WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," and also in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," and of all other powers contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the sixteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Snaith and Kellington, in the West Riding of the county of York, and in the diocese of York, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous parts of the said parishes and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at Hensall, in the said parish of Snaith, under the power or authority for such purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named "The Consolidated Chapelry of Hensall," and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: commencing at the south bank of the River Aire, at the point where the township of Heck

joins the township of Gowdall, thence along the boundary dividing the townships of Heck and Hensall from the townships of Pellington and Gowdall, to the boundary between the township of Balne and the township of Heck, thence westwardly along the last-mentioned boundary to the boundary between the townships of Whitley and Heck, thence along the last-mentioned boundary to the boundary between the township of Egbrough and the township of Heck; thence westwardly along the boundary between the township of Whitley and the township of Egbrough to a certain fence dividing the several closes of land in the township of Egbrough, respectively numbered 294 and 295 in the tithe apportionment plan for the said township of Egbrough, from other closes of land in the same township, respectively numbered 291 and 293 in the same plan; thence northwardly along the last-mentioned fence to the fence dividing the said close, numbered 291, from a close of land in the said township of Egbrough, numbered 296 on the same plan; thence eastwardly along the last-mentioned fence to the south end of a drain dividing the said close of land, numbered 296, from two other closes in the same township, numbered 239 and 290, in the said plan; thence northwardly along the said last-mentioned drain to the road leading from Heck to Hut-green; thence eastwardly along the last-mentioned road to the road called Warren-lane, leading from High Egbrough towards the River Aire; thence northwardly along the last-mentioned road to its junction with the low road from Hensall to Kellington; thence eastwardly along the last-mentioned low road to the occupation road, called the Ing's-lane, in the township of Egbrough, leading towards the River Aire; thence northwardly along the last-mentioned road to its termination in a close of land in the said township of Egbrough, numbered 50 in the tithe apportionment plan for the said township; thence northwardly and again eastwardly along the west and north fences of the said close, numbered 50, to the River Aire; thence along the south bank of the River Aire to the point where the said township of Heck joins the township of Gowdall, as such consolidated chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured pink and blue.

"That the consents of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Thomas, Archbishop of the said diocese of York, of Yarburch Yarburch, of Sewerby-house, in the county of York, Esquire, patron of the parish church of the said parish of

Snaith and of the Master, Fellows, and Scholars of Trinity-college, Cambridge, patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Kellington, have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Hensall, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, and Yarburgh Yarburgh, have signed and sealed this representation, and the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars have hereto affixed their common seal.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Yarburgh Yarburgh and the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid, and the Right Honourable William Henry, Viscount Downe (in whom, his heirs and assigns, the right of presentation and appointment of a minister to serve the said church of Saint Paul, at Hensall aforesaid, is now vested, under the powers contained in the twenty-third section of the Act of Parliament firstly hereinbefore mentioned, as amended by the fourth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled, 'An Act to amend the law relative to the assignment of ecclesiastical districts,') testified by his signing and sealing this representation (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church of Saint Paul at Hensall aforesaid should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the said William Henry, Viscount Downe, his heirs and assigns, for ever.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave also to represent that, having taken into further consideration the said parish of Snaith, it appears to them to be expedient that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated churches of Saint John, situate at Balne, and of the Holy Trinity, situate at East Cowick, both within the said parish of Snaith, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and of all other powers in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed districts should be named 'The District Chapelry of Balne,' and 'The District Chapelry of East Cowick,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: The district chapelry of Balne commences at the north-west corner of the township of Balne, at the point where the Balne Moor-road joins the Askern and Selby turnpike-road; thence, eastwardly, along the boundary between the townships of Balne, Whitley, and Hech, to the boundary between the townships of Pollington and Hech; thence, northwardly and north-eastwardly, along the last-mentioned boundary to the boundary-line between the townships of Pollington and Gowdall,

