The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories of any Foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to a subject of such Power, when within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty, that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being Belgian subjects) who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories belonging to His Majesty the King of the Belgians:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves (and not being British subjects), who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to subjects of the King of the Belgians, within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories

apprehended and carried on board their respective ships: Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THEREAS by the "Merchant Shipping Law Amendment Act, 1853," it is (amongst other things) enacted that Her Majesty may, from time to time, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, fix the establishments to be maintained by the Corporation of Trinity House of Deptford Strond (therein and hereinafter called "The Trinity House"), the Commissioners in whom the management of Scotch Lighthouses is vested by an Act of the twenty-sixth year of the reign of King George the Third, and by various other Acts (and therein and hereinafter called "The Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses"), and the Corporation for preserving and improving the Port of Dublin (therein and hereinafter called The Port of Dublin Corporation"), respectively, on account of the services of lighthouses, and to be maintained by the Trinity House on account of the services to which the rates received by them are to be applied, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of such establishments; and if it appears that any part of the establishments of the Trinity House, or of the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, or of the Port of Dublin Corporation of the East India Company, shall be liable to be respectively, is maintained for the purposes of

that Act, and also for other purposes, may fix, and from time to time alter, the portion of the expense of such establishments to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund.

And whereas it appears that part of the establishment of the Port of Dublin Corporation is maintained for the purposes of the said recited Act, and also for other purposes.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue, and in exercise, of the power vested in Her by the said "Merchant Shipping Law Amendment Act, 1853," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to fix, and doth hereby fix, the establishments which may be maintained by the Trinity House, the Commissioners of Northern Light-houses, and the Port of Dublin Corporation, respectively, on account of the services in the said Act and hereinbefore mentioned, in the manner following; that is to say:

The establishment of the Trinity House shall

One secretary, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds (£1,000) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding fifty pounds (£50), to an amount not exceeding twelve hundred pounds (£1,200) per

One assistant secretary, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding six hundred pounds (£600) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding twenty-five pounds (£25), to an amount not exceeding eight hundred pounds (£800) per annum.

Five senior clerks, each at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding three hundred pounds (£300) per annum, and rising, by a yearly increase not exceeding twenty pounds, to an amount not exceeding six hundred (£600) per annum.

Four assistant clerks, each at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding two hundred pounds (£200) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding ten pounds (£10), to an amount not exceeding three hundred pounds (£300) per annum; and ten junior clerks, each at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding eighty pounds (£80) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding ten pounds (£10) to an amount not exceeding two hundred pounds (£200) per annum.

The establishment of the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses shall consist of-

One secretary, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding seven hundred pounds (£700) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding twenty-five (£25), to an amount not exceeding nine hundred (£900) per annum.

One examiner of accounts, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding two hundred pounds (£200) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding ten pounds (£10) to an amount not exceeding three hundred pounds (£300) per annum.

One book-keeper, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding two hundred pounds (£200) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding ten pounds (£10) to an amount not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds (£250)

One clerk, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding one hundred and twenty pounds (£120), and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding ten pounds (£10) to two hundred pounds (£200) per annum. And

One clerk, at a salary commencing at a sum

and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding five pounds (£5) to an amount not exceeding one hundred pounds (£100) per annum.

And the establishment of the Port of Dublin Corporation shall consist of-

One superintendent, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding seven hundred pounds (£700) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding twenty-five pounds (£25) to an amount not exceeding nine hundred pounds (£900) per annum.

One chief clerk, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding four hundred pounds (£400) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding twenty pounds (£20) to an amount not exceeding six hundred pounds (£600) per annum.

One secretary, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding fifteen pounds (£15) to an amount not exceeding five hundred pounds (£500) per annum.

One accountant, at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding two hundred pounds (£200) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding fifteen pounds (£15) to an amount not exceeding four hundred pounds (£400) per

Two clerks, each at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds (£150) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding ten pounds to an amount not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) per annum.

