REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* on the *Monday previous* to each Levee, or upon any earlier day between the hours of *eleven and four*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation ; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levees but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Monday previous* to each Levee ; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levees ; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty ;

and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend an Act for regulating the sale of waste land belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies, and to make further provision for the management thereof," after reciting that it might be expedient that various rules and regulations should be made respecting the division of the said colonies into districts, within which alone the demises or licences, mentioned in the said Act, might be made to take effect, it was enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by an Order or Orders in Council, to make and establish all and any such rules and regulations as aforesaid as to Her Majesty may seem meet, and any such rules and regulations again to repeal, renew, alter, and amend, and that all such Orders in Council should have the force and effect of laws in the said Australian Colonies.

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, made in pursuance of the powers of the said Act, it was ordered that the lands in the colony of New South Wales should for the purposes of the said Orders, be considered as divided into three classes, and be dealt with accordingly as they might be situated in districts to be denominated respectively as the settled, the intermediate, and the unsettled districts, and it was ordered that the settled districts should comprehend certain lands therein mentioned.

And whereas it is expedient to include within the said settled and intermediate districts certain lands hereinafter mentioned, not already included within the same.

It is therefore hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that from and after the Proclamation of this Order in the said Colony, and the lapse of six months next after this Order shall have been laid before Parliament, the said settled districts shall comprehend, in addition to

the lands already comprehended therein, the counties or reputed counties of Clinton, Deas Thompson, and Livingstone; and it is hereby further ordered that from and after the time aforesaid, the said intermediate district shall comprehend, in addition to the lands already comprehended therein, the counties of Palmerston, Liebig, Raglan, Pelham, and Flinders, except so much of the counties of Liebig, Palmerston, and Flinders, as lies within the distance of three miles measured in a straight line from the sea, which by operation of the aforesaid Order of the ninth of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, is already comprehended within the settled district.

And the Right Honourable Sidney Herbert, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the ninth and tenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend an Act for regulating the sale of waste land belonging to the Crown, in the Australian Colonies, and to make further provision for the management thereof," after reciting that it might be expedient that various rules and regulations should be made respecting the more effectually making demises or licenses, for any term of years not exceeding fourteen, of any such waste lands as therein mentioned, and respecting the reservation on such demises or licenses of any such rents or other pecuniary services, and respecting the insertion therein of such conditions and clauses of forfeiture as are therein mentioned, and respecting any other matters and things which might be requisite either for carrying into more complete effect the occupation, in manner therein mentioned, of such waste lands as aforesaid, or for preventing the abuses incident thereto, it was enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to make and establish all such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty should seem meet, for the purposes aforesaid, or for any of them, and any such rules and regulations again to repeal, renew, alter, and amend; and that all such Orders in Council should have the force and effect of law in the colonies aforesaid.

And whereas, in pursuance of said Act of Parliament, certain rules and regulations have already been made with regard to the colony of New South Wales, for the above purposes.

And whereas it is expedient that additional rules and regulations, as hereinafter contained, shall now be made and established for demising lands supposed to contain minerals not auriferous, and for working the same. It is hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that within the said colony of New South Wales it shall be lawful for the Governor of the said colony to demise lands supposed to contain minerals not auriferous, to any party or parties desirous of working the same on the following conditions.

1. The extent of land so to be granted shall be fixed from time to time by the Governor with the advice of his Council

2. The term of the lease shall be for a term not exceeding fourteen years, at a rental to be fixed by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, but not less than ten shillings per acre,

per annum, payable yearly in advance. The lessee, on payment of such rent in advance, being entitled to the right of search during the first year and to the option of giving up the lease. The lease to date from the commencement of the second year.

3. Any person claiming a lease on the above conditions who shall remove or cause to be removed any ore from the land before a lease thereof shall be accepted by him shall forfeit his claim thereto.

4. At the termination of the lease the land shall be open to sale by public auction to the highest bidder.

5. Should the land not be purchased by the lessee, the value (to be estimated) of any improvements he may have made, or buildings he may have erected thereon, will be added to the upset price of the land, and he will be allowed compensation for the same, if sold.

6. The lease to become void and forfeited if the rent is not duly paid in advance, and if the land is not *bonâ fide* applied to mining purposes.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect with certain modifications the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the parish of Saint Peter, in the town of Carmarthen and diocese of Saint David's.

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, with an especial view to the better cure of populous parishes, that arrangements might from time to time be made by the authority therein provided (namely, by a scheme prepared by us, ratified by your Majesty in Council, and duly gazetted), for improving the value or making a better provision for the spiritual duties of ill-endowed parishes by means of such alterations in the exercise of patronage as might be agreed upon by patrons, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese.

"And whereas, the church of Saint Peter, Carmarthen, is in the patronage of John Burder, of Parliament-street, Westminster, Esquire, and therefore does not fall within the provisions of the several Orders of your Majesty in Council respecting grants in augmentation of benefices and churches out of the moneys in our hands, under

the said recited Act, so far as such provisions relate to unconditional grants; and in order to bring it within such provisions, the said John Burder desires to transfer his right of patronage in such church in manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the parish of Saint Peter, Carmarthen, contains a population exceeding four thousand, and the average annual income of the incumbent does not exceed the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose with the consent of the Right Reverend Connop, Bishop of Saint David's, and of the said John Burder, testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme, that the advowson and perpetual right of patronage and presentation to the vicarage of the parish church of Saint Peter, in the town of Carmarthen aforesaid, and all the estate, right, title, interest, use, trust, property, claim, and demand therein, of the said John Burder, shall, upon and from the day of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such gazetted Order, become and be transferred to, and absolutely vested in, the said Connop, Bishop of Saint David's, and his successors Bishops of Saint David's, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the incumbent for the time being of the said church, the fixed annual sum of five pounds by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May, and the first day of November, in each year, and that the first of such payments shall be made on the first day of November next.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation of such benefice, if it shall be deemed fit, when we shall have at our disposal sufficient means for that purpose; and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of such benefice, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament, should be conveyed to such benefice in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such substitution."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint David's.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with cer-

tain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for enabling Ecclesiastical Corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues,' and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for enabling Ecclesiastical Corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for determining the portion of the improved value to be made payable to us in a certain lease of a coal mine about to be granted by the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Saint Peter, Earl's Heaton, in the parish of Dewsbury, and county of York.

