |

Winchester's Launch - Lieutenant Charles Fellowes; Mr. Gilmore, midshipman; Mr. Stuart, assistant-surgeon;

2nd Barge-Lieutenant J. Bushnell; Hon. H. D. Lascelles, m'dshipman; Pinnace-Mr. F. Robinson, midshipman.

Spartan's Barge - Licutenant Palliser; Mr. Grove, midshipman;

Pinnace—Mr. Oliver, mate;

left the Winchester at 5 30 p.m. of the 1st instant, and proceeded to the Throat Gates of Capsingmoon Passage; overhauled two boats off the island of Makwan, on their way to Hong Kong, whose cargoes had that day been removed by some pirates; at 10 P.M. anchored for the night off Pilong Bay.

At daybreak on the morning of the 2nd instant weighed, and, observing some boats at anchor off the village in Pilang Bay, proceeded to examine, and found two of them to be Hong Kong passageboats, whose crews reported three boats then on the beach to belong to pirates, and the village, which consisted of six houses, apparently storehouses, to be their stronghold; sent the police constable on shore with the informers to examine these houses, in which portion of the property lost by informants was found; restored the same to them, burnt the houses, and destroyed the

boats, three in number.

At 7 A.M., at the request of the informants, stood towards Castle Peak Bay. As we opened the land observed four large junks in the offing, and one small Hong Kong boat making towards us; on nearing our boats the latter reported the four junks to be pirates, who had just robbed them of all their property. I desired one of the crew to come into the launch and accompany the boats for the purpose of giving evidence against They now made for Tynmoon Bay, these junks. sailing and pulling a number of oars, the boats in full chase; they succeeded in entering the bay before our boats could overtake them, and running two of them on shore at separate points; their crews landed and received us with a sharp fire of musquetry and wall pieces from the rocks; having dispersed them from their positions, I ordered Lieutenant Bushnell and Mr. Oliver to go in and bring out the junks, and with the remaining three boats proceeded to the head of the bay; received the fire from one Hong Kong fast-boat lying alongside of another, took both of them, and left the four vessels anchored in the centre of the bay, clear of the enemy's fire, under charge of Mr. Oliver; proceeded with the remainder of the boats up a small creek, the Winchester's second barge, Lieutenant Bushnell, leading, closely followed by the Spartan's barge, Lieutenant Palliser; the launch drawing too much water grounded several times, and I considered it more prudent, with a falling tide, to send her out of the creek, and taking the Winchester's pinnace followed the two barges, which had now pushed up as far as the water would allow, and grounding, received a sharp fire of musquetry from the pirates concealed behind the rocks, they having placed themselves there in strong position, from which they were soon driven by the two boats' crews; then landed, finding it impossible to get the pinnace up far enough to make use of her gun; I landed under fire of musquetry from the rocks on the opposite side of the creek, accompanied by Mr. Stuart, assistant surgeon, and five men, and joined the other two boats' crews under Lieutenants Palliser and Bushnell, ordering the pinnace at the same | their strongholds at Coulan, or up the Broadway

time to move down the creek into deep water. The pirates had time, unfortunately, to remove all valuables and munitions of war from the two junks found here, which were burnt without delay. In the meanwhile a large junk of about 200 tons hove in sight, and steering towards our former prizes fired a shot at them, Mr. Oliver returned the fire immediately, and joined by Gilmore in the launch, chased and drove her on shore, having exchanged several shots with her; the crew jumped overboard and swam to the shore, leaving the mangled bodies of several of their number lying about the deck; the boats now boarded her and found several guns, gingalls, stink-pots, &c. Mr. Gilmore endeavoured to bring the vessel off shore, but not being able to succeed took the guns out of her and blew her up.

The tide having fallen so much as to leave the two barges high and dry up the creek, I ordered Lieutenant Palliser to take such steps as to secure his party against surprise from the enemy, which he did by landing the gun from the Winchester's barge to keep them in check, fancying they had some idea of coming down again towards the boats. No further annoyance however was attempted, and I returned to the former prizes for the purpose of examining their cargoes; the two first taken contained the greater portion of the property lost by the informers, which I restored to them, and allowed them to put the same into one of the two Hong Kong fast-boats taken, which, from want of evidence, I did not consider it my duty to detain; the other three junks were burnt, making in all nine piratical vessels destroyed, the stronghold of the pirates razed to the ground, from forty to fifty men killed, bringing away nine guns and seven gingalls.

I cannot close this without expressing my high sense of the conduct of the officers and men under my command, and the zeal displayed was so universal that I cannot particularize any one.

H.M.S. Encounter, Hong Kong, November, 4, 1854.

IN compliance with your orders of the 31st ultimo, I have the honour to inform you that I. arrived at Macao on the morning of the 1st instant, and the same day waited on his Excellency the Governor.

