REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* on the *Monday previous* to each Levee, or upon any earlier day between the hours of *eleven and four*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation ; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levees but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Monday previous* to each Levee ; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levees ; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty ;

and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

LORD PANMURE yesterday received a Despatch and its Enclosures, of which the following are copies, addressed to His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, by Field-Marshal the Lord Raglan, G.C.B.

*Before Sevastopol,  
February 17, 1855.*

MY LORD DUKE,

I HAVE the satisfaction to acquaint your Grace that the weather has improved since I last addressed you, and the country is becoming drier.

Two days ago the thermometer was up at 60. It was somewhat lower yesterday, and early this morning it was down below freezing point, and at this moment it is snowing.

I mention these particulars in order to show your Grace how variable this climate is.

No movement has been made upon the part of the enemy. The garrison of Sevastopol is engaged in deepening the ditches, and improving the defences of the south front, and in constructing works on the north side of the harbour.

I have received information that the Russian Army, in the neighbourhood of Backshi Serai and Simpheropol, is suffering much from the want of provisions, and from privations of all kinds.

I am happy to be able to say that the railway is making considerable progress, and that every hope is entertained that in the course of a very short time it will be available for transit as far as Kadikoi, which will accelerate the conveyance of stores up to the camp.

I inclose the return of casualties up to the 16th instant.

I have great pleasure in stating that Colonel Bell, of the Royal Regiment, who received a slight wound in the side from a musket-ball, when commanding in the trenches on the night of the 14th instant, experiences very little inconvenience from it, and has felt well enough to continue to discharge his duty with his accustomed zeal.

WE, taking into Our most serious consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our arms both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Public Day of Solemn Fast, Humiliation, and Prayer be observed throughout those parts of Our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Wednesday the twenty-first day of March next, that so both We and Our people may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of Our sins, and in the most devout and solemn manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our arms for the Restoration of Peace to Us and Our dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said day be reverently and devoutly observed by all our loving Subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his Wrath and Indignation: And, for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Public Worship, and to take care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

WE, taking into Our most serious consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our arms, both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Public Day of Solemn Fast, Humiliation, and Prayer be observed throughout that part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Wednesday the twenty-first day of March next, that so both We and Our people may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of Our sins, and in the most devout and solemn manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our arms for the Restoration of peace to Us and Our Dominions: and We do strictly charge and command, that the said day be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation: Our will is, therefore, and We charge, that, this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith proceed to the

Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in Our name and authority, make publication hereof, that none pretend ignorance: And Our will and pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We do appoint them to send copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their bounds, that, upon the Lord's day immediately preceding the day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

And whereas the justices of the peace for the county palatine of Lancaster, in quarter sessions assembled, have presented two several petitions to Her Majesty in Council, representing that the number of polling places for the northern division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that the towns of Dalton in Furness and Hornby, and the town of Accrington, may be polling places for the northern division of the said county, within which such towns are situate;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petitions into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said towns of Dalton in Furness, Hornby, and Accrington, shall be polling

places for the northern division of the county of Lancaster; and that the justices of the peace for such county or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, of the third year of His late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such northern division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said parish of Darlaston, the hamlet of Smethwick within the parish of Harborne, and the township of Willenhall within the parish of Wolverhampton, shall be polling places for the southern division of the county of Stafford; and that the justices of the peace for such county, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such southern division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that certain of the provisions of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," shall extend and apply to the Court of Record for the hundred of Salford, in the county of Lancaster, in the manner herein-after directed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, subject to such directions as to the persons by whom the powers and duties incident to the provisions of the Common Law Procedure Act, 1852, as applied to the said Court, shall and may be exercised with respect to matters in the said Court; and to such orders and directions for carrying into operation the said provisions in the said Court, as hereinafter contained, the provisions of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," with all requisite modifications and alterations, with reference to the constitution and peculiar circumstances of the said Court, and the Rules made, and to be made in pursuance of the said Act, with the like requisite modifications and alterations, shall, within one month after this Order shall have been published in the London Gazette, extend and apply to the Court of Record for the hundred of Salford, in the county of Lancaster; that is to say: all the provisions of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," except those contained in the following Sections, numbered respectively in the Queen's Printers' Copies of the said Act:—1, 5, 9, 10, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23, 24, 82, 97, 98, 100, 101, 102, 103, 104, 105, 106, 107, 108, 109, 110, 111, 112, 113, 114, 115, 116, 120, 121, 122, 146, 147, 148, 149, 150, 151, 152, 153, 154, 155, 156, 157, 158, 159, 160, 161, 162, 163, 164, 165, 166, 167, 173, 182, 188, 189, 202, 217, 219, 220, 223, 224, 225, 226, 227, 228, 229, 230, 231, 232, 233, 234, 235, and 236; and except so much of Section 27, as provides for the mode of fixing the amount of costs to be endorsed on the Writ of Summons under that Section; and except so much of Section 131, as relates to the venue in a declaration upon a writ of revivor; and except so much of the said provisions as relate to the time within

