REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* on the *Wednesday previous* to the Levee, or upon any *earlier* day between the hours of *eleven and four*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty

at the Levee, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Wednesday previous* to the Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the "burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of "the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning "the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of February last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the thirteenth day of April last; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the twelfth day of May instant (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz.:

WARWICK.—Forthwith in the churches of *St. Paul* and *St. Nicholas*, and within five yards

thereof; and in the churchyards of the same the regulations for new burial-grounds are to be observed. Forthwith in and under the church of *St. Mary*, and also in the churchyard, except in existing vaults and graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner. In the burial-grounds of the *Independent Chapel Brook-street*, and of the *Unitarian Chapel*, in the *Friends' Burial-ground*, and in the *Baptist Burial-ground, Back-hill*, one body only is to be buried in a grave, and no grave previously used is to be re-opened, except walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner.

WHITTINGTON, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—Forthwith in the church, and from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the churchyard.

STAPLETON, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—In the Fishponds Churchyard, and in the burial-grounds of the Clifton and Bristol Unions, the regulations for new burial-grounds are to be observed.

ALCESTER.—Wholly in the *Parish Church*, and in the *Baptist Chapel*; and without any exception in the *Parish Churchyard* from the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six; and (except in existing vaults and brick graves, in which each coffin shall be entombed in an air-tight manner), in the *Baptist Burial-ground* from and after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

BANGOR.—Wholly within the *Cathedral*, and in the *Old Burial-ground*; no more than one body is to be buried in any grave in the *New Burial-ground*, and no interment is to take place without a covering of earth four feet and a half in depth at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground, and interments are to be wholly discontinued therein from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

LLANDUDNO, CARNARVONSHIRE.—Forthwith in *St. George's Churchyard*.

CHELTHENHAM.—Forthwith in the *Parish Church of St. Mary*, in *St. Peter's Church*, in *Trinity Church*, in the *Cheltenham Chapel*, in the *Wesleyan Chapel*, in *Bethel Chapel*, in the *Friends' Meeting House*, in the *Jews' Synagogue*, in the *Unitarian Chapel*, and in the *Mormonite Chapel*. In the burial-grounds of the Cheltenham Chapel, Wesleyan Chapel, Bethel Chapel, Unitarian Chapel, and Mormonite Chapel, one body only is to be buried in a grave, and no graves previously used are to be re-opened, except a walled grave, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner. In the *Parish Cemetery* one body only is to be buried in a grave, and no grave to be re-opened except to bury another person of the same family.

COVENTRY.—Forthwith in the undermentioned places of worship, viz., *St. John the Baptist's Church, Holy Trinity Church, St. Michael's*

Church, St. Peter's Church, the Roman Catholic Chapel, the Friends' Meeting House, the Cow Lane Chapel, and the Protestant Dissenters' Chapel; also (except in existing vaults, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed,) in the churchyards of *St. John the Baptist, Holy Trinity, and St. Michael,* and in the burial-ground of the *Cow Lane Chapel;* and in the churchyard of *St. Peter,* and in the burial-ground of the *Protestant Dissenters' Chapel,* except of the families of those already buried therein.

SOUTH SHIELDS.—Wholly in *Holy Trinity Churchyard* from and after the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five; and in *St. Stephen's Churchyard,* except so far as is compatible with the Regulations for New Burial-grounds.

DODDINGTON, CAMBRIDGESHIRE.—Forthwith in the parish church, and from and after the first February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the churchyard (provided nevertheless that the present Dowager Lady Peyton, and the Reverend Algernon Peyton, the present incumbent of Doddington, may, when dead, be interred in the family-vault under Doddington Church, on condition that each body to be buried be enclosed in an air-tight metallic coffin, and that each coffin be separately entombed in brick work well cemented).

WARRINGTON.—Forthwith in *St. Paul's Church,* and no interment is to take place in *St. Paul's Churchyard* without a covering of earth four and a half feet in depth at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground; and (except in existing private vaults) interments are to be wholly discontinued in the said churchyard from and after the first April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

LEEDS.—No interment is to take place in any vault in *St. George's Churchyard or Cemetery,* except in an air-tight metallic coffin, interments (except in existing vaults) are to be wholly discontinued in such churchyard, and interments in the vaults underneath *St. George's Church* are to be wholly discontinued. Except in existing private vaults and graves, interments in the churchyard of *St. Mark Woodhouse* are to be wholly discontinued, and no interment is to take place in any grave without a covering of earth four and a half feet in depth at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground.

ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE.—Except in existing vaults and graves, no more than one body is to be buried in any grave in *St. Peter's Churchyard;* no burial is to take place in any grave without a covering of earth four feet and a half in depth at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground, and except in existing private vaults and graves, interments are to be wholly discontinued in the said churchyard from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

WORKINGTON.—Wholly in that part of *St. John's Churchyard* situate on the north side of the church, and in the remainder of the ground to be discontinued subject to the Regulations for New Burial-grounds.

LEAMINGTON.—Forthwith beneath the *parish church*, and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six in the *old churchyard*; and from the same date in the *Roman Catholic*, the *Lady Huntingdon's*, and in *Warwick-street Burial-grounds*, except in walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed. In *Spencer-street Chapel Burial-ground*, one body only is to be buried in a grave, and no grave to be re-opened within fourteen years, except to bury a member of the same family. In the *Leamington Cemetery* the regulations for new burial-grounds are to be observed.