From him I learned that the piratical fleet, infesting this neighbourhood, were supposed to be partly at Coulan, in the Island of Tyloo, and partly at Moto, up the Broadway River; that he had been applied to by an inferior mandarin to assist in their destruction, but had declined doing so unless applied to by an officer of higher rank. He very kindly offered to place at your disposal, a schooner and lorcha, the former but lightly armed with a few small guns, the latter with four 12-pounder carronades, one 25 cwt. 32-pounder, and one 17 cwt. 32-pounder carronades.

On consulting with him, and with the view of any future operations being undertaken, I came to the conclusion that it would be unadvisable to visit any portion of the West Coast this time, but confine myself to the islands in the neighbourhood of Hong Kong, where, should there be any portion of the piratical fleet, they would no doubt retire to

River, where his Excellency has promised to have a good look out kept on them, and their movements watched.

I remained at Macao the whole of the 2nd, in order that I might have the benefit of any further information his Excellency might be able to obtain,

and which he was endeavouring to do.

On the evening of that day at 7 30, a small American steam-vessel the Queen, tender I imagine to the United States frigate Macedonian, arrived, and Lieutenant Prebles, her commander, informed me he had been engaged with a piratical force of ten junks, at Tyho, in the island of Lantao; that on his approaching the bay with his ensign and pendant flying, they had, without the slightest provocation, opened fire upon him, which he returned, but not considering his vessel of sufficient force to engage them closely with a prospect of carrying them, he had come to ask my aid. I informed him of the nature of my orders, and that under them it was not in my power to make any attack on them, but that I would go down and endeavour to blockade them until I had communicated with you, as it was not improbable from the communication you were in with the Chinese authorities it might be in your power to give me more freedom of action. Accordingly, at 10 30 P.M., I weighed and proceeded under steam to Tyho, where I arrived at daylight on the 3rd. The piratical vessels were seen moored close in shore, some portion up a creek; Lieutenant Prebles told me he should go and have a shot at them. I said I could only look on and hoped he would do nothing to compel me to interfere; he opened fire, which was promptly returned by two well-directed shots from one of the junks; he then returned, and at my request proceeded to Hong Kong, to inform you of the affair, and also to take a note from me on

The Queen returned at 4 P.M. with the boats of Her Majesty's ship Spartan in tow, and Lieutenant Prebles told me he was certain it was your intention I should attack the pirates, but had no written communication from you on the subject. As the day was drawing to a close, and only two hours' day light remaining, I trust I only anticipated the tenor of your written orders (conveyed to me by Commander Parker, Her Majesty's ship Barracouta, which vessel arrived about an hour after the Queen), by commencing operations at once, as Lieutenant Prebles had no hesitation in identifying the junks as those that had fired on him the pre-

vious evening, without provocation.

A few shot and shell from the Encounter, at a range of 1800 yards, speedily dislodged the pirates both from the junks and the houses in their vicinity, otherwise their position would have rendered a boat attack somewhat hazardous; as it was, on the boats reaching them they were found deserted, and under the direction of Lieutenant Fellowes, with the boats of the Winchester, and also those of the Encounter and Spartan, the latter commanded respectively by Lieutenants Montgomerie and Palliser, were burnt, their guns having previously been taken out. I am happy to have it in my power to express my entire satisfaction with the manner in which those officers carried out my orders, a copy of which I have the honour to enclose.

The gratitude however of the poor people of Tyho is unbounded; and although I am fully aware it is no part of my duty to protect the subjects of the Emperor of China, yet it is gratifying to find we are borne out in our acts by their testimony.

These marauders have been levying contributions on Tyho, and driving the population from it since their arrival. No doubt they had much

property on board their junks, but this was removed during the day; I trust, however, they will not benefit by it, as I understand the people of Tyho drove them from its vicinity during the night. I did not think it advisable to search the town for either property or the persons of the pirates, fearing that mistakes might be made, and innocent people suffer for the guilty; I therefore weighed this morning at ten, and have now the honour to report my arrival.

The number of junks destroyed are nineteen, armed with some twenty-five guns of various calibre, of from 12 to 3-pounders. They had abundance of ammunition, and the usual supply

of stink-pots, &c.

PURSUANT to an arrangement entered into with the Viceroy of Canton, the Commandant of the Ta-Pang station, a mandarin of rank, arrived this morning with two war junks, for the purpose of co-operating with Her Majesty's naval force in the repression of piracy in the channels and upon the coasts adjacent to this colony. The importance of that officer's presence upon that service you will readily comprehend on reference to my extant instructions of the 31st ultimo; and you will perceive that his presence will not only justify you in acting as an aid and support to him in the execution of his duty in the search for and apprehension of pirates within the waters or upon the shores subject to Chinese jurisdiction, but that his knowledge of the people and places will very much facilitate the service in question.