And two junior clerks, each at a salary commencing at a sum not exceeding eighty pounds (£80) per annum, and rising by a yearly increase not exceeding ten pounds (£10) to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds (£150) per annum.

And Her Majesty, by virtue and in further exercise of the power so vested in her as aforesaid, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to fix and doth hereby fix the annual sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of the several establishments hereby authorized at the sums or amounts hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

In respect of the establishment of the Trinity House and the establishment of the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, the aggregate amount of the salaries which, under the provisions of this present Order in Council shall, for the time being, be payable to the officers of such establishments respectively.

And in respect of the establishment of the Port of Dublin Corporation, two-thirds of the aggregate amount of the salaries which, under the provisions of this present Order, shall, for the time being, be payable to the officers of such last-mentioned establishment.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the not exceeding eighty pounds (£80) per annum, I third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to carry into effect with "certain modifications the fourth report of the "Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and "revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act' to carry into effect, with certain modifications, 'the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for confirming certain alterations in the statutes of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, in London.

"Whereas it is by the said recited Act enacted, that the chapters of the several cathedral and collegiate churches shall from time to time of their own accord, or upon being required by the visitors of the said churches respectively, propose to such visitors such alterations in the existing statutes and rules as shall provide for the disposal of the benefices in their patronage so as to meet the just claims of the minor canons of such churches, and that all such alterations may be confirmed by the authority of the visitor, and that all such statutes and rules when so altered, shall be submitted to us and may be confirmed by the authority in the same Act provided; that is to say: by a scheme prepared by us, and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas, the dean and chapter of the said cathedral church of Saint Paul, have, in pursuance of the directions in that behalf, of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of London, as their visitor, prepared a plan for effecting certain alterations in the statutes of their said church, which plan is set forth in the

schedule hereunto annexed:

"And whereas the alterations proposed by such plan have been confirmed by such visitor, and it appears to us to be expedient that the same should also be confirmed by your Majesty as contemplated by the said recited provision of the said Act.

by the said recited provision of the said Act.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the alterations in the statutes and rules of the said cathedral church which are set forth in the plan contained in the schedule hereunto annexed as aforesaid, shall be confirmed accordingly.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

# SCHEDULE.

"To the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James Lord Bishop of London, and Visitor of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London.

"The Representation and Proposal of the very Reverend Henry Hart Milman, D.D., Dean of the said Cathedral Church, and the Chapter of the same church.

"That by an instrument in writing, bearing date the seventeenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, signed by your Lordship, being a sentence, or adjudication, upon an appeal to your Lordship as such Visitor as aforesaid, by

the Reverend Robert Collier Packman, Clerk, and the Reverend James Lupton, Clerk, two of the minor canons of the said cathedral church, your Lordship was pleased to require of us the the said Dean and Chapter, to prepare a plan for the disposal of benefices in our gift or patronage, according to the forty-seventh section of the Act of Queen Victoria, entitled 'An Act to carry into 'effect, with certain modifications, the fourth 'Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical 'Duties and Revenues.'

"That by the forty-fourth section of the said Act it is enacted as follows:

"'And be it enacted, that upon the vacancy of any benefice in the patronage of the chap-'ter of any cathedral or collegiate church, 'the chapter shall present or nominate 'thereto either a member of such chapter, ' or one of the archdeacons of the diocese, or 'a non-residentiary prebendary, or honorary 'canon, as the case may be, or any spiritual ' person who shall have served for five years 'at the least in the office of minor canon or ' lecturer of the same church, or of master of ' the grammar or other school, if any, attached to or connected with such church, or as in-'cumbent or curate in the same diocese, or as public tutor in either of the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, or who, so far as relates to the cathedral church of Dur-' ham, shall have served for the like term in 'the office of professor, reader, lecturer, or 'tutor in the said University of Durham, or 'shall have been educated thereat, and shall 'be a licentiate or graduate in theology therein, or who shall have served as incum-' bent or curate within the same diccese for the period aforesaid; and that every such office of minor canon, lecturer, schoolmaster, professor, reader, lecturer, or tutor, shall 'immediately upon the expiration of one 'year from the time of his institution to such ' benefice, if not previously resigned, become and be vacant; and that if neither a member of the chapter, nor an archdeacon of the 'diocese, nor a minor canon, nor lecturer, 'nor such schoolmaster, incumbent, or cu-'rate, professor, reader, lecturer, tutor, licen-' tiate, or graduate, as the sase may be, shall 'be presented or nominated to such benefice 'within six calendar months, from the time of the vacancy thereof, the bishop of the 'diocese in which the same is situate may, 'within the next six calendar months, col-'late or license thereto a spiritual person 'who shall have actually served within such 'diocese, as incumbent or curate, for five 'years at the least; and if no such collation 'or license shall be granted within such 'time, the right of presentation or nomination to such benefice for that turn shall ' lapse to the archbishop of the province.'

