MY LORD, *Georgevo, August 1, 1854.*

I HAVE the honour to forward to your Lordship copy of a Despatch, dated 10th July, which I addressed to his Highness Omer Pasha after the action of the 7th July, at Rouschouk, and the passage of the Danube.

I take the liberty earnestly to recommend to your Lordship's most favourable notice the three surviving British Officers therein named, who served under my orders on that day, and I say it without fear of contradiction, that had they not, by their gallantry and firmness, led on the Turkish troops in the manner they did, the fate of that eventful day might have proved to be widely different.

Their names are Lieutenant-Colonels Balfour Ogilvy, Hinde, and Ballard, all of the Indian Army.

HIGHNESS, *Rouschouk, July 10, 1854.*

IT being my duty to bring under your Highness' favourable notice the conduct of the British officers engaged in the action of the 7th instant, and the passage of the Danube, I have the honour to state that I crossed the river on that morning, with the first body of troops, under the command of Ferik Beker Pasha, accompanied by Captain Bent, of the Royal Engineers, and Lieutenant Ballard, of the Bombay Engineers. These two officers were conspicuous for their gallantry in leading on our light infantry troops against the Russians, and successfully carried everything before them, until strong reinforcements of the enemy arrested their progress. At this critical moment my Aide-de-camp, Lieutenant-Colonel Youer Bey (Balfour Ogilvy), who had crossed higher up the river, with a body of 500 men, arrived, and with him Lieutenant-Colonel Beyzad Bey (Hinde). These two officers fought their way in the most gallant and spirited manner, and succeeded in forming a timely junction with the main body of our troops.

It is with pain that I have to inform your Highness that Lieutenant Burke, of the Royal

Engineers, was killed whilst acting with a detached body of our troops. I have also the melancholy duty to record the death of Captain Arnold, of the 3rd Regiment Madras Light Infantry, and Lieutenant Meynell, of Her Majesty's 75th Regiment of Foot, both serving on my personal staff. These two brave British officers fell in a desperate conflict with the enemy, and their remains now rest on the spot ennobled by their fall. I am much indebted to all these officers for their valuable services on that day; and when I remind your Highness that the following named officers,—Lieutenant-Colonels Youer Bey (Balfour Ogilvy) and Beyzad Bey (Hinde), Captains Arnold, Ballard, and Meynell, were all volunteers, freely and gratuitously giving their services in the just cause of His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, I feel confident your Highness will permit me to recommend the survivors,—Lieutenant-Colonels Youer Bey (Balfour Ogilvy), Beyzad Bey (Hinde, 65th Regiment Bengal Infantry), and Captain Ballard, to your Highness' most favourable consideration.

I have already, in a separate despatch, done myself the honour to bring the services of Captain Bent, of the Royal Engineers, under the favourable notice of his Excellency General Lord Raglan.

GALLANT REPULSE OF THE ENEMY FROM
EUPATORIA, IN NOVEMBER LAST.

*Britannia, in the Archipelago,
December 30, 1854.*

SIR,

I BEG you will lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the accompanying letter, sent to me some time since, by Captain Brock, from Eupatoria, detailing the gallant repulse of a large body of the enemy by the force under his orders.

Eupatoria, November 15, 1854.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to inform you, that, encouraged by the catastrophe* mentioned in my other letter of this day's date, and our rockets having been blown down, a large body of the enemy's cavalry, between seven and eight thousand, supported by sixteen guns of horse artillery, made an attack on us at 3.45 P.M.

They planted their guns (under cover of the mills) at about a thousand yards, in front of our upper rocket battery, where we had two rockets, one 12-pounder howitzer, and an 18-pounder iron carronade, procured from a merchant ship.

They commenced a heavy fire of shot and shell, and with sufficiently good practice to fall very thick around us, and many shot lodged, and several shell exploded, in the parapet of the redoubt. Their fire was returned with great spirit on our side, by the two rocket batteries, the upper one commanded by Lieutenant Lambert, of the Spiteful, and Mr. Lake, midshipman of the Leander; Lieutenant Hood, of the Arethusa, attended the lower battery, with Mr. Mitchell, mate of the Leander, where were two 12-pounder howitzers, and one 18-pounder merchant ship's guns, and three rockets, one 24-pounder, and two 12-pounders.

Having no marines and but few seamen, I reinforced both batteries with fifty Arab troops, who, however, as the enemy did not approach within musket shot, had no opportunity of doing anything, though, from their behaviour under fire, they seemed to promise well. The fire was kept up with animation on both sides for nearly an hour, without any casualties amongst us, except one man's thumb slightly wounded; although it seemed wonderful that no one was struck by the shot and shell, which flew pretty thickly. The enemy's cavalry was drawn up in dense masses in the rear and on each flank of their artillery, and, though an occasional shot or rocket fell amongst them and disturbed their formation, they seemed to be in excellent order. Both our officers and men seemed animated with the highest spirit, and, considering the immensely superior force on the enemy's side, their firmness merited my warmest approbation. My attention was devoted to the upper battery, being nearest the enemy, and whence I could best observe his movements. Some of our rockets were beautifully directed by Lamb,* gunner's mate of the Arethusa, and Ball, quartermaster of the Leander, and appeared to fall amongst the horse artillery, and I have no doubt contributed to hasten their retreat, which they did at about 4.40.