HEYWOOD, IN BURY, LANCASHIRE.—Except in existing private vaults and graves no interment is to take place in the *churchyard* of *St. James Heywood* within twenty feet of the church; except in existing private vaults and graves no more than one body is to be buried in any grave; and no interment is to take place in any grave without a covering of earth four and a half feet in depth at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground.

BURNLEY.—Wholly in *St. James's Churchyard*. Except in existing private vaults no interment is to take place in *Holy Trinity Churchyard* within twenty feet of the church, except in existing private vaults and graves no more than one body to be buried in any grave, no interment is to take place in any grave without a covering of earth three feet in depth at the least measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground, and (except in existing private vaults and graves) interments are to be wholly discontinued in the said churchyard from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

BRADFORD, YORKSHIRE.—Forthwith within the *church* of *St. Paul Manningham*, and no interment is to take place in the *churchyard* thereof without a covering of earth four and a half feet in depth at the least measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground, except in existing family brick graves no more than one body is to be buried in any grave, and (except in existing family brick graves) interments are to be wholly discontinued in the said churchyard from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

MARCH, CAMBRIDGESHIRE.—Forthwith in the *parish church* and in the *old churchyard*, also in the *General Baptist Chapel Burial-ground* within three yards of all dwelling-houses; in the *New Churchyard*, and in the *General Baptist Chapel Burial-ground* (with the exception of family vaults and graves) one body only is to be buried in each grave. The said *New Churchyard* and said burial-ground are to be drained to the depth of six feet at the least.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require ;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by an Order in Council of the eighteenth October last, to extend the time for discontinuing burials in the churchyard and new burial-ground of the parish of St. Alphage, Greenwich.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made a representation stating that he is of an opinion that the time for closing the said churchyard and burial-ground may be further extended ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the churchyard and new burial-ground of the parish of St. ALPHAGE GREENWICH, from and after the first of September, instead of from the thirtieth of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis ;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification ; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-

grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require ;

And whereas Her Majesty has been pleased, by various Orders in Council, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned ;

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made certain representations stating that he is of opinion that the time for closing the said churchyards and burial-grounds may be extended ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken such representations into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the undermentioned churchyards and burial-grounds, as follows ; viz. :

In the churchyard of the parish of **BERKELLY** (except as before excepted), from and after the 5th August, instead of from the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard of **BERWICK-UPON-TWEED**, from and after the first November, instead of from the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five; and it is further ordered that in this churchyard exception be made in favour of the survivor in any case where a husband or wife has been already buried, such exception not to extend to the survivors of persons hereafter to be interred, and to be on condition that no grave be opened which cannot be dug five feet deep without the disturbance of undecayed remains.

In the parish churchyard and in the burial-grounds of the Baptist and Independent Chapels, in the parish of **BISHOPS STORTFORD**, from and after the first September, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In **Trinity Churchyard**, **St. Paul's Churchyard**, and **St. John's Churchyard**, in the township of **BLACKBURN**, in the burial-grounds of the Independent Chapel, of the Wesleyan Methodist Association, and of the Baptist Chapel (Town's Moor), in the Quakers' Burial-ground, and in the burial-ground of **St. Alban's Roman Catholic Chapel**, all in the said township, from and after the first November, instead of first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard of the parish of **CHEDDER**, from and after the first September, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard of the parish of **EASTON IN GORDANO**, from and after the first December, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the old churchyard of the parish of **FISHERTON ANGER**, from and after the first September, instead of from and after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard of **FLINT**, from and after the first September, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard of **KIRTON**, Suffolk, from and after the first August, instead of from the first April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the burial-grounds of **St. Mary's Chapel**, the Baptist Chapel, the Presbyterian Chapel, the English Presbyterian Chapel, and of the

Quakers' Meeting-house, in the town of MARYPORT, in the parish of Cross Canonby, from and after the first November, instead of from the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

Works, the following information relative to the situation of a new Lighthouse which has been erected on the coasts of the Spanish Peninsula by the Corps of Engineers of Roads, Canals, and Ports.

Lighthouse of Chipiona, on the southern point of the mouth of the River Guadalquivir (Province of Cadiz).

This Lighthouse, having a light of natural colour, is placed on the church tower of the town, and will be lighted from the 1st of next May.

36° 44' 15" N. latitude, and

00° 13' 30" W. longitude from the Naval Observatory of San Fernando.

The elevation of the luminous focus above the average level of the sea, is of 75.9 feet, Burgos measure, and its range will be of 8 miles.

This light, besides marking the position of that part of the coast, serves provisionally to mark the situation of the "Salmedina Bank," from the foremost extremity of which to the N.W., the lighthouse lies to the N. 83° E., erected at the distance of 1.8 miles.

And, at the request of the said Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said township, we do hereby prescribe and direct, that, in addition to the duties of the said Vestry Clerk set forth in the said Act, it shall be the duty of the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in such behalf and this Order, also to make out the Poor Rate for the said township, as and when the same shall become requisite.

And we hereby further order and direct, as follows:

That a salary of one hundred and sixty pounds a year shall be paid to such Vestry Clerk by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said township; and that the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual Feast-days in the year, namely, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, Christmas Day, and Lady Day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

That every person appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk in the said township shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the Wolverhampton Union, in the county of Stafford, a bond, in the penal sum of three hundred pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, and shall, when required by the said Guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or insolvent: Pro-

vided that the Guardians may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company expressly authorized by statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any Poor Law officer.

That the Auditor of the District comprising the said Union shall, in the statement required by the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Board, of the securities of the officers of the said Union, include the name of the Vestry Clerk for the time being appointed under the authority hereof, together with the particulars in the said General Order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

And we direct, that a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