"That by the forty-sixth section of the said Act it is enacted as follows:

"'And be it enacted, that no minor canon herefafter to be appointed in any cathedral or collegiate church shall be allowed to take and hold, together with his minor canonry, any benefice beyond the limit of six miles from such church.'

"That by the forty-seventh section of the said Act it is enacted as follows:

"'And be it enacted, that the chapters of the 'several cathedral and collegiate churches shall from time to time, of their own accord, 'or upon being required by the visitors of 'the said churches respectively, propose to such visitors such alterations in the existing 'statutes and rules as shall provide for the disposal of the benefices in their patronage, 'so as to meet the just claims of the minor canons of such churches, and as shall make them consistent with the constitution and 'duties of the chapters respectively, as 'altered under the authority of this Act; 'and all such alterations, if approved, may be confirmed by the authority of such visitor, and that in any case, in which 'such alterations shall not be approved, or 'in which such requisition shall not be com-' plied with within twelve calendar months after the making thereof, the visitor shall be at liberty of himself to make the 'necessary alterations; and all such statutes and rules when so altered shall be sub-' mitted to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners ' for England, and may be confirmed by the 'authority hereinafter provided; and that as to any alteration made by a visitor alone, 'the said Commissioners shall communicate 'a draft thereof to the chapter to be affected 'thereby, and shall, together with any 'scheme to be prepared by them under the authority hereinafter contained, lay before 'Her Majesty in Council such remarks as 'may within three months have been made thereon by such chapter; and that out of ' the proceeds of the suspended canonries in any chapter provision may from time to 'time be made by the authority hereinafter ' provided, for relieving the present canons of such chapter from the performance of 'any additional duty by reason of such suspension, by the employment of substitutes to be approved by the respective bishops: provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect any existing right of chapters with their visitors ' to make statutes.'

"That by a certain other Act of Parliament, 4 and 5 Victoria, chapter 39, section 15, it is enacted as follows:

"'And be it declared and enacted that, notwith'standing anything in the secondly recited
'Act contained [3 and 4 Vic., c. 113], any
'minor canon in any cathedral or collegiate
'church may take and hold, together with
'his minor canonry, any benefice which is
'within the distance prescribed by the said
'Act.'

"Now we, the said dean and chapter, in obedience to the said requisition made to us by your Lordship, and according to the directions of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament, do hereby respectfully propose to your Lordship the following plan of alterations in our existing statutes and rules, being such as in our judgment, formed upon a full consideration of the subject, will provide for the disposal of the benefices in our patronage, so as to meet the just claims of the minor canons of the cathedral, and as will make them consistent with the constitution and duties of the chapter, as altered under the authority of the said Act; and we solicit your Lordship's approval and confirmation of the same by your visitatorial authority.

# " Proposed Plan.

"1. That the dean and chapter shall, in the first place, if they think fit, from time to time, when

and as often as any one of the benefices in their patronage shall become vacant, present or nominate thereto either the dean or one of the canons, if qualified to hold the same.