The plan which I have accordingly arranged with the Commandant is, that in the first instance he shall proceed to Coulan, in the island of Tyloo, with the view of examining that locality, which is understood to be a haunt of pirates, and where it is supposed some portions of the cargoes plundered from the Mary Anna and Caldera may be found, and very important information be obtained; and to ensure his safety and augment his means, while executing that service, I have determined on employing you in command of a force sufficiently large to give full effect to that arrangement.

You will accordingly take under your direction and command, in addition to the Encounter, Her Majesty's steam-sloop Barracouta and Styx, the launch of the Winchester, and a boat from the Spartan, and it is understood you will be accompanied by two steamers hired by native merchants now resident in this colony, some of whom will

proceed in them to identify property heretofore

taken from them by the pirates.

You will also be accompanied by the United States hired war steamer, the Queen, under command of Lieutenant Prebles, whom Captain Abbott has placed at my disposal for the purpose of rendering aid in this service, and for conveying certain American merchants who have goods to reclaim.

It is unnecessary to give you detailed instructions in this case, as the objects aimed at, in conjunction with the local circumstances, will be your best instruction upon your arrival at Tyloo; but I am very anxious to impress upon you, that while I desire to detect, apprehend, and bring to punishment any persons who may have been engaged in acts of piracy, and to bring them to trial before the proper courts, I deprecate conflicts between our force and any bodies of such persons except they be justified by self-defence; and therefore, while you are to afford the Commandant full aid, support, and security in the performance of his duties before-mentioned, you are to avoid any acts of hostility and violence uncalled for and unjustified by the circumstances in which you may be placed.

The Lieutenant-Governor having acceded to

The Lieutenant-Governor having acceded to my request for the services of Mr. Caldwell, the chief of the police of Hong Kong, and having directed him to accompany you upon the expedition, I do not doubt you will derive advantage

from his presence.

So soon as the port and town of Coulan shall have been visited in the manner aforesaid, you will detach the Barracouta to me with intelligence, and proceed with the other vessels to the mouth of the Broadway and await further orders.

Her Majesty's Ship Encounter, off Concock, Sir, November 11, 1854.

IN pursuance of your orders, I have the honour to inform you that I took in tow, off Green Island, two junks of His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of China, on board of one of which was the mandarin alluded to in your letter of the 11th instant. Her Majesty's ship Styx having joined, I proceeded on my way to Tyloo by way of Lantao.

It blew hard during the night, with considerable sea on, and consequently we were forced to go very slowly on account of the vessels in tow. By 6 A.M. of the 12th, it blew a fresh gale, dead off shore (Her Majesty's steam-sloop Barraconta joined us at this time), and I was truly glad to steam for the first sheltered bay I could reach. Both junks broke adrift; the first was picked up by Her Majesty's steam-sloop Styx, by signal, and the other we got hold of again ourselves, at the risk of a boat, which I was forced to lower, and could not hoist up again; she however got hold of the junk, and we succeeded in towing them into shelter, between Tymong and Concock, we had mistaken the latter island for Tyloo, our pilots proving ignorant of this part of the coast. time, however, was lost by this, as it would have been impossible for boats to have acted to the N.E. of that island.

On rounding Concock we observed three armed junks at anchor, who immediately commenced throwing overboard their guns and removing their cargoes. I sent for Mr. Caldwell and the mandarin, who came on board; the latter declared them to be pirates. I told him I could not act upon a mere assertion of this kind, but that any steps he might think proper to take in ascertaining the fact, I would support him; I accordingly ordered Lieutenant Fellowes to take his own boat, together with the boats of the Encounter, Barracouta, and Styx, commanded respectively by the First Lieutenants of those ships, and support the officers and men sent by the mandarin, in the execution of their duty; I also requested Mr. Caldwell to accompany them, with any of the parties who might wish to go, for the purpose of identifying their lost property. Lieutenant Prebles, of the United States Navy, in command of the chartered steam-vessel Queen, volunteered to cover the boats, which service I accepted.

The boats being deserted, and a portion of the property (or rather sails of Caldera) being found,

those junks were destroyed.

After this I proceeded in the Peninsular and Oriental Company's steam-vessel Canton, and reconnoitered the Bay of Coulan, where I found a large assembly of junks and a considerable battery. About 5 P.M., His Most Catholic Majesty's naval lorcha Amazon, appeared in sight, and on opening the bay was fired upon. Having satisfied myself of the position, I closed up our own ships, and sending a party of marines and an armed boat on board the Canton and Charles Forbes (also of the Peninsular and Oriental Company's Service), and on board the Queen, desired Lieutenant Fellowes to undertake the blockade of that bay during the night, which he most effectually did. During a reconnoitre early in the morning by Lieutenant Fellowes in his launch, he was repeatedly fired upon, but acting strictly in accordance with my orders, did not return the fire.