I may add that the officers and men did their duty with alacrity, and seemed anxious to have an opportunity of meeting the enemy. I have particularly to call your attention to the steady and cool conduct of Lieutenant Hood, who rode over the field this morning, after the action, and ascertained that our shot and rockets were well directed, and appeared to fall exactly in the right place; he has recovered many of our shot at a time when we most need them. I have likewise great satisfaction in bringing before your notice the zeal and intelligence of Mr. Brine, mate of the Leander, in charge of two 18-pounder merchant ship's guns, at the Hospital post, and he has reported to me the good conduct of James Montgomery, leading seaman of Her Majesty's ship Leander; I beg to recommend him to your favourable consideration. The Tartars say the Russians lost many men, as they saw many saddles vacant.

I have great pleasure in particularizing the conduct of Mr. Hamilton, senior lieutenant of the Leander, from whom I have received the most efficient assistance throughout these trying times to both officers and men, as well as that of Messrs. Irvine, mate of the Megæra, Dupuis, midshipman of the Leander, Phillips, master's-assistant of the Megæra, who has acted as my aide-de-camp, Doctor Blake, assistant-surgeon of the Leander, and the Rev. S. Robson, of the same ship, whose manifold services in the field, as well as his own duties, have merited great praise. Assistant-Commissary-General Gardiner I have found a most able assistant in everything connected with his duty. I respectfully trust that, in the defence of this town that you have done me the honour to entrust me with, I have, as far as my limited means will allow, carried your wishes into effect.

The Queen has been pleased to give and grant unto Sir De Lacy Evans, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Lieutenant-General of Her Majesty's Forces, Colonel of the 21st (Royal North British Fusiliers) Regiment of Foot, Knight Grand Cross of the Royal and Distinguished Order of Charles the Third, and of the National and Military Order of San Fernando of Spain, Her royal licence and permission that he may accept and wear the Imperial Order of the Medjidie of the First Class, which the Sultan hath been pleased to confer upon him, as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of the courage displayed by that Officer upon the field of battle, and of the eminent military services which he has rendered to the Ottoman Empire; and that he may enjoy all the rights and privileges hereunto annexed.

And also to command that Her Majesty's said concession and especial mark of Her royal favour be registered, together with the relative documents, in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Postmaster-General to remit any of the rates of British postage for the time being, payable by law on the transmission of post letters, newspapers, or other printed papers, to such extent as the Lords of the Treasury shall from time to time direct; and power is also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or Inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas it is expedient that regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said Act,

and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided) order and direct, that on every letter not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, and sent from or to any commissioned Officer employed in Her Majesty's regular Forces, Artillery, or Royal Marines, in the Baltic Sea, or the adjacent waters, or sent from or to any commissioned or warrant officer, midshipman, or master's mate employed in Her Majesty's Navy, or any of Her Majesty's ships in the Baltic Sea, or the adjacent waters, transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom and any port or place in the Baltic or the adjacent waters, either by packet-boat, or via Belgium and Prussia, or by any other route, there shall be charged and taken in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such letters a uniform rate of three pence (which shall include any foreign postage that may be payable thereon).

And we further order and direct, that on every letter not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, and sent from or to any non-commissioned officer, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier, employed in Her Majesty's regular Forces, Artillery, or Royal Marines, in the Baltic Sea, or the adjacent waters, or sent from or to any seaman employed in Her Majesty's Navy, or any of Her Majesty's ships in the Baltic Sea, or the adjacent waters, transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom, and any port or place in the Baltic Sea, or the adjacent waters, via Belgium and Prussia, there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such letters, a combined British and foreign rate of three pence.

And we direct, that on every letter, transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding a quarter of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such respective letters, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every letter, exceeding a quarter of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding half an ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding three quarters of an ounce in weight, three rates of postage.

On every letter exceeding three quarters of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, four rates of postage.

And for every quarter of an ounce in weight above the weight of one ounce, there shall be charged and taken one additional rate of postage; and every fraction of a quarter of an ounce above the weight of one ounce shall be charged as an additional quarter of an ounce; and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under the provisions hereinbefore contained, if not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight.

And we further direct, that in respect of letters sent by any non-commissioned officers, serjeants, corporals, drummers, fifers, private soldiers, or seamen, under the regulations of this Warrant, the following conditions shall be observed; that is to say: upon each such letter shall be superscribed the name of the writer, and his class or description

in the regiment, detachment, or vessel, to which he shall belong; and upon every such letter there shall be written in the handwriting of, and signed by, the officer having at the time the command of the regiment, detachment, or vessel, to which the privileged person belongs, the name of such officer and the name of such regiment, detachment, or vessel.

And we further direct, that in respect to letters, received by the post under this Warrant, by any commissioned or warrant officers, midshipmen, or master's mates, or any non-commissioned officers, private soldiers, or seamen, the following conditions shall be observed; that is to say: the postage of each such letter posted in the United Kingdom shall be prepaid, either in money or by the proper stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, at the time of the same being posted; and as to letters received by any non-commissioned officers, private soldiers, or seamen, each letter shall be directed to the privileged person, specifying on the superscription thereof, the regiment, detachment, or vessel to which he shall belong.

And we further direct, that if the postage of any such letter posted in the United Kingdom shall not be prepaid either in money or by stamps, when posted, the same shall not be forwarded by the post; and that if in any case any other of the conditions hereinbefore prescribed be not complied with, the letter shall be charged with the same rates of postage as if this Warrant had not been signed.

And we further direct, that the several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Act.

Provided lastly, and we hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter, to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