thence, eastwardly and north-eastwardly, along the last-mentioned boundary to the boundary between the townships of Pollington and Snaith and Cowick, thence along the last-mentioned boundary to the road leading from the township of Pollington to Baln Croft; thence, in an eastwardly direction along the last-mentioned road, to a point on the north side of the Knottingley and Goole Canal, immediately opposite to, and in a line with, the boundary-fence between two closes of land in the said township of Snaith and Cowick, belonging to the Earl of Mexborough, and numbered 715 and 716 in the tithe apportionment plan for the said township of Snaith and Cowick; then southwardly across the canal and along the said last-mentioned fence to a fence now dividing a close of land in the last-mentioned township belonging to the Earl of Mexborough, and numbered 722 in the said plan, thence southwardly along the last-mentioned fence to the boundary between the townships of Snaith and Cowick and the parish of Fishlake; thence westwardly along the boundary dividing the townships of Snaith and Cowick and Pollington and Balne from the parishes of Fishlake and Campsall, to the boundary between the parish of Womersley and the township of Balne; thence northwardly along the last-mentioned boundary to the boundary between the township of Whitley and the township of Balne, thence northwardly along the last-mentioned boundary to the north-west corner of the township of Balne, at the point where the Balne Moor-road joins the Askern and Selby Turnpike-road, as such district chapelry of Balne is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured blue.

"The district chapelry of East Cowick commences at the south bank of the River Aire, at the point where the township of Snaith and Cowick aforesaid joins the township of Rawcliffe, thence along the boundary between the said townships of Snaith and Cowick and Rawcliffe, to the fence dividing the premises in Rawcliffe, numbered 563 on the tithe apportionment plan for the said township of Rawcliffe, now or late belonging to Richard Sykes from other premises in Rawcliffe aforesaid, numbered 564 on the last-mentioned plan, also now or late belonging to the said Richard Sykes; thence along the last-mentioned fence southwardly, to the boundary between the said townships; thence eastwardly along the same boundary line to and including the toll-house and premises at Rickard Gyne; thence in a southwardly and south-eastwardly direction along the boundary line between the same townships to the township of Goole; thence southwardly along the boundary between the said townships of Snaith and Cowick and Goole, to the parish of Thorne; thence westwardly along the boundary between the said townships of Snaith and Cowick and Rawcliffe, and the said parish of Thorne, to the road from Thorne to Snaith; thence westwards in a straight line across the said road and the Dutch River to the boundary between the said township of Snaith and Cowick and the parish of Fishlake; thence westwardly along the last-mentioned boundary to the fence now dividing a close of land in the said township of Snaith and Cowick, belonging to the Earl of Mexborough, numbered 722 in the tithe apportionment plan for the township of Snaith and Cowick; thence northwardly along such last-mentioned fence to and along the fence dividing two closes of land in the said township of Snaith and Cowick, belonging to the said Earl of Mexborough, and numbered 715 and 716 in the last-mentioned tithe apportionment plan to the Knottingley and Goole Canal; thence along

the north side of the said canal to the bridge over the said canal near to Balne Croft; thence in a westwardly or north-westwardly direction along a road to the township of Pollington; thence along the boundary between the townships of Pollington and Snaith and Cowick aforesaid, to the Hags Drain; thence along the said Hags Drain to the Carr Drain; thence eastwardly along the Carr Drain to Finley-lane; thence in a westwardly direction along the west side of Finley-lane to the footpath leading from Finley-lane to Spa Well-lane; thence along the same footpath to Spa Well-lane; thence along the west side of the same lane northwardly to a fence dividing two closes of land belonging to Viscount Downe, now in the occupation of William Sumner, numbered respectively 452 and 454 on the said last-mentioned title apportionment plan; thence westwardly along the last-mentioned fence to the fence dividing the said close, numbered 452, from another close belonging to the Viscount Downe, numbered 453 on the same plan; thence northwardly along the last-mentioned fence and along the boundaries on the west sides respectively, of the premises belonging to Viscount Downe and William Hartley (late Oxley's trustees), numbered respectively 451 and 450 on the same plan, to the footpath on the north side of the premises of the said William Hartley, numbered 450 on the same plan; thence eastwardly along the same footpath to the west side of Spa Well-lane aforesaid; thence northwardly along the same lane and across the Townstreet of Cowick village, to the fence dividing the premises, numbered respectively 341 and 342, now or late belonging to James Skelton and Viscount Downe respectively; thence northwardly along the same fence and along the boundary fence dividing the field, numbered 395 on the same plan, from the premises numbered respectively 398, 397, and 396, on the same plan, to and in a straight line northwardly across the turnpike-road from Snaith to Thorne; thence in an eastwardly direction along the north side of the same turnpike-road to and along the fences dividing the closes of land formerly belonging to Nicholas Edmund Yarburgh and George Daniel respectively, but now to Yarburgh Yarburgh, Esq., numbered respectively 217, 218, and 209, on the same plan, from the closes of land and premises respectively belonging to Frederick Clark (late Robert Bramley and John Rhodes), numbered respectively 219, 220, and 205, on the same plan, to the occupation-road leading from Snaith, to Snaith and Cowick Ings; thence eastwardly along the south side of the last-mentioned road to the drain dividing the marsh from the said Ings; thence in a north-eastwardly direction along the last-mentioned drain to the River Aire; thence eastwardly along the south bank of the River Aire to the point where the said township of Snaith and Cowick joins the said township of Rawcliffe, as such district chapelry of East Cowick is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings and burials, should be solemnized or performed in the said churches of Saint John, at Balne, and the Holy Trinity, at East Cowick aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the ministers or incumbents for the time being of the said churches at Balne and East Cowick aforesaid.