I moved Her Majesty's ship under my command into two and a half fathoms, at daylight, and having made my arrangements to support the mandarin in a search for property, &c., and also with a due regard to the safety of those under my command, I had the armed boats, and a party of 100 small arm men, towed up to the bay; and having entered into a communication with the mandarin, and he having appointed certain officers to proceed in the search of Coulan and the junks there, for plundered property, I sent the abovenamed force to support the imperial officers. The boats, under the command of Commander Parker, consisting of the launch of the Winchester, the paddle-box boats and pinnaces of the Barracouta. and Styx, and also the pinnace of the Spartanthe officers therein I have noted in the marginthe marines and small arm men, with a field-piece and rocket party, the whole under the command of Commander Woollcombe; the marines of the ships under Lieutenant Burton, R.M., and the latter party under Lieutenant Montgomerie, senior lieutenant of the Encounter, assisted by Mr. The moment these boats left they Butler, mate. were fired upon; I then directed the Portuguese lorcha and the United States chartered steam-

vessel to cover the boats, and I cannot express myself too highly of the conduct of the former in the admirable manner in which he took his little vessel into action, and the beautiful precision of his fire. I am not less indebted to Lieutenant Prebles for his exertions, and he has always shewn an anxious desire to aid me in every

I had given my directions to Commanders Parker and Woollcombe as to the landing of the men and the covering of the landing; they were most ably and gallantly carried out under a fire of a battery of twenty guns of various calibre from 12 to 6-pounders. The battery being silenced, Commander Parker landed, and taking command of the whole force proceeded to endeavour to capture some of the piratical force; in the execution of this duty he had to encounter a small battery of seven guns, where the fugitives made a stand, but it was soon carried. I called upon the mandarin officer to declare what junks he considered piratical, and also if any portion of the houses should be destroyed; he declared the whole of the junks as such, and pointed out what portion of the houses he considered should be destroyed; accordingly forty-eight masted junks were set on fire. would have taken a week to get them afloat.

The property found was a case of instruments belonging to the master of the Caldera, also a chest of tea. I have also further indication of their having plundered either American or English

vessels.

In the performance of this service the boats had to land the men under great natural obstacles, and a fire of twenty guns kept up for half an hour. It was ably and well done by the officers aforementioned: I am perfectly satisfied with their conduct.

The loss on our side was one American seaman killed; on the part of the pirates fifty. Eight Chinese were captured, but whether pirates or not

remains to be proved.

I now send the Barracouta, in accordance with your orders. Commander Parker will afford you any further details. I proceed to-morrow, Tuesday, the 14th instant, off the Broadway. Should it be your intention to carry out operations up that river I deem it requisite to have a further force for landing, as I cannot leave the ships at twenty miles' distance with so few hands as I did to-day; and, Sir, I have further to state that I consider it quite impracticable to suppress piracy on this coast without a recourse to decided hostilities.

The amount of guns taken and destroyed is thirty-eight, a greater portion of which are on board the mandarin's junk. The largest gun de-

stroyed is a 32-pounder.

Her Majesty's Steam-ship Encounter,
Sir, Hong-Kong, November 17, 1854.

I HAVE the honour to inform you, in continuation of my last letter of proceedings and report of the affair at Coulan, that I so far altered my plans as to remain at that place the whole of the 14th instant, for the purpose of making a further search for lost property and, if possible, taking prisoners.

For this purpose, I communicated with the

mandarin, who said he had been about to propose the subject to me, but thought we had already done so much that he did not like to do so, but that he would send an officer with fifty men; this he did, and I directed Lieutenant Montgomeric, senior lieutenant of this ship, to support him with a party of thirty marines of the Encounter and Styx, and thirty small-arm men of the former. The marines were commanded by Lieutenant Burton, R.M.; and Lieutenant Montgomerie was assisted by Lieutenant Fox, and Mr. Hardinge, midshipman; the whole were embarked on board the Peninsular and Oriental steam-vessel Charles Forbes, and Lieutenant Fellowes was directed to superintend and cover their landing, if required, with the Winchester's launch.

My orders were ably and steadily carried out; but, from the great difficulty of getting through the country, and want of knowledge of it, the parties only succeeded in making five prisoners, whom I have delivered to the mandarin.

