SIR,

I TRUST that you will not think me presuming if I endeavour to place before you some of the merits of Captain Gell, Honourable East India Company, the Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, conducting the transit of the 10th and 12th Regiments of Cavalry through Egypt, and superintending their embarkation.

Colonels Pole and Parlbey are more capable than I can be of bearing testimony to his services, but I beg to add my witness to the zeal, great energy, and consummate tact, by which he obtained a maximum of work from a people notoriously inert; and thus made my portion of the embarkation very simple: that no casualty of any kind has occurred in getting from the shore into pontoons and alongside the several ships more than 1000 horses, is attributable to his foresight and prudence. I respectfully submit that it may prove advantageous to the service if his exertions be brought to the notice of Lord Raglan.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the

twenty-second day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, respecting the endowment of the University of Durham.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that so soon as conveniently may be and by the authority therein provided, such arrangements shall be made with respect to the deanery and canonries in the cathedral church of Durham and their revenues as upon due enquiry and consideration of an Act passed in the second year of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to enable the Dean and Chapter of Durham to appropriate part of the property of their church to the establishment of a University in connexion therewith for the advancement of learning,' and of the engagements entered into by William, late Bishop of Durham, and the Dean and Chapter of Durham, shall be determined on with a view to maintaining the said University in a state of respectability and efficiency.

"And whereas in pursuance of the said in part recited Act, and upon due inquiry and consideration of the Act therein referred to, we have, from time to time prepared and submitted to your Majesty in Council schemes for effecting the arrangements aforesaid; and such schemes have been ratified by your Majesty in Council by Orders, bearing date respectively the fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one.

"And whereas by virtue of the said secondly-mentioned Order, as modified by the provisions of the said lastly mentioned Order, the said warden, masters, and scholars have become entitled to receive from us a money payment of the sum of four hundred pounds, on the twenty-ninth day of September in every year, until further and other arrangements for endowing the said University shall have been recommended and proposed by us and ratified by your Majesty in Council.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, on behalf of the said warden, masters, and scholars, that it would be advantageous to the said University that our estate and interest in the lands, tenements, and hereditaments described in the schedule hereunto annexed should be transferred to them in lieu of an equivalent portion of the before-mentioned money payment, and we have ascertained, after due inquiry and calculation, that it would be expedient to effect the proposed transfer, and that the sum of eighty-five pounds or thereabouts would be such equivalent portion of such money payment.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said warden, masters, and scholars of the University of Durham, testified by their common seal being hereunto affixed, we humbly recommend and propose that all the estate and interest now vested in us in the lands, tenements, and hereditaments described in the said schedule hereunto annexed shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the

same be, upon and from the day of the date of such Order, transferred to and permanently vested in the warden, masters, and scholars of the said University of Durham, and their successors, for ever, in full substitution for the said sum of eighty-five pounds, part of the said annual money payment of four hundred pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose that the rents and profits of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments which have accrued to us since the twenty-ninth day of September now last past, shall belong to and be receivable by the said warden, masters, and scholars, and that the said money payment of four hundred pounds shall, as from the said twenty-ninth day of September, cease and determine, and that in lieu thereof a money payment of three hundred and fifteen pounds, and no more, shall be paid by us to the said warden, masters, and scholars on the twenty-ninth day of September in this and every subsequent year:

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the endowment of the said University of Durham in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament, and particularly the substitution of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for the said annual money payment of three hundred and fifteen pounds, or any part thereof:

" SCHEDULE.

"All those five several closes of land lying in the parish of Saint Oswald, Durham, in the county of Durham, and called and known by the name of Howland's Fields, containing together, by estimation, forty-four acres, three roods, and thirty perches, little more or less, now or late in the occupation of John Gowland, which said closes are bounded on or towards the north by a lane called Howling-lane; on or towards the north-east and north by lands formerly part of Elvet Moor, and now or late belonging to Henry Taylor and George Wilkinson respectively; on or towards the south and south-east by lands called Houghall Grounds, now belonging to the warden, masters, and scholars of the said University of Durham; on or towards the west by the lands and grounds of Farewell Hall, now or formerly belonging to B. J. Salvin, Esq.; and on or towards the north-west by lands which became vested in the warden, masters, and scholars of the said University by virtue of the above-mentioned Order in Council of the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one:

"And also all that close of land called Duckett's close, containing by estimation one acre, one rood, and twenty-two perches, little more or less, with the barn, stable, cowhouses, and foldyard thereupon erected, also now or formerly in the occupation of the said John Gowland, which said land and premises are bounded on the north, east, and south sides thereof by lands and buildings which became vested in the warden, masters, and scholars of the said University, by virtue of the said Order in Council of the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and on the west in part by the lands last above referred to, and in other part by waste ground called Hall Garth, together with all rights, ways, easements, and appurtenances, thereunto belonging, or in anywise appertaining, saving and excepting, and always reserving out of the said lands unto the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Durham, their successors and assigns,