"2. That subject to the foregoing regulation, the dean and chapter from time to time, when and as often as any one of the seventeen benefices\* named in the schedule hereunder written (being all the benefices in the city of London in their patronage, except the vicarage of Saint Giles, Cripplegate) shall become vacant, shall by writing under the hand of the dean, or of the registrar or deputy registrar for the time being of the said dean and chapter, make the offer of presentation or nomination thereto, to any one of the minor canons of the said cathedral church whom they may think proper to select, he being duly qualified according to the provisions of the said Act; and in case of his refusal, then they shall in the same manner make the like offer to any other of the minor canons who shall be so qualified, and so on, in case of refusal, until such offer shall be accepted by one, or shall have been refused by all of them, and on acceptance by a minor canor of such offer, the dean and chapter shall forthwith present or nominate him to the said benefice; but in the event of refusal of such offer by all the said minor canons to whom the same shall have been so made. the dean and chapter shall be at liberty to present or nominate to the said benefice, any one of the other persons described in the forty-fourth section of the before-mentioned Act of Parliament: provided, nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the dean and chapter from nominating or presenting a minor canon to any benefice in their patronage which he may be qualified to hold, although the same may not be one of the benefices named in the said schedule: provided, also, that it shall not be obligatory on the dean and chapter to present or nominate to any benefice named in the schedule, a minor canon who, at the time of the vacancy thereof, shall be already in possession of a benefice with the cure of souls, whether the same be in the patronage of the said dean and chapter or not, but in every such case they shall use their own discretion with respect thereto.

"3. That every minor canon to whom the dean and chapter shall make an offer of presentation or nomination to a benefice, shall signify by writing under his hand, his refusal or acceptance thereof to the dean or to the canon in residence, within ten days after such offer shall be made to him, and in default of so doing he shall be considered to have refused such offer.

"4. That the presentation or nomination of minor canons by the dean and chapter to the benefices named in the schedule as hereby proposed, shall be subject to such alterations as may from time to time be made by the proper authorities in that behalf by reason of any future Act of the Legislature, or under special circumstances requiring such alterations.

"5. That in all cases not provided for by and subject to the preceding regulations, the dean and chapter shall, upon the vacancy of any benefice in their patronage, present or nominate thereto one of the archdeacons of the diocese or a non-residentiary prebendary of the said cathedral church, or one of the other spiritual persons described in the forty-fourth section of the before-mentioned Act of Parliament.

As to these seventeen benefices, five of them are in the sole patronage of the dean and chapter; to one they present twice in three times, and the remaining eleven are in their alternate patronage.

Cathedral Church contained in the five several items in the said representation or proposal, respectively numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, upon the same being duly confirmed by the authority in that behalf provided by the Act of Parliament, 3 and 4 Victoria, chapter 113, shall form part of the statutes and rules of the said Cathedral Church. In testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hand, and caused our episcopal scal to be affixed this twelfth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and in the twenty-seventh year of our translation.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain "modifications, the fourth report of the Commis-"sioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain "and amend two several Acts relating to the "Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eleventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to earry into effect, with certain modifications, 'the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for regulating the incomes of the dean and canons of the cathedral church of Salisbury.

"Whereas it is by the first-recited Act enacted, that so soon as conveniently may be, and by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same)

such annual sums shall be determined on to be paid, and shall be accordingly paid by us, or such deductions shall be allowed to be made out of the proceeds of any suspended canonry or canonries as, after due inquiry and calculation shall give to the dean of every cathedral and collegiate church in England an average annual income of one thousand pounds, and to the respective canons of every cathedral church in England an average annual income of five hundred pounds.

"And whereas it is by the secondly-recited Act declared and enacted, that notwithstanding such last recited provision it shall be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, to carry the said purposes, or any of them, into effect by any other mode of payment, contribution, augmentation, or endowment, which may be deemed fit, as well as by the mode in the said first-recited Act specified, and that the scale of payments and receipts may from time to time in any case be revised, and, if need be, varied by the like authority, so as to preserve, as nearly as may be, the intended average annual incomes respectively, but not so as to affect any dean or canon in possession at the time of making any such variation.