which judgment may be signed and execution issued; and except so much and such parts of the said provisions, as may be inconsistent with the provisions of the Act by which the said Court is constituted as a Court of Record. And that in applying the said provisions to the said Court, they shall be read as if the word "Registrar" had been used in the said Act instead of the word "Master," and as if the words or expressions "Offices of the Masters of the said superior Courts," and "Masters' Office," had been "Registrar's Office." And that in so applying to the said Court, the provisions of the several Sections of the said Act, as the same are numbered in the Queen's Printers' Copies of the said Act, the words or expressions, "Judge's Order" in Sections 27, 28, and 127, and "Order of a Judge," in Sections 42 and 46, shall respectively mean "an Order of the Court, as well as an Order of the Judge;" and Sections 28 and 89 respectively shall be read as if the word "Filed" had been used therein, instead of the word "Delivered;" and Section 30 shall be read as if the words, "Pleading and other" had not been used therein; and Section 63 shall be read as follows: "The time for pleading in Bar, unless extended by the Court, Judge, or Registrar, shall be eight days, and a notice requiring the defendant to plead in eight days, or otherwise judgment shall be served on the defendant or his attorney;" and Section 124 shall apply to the said Court only so far as respects the mode of renewal of writs of execution issued out of the said Court, but the period for which the same shall be originally in force, and the period for which the same may be renewed, shall be fixed by rule of the said Court, in the manner provided by the Act by which the said Court is constituted as a Court of Record; and section 127 shall be read as if the words "already in the prison of the Court," had been "already in the prison for the custody of persons in execution under the process of the said Court;" and Section 138 shall be read as if the words "shall be filed together," had been used therein, instead of the words "may be served together;" and section 139 shall be read as if the words "three months," had been used therein, instead of the words "two terms;" and section 142 shall be read as if the words "an order of the Court or Registrar," had been used therein, instead of the words "a Judge's Order," and as if the words "Court or Registrar may order," had been used therein, instead of the words "Judge may order;" and sections 175 and 179 shall respectively be read as if the words "Court or Registrar," had been used therein, instead of the word "Judge;" and section 178 shall be read as if the word "Registrar," had been used therein, instead of the word "Sheriff;" and section 222, shall be read as if the words "it shall be lawful for the Court and the Judge at all times," had been used therein, instead of the words "it shall be lawful for the Superior Courts of Common Law, and every Judge thereof, and any Judge at nisi prius at all times."

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to direct that all the powers exercisable by a Judge, or any number of Judges, under any of the sections of the "Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," by this Order extended and applied to the said Court of Record for the hundred of Salford, shall, as regards matters to be done under the authority of this Order, be exercisable and exercised by the Court, or the Judge, or his deputy duly appointed, except that as to the 223rd section of the said Act the powers conferred in this respect shall be con-

fined to so much of that section as provides that "it shall be lawful for the Judges of the said Courts, or any eight or more of them, of whom the chiefs of each of the said Courts shall be three, from time to time to make all such general rules and orders for the effectual execution of the said Act, and of the intention and object thereof, and for fixing the costs to be allowed for and in respect of the matters therein contained, and the performance thereof, as in their judgment shall be necessary and proper;"

And that all the powers exercisable by a master, or any number of masters, under any of the sections of the said Act, by such Order extended and applied to the said Court of Record for the hundred of Salford, shall, as regards matters to be done under the authority of this Order, be exercisable and exercised by the Registrar of the said Court, or his Deputy duly appointed;

And that all the powers exercisable by a sheriff, under any of the sections of the said Act, by this Order extended and applied to the said Court of Record for the Hundred of Salford, shall, as regards matters to be done under the authority of this Order, be exercisable and exercised by the Head Bailiff of the said Court, or his under bailiffs duly appointed.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board, a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the fifth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"The General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' have, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the parish of Wilton, in the county of Wilts (the number of the said petitioners greatly exceeding thirty in the whole), directed William Ranger, a Superintending Inspector, appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act, to visit the said parish, and to make inquiry and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial-grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such parish,

for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said parish, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, and other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said Superintending Inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed, and no statements have been received by the said Board in relation to such report.

They must subscribe and send in to Dr. Scott, the Physician to the Honourable East-India Com-

pany, 10 days before the period fixed for each examination, a declaration to the following effect:

"I (christian and surname at full length), a candidate for employment as an Assistant-Surgeon in the service of the East India Company, do hereby declare that I was \_\_\_\_\_ years of age on the day of \_\_\_\_\_ last, and that I labour under no constitutional disease or physical disability that can interfere with the due discharge of the duties of a medical officer; and I also attest my readiness to proceed on duty to India within three months of receiving my appointment."
