REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOM, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

The Ladies, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the same to Her Majesty.

Those Ladies who are to be presented at the Drawing-Room on the 14th of June next, are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Tuesday previous* to the Drawing-Room, or upon any *earlier* day, between the hours of *eleven* and *four*, in order that they may be submitted for The Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place, unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which names shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

THE Queen has been pleased to order letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal, revoking the letters patent of the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, and Principal Storekeeper of the Ordnance.

Her Majesty has likewise been pleased to order letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal, vesting the Civil Administration of the Army and Ordnance in the hands of Fox Baron Panmure, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

*Foreign Office, May 25, 1855.*

IT is hereby notified that the Earl of Clarendon has received, through Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, an assurance from the French Government that all British workmen desirous of visiting the Paris Industrial Exhibition who shall be furnished with Foreign Office passports, in a form agreed upon, shall be allowed to land in France and proceed on their journey to Paris without any hindrance whatever. In order to carry into effect this arrangement, Her Majesty's Government have decided upon granting passports to all such persons, without payment of the usual stamp duty and fee, according to the following regulations:

The mayors of towns, and other municipal and local authorities, will, under instructions from the Home Department, send to the Foreign Office lists of the workmen residing in their neighbourhood who may wish to visit the Exhibition; and passports will then be prepared and transmitted to the respective local authorities for distribution.

Within the Metropolitan Police District, application for passports referred to in this notice are to be delivered at the nearest Metropolitan Police Station, arrangements having been made for such

application being forwarded through the Chief Commissioner to the Foreign Office, and the passports will thereafter be delivered to the applicants at the station where the application was made.

The several local authorities will forward applications for those passports to the Foreign Office, with a list according to the annexed form.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for endowing the archdeaconry of Carlisle, in the diocese of Carlisle, and for disannexing from such archdeaconry the rectory of Great Salkeld, in the county of Cumberland, now held with the same.

"Whereas it was, by the said first recited Act, enacted, that so soon as conveniently might be, and by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), any archdeaconry might, subject to the consent of the bishop, be endowed by the annexation of a canonry, or by augmentation out of the common fund, in the same Act mentioned, but not so as in that case to raise the average annual income thereof to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds, with a proviso that no archdeacon should be entitled to hold any endowment, or augmentation, or other emolument as such archdeacon under the provisions of the said Act, unless he should be resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry is situate, subject, however, to the same provisions as to licenses for non-residence which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices, by the Act relating to pluralities and the residence of the clergy, in the same Act mentioned.

"And whereas it was by the said first recited Act further enacted, that, upon the endowment of an archdeaconry by either of the modes of endowment therein provided, any benefice annexed to such archdeaconry might, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese and of any archdeacon in possession at the time of the passing of the said Act, and by the authority therein provided, be disannexed therefrom, and that the patronage of such benefice should thenceforth revert to the patron to whom it belonged before such annexation, subject to any transfer of patronage provided for by the said Act.

"And whereas by the secondly recited Act it was declared and enacted that in the case of any archdeaconry which should no longer be held by the archdeacon who was at the time of the passing of the said first recited Act in possession thereof, the provisions of the same Act which related to the disannexing from any such archdeaconry upon its endowment in either of the modes therein provided, of any benefice with cure of souls should be construed and held to authorize such disannexation with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, and of the archdeacon in possession of the archdeaconry at the time of such disannexation, or if the archdeaconry were at such time vacant with the consent of the bishop only.

"And whereas the archdeaconry of Carlisle, is endowed chiefly by the annexation thereto of the rectory or benefice of Great Salkeld, in the county of Cumberland, and it has been made to appear to us, that the average annual income of the said archdeaconry, exclusive of the said rectory or benefice, does not exceed the sum of eight pounds.

"And whereas the said archdeaconry and the said rectory or benefice thereto annexed are now vacant, and it appears to us to be expedient that the same should be disunited, and that the endowment of the said archdeaconry should be provided for in manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the approval and consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Hugh, Bishop of Carlisle, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the canonry in the cathedral church of Carlisle which shall next become vacant, shall immediately upon the vacancy thereof become and be annexed and united to the said archdeaconry of Carlisle, and be held by the Archdeacon of Carlisle for the time being, so long as he shall hold such archdeaconry and no longer, and that the then and every future Archdeacon of Carlisle shall, as such archdeacon be entitled to installation to the same canonry, and shall be invested with, and so long as he shall remain Archdeacon of Carlisle but no longer, shall hold and enjoy all the rights, privileges, and emoluments of a canon of the same church.

