It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levee, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Monday previous* to the Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

DESPATCHES, of which the following are copies, have been received from Rear-Admiral Sir Edmund Lyons, Bart., G.C.B., Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean and Black Sea.

UNSUCCESSFUL ATTACK BY THE RUSSIANS ON EUPATORIA.

*Royal Albert, off Sevastopol,
February 20, 1855.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to enclose, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, copies of two letters which I have received from Captain Hastings, of the *Curaçoa*, Senior Officer at Eupatoria, reporting an unsuccessful attack made upon that place, at daybreak, on the 17th instant, by a large Russian force of cavalry, artillery, and infantry, and enclosing a letter from Omar Pasha, expressing warm acknowledgments for the great services rendered by Her Majesty's ships *Curaçoa*, *Valorous*, *Furious*, and *Viper*, as well as his Highness' thanks for the reinforcements of steamers which I had sent to him on hearing that the enemy was still in force in his neighbourhood.

2. Captain Hastings appears to have conducted his share of the defence with his accustomed zeal and ability, and to have been well and effectively seconded by Captains Buckle and Loring and Lieutenant Brock, and the officers, seamen, and marines of all Her Majesty's ships present on that occasion.

3. Colonel Simmons, of the Royal Engineers, who is attached to Omar Pasha's Staff, estimates the attacking force at 40,000 of all arms, and he states that as many as sixty guns, some of them 32-pounders, played upon the place at one time.

4. I understand that at nine o'clock the enemy's infantry formed under the shelter of a wall, at 350 yards from the place, and advanced to the attack, but were repulsed with considerable loss, and soon afterwards retired, leaving nearly two hundred dead on the nearest spot, and removing the rest of their dead from the more distant parts of the field.

5. Omar Pasha's army appears, from the latest and most authentic accounts, to have had nearly a hundred men killed and about two hundred and fifty wounded, and to have had eighty artillery horses killed, and some guns much damaged.

6. The *Banshee* has brought me a report from Captain Hastings up to noon yesterday, at which

time the enemy remained encamped about five miles from Eupatoria, with his left leaning on the Putrid Lake Sasik; whilst Omar Pasha, with the garrison, having been reinforced after the battle by further Turkish troops, brought over from Varna in British transports, as well as by the Dauntless, Curlew, Arrow, and Lynx, sent by me from hence, and by two French steamers sent by Admiral Bruat, awaited an attack with confidence in a favourable result.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to acquaint your Excellency that, this morning about 6.30 A.M., the Russians in considerable force attacked the Turkish troops which are encamped at this place under the command of his Highness Omar Pasha.

The ships under my command at this anchorage, which are named in the margin,* immediately proceeded under steam to close the flanking position of the Turkish entrenchments,—Valorous and Viper taking the left flank, and Curaçoa and Furious the right. About half an hour after the commencement of the attack, I received from his Highness Omar Pasha, a request to strengthen as much as possible the right flank, as the enemy were pressing their attack upon that point.

The Viper was immediately recalled, and from her light draught of water was enabled to effect good service, as also the three other ships in their respective positions.

The conduct of the captains, officers, seamen, and marines under my command on this occasion, deserves your Excellency's approbation.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your memorandum of yesterday's date, relative to my report of the Russians having attacked this place on the 17th instant, as communicated by the steam transport Queen of the South, and beg to inform you that the reinforcement of vessels mentioned therein have duly arrived here; and that I immediately informed his Highness Omar Pasha of the reinforcement being sent to his support, who begged me to offer to your Excellency his warmest thanks.

In the late attack the Turks suffered a loss of 88 men killed, 250 wounded, and 78 horses killed: the loss on the part of the Russians cannot be ascertained.

No further attack has been made; but the Russians still remain in force about five miles

from Eupatoria, and large reinforcements, both of men and waggons, are daily arriving from the road to Simferopol. If the Arrow's services could be spared she would be of great assistance here.

IN continuation of our proceedings, I have the honour to inform you that we have been employed this week in carrying shot into the batteries. The enemy continues augmenting his defences and firing on our working parties during the day. Several ineffectual sorties have been made on the French during the past week.

I have also been getting up slops and provisions, and have a supply for seven days of the latter in our store tents.

I have much pleasure in informing you of the healthy state of the brigade, having only 44 in the sick list, no serious cases, and victualling 998.

I HAVE the honour to inform you that the enemy still continues strengthening his works. I am happy to say that there have been no casualties this week, and that the brigade is remarkably healthy. We have only 27 men in the sick list, victualling 999 men and officers. All symptoms of scurvy have disappeared; and I am informed by the medical officers in charge, that he considers this as principally owing to the liberal supply of oranges issued to the brigade.