At 3 A.M., of the 15th, I weighed, and at 8 o'clock fell in with the Barracouta: and, having made myself acquainted with your further instructions, proceeded with the squadron up the Broadway, to within eight miles of Moto. daylight the next morning I embarked in the Peniusular and Oriental Company's steam-vessel Canton, taking with me Mr. Raymond, Master of the Encounter, and Mr. Sarratt, second Master of the Spartan, to ascertain the possibility of the squadron being brought higher up if required. I take this opportunity of bringing to your notice the former officer, who has had some arduous duty to perform, of which he has acquitted himself to my entire satisfaction. I also had with me the Winchester's launch and ten marines, and an imperial officer from the mandarin. At Moto there are no imperial authorities, and not obtaining any satisfactory information, I proceeded off Yut-Kok, where were lying nineteen armed junks; with these I communicated, and ascertained they were chartered vessels for the protection of Hong-Shan, and were in charge of an imperial officer. officer afterwards came on board, and informed me that Aw-ung, the pirate chief, he believed to be at Chun-Kok, and that the mandarin of Hong-Shan was endeavouring to persuade him to join the imperial forces; from other sources I was informed he had done so, and I understood that the mandarin at Canton had also been making overtures to him to the same effect. His force was said to be about forty junks.

I considered it highly important that these facts should be clearly ascertained, and accordingly proceeded up a branch of the Broadway river, to the N.W. This has never been visited before, and I have desired Mr. Raymond, master, to draw up a report of it. We anchored abreast a small fort at the village of Woo-chun, opposite Ngoi-hoi, about thirty-five miles from Moto; here the Chinese who lost so much property ascertained that Aw-ung, with thirty junks, had gone up to Macao Fort, and been received by the imperial officers. Twenty rebel rowing-boats came down upon us, with not less than 100 men in each; but, on their being made aware of what was the object of our visit, immediately came to anchor. I was unable to rejoin the squadron that night, the pilot declining to go on after dark; but at 7 30 this morning I did so, and then, in obedience to your orders, directed the Barraconta to Hong-Kong by the Capsingmoon, and having ascertained it was the mandarin's desire to return to the Bogue, I directed the Styx on that service, and taking in tow the Portuguese lorcha myself, proceeded down the river. com pany.

Thus the squadron you did me the honour to place under my command was broken up, and it only now remains for me to state how perfectly satisfied I am with all. The greatest good feeling has existed among officers and men. To Commander Scarmihia, of the Portuguese lorcha Amazon, to Lieutenant Prebles, in command of the United States chartered vessel Queen, my best thanks are due, for their zealous and gallant co-operation with Her Majesty's ship under my command. From Commanders Parker and Woollcombe I have received every assistance; and it is to them and the officers already mentioned as forming their respective divisions, and with the active assistance alluded to above in carrying out my views and wishes, that the expedition owes its success. For Lieutenant Fellowes, senior lieutenant of your flag ship, I beg to assure you I cannot say too much in his praise,—always ready and willing for anything. Lieutenant Palliser, of Her Majesty's ship Spartan, has also given me much satisfaction, and I regret to say he is now suffering from his exertions. Licutenant Montgomerie, senior licutenant of my own ship, is an officer in whom I can place the greatest confidence, and I selected him in consequence, for the peculiar and difficult duty of searching for the pirates at Coulan, in the execution of which there was so much danger of the innocent suffering. I also, when I thought it was my duty to quit my ship, felt at my ease, knowing he was on board. Mr. Raymond and the other master of the squadron, deserve credit for the manner in which the ships have been navigated in water very often not a foot more than they drew.

In conclusion I must further beg to call your attention to the very steady conduct of the respective ships' companies; there was a great quantity of spirits in some of the junks, yet I heard of but one case of drunkenness. The service has been attended with considerable fatigue, which has been borne most cheerfully, and I trust you may feel it in your power to recommend those employed to the favourable consideration of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

I beg to enclose a statement of the services performed since the 2nd instant, also Mr. Raymond's remark on the N.W. branch of the River Broad-

Mr. Percy Earl, master's assistant of this ship, formed one of the party in the attack of Coulan, on the 13th instant; his name was unintentionally omitted in my report.

Statement of service performed by the crews of Her Majesty's ships Encounter, Barracouta, and Styx, and the launch of the Winchester, and pinnace of the Spartan, between the 2nd and 17th November, 1854.

At Tr-Ho. The whole of the junks, 17 in number, were destroyed; 6 guns taken by Winchester's boat delivered to Marshal of Admiralty Court at Hong Kong; 7 guns taken by Spartan's boat disposed of in like manner; 2 guns taken and retained by the United States chartered steam-vessel Queen; and 10 guns destroyed with the junks and sunk. Number of pirates killed unknown. From 50 to 60 prisoners taken by the Chinese authorities.