"And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in

Council, bearing date the seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fiftyone, and duly published in the London Gazette, it was inter alia provided, that the annual income of the present and every succeeding dean of the said cathedral church of Salisbury should be one thousand pounds, to be provided in manner therein

mentioned.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that the further arrangements hereinafter recommended should be adopted with regard to the income of the said deanery.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the annual incomes of the canons of the said cathedral church of Salisbury are subject to much fluctuation and uncertainty, and do not on the average amount to the sum of five hundred pounds each, and we have satisfied ourselves, after due inquiry and consideration, that the following arrangement should also be adopted for

regulating such incomes.

such surplus shall be given to the treasurer of the said cathedral church, and shall be a good and valid discharge for the same, and that if it shall appear by any such account that the amount which may have become so due and payable in the case of any canon be less than the sum of five hundred pounds, then in every such case there shall be paid by us forthwith to such treasurer on account of such canon such a sum of money as shall make up the deficiency, and the receipt of such treasurer, countersigned by the same canon shall be a good and sufficient discharge for any claim which any such canon may have on us in respect of the average annual income to which he may be entitled for the year to which the same account relates. under the provisions of the before-mentioned Order, or of the said first-recited Act.

" Provided always, and we further recommend and propose that all monies which, according to the statutes and usage of the said cathedral church or the chapter thereof may be receivable by any dean or canon thereof succeeding upon the first vacancy of the deanery, and of each canonry happening after the date of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid, shall be included in the next yearly account to be delivered to us as aforesaid, and that the income of the dean or canon so newly appointed shall be made up or limited, as the case may be, in manner aforesaid, to such part of the sum of one thousand pounds or five hundred pounds respectively, and no more, as shall be proportioned, according to such rate, to the period during which he shall have been appointed to such deanery or canonry.

"And that upon every subsequent vacancy of the deanery or of any canonry, all the monies which, according to the statutes and usage of the said cathedral church or the chapter thereof, would, if such vacancy had not taken place, have become due and payable to the dean or canon making such vacancy, out of the corporate revenues of the said cathedral church for the year ending on the day of the next ensuing annual audit as aforesaid, shall be included in the account so to be delivered to us as aforesaid after such audit, and that the whole of any surplus above the sum of one thousand pounds, in the case of a dean, and five hundred pounds, in the case of a canon, shall be paid to us, and that in case the amount of such monies shall be below the said sum of one thousand pounds or five hundred pounds, as the case may be, we shall not be called upon to pay in respect of such deanery or canonry any greater sum for that year than shall, together with the amount of such monies be necessary to make up the income of such deanery or canonry for that year to one thousand pounds or five hundred pounds, as the case may be, and that the respective incomes of one thousand pounds to the dean, and five hundred pounds to each canon, so to be secured as aforesaid, shall on every such vacancy be strictly apportioned between the dean or canon making the vacancy, or his representatives, and the dean or canon succeeding thereto, any statutes or usage of the said cathedral church to the contrary notwithstanding.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Robert Bickersteth, one of the canons of the said church, testified by his having hereunto set his hand and seal, that the provisions of this scheme shall apply to and affect him, the said Robert Bickersteth, and the income

payable to him as such canon.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the said cathedral church, or the dean and canons thereof, in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immedidiately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Coppenhall, in the county and diocese of Chester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate at Crewe, in the said parish of Coppenhall, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional 'churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to 'churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of 'Christ Church Crewe,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"Commencing at Liverpool Bridge, on the north-east, and proceeding from thence, westerly, along Earle-street to Coppenhall-street; then northerly along the middle of the latter street to Victoria-street, and then proceeding westerly along the middle of that street and the lane to Wistaston, southerly, as far as the north-west angle of the field, No. 231 on the Tithe commutation Map of the said parish of Coppenhall; and then proceeding southerly along the footpath run-