"And we further recommend and propose that until the said canonry of the said cathedral church shall become vacant and an endowment be thereby provided for the said archdeaconry, there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said first-recited Act mentioned, to the Archdeacon of Carlisle for the time being (provided that he shall duly reside in accordance with the provisions of the same Act, or shall have obtained license of non-residence), the yearly sum of one hundred and ninety-two pounds, on the first day of January in every year, and that a proportionate part of the first such payment shall be made on the first day of January next, and that every such payment shall be made only on production to us of a certificate from the bishop, that the archdeacon claiming such payment has duly resided within

the diocese of Carlisle, according to the provisions of the said firstly-recited Act, or has been legally exempt from such residence.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, shall be published in the London Gazette, the said rectory or benefice of Great Salkeld, now annexed as aforesaid to the said archdeaconry of Carlisle, shall become and be disannexed therefrom.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Carlisle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the 'spiritual care of populous parishes,'" duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the archdeaconry of Merioneth, in the diocese of Bangor, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments

vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property herein-after described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing duly executed according to law; with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, formerly belonging to the said archdeaconry (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) became vested in us, by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and duly published in the London Gazette on the fifth day of the then following month of July, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said archdeaconry of Merioneth, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable:

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bangor.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"The General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' has, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the parish of Mistle, in the county of Essex (the number of the said petitioners greatly exceeding thirty in the whole), directed Alfred Lamerte Dickens, a Superintending Inspector, appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act to visit the said parish, and to make inquiry and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial-grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such parish, for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said parish, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, and other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said Superintending Inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed, and no statements have been received by the said Board in relation to such report;

"And it appears by the said report, that there is no local Act of Parliament in force within the said parish, for paving, lighting (otherwise than for the profit of proprietors or shareholders), cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving such parish, or any part thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of the said Public Health Act;

"Now, therefore, the said General Board of Health, does hereby, in pursuance of the said Public Health Act, humbly report to your Majesty, that it appears to the Board to be expedient that:

"1. 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by your Majesty's printers, should be applied to, and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said parish of Mistle, in the county of

Essex, and that such area, places, and parts of places should be and constitute a district for the purpose of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

"2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act should consist of nine persons, and that the entire number should be elected for the whole of the said district.

"3. The first election of the said Local Board of Health should take place on the twenty-first day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

"4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health should go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed should fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third should go out of office on the day next following.

"5. Every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, should be resident, as in the said 'Public Health Act, 1848,' is required, and be rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than fifteen pounds.

"6. At the first election of the said Local Board, Charles Samuel Bawtree, of Mistle Abbey, should have the powers and perform the duties vested in or imposed upon the chairman of the Local Board of Health by 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' in relation to the election by owners of property and ratepayers, and should perform all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing the said first election; and in case the said Charles Samuel Bawtree, from illness or other sufficient cause, should be unable to exercise or discharge such powers or duties, or should be absent, or should refuse to act, then that John Thomas Ambrose, of Mistle aforesaid, should exercise and perform such of the said powers and duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

"7. The fourteen days' notice of qualification required by 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, should be given to the said Charles Samuel Bawtree, at his residence, Mistle Abbey; or in case he should refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to the said John Thomas Ambrose, at his residence, likewise within the district of Mistle aforesaid.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said Report into consideration, is pleased to approve thereof, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby, under and in pursuance of "The Public Health Act, 1848," order and direct that:

1. From and after the date of this Order, "The Public Health Act, 1848," and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by Her Majesty's printers, shall be applied to and be in force within and

throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said parish of Mistley, in the county of Essex, and that such area, places, and parts of places, shall be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act shall consist of nine persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

3. The first election of the said Local Board of Health shall take place on the twenty-first day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health shall go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year, subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

5. Every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, shall be resident, as in the said "Public Health Act, 1848," is required, and be rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than fifteen pounds.

6. At the first election of the said Local Board, Charles Samuel Bawtree, of Mistley Abbey, shall have the powers and perform the duties vested in or imposed upon the chairman of the Local Board of Health by 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' in relation to the election by owners of property and ratepayers, and shall perform all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing the said first election; and in case the said Charles Samuel Bawtree, from illness, or other sufficient cause, shall be unable to exercise or discharge such powers or duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then that John Thomas Ambrose, of Mistley aforesaid, shall exercise or perform such of the said powers and duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

7. THAME.—In the *church* of Thame; and also in the *churchyard*, except so far as is compatible with the observance of the regulations for new burial-grounds.

KINGS LYNN.—Wholly in the *New Burial-ground* in the parish of *St. Margaret* from and after the fourteenth of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

RUTHIN, DENBIGHSHIRE.—Forthwith in the *church*; and from and after the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the *churchyard*.

polis;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require;

And whereas Her Majesty has been pleased, by various Orders in Council, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made certain representations stating that he is of opinion that the time for closing the said churchyards and burial-grounds may be extended;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken such representations into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the undermentioned churchyards and burial-grounds, as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of the parish of **AXMINSTER** from and after the first October, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the Parish Churchyard, in St. John's Churchyard, and in the burial-grounds of Bethel Chapel, the New-road Independent Chapel, the Presbyterian Chapel, Union-street Wesleyan Chapel, and of Castlecroft Chapel, in **BURY**, in the county of Lancaster, from and after the first of August, instead of from the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyards of St. Mary and St. James, **BURY ST. EDMUNDS**, and in the burial-grounds of the Baptist and Whiting-street Chapels, in that town, from and after the first of October, instead of from the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyard of the parish of **CHEPSTOW** from and after the first September, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyard of the parish of **CHIPPENHAM** from and after the first July, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the parish churchyard of **CHORLEY**, and the burial-grounds of George-street Independent Chapel, the Wesleyan Chapel Park-road, and of Hollinshead-street Chapel, in that parish, from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first June next;