At Coulan and the neighbourhood. 50 junks destroyed; also 2 batteries, mounting 20 and 7 guns respectively; 17 guns taken by the Chinese authorities, and 6 by the Queen; 27 guns sunk and destroyed, being too heavy to embark without considerable waste of time; 15 guns thrown overboard by the pirates themselves from 3 junks off Cow-Kok; and from 50 to 60 pirates killed; 4 prisoners (13 were taken, 9 of whom either have been or are to be released by the mandarin).

TOTALS. 67 junks burnt, being in such positions that it would have taken a very long time, and would have been attended with considerable exposure and fatigue to have removed them.

90 guns taken or destroyed.

50 to 60 pirates killed.

54 to 60 prisoners, as above stated.

The whole of the junks were capable of having crews of from 20 to 40 men each; allowing therefore an average of thirty men for each junk, there would not have been less than 2000 pirates, of whom 115 may be said to be either taken or killed. A large quantity of ammunition was also destroyed.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed, and made chargeable and payable, upon, for, or in respect of, letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the 'post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post; and by the same Act powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the

Post-office."

And whereas by a Warrant, under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated the 29th day of January, 1852, it was ordered and directed, that packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, might be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several regulations and rates therein contained.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Warrant should be repealed, and that such other regulations should be made respecting the conveyance of certain packets sent by the post as are

hereinafter contained.

- 1. Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order and direct that the said Warrant of the 29th day of January, 1852, and the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth, shall cease and determine, and shall be, and the same are, hereby repealed and revoked. Nevertheless, no Treasury Warrant repealed by the said Warrant of the 29th day of January, 1852, shall be revived by this Warrant.
- 2. And we do further order and direct, that all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, posted in the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several regulations and rates hereinafter contained; that is to say:

On every such packet, if not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of six pence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one shilling.

And for every additional one pound in weight of any such packet, above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged and taken an additional rate of postage of six pence, and every fraction of such additional pound shall be charged as an additional pound.

- 3. And we further order and direct, that no such packet, which in length or breadth or width shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be forwarded by the post under the provisions aforesaid.
- 4. And we further order and direct, that the postage of all such packets as aforesaid, shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post Office in London, in which case the same shall be forwarded post paid, and the postage thereof shall be charged in such postage account.
- 5. And we further order and direct, that the terms "Books, publications, or works of literature or art" herein used, shall, for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and include all books, whether printed, written, or plain, publications or compilations, whether in print or in manuscript, almanacks, prints, maps, whether on paper or canvas or cloth, and whether printed or written, and any description of paper, parchment, or vellum, whether printed, written upon, or plain, together with any binding, mounting, or covering of or upon or belonging to any book or publication or work, or any portion thereof, or of or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book markers, pencils, pens, or other articles usually appertaining to any such book, publication, or work, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission, and that every such packet shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover, or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and that there shall be no letter, either closed or open, nor any enclosure, sealed or otherwise, closed against inspection, sent in or with any such packet, nor shall there be any letter or any communication in the nature of a letter, written or printed on the cover or envelope of any such packet.
- 6. And in order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, we further direct, that it shall be lawful for any officer of the Post-office to delay the transmission of any packet, posted or forwarded by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be dispatched, in due course of the post, or (at his option) until the dispatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought, in due course of the post, to be forwarded by him.
- 7. And we further direct, that the transmission of the packets aforesaid, under this present Warrant, shall be restricted to such as shall be sent by the post between places within the United Kingdom and by the post of any post town in the

United Kingdom, and that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to interfere with or in anywise to affect the transmission by the post of printed votes and proceedings of Parliament, nor of British newspapers or other British publications which are allowed to pass by the post between places within the United Kingdom under the newspaper privilege, nor shall this present Warrant be construed to extend to any packet sent by the post between the United Kingdom and

places beyond the seas.

8. And we further order and direct, that if any packet, or the cover or envelope of any packet, sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this present Warrant shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall in length or breadth or width exceed the dimensions of two feet, or if there shall be any letter, or any communication in the nature of a letter, written or printed on any such cover or envelope, every such packet shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and every such packet, on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter, if the postage had been paid by stamps when posted, and such double postage may be either paid by the sender or be charged to the person to whom such packet shall be forwarded.

9. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet, sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, every such letter or enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post-office, and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged not only with the full rates of postage, as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of six pence; and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid by stamps, may be forwarded to the place of its address

without any extra charge.

10. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant (any such packet sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service, of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post-office in London, and the postage thereof being charged in such account, only excepted), shall be posted, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinbefore contained, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under this Warrant if such packet did not exceed one pound in weight, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon, or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of six pence: but if any such packet shall be posted without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, or having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps the value of which shall be less in amount than the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant, every such last-mentioned packet shall, and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be dealt with and chargeable in like manner, as is hereinbefore directed, with respect to any packet not open at the ends or sides, or exceeding in length, or breadth, or width, the dimensions of two feet.