the woods, underwoods, and trees, now standing or hereafter to stand upon the said lands, and the mines, quarries, and beds of coal, stone, clay, and minerals of all descriptions within or under the said lands, with free and exclusive authority to cut down and carry away the said woods, underwoods, and trees, or any of them, and to dig, win, work, get up, and carry away coal, stone, clay, and minerals of all descriptions, in, out of, and from the said lands, with free ingress, egress, and regress, wayleave, and passage into, out of, and through, or underneath any part of the said lands, to or from any part of the same lands, or any other lands whatsoever, whether on foot, or on horseback, or with carts or other carriages, with full and exclusive authority to make, grant, and use any railway or railways or other way or ways, upon or across the said lands, for the purposes aforesaid, or for any other purposes which the said dean and chapter, their successors, or assigns, shall think fit, and to construct such machinery, buildings, and erections on any part of the said premises as shall be necessary or convenient for working the said mines, quarries, or beds, or making, using, and enjoying the said railways and other ways, and to burn and make lime, bricks, and tiles upon the said lands, whether for sale or otherwise, and also with all other necessary or convenient ways, passages, conveniences, privileges, and powers whatsoever, for or in relation to the purposes of this present exception or any of them, the said dean and chapter, their successors and assigns paying reasonable compensation for spoil of ground to be thereby occasioned, such compensation to be determined by the adjudication of two indifferent persons, one to be chosen by the said dean and chapter, their successors, or assigns, and the other by the warden, masters, and scholars of the said University for the time being, to the intent that the said fields, closes, or parcels of land, and premises, with the appurtenances (saving and excepting as hereinbefore is excepted), may be henceforth held and enjoyed by the warden, masters, and scholars of the said University for the time being for ever, subject nevertheless to a payment to the said dean and chapter, and their successors of an annual rent or sum of eighteen shillings, and also of an annual sum of nineteen shillings in respect of redeemed land-tax."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect with

"certain modifications the fourth report of the "Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and "revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, 'the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes.

"Whereas by the said Act it is enacted, that, except as therein otherwise specified, all the monies and revenues to be paid to us, and all the rents and profits of the lands, tithes, and other hereditaments vested and to be vested in us by and under the authority of the same Act, together with all accumulations of interest produced by and arising therefrom, shall be from time to time carried over by us to a common fund, and by payments or investments made out of such fund, or, if in any case it be deemed more expedient, by means of an actual conveyance and assignment of such lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of a portion thereof, additional provision shall be made by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by orders of your Majesty in Council, ratifying schemes prepared by us) for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required, in such manner as shall, by the like authority, be deemed most conducive to the efficiency of the Established Church; provided always, that in making any such additional provision out of any tithes, or any lands or other hereditaments allotted or assigned in lieu of tithes, so vested or to be vested in us, or out of the rents and profits thereof, due consideration shall be had of the wants and circumstances of the places in which such tithes now arise or have arisen:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, out of the said common fund, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A., the fixed annual sum set opposite to the name of such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year; provided nevertheless, that the amount of the payment on the first day of November next in respect of each of the annual sums specified in the said schedule shall be calculated from such date as, according to the circumstances of each case, shall appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we also recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us out of the said common fund, to the Reverend James Halls Croft, incumbent of the vicarage of Timberscombe, in the county of Somerset, and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, or to the incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage, a gross sum of one hundred and thirty pounds, to be applied towards providing a fit house of residence for the same benefice.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the tithes or rentcharges allotted in lieu of tithes, and the lands and premises particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked B., with their appurtenances, now vested in us for the purposes of the said Act, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any convey-

ance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the gazetting thereof, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons herein-after mentioned, that is to say, the tithes or rentcharge allotted in lieu of tithes described in the same schedule, and therein numbered 1, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the Reverend David Lloyd James, incumbent of the consolidated chapelry of Pont Robert, in the county of Montgomery, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, and his successors, incumbents of the said consolidated chapelry; and the lands described in the same schedule, and therein numbered 2, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the Reverend John Gibson, incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Muggleswick, in the county and diocese of Durham, and his successors, incumbents of the said perpetual curacy.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit, when there shall be sufficient means for that purpose; and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any benefice, or instead of any part of such annual sum, a gross sum equivalent thereto should be substituted, or any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," as enlarged by the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Skipton, in the West Riding of the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Embay, in the said parish of Skipton, under the power for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels, augmented by the Governors of the bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district (which is to comprise the township of Embay-cum-Eastby and part of the hamlet of Skybeden), should be named

or called 'The District Chapelry of Embsay with 'Eastby,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Embsay, in the parish of Skipton, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and burials, in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed, and made chargeable and payable, upon, for, or in respect of, letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post; and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office."

And whereas by a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated the 23rd day of January, 1855, it was ordered and directed, that packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, might be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates of postage and regulations therein contained.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Warrant should be repealed, and that such other rates of postage should be charged, and such other regulations made with respect to certain packets sent by the post as are hereinafter contained.

1. Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and

provided), order and direct that the said Warrant, dated the 23rd day of January, 1855, and the several rates of postage and the several orders, directions, and regulations therein mentioned and set forth relating to the transmission by the post, of packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art within the United Kingdom shall cease and determine, and shall be, and the same are, hereby repealed and revoked. Nevertheless, no Treasury Warrant repealed by the said Warrant of the 23rd day of January, 1855, shall be revived by this Warrant.