ning by the western fences of the fields Nos. 231, 225, 224, 206, 202, and 203 on the said map, and enters the Nantwich-road, and along such road to the western corner of field No. 190, when it meets the boundary line separating the said parish of Coppenhall from the parish of Wybunbury; then proceeding easterly along such boundary line as far as the boundary line separating the said parish of Coppenhall from the parish of Barthomley; and then proceeding northerly along such boundary line as far as the Brook and the Liverpool line of Railway; and then proceeding up the middle of that railway, northerly, as far as Liverpool Bridge, where the boundary line of the said district chapelry commenced, and which is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at Christ Church, Crewe aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the Minister or incumbent of such

church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of the said diocese of Chester has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Crewe, in the parish of Coppenhall, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Saul, Arlingham, Fretherne, Eastington, Wheatenhurst otherwise Whitminster, Moreton Valance, and Standish, in the county of Gloucester, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said several parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Framilode, in the said parish of Saul, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building 'Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Framilode,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: commencing in the said parish of Arlingham, at a point on the plan hereunto annexed, marked with the letter A, at the northwestern corner of the said consolidated chapelry adjoining the River Severn, proceeding in a westwardly direction along and including the northern side of an inclosure, numbered 97 on the said plan, into a stone road leading to the village of Arlingham, along the north side of the said road to a point opposite the northern fence of inclosure No. 117; thence in a south-westerly direction along the western fence of an inclosure numbered 117, until it reaches the southern fence of the said last-mentioned inclosure, which it follows easterly until it reaches the western fence of inclosure No. 111, which it follows in a southwardly direction along the said fence, No. 111, and also of inclosure No. 112, to its south-west corner; thence along the southern fence of the said lastmentioned inclosure and the eastern fence thereof, all within the said parish of Arlingham, until it reaches the western point of the inclosure No. 32, part of the said parish of Fretherne; thence the boundary line proceeds by the southern fence of the said last inclosure, No. 32, till it reaches the Frampton-road, thence across the said road to the south-west corner of the inclosure No. 62, in the said parish of Saul, thence along the southern boundary of the said last-mentioned inclosure till it reaches its point of junction with the western fence of the inclosure No. 659, part of the said parish of Eastington; thence in a southerly direction along the western fence of the said last-mentioned inclosure till it reaches its junction with the westerly fence of the inclosure No. 19, in the said parish of Fretherne (the fence of which last-mentioned inclosure it follows in a southerly and easterly direction) to the western fence of No. 18, in the said parish of Fretherne; then southerly down such western fence until it reaches its junction with the northern fence of an inclosure, No. 658, in the said parish of Eastington, which it follows, first in a southwardly direction, and then in a south-easterly direction, and thence in a north-eastern direction until it reaches its junction with the western end of an inclosure, part of No. 103, in the said parish of Saul; thence along the southward and eastward sides of the said last-mentioned inclosure to its junction with an inclosure, No. 657, in the said parish of Eastington; thence proceeding north-eastwardly along the southern boundary of the last-mentioned inclosure, No. 657, and in the same direction along the boundary of the inclosure, No. 656, and still in the same direction along the southern boundary of the inclosures Nos. 16 and 15, in the said parish of Fretherne, and of No.