11. And we do hereby further order and direct, that the terms and expressions used in this Warrant, shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects, as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

12. And we do further direct, that this Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of

March next.

13. Provided lastly, and we do hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being, of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant, under their hands at any time hereafter, to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby fixed or altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas by the said Act, powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, and at any time thereafter by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any of such altered rates and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid, and the power thereby given to alter and fix rates of postage is extended to any increase or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas by an Act, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office," the provision fixing the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, in the first-mentioned Act, is repealed; and in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk or an inconvenient size being transmitted by the post, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by Warrant under their

hands, to fix the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight, wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum of weight in lieu thereof; and it is provided, that all letters shall be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered by the post in conformity with any such Warrant, and also in conformity with and under and subject to all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions as to the form, size, or dimensions thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct. And by the said Act power is also given to the Postmaster-General to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or charge-able on any letters sent by the post, and also with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to require the postage, British, colonial, or foreign, of any letters sent by the post, to be prepaid, either in money or in stamps as he may think fit, on the same being put into the Post-office, and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post, either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the prepayment thereof to be in stamps, and also to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made. And it is also declared and enacted that in all cases in which the British postage, chargeable on any letters sent by the post, shall exceed the sum of one penny, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, reduce such postage to any other rate of postage, they may from time to time think fit. And also that the Postmaster-General may, if he shall think fit (with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury), allow any printed words, writing, or marks (in addition to the direction), to be put on any printed newspapers or other printed papers sent by the post, or on the covers thereof, and that any such newspapers, or other printed papers shall from thenceforth be forwarded either free of postage or subject to such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct. And it is also declared and enacted that the Postmaster-General and any officer of the Post-office may detain any letters which shall be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations of that Act, or the first-mentioned Act, or contrary to any regulations made under the authority of that Act, or of the firstmentioned Act, or contrary to the regulations of any Treasury Warrant to be issued under or by virtue of that Act, or which had been or should be issued under or by virtue of the first-mentioned Act, and open such letters, and either return them to the senders thereof or forward them to the places of their destination, charged in either case with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury shall, from time to time, direct.

And whereas the Postmaster-General hath, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have, at various times, since the passing of the said two before-mentioned Acts, and in pursuance and in exercise of the powers reserved to them thereby, by divers Warrants under their hands, made and given certain orders, directions, and regulations, relating to the weight, size, and dimensions, and to the rates of postage in conformity with, and under and subject

to which, certain printed papers and Parliamentary proceedings therein rerpectively mentioned were to be, and arc, transmitted by the post, and it is expedient that such Warrants, and such orders, directions, regulations, and rates should be altered, repealed, and revoked, and that other orders, directions, regulations, and rates should be made and given, and consolidated and incorporated in one Warrant.

1. Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order and direct that the several Warrants and parts of Warrants mentioned and set forth in the Schedule A to this Warrant annexed, and the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage in such several Warrants and parts of Warrants respectively mentioned and set forth, shall cease and determine, and shall be, and the same are, hereby respectively repealed and revoked.

2. And we do further order and direct, that all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the several places mentioned and set forth in the Schedule B to this Warrant annexed; and that all such respective packets shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under, and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained; and that, as respects certain of the said places in the said Schedule B mentioned, such transmission may also be by the routes mentioned against such places in such schedule; and that the single rate of postage for the transmission thereof shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively in the said Schedule B; and that all such respective packets so transmitted shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such packet so transmitted under the provisions of this Warrant as aforesaid, if not exceeding half a pound in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said schedule B.

And on every such packet exceeding half a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such packet, if exceeding half a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding two pounds and not exceeding three pounds in weight, six rates of postage.

And for every additional one pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of three pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half a pound in weight.

No such packet, which in length or breadth or width, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet shall be forwarded by the post, under the

provisions aforesaid.

No such packet, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales, addressed to the United Kingdom, exceeding the weight of three pounds, shall be forwarded by the post, under the

provisions aforesaid.

The terms "books, publications, or works of literature or art" in this Warrant used, shall for the purposes of this Warrant mean and include all books, whether printed, written, plain; publications or compilations, whether in print or in manuscript, almanacks, prints, maps, whether on paper or canvas or cloth, and whether printed or written, and any description of paper, parchment, or vellum, whether printed, written upon or plain, together with any binding, mounting, or covering of or upon or belonging to any book or publication or work, or any portion thereof, or of or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book markers, pencils, pens, or other articles usually appertaining to any such book, publication, or work, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission; and that every such packet shall be sent open at the ends or sides and either without a cover, or in a cover or envelope, open at the ends or sides, and that there shall be no letter, either closed or open, nor any enclosure, sealed or otherwise, closed against inspection, sent in or with any such packet, nor shall there be any letter or any communication in the nature of a letter, written or printed on the cover or envelope of any such packet.