"That the consent of the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, has been obtained thereto, as re-

quired by the two Acts and sections lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the maps or plans thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned, for the consecrated church of Saint Paul, at Hensall, in the parish of Snaith, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, William Henry Viscount Downe, his heirs and assigns for ever, they being the persons mentioned in such representation; and it is hereby further ordered, that the proposed assignment of district chapelries to the consecrated churches of St. John, at Balne, and of the Holy Trinity at East Cowick, both in the said parish of Snaith, be accordingly made; and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said last-mentioned two churches, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

particular district' should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Chrysostom, situate at Everton, in the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Chrysostom, Everton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Chrysostom, situate at Everton, in the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom,

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"The General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' has, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the township of Eccleshill, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, the same being a place having a known and defined boundary (the number of the said petitioners exceeding thirty in the whole), directed William Ranger, a Superintending Inspector, appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act to visit the said township, and to make inquiry and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial-grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such township, for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said township, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, and other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said Superintending Inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed;

"And it appears by the said report, that there is no local Act of Parliament in force within the said township for paving, lighting (otherwise than for the profit of proprietors or shareholders), cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving such township, or any part thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of the said Public Health Act;

"Now, therefore, the General Board of Health, does hereby, in pursuance of the said

Public Health Act, humbly report to your Majesty, that it appears to be expedient that :

"1. 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by your Majesty's printers, should be applied to, and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said township of Eccleshill, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and that such area, places, and parts of places should be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

"2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act should consist of nine persons, and that the entire number should be elected for the whole of the said district.

"3. The first election of the said Local Board should take place on the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

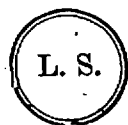
"4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health should go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed should fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third should go out of office on the day next following.

"5. Every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, should be resident, as in the said 'Public Health Act, 1848,' is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than two hundred and fifty pounds, or should be so resident and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than five pounds.

"6. At the first election of the said Local Board, James Armitstead, of Town-street, within the district of Eccleshill, should perform the duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting the said first election; and in case the said James Armitstead, from illness or other sufficient cause, should be unable to discharge such duties, or should be absent, or should refuse to act, then Julius Dalby, of Eccleshill, within the district aforesaid, should perform such of the said duties as then remain to be performed.

"7. The fourteen days' notice of qualification required by 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, should be given to the said James Armitstead, at his residence, No. 7, Town-street, within the district of Eccleshill aforesaid; or in case he should refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to the said Julius Dalby, at his residence, likewise within the aforesaid township of Eccleshill.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said Report into consideration, is pleased to approve thereof, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby, under and in pur-

suance of "The Public Health Act, 1848," order and direct that :

1. From and after the date of this Order, "The Public Health Act, 1848," and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by Her Majesty's printers, shall be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said township of Eccleshill, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and that such area, places, and parts of places, shall be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act shall consist of nine persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

3. The first election of the said Local Board shall take place on the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health shall go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year, subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

5. Every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, shall be resident, as in the said "Public Health Act, 1848," is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than two hundred and fifty pounds, or shall be so resident, and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than five pounds.

6. At the first election of the said Local Board, James Armitstead, of Town-street, within the district of Eccleshill, shall perform the duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting the said first election; and in case the said James Armitstead, from illness, or other sufficient cause, shall be unable to discharge such duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then Julius Dalby, of Eccleshill, within the district aforesaid, shall perform such of the said duties as then remain to be performed.

7.