9 P.M.

THE bearer is an Aide-de-Camp of the Seraskier, bearing despatches from Omar Pasha to his Government.

His Highness would be much obliged to you if you would kindly order him a passage to Constantinople by the first opportunity.

The position is much stronger here than it was; in fact, I should say doubly so, and nearly twice as many guns mounted as on the 17th.

That affair was pretty sharp, and the Russians lost a great many men: we have interred 453, and there can be no doubt they carried off and buried many more who were killed at long ranges by our artillery.

They also left nearly 300 dead horses on the field.

Our loss was 87 killed, 277 wounded, Turks; 4 killed and 9 wounded, French; and 13 killed, 11 wounded, of the population; besides 79 horses killed and 18 wounded. Our field battery had 19 men (Turks) killed, and every gun (6) disabled.

The Turks behaved very well. Selim Pasha, the Egyptian, who was killed, was a great loss, but his place is well supplied by Suliman Pasha, who was wounded.

Omar Pasha is most gratified for the promptitude with which you sent up ships after hearing of the attack. The exertions of the officers and men of your fleet in disembarking troops, &c., here

are beyond all praise; but, unfortunately the weather during the last week or ten days has not been propitious and consequently transports have been detained longer than they otherwise would.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for enabling Ecclesiastical Corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eleventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues,' and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for enabling Ecclesiastical Corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for determining the portion of the improved value to be made payable to us in a certain lease of coal about to be granted by the Vicar of Radford, in the county of Nottingham.

"Whereas by the said last-recited Act it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for any Ecclesiastical Corporation, aggregate or sole (with certain exceptions, which do not include vicars), from time to time, with the consent or consents thereby required, to grant or demise by lease, in manner thereafter mentioned, any mines, minerals, quarries, or beds belonging to such corporation, together with the right of working or of opening and working the same.

"And whereas by the same Act it is further enacted, that in case of any lease of mines, minerals, quarries, or beds granted thereunder, such portion of the improved value accruing under such lease, as by the authority provided in the first recited Act shall be determined, not being more than three fourth parts nor less than one moiety of such improved value, shall forthwith, and from time to time as the same shall accrue, be paid to us, and shall be subject to the provisions relating to monies payable to us.

"And whereas, with the consent required by the said Act, and otherwise in accordance with the provisions thereof, it is proposed by the

Reverend Samuel Cresswell, the present Vicar of Radford aforesaid, to grant or demise by lease certain beds of coal, situate in the parish of Radford aforesaid, belonging to him as such vicar.

"And whereas the improved value to accrue under the lease so proposed to be granted as aforesaid will, according to the meaning of the same Act, be the whole of the rents, royalties, or other reservations which will become payable by virtue of such lease.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that three-fourth parts of the whole net amount of the reservation or reservations to be made in the said lease so to be granted, whether consisting of rent, royalty, or otherwise, shall by such lease be made directly payable to us, and that we shall have all the like remedies in respect of such three-fourth parts of any such reservation as aforesaid, as if the same were a separate rent reserved to us as lessors or grantors and reversioners of the premises comprised in such lease, independently of the rights and remedies of the said Samuel Cresswell and his successors, vicars of Radford, in respect of the remaining one-fourth part thereof, without any priority or preference between us and the Vicar of Radford for the time being; and, further, that we shall have full benefit and advantage, either jointly with, or separately from, the said Samuel Cresswell and his successors, vicars of Radford for the time being, of all or any of the covenants, conditions, and agreements in the said lease to be contained on the lessee's part, in like manner as if we had been grantors, lessors, and reversioners as aforesaid, and as in such lease shall be expressed; and that, for effectuating such objects, the said lease shall and may be framed in such manner and contain all such clauses and provisions as we shall approve, and shall have full force accordingly, any rule of law, statute, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding.

"And we further recommend and propose, that we be authorized to apply, from time to time, as we shall think fit, all or any part of the monies which shall be received by us by virtue or on account of the reservation or reservations aforesaid (after deducting therefrom all costs, charges, and expenses which we may have incurred in respect of the premises), towards making better provision for the cure of souls within the present limits of the parish of Radford aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas notice of the said scheme has been given to the said Samuel Cresswell as such vicar as aforesaid, in accordance with the provisions of the first recited Act, and he has made no objection thereto;

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the diocese of Lincoln.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend the law relating to Ecclesiastical houses of residence,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the Bishoprick of Bath and Wells.