Upon every packet transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom, and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule B, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post-office in London, in which case the same shall be forwarded, post paid, and the postage thereof shall be charged in such postage account; and upon every such packet which shall be posted in any of the colonies respectively mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule B to this Warrant annexed, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales, addressed to the United Kingdom, shall exceed the weight of three pounds, or if any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule B, shall, in length, or breadth, or width, exceed the dimensions of two feet, or if the postage of any such packet, posted in any of the colonies respectively mentioned in the said schedule B, to this Warrant annexed, shall not be duly and properly paid when posted, or if any packet or the cover or envelope of any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall not be open at the ends or sides, or if there shall be any letter, or any communication in the nature of a letter, written or printed on any such cover or envelope, every such respective packet shall and may be detained and opened, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and every such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, and such double postage may be either paid by the sender, or be charged to the person to whom such packet shall be forwarded.

6. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule B, shall contain any letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure, scaled or otherwise closed against inspection, every such letter or enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged not only with the full rates of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under the said schedule on a packet not exceeding half a pound in weight, and the remainder of the packet, if the postage be duly paid when posted, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

7. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, respectively between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule B (any such packet sent from any department or office in or connected with I hereby made, and may make and establish any

the public service of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post Office in London, and the postage thereof being charged in such account, only excepted), shall be posted in the United Kingdom, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinbefore contained, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under the said schedule, if such packet did not exceed half a pound in weight, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage, equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under the said schedule on a packet not exceeding half a pound in weight; but if any such packet shall be posted in the United Kingdom, without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, or having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the single rate of postage chargeable under the said schedule, every such last-mentioned packet shall and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be dealt with and chargeable in like manner as is hereinbefore directed with respect to any packet not open at the ends or sides, or exceeding in length, or breadth, or width, the dimensions of two feet.

8. And we do further order and direct, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any packets sent through France, or any other foreign country, to which a transit rate of postage would be payable thereon.

9. And we do further order and direct, that the Postmaster-General shall and may have and exercise the option of sending any packets hereby authorized to be sent by the post under the provisions aforesaid, either by packet-boat, or by private ship, at the same rate of postage as by packet-boat, when and as he shall think fit.

10. And we do further order and direct, that the term "by the post," used in this Warrant, or in any schedule hereto annexed, shall, as to the seå conveyance, include the conveyance by any British or Colonial packet-boat, and also by private ship, when sent by the Postmaster-General, in accordance with the provision last hereinbefore contained, and the option thereby given to the Postmaster-General; and that the term "East Indies" used in this Warrant, or in any schedule hereto annexed, shall be construed to mean every port or place in Asia within the limits of the charter of the East India Company (China, Hong Kong, Ceylon, the Mauritius, Java, Borneo, and Australia excepted); and that the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant or in any schedule hereto annexed, shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

11. And we do further order and direct that the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's I'reasury may, by Warrant under their hands, or the hands of any two of them, at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations, and conditions

new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations, and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

12. And we do further order and direct, that this Warrant shall come into operation on the

first day of March next.

Provisional Order. Cannock and Penkridge Road.

WHEREAS the Trustees of the Cannock and Penkridge Turnpike Road, acting under the powers of the Local Act of the 7th of George the Fourth, cap. 9, have made application to Her Majesty's Principal Sccretary of State for the Home Department, pursuant to the Act of the session holden in the 14th and 15th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, cap. 38, for a Provisional Order upon the terms following; viz.:—

To reduce the rate of interest on the mortgage debt, charged or secured on the tolls or revenues of the said road, from the sum of five pounds per centum, per annum, to the sum of one pound per centum, per annum; and to extinguish the whole of the arrears of interest due upon the said debt.

And whereas the said application is dated the eighteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and is signed by three of the said trustees, who therein certify that the persons entitled to more than two-thirds of the money charged or secured on the tolls of the said road, and remaining unpaid, have signified their consents in writing under their hands to the said application.

And whereas it appears desirable to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, that the aforesaid application should be granted upon the terms herein set forth.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power and authority of the said Act of the 14th and 15th of Victoria, cap. 38, given to me as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, I do by this Provisional Order under my hand declare, subject to the confirmation hereof by Parliament, that, from the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, the rate of interest shall be reduced from five pounds to one pound per centum, per annum, upon the bonded or mortgage debt of one thousand four hundred pounds, charged or secured upon the tolls or revenues of the said road; and that the whole of the arrears of interest due and remaining unpaid upon the said debt, at that date, shall be extinguished.