"Whereas by the said last-recited Act it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for any Ecclesiastical Corporation, aggregate or sole (with certain exceptions, which do not include perpetual curates), from time to time, with the consent or consents thereby required, to grant or demise by lease, in manner thereinafter mentioned, any mines, minerals, quarries, or beds belonging to such corporation, together with the right of working or of opening and working the same.

"And whereas by the same Act it is further enacted, that in case of any lease of mines, minerals, quarries, or beds granted thereunder, such portion of the improved value accruing under such lease, as by the authority provided in the first recited Act shall be determined, not being more than three fourth parts nor less than one moiety of such improved value, shall forthwith, and from time to time as the same shall accrue, be paid to us, and shall be subject to the provisions relating to monies payable to us.

"And whereas, with the consent required by the said Act, and otherwise in accordance with the provisions thereof, it is proposed by the Reverend George Rose, the present Perpetual Curate of St. Peter, Earl's Heaton, to grant or demise by lease a certain bed of coal, situate at Earl's Heaton, in the parish of Dewsbury aforesaid, belonging to him as such perpetual curate.

"And whereas the improved value to accrue under the lease so proposed to be granted as aforesaid will, according to the meaning of the said Act, be the whole of the rents, royalties, or other reservations which will become payable by virtue of such lease.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that three-fourth parts of the whole net amount of the reservation or reservations to be made in the said lease so to be granted, whether consisting of rent, royalty, or otherwise, shall by such lease be made directly payable to us, and that we shall have all the like remedies in respect of such three-fourth parts of any such reservation as aforesaid, as if the same were a separate rent reserved to us as lessors or grantors and reversioners of the premises comprised in such lease,

independently of the rights and remedies of the said George Rose and his successors, perpetual curates of Saint Peter, Earl's Heaton, in respect of the remaining one-fourth part thereof, without any priority or preference between us and the perpetual curates of Saint Peter, Earl's Heaton, for the time being; and, further, that we shall have full benefit and advantage, either jointly with, or separately from, the said George Rose and his successors, perpetual curates of Saint Peter, Earl's Heaton, for the time being, of all or any of the covenants, conditions, and agreements in the said lease to be contained on the lessee's part, in like manner as if we had been grantors, lessors, and reversioners as aforesaid, and as in such lease shall be expressed; and that, for effectuating such objects the said lease shall and may be framed in such manner and contain all such clauses and provisions as we shall approve, and shall have full force accordingly, any rule of law, statute, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding.

"And we further recommend and propose, that we be authorized to apply, from time to time, as we shall think fit, all or any part of the monies which shall be received by us by virtue or on account of the reservation or reservations aforesaid (after deducting therefrom all costs, charges, and expenses which we may have incurred in respect of the premises), towards making better provision for the cure of souls within the present limits of the hamlet of Saint Peter, Earl's Heaton.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas notice of the said scheme has been given to the said George Rose as such perpetual curate as aforesaid, in accordance with the provisions of the first recited Act, and he has made no objection thereto;

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," as enlarged by the first section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's

reign, intituled "An Act to further amend the Church Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the seventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the district chapelries of Garston and Aigburth (both being within and having been wholly assigned or taken out of the parish of Childwall), in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Grassendale, in the said district chapelry of Garston, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the first section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to further amend the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed district should comprise portions of the said district chapelries of Garston and Aigburth, and should be named 'The District Chapelry of Grassendale,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"On the west by the River Mersey, from Bittock's-lane to Beechwood; then proceeding in an easterly direction along the northern boundary of the Beechwood estate to Beech-lane; then along Beech-lane to Aigburth-road; then along Aigburth-road, northwardly, to Aigburth Hall-lane; then eastwardly, along Aighburth Hall-lane to Mosley Hill-road; then along Mosley Hill-road, southwardly, to Red House Farm; then eastwardly, across certain fields bounded on the north by certain glebe land, and then continuing in a straight line to a point in Hogginson's-lane, about sixty yards north of the farm house occupied by Mr. Atherton Green; then northwardly, along Hogginson's-lane, to the point of junction with Allerton-road; then southwardly, along Allerton-road, to the north side of Springwood Gardens; then westwardly, along the north side of Springwood Gardens, to a private lane; then southwardly, along the said private lane, to Oak-lane; then along Oak-lane to Out-lane; then along Out-lane to Island Farm-lane; then along Island Farm-lane to Seddon's-lane; then along Seddon's-lane to Garston-road; then across Garston-road, along Bittock's-lane, to the shore of the River Mersey, where the boundary-line of the said district chapelry of Grassendale commenced, and which is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Mary, at Grassendale aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, has been

obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the said consecrated church of Saint Mary, at Grassendale, in the district chapelry of Garston, and parish of Childwall, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.