653, in the said parish of Eastington, to its junction with the Stroudwater Canal; thence proceeding southwardly along the said canal until it reaches a point opposite to the southern extremity or point of an inclosure, No. 11, in the said parish of Fretherne, thence leaving the canal and crossing the road to the said last-mentioned southern point of the last-mentioned inclosure No. 11; thence in a northern direction along the eastern side of the said last-mentioned inclosure, and another inclosure in the said parish of Fretherne, No. 10, until it reaches opposite to the western part of an inclosure, No. 5, on reaching which it crosses the River Frome; thence eastwardly along the southern fence of No. 5 to the road leading from Saul, and crossing the said road proceeding along its eastern boundary in a northerly direction to an inclosure, No. 28, in the said parish of Saul; thence proceeding along the southern and eastern boundaries of the said last-mentioned inclosure to its junction with a road leading eastwardly to Epney Longney and Gloucester, proceeding along the southern boundary of the said road until it reaches a stream of water at the western boundary of an inclosure, No 14, in the said parish of Saul (the said stream of water being the boundary of the said last-mentioned inclosure on its western side), along which the boundary line continues in a southerly direction till it reaches another stream which joins the southern boundary of the said lastmentioned inclosure, along which said stream it proceeds, in a northerly and then in an eastwardly direction, by the inclosure, No. 13, and again in a northwardly direction up to the point of junction with the inclosure, No. 11, in the said parish of Saul, proceeding in a north-western direction for a short distance along the eastern side of the said inclosure, No. 11, where it reaches a farm road, crossing which it proceeds in an eastwardly direction to the west point of the southern boundary of the inclosure, No. 3, in the said parish of Whitminster, along which the boundary line proceeds in an eastwardly direction, and in the same direction along the southern boundary of the inclosure, No. 4, in the said parish of Whitminster, thence in a northerly direction along its eastern boundary to its junction with the southern boundary of the aforesaid road leading to Epney Longley and Gloucester, thence the boundary line proceeds in a north-eastwardly direction along the south-eastern boundary of the said road until it reaches its junction with the western corner of the inclosure, No. 24, in the parish of Moreton Valence, thence eastwardly, southerly, and easterly along inclosure No. 24, till it joins inclosure No. 25, then southerly and easterly along the southern boundary of No. 25, until it joins the western boundary of inclosure No. 26, thence southerly and easterly along the southern boundary of inclosure No. 26, up to its junction with a stream at the south-eastern corner of No. 26, following the said stream in a northward direction and passing Nos. 27, 30, and 31, until it reaches its junction with the westwardly point of an inclosure, No. 71, in the said parish of Moreton Valence, thence along the southerly and south-eastern fence of the last-mentioned inclosure to its junction with the Arle Brook, which it follows in a south-eastwardly direction to a point marked thus × on the said plan, then crossing the road in a northwardly direction to the south point of the eastern boundary of the inclosure, No. 72, in the said parish of Moreton Valence, thence north-wardly along the eastern fences of the inclosure, No. 72, then north-easterly along the eastern and north-westerly along the northern boundary of inclosure No. 79, to the eastern fence of inclosure I for the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate

No. 75, proceeding north-casterly along the eastern fences of Nos. 75, 76, and 77, to the eastern part of the northern fence of the said inclosure, No. 77, thence proceeding in a north-western direction along the said northern fence, thence northwardly along the eastern fence of inclosure, No. 55, till it reaches the stream dividing the parish of Moreton Valence from the parish of Longney, thence following the said stream in a westwardly direction to the point where it flows into the River Severn at the point on the said map marked with the letter B, thence it follows the River Severn to the first-mentioned point on the said plan marked with the said letter A, at which the boundary of the said consolidated chapelry of Framilode commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured yellow, pink, green, brown, buff, lilac, and red.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend James Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and patron, in right of his see, of the parish churches of the said parishes of Moreton Valence and Standish; of the Reverend Thomas Murray Browne, Master of Arts, Vicar and Incumbent of the united parishes of Standish cum Hardwicke, in the county of Gloucester, and (as such Vicar and Incumbent) patron of the parish church of the said parish of Saul; of John Sayer, of Arlingham, in the county of Gloucester, Esquire, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Arlingham; of Sir Edward Tierney, of Church Town House, Buttervant, in the county of Cork, Baronet, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Fretherne; of the Reverend Thomas Peters, Bachelor of Arts, of Eastington aforesaid, Clerk, patron (in his own right) of the parish church of the said parish of Eastington; and of George Bengough, of "The Ridge," in the parish of Wootton, in the said county of Gloucester, Esquire, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Whitminster, have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Framilode, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it has been mutually agreed between the said James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, Thomas Murray Browne, John Sayer, Sir Edward Tierney, Thomas Peters, and George Bengough, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and also of the said James Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church at Framilode aforesaid should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned at Framilode, in the parish of Saul, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Bishop of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol for the time being, he being the person mentioned in such representa-tion; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.