2. And we do further order and direct, that all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, posted in the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates and regulations hereinafter contained; that is to say:

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one penny.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of two pence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of four pence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound, and not exceeding one pound and one half of another pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of six pence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and one-half of another pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of eight pence.

And for every additional half a pound in weight of any such packet, above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged and taken an additional rate of postage of two pence.

And every fractional part of every such additional half of a pound in weight, shall be charged as one half of a pound in weight.

3. And we do further order and direct, that no such packet, which in length or width or depth shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be forwarded by the post under the provisions aforesaid.

4. And we do further order and direct, that the postage of all such packets as aforesaid, shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post Office in London, in which case the same shall be forwarded post paid, and the postage thereof shall be charged in such postage account.

5. And we further order and direct, that for the purposes of this Warrant, the terms "Books, publications, or works of literature or art" shall mean, comprise, and include all books (whether printed, written, or plain), publications or compilations (whether in print or in manuscript), alman-

nacks, prints, maps (whether on paper or canvas or cloth, and whether printed or written), and any description of paper, parchment, or vellum (whether printed, written upon, or plain, or any mixture of the three), together with any binding, mounting, or covering of or upon or belonging to any book or publication or work, or any portion thereof, or of or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book-markers (whether of paper or otherwise), pencils, pens, or other articles usually appertaining to any such book, publication, or work, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission, except where any such packet shall be transmitted by the post, upon or in respect of which a less rate of postage than a minimum rate of four pence shall be paid, and in all cases where any such packets shall be transmitted by the post, upon or in respect of which a less rate of postage than a minimum rate of four pence shall be paid, every such packet shall consist of and comprise all such before-mentioned books, publications, or compilations, almanacks, prints, maps, paper, parchment, or vellum only as shall be printed or contain printed matter only (whether bound or unbound), and shall not comprise, extend to, or include any packet consisting of or containing any writing (except the address), nor any cases or rollers of prints or maps or book-markers, pencils, pens, or other articles.

6. And we do further order and direct, that every such packet shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover, or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and that there shall be no letter, either closed or open, nor any communication in the nature of a letter, nor any enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant, sent, in or with any such packet, nor shall there be any letter or any communication in the nature of a letter, written or printed in or upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof, nor (unless a minimum rate of postage of four pence shall be paid upon or in respect of such packet), any writing whatever written in or upon any such packet, or upon the cover or envelope thereof, except the address.

7. And in order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, we do further order and direct, that it shall be lawful for any officer of the Post-office to delay the transmission of any packet, posted or forwarded by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be dispatched, in due course of the post, or (at his option) until the despatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought, in due course of the post, to be forwarded by him.

8. And we do further order and direct, that the transmission of the packets aforesaid, under this present Warrant, shall be restricted to such as shall be sent by the post between places within the United Kingdom and by the post of any post town in the United Kingdom, and that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to interfere with or in anywise to affect any privileges beyond those granted by this Warrant which may relate to the transmission by the post of printed votes and proceedings of Parliament, or of newspapers or other periodical publications which are allowed to pass by the post between places within the United Kingdom under the newspaper privilege, nor shall this present Warrant be construed to extend to any packet sent by the post between the United Kingdom and places beyond the seas.

9. And we do further order and direct, that if

any packet, or the cover or envelope of any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this present Warrant shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall in length or width or depth exceed the dimensions of two feet, or if there shall be any letter or any communication in the nature of a letter, written or printed in or upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof, every such packet shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and every such packet, on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter, if the postage had been paid by stamps when posted, and such double postage may be either paid by the sender or be charged to the person to whom such packet shall be forwarded.

10. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any writing whatever (such writing not being a letter, or any communication in the nature of a letter), either enclosed in or written upon any such packet, or upon the cover or envelope thereof (except the address), and a rate of postage less than a minimum rate of four pence shall have been paid upon or in respect of such packet, every such packet shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the postage paid thereon and the postage to which such packet would be liable as a book packet under this Warrant, together with a further and additional rate of four pence.

11. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any letter, or any communication in the nature of a letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, every such letter, or communication, or enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office, and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged not only with the full rates of postage as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of four pence, and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid by stamps, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

12. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant (any such packet sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service, of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post-office in London, and the postage thereof being charged in such account, only excepted), shall be posted, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinbefore contained, but equal in amount to *one penny* at the least, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon, or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of four pence: and if any

such packet shall be posted without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, every such last-mentioned packet shall, and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be dealt with and chargeable in like manner, as is hereinbefore directed, with respect to any packet not open at the ends or sides, or exceeding in length, or width, or depth, the dimensions of two feet.

13. And we do hereby further order and direct, that in every case in which the postage chargeable on any packet, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall exceed the rates of postage to which any such packet would be liable as a letter, no higher amount than the letter rates shall be charged thereon.

14. And we do hereby further order and direct, that the several packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage, respectively contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage upon letters and packets which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post.