In the burial-ground of the Wesleyan Chapel, **COCKERMOUTH** from and after the first September, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyards of All Saints, the Holy Trinity, and St. Peter **DORCHESTER**, from and after the first September, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the parish churchyard (except as before excepted), and in the burial-grounds of the Protestant Dissenters' Chapel, and of the Baptist Chapel, in **GREAT DUNMOW**, from and after the first December, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyard of the parish of **FARNHAM**, Surrey, from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first July next;

In the burial-ground of the parish of St. Mary in the Castle, and in the churchyard and burial-ground of the parish of St. Clement, near the Croft, **HASTINGS**, from and after the thirty-first July, instead of from the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In St. Luke's Churchyard **HEYWOOD**, and in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan Chapel Market-street, of the Wesleyan Methodist Association, of the Baptist Chapel, of the New Jerusalem Chapel, and of the Independent Chapel, all in Heywood, from and after the first December, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the Parish Churchyard, in St. George's Churchyard, in the United Presbyterian, and Unitarian Burial-grounds, and in the burial-ground of Pear Tree Meeting-house, all in the town of **KENDAL**, from and after the first August, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the Parish Churchyard and new burial-ground of **LEIGH**; in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan Chapel, and of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Chapel, both in the township of *Bedford*; and in the burial-grounds of the Primitive Methodist Chapel, Bethesda Chapel, and the Wesleyan Chapel, in the township of *Pennington*, all in the parish of **LEIGH**, in the county of Lancaster, from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first July next;

In the churchyard of the parish of **LEWISHAM**, from and after the first September, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyard of St. Hilda, and the Holy Trinity, **SOUTH SHIELDS**, from and after the first October, instead of from the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyards of the parishes of **EAST AND WEST TEIGNMOUTH** from and after the first November, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyard of St. Margaret, and in the Wesleyan, Unitarian, and Independent Burial-grounds, **TOFESHAM**, from and after the first October, instead of from the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the churchyard of the parish of **TORNESS** (except as before excepted), from and after the first October, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five;

In the parish burial-ground adjoining **WIMBORNE MINSTER** from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first June next.

And it is further ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and upon a representation of the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that in the parish

churchyard of DODDINGTON, and in the old churchyard of MARCH, in the case of now existing family vaults which can be opened without digging up the soil of the churchyards, interments be allowed of persons standing in the relationship of husband, wife, son, or daughter to persons already buried in such vaults, on condition that each body to be buried be enclosed in an air-tight metallic coffin, be embedded in charcoal, and be separately entombed in brick work well cemented.

BUCKINGHAM. — To be forthwith discontinued in the district church of *Gawcott*, and from and after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the parish churchyard of *Buckingham*, and in the burial-ground of *Ebenezer Chapel*.

AMERSHAM. — To be forthwith discontinued in the portion of the parish churchyard lying on the south of the church as far as to the footpath on the east side; also in the old part of the *Lower Meeting House* burial-ground adjoining the day school; also in the *Upper Meeting House*, and in the burial-ground attached to the same; and from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, wholly in the parish churchyard, in the vault beneath the chapel attached to the church, and in the catacombs in the building adjoining the church.

REEPHAM, NORFOLK. — To be forthwith discontinued in the parish church, and from and after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the parish churchyard.

HACKFORD-NEXT-REEPHAM. — To be forthwith discontinued in the parish church, in the *Wesleyan Chapel*, in the *Presbyterian Reformed Chapel*, and in the *Primitive Methodist Chapel*; and from and after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the parish churchyard, and in the *Wesleyan Chapel burial-ground*.

BASINGSTOKE. — To be forthwith discontinued in the parish church, and in the vaults beneath the school-room adjoining the *Independent Chapel*; and from and after the first

June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the parish churchyard, in the *Litten burial-ground*, in the burial-grounds of the *Independent* and of the *Countess of Huntingdon's Chapels*, and in the burial-ground adjoining the *Friends' Chapel*.

GAYWOOD, NORFOLK. — To be forthwith discontinued in the parish church; and from and after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the churchyard.

GREAT MARLOW. — To be forthwith discontinued in the catacombs and vaults beneath the parish church; and also within three yards of all dwellings in the parish churchyard, in the *Roman Catholic Chapel* burial-ground, and in *Salem Chapel* burial-ground. That in the above churchyard and burial-grounds no interment shall take place without a covering of earth four feet in thickness, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground; and that from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, burials be discontinued in the parish churchyard, and in *Salem Chapel* burial-ground; and also in the *Roman Catholic Chapel* burial-ground, unless this ground can be efficiently drained to the depth of six feet and a half at the least.

REIGATE. — To be discontinued forthwith in the parish church, in the *Independent Chapel*, and in the *Friends' burial-ground* within three yards of its western boundary; and from and after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the parish churchyard, and in the *Independent Chapel burial-ground*.

STALMINE, LANCASHIRE. — To be wholly discontinued in the church and churchyard from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fifth day of July next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said fifth day of July.