"Whereas it was by the said recited Acts enacted and declared, that, by the authority of a scheme prepared by us and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the said first recited Act, any sum of money which should have been invested in the public funds, or in other security or securities, in trust, for any ecclesiastical body corporate, aggregate or sole, might, upon application in writing to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the hand and seal of such body corporate be directed to be sold, and the same should be sold accordingly, and that the produce of such sale should be applied to such purpose and in such manner as should appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such body corporate; and also that for any like purpose any arrangement might be made, with the consent in writing, under the corporate seal of any bishop for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such bishop, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, and that the aforesaid provisions relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested, in trust, for any ecclesiastical body corporate, did and should include and apply to all moneys and securities for

money, and to all stock in the Government funds, or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer, or of any individual or individuals for or to the credit of or in trust for any bishop, dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Robert John Baron Auckland, Bishop of Bath and Wells, is seized in right of his bishoprick of divers manors, lands, tithes, tenements and hereditaments, the whole or the greater part of which have been demised on leases for lives or years for small annual reserved rents, and upon payment of fines, and the said bishop is also in right of his said bishoprick, beneficially interested in, or otherwise entitled to certain sums of stock or cash invested or held in trust in the manner mentioned, in the said recited Acts, and particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked B.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said recited Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and the said bishop has agreed with us that the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements and hereditaments (except as hereinafter excepted), stock and cash, should be dealt with in the manner hereinafter mentioned, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce, as well to the improvement of the said fund, as to the permanent benefit of the said bishoprick to deal with the same accordingly.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Robert John Baron Auckland, Bishop of Bath and Wells, testified by his having hereunto affixed his hand and episcopal seal, that in consideration of the money payment hereinafter mentioned, to be paid by us to the said bishop and his successors in the said bishoprick, all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements and hereditaments which now belong either in possession or reversion to the said Robert John Baron Auckland, Bishop of Bath and Wells, in right of his bishoprick (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage, and the palace or episcopal house of residence, at Wells, with the grounds thereunto belonging, and excepting also the lands, tenements and hereditaments mentioned and described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A), and all the estate and interest therein of the said bishop, shall upon, and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any other conveyance or assurance in the law, become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon become and be absolutely seized or possessed of the same in fee, and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the fifteenth day of May now last past, and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall on the first day of May and the first day of November, in every year, be paid by us to the said Robert John Baron Auckland, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors, Bishops of Bath and Wells, the sum of two thousand five hundred pounds (a proportionate part of the first such payment, calculated from the said fifteenth day of May to the first day of November last past, to be made on the day on which such order shall be so published as aforesaid) subject, nevertheless, to the deduction by us from each of such half-yearly payments of the amount which for the corresponding half year shall have been paid or payable to the Governors

of the Bounty of Queen Anne, in respect of the mortgage of the estates of the said bishoprick, effected under the provisions of the Orders of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the sixth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, for adding to, altering, and improving the episcopal house of residence of the see of Bath and Wells, and the tenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, respecting the alteration and improvement of the episcopal house of residence at Wells: provided always that nothing herein contained shall prejudice or affect the right (if any) of the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being to be reimbursed the deficiency in his income hereby provided occasioned by the said deductions in respect of the said mortgage or the powers of the Commissioners to prevent or supply such deficiency.

"And we further recommend and propose that none of the moneys or estates to be received or required under the provisions of this scheme shall be applicable to the purposes of our common fund (except only so far as it may be necessary to reimburse such fund any advances made under the provisions of this scheme), until or unless by and under the like authority the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being, and his successors, shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates, sufficient, together with the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, mentioned and described in the said schedule, marked A, to secure to such bishop a clear annual income (after deducting rates, taxes, and other outgoings, including costs of management) of five thousand pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the like consent of the said Robert John Baron Auckland, Bishop of Bath and Wells, that the said sums of stock and cash so described as aforesaid in the said schedule, marked B, shall as soon as conveniently may be, after the gazetting of such Order as aforesaid, be transferred or sold out, and the proceeds thereof paid to our account at the Bank of England, to be applied towards the objects of this scheme, and particularly to investment in the purchase of any interest in the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us or any or either of them, or of any other real estates.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prejudice or affect the operation of the provisions of the Orders of your Majesty in Council, bearing date respectively the twenty-fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and the eighteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, for regulating the incomes of the several archbishops and bishops of England and Wales, so far as the same relate to the bishoprick of Bath and Wells.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

SCHEDULE A.
