Those Ladies who are to be presented at the Drawing-Room on the 14th of June next, are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Tuesday previous* to the Drawing-Room, or upon any *earlier* day, between the hours of *eleven and four*, in order that they may be submitted for The Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place, unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which names shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* on the *Monday previous* to the Levee, or upon any *earlier* day between the hours of *eleven and four*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, now convened as the Representatives of the several Presbyteries, Royal Burghs, and Universities in Scotland, have received with profound respect and gratitude your Majesty's gracious letter addressed to this General Assembly.

In the renewed assurance of your Majesty's affectionate and undiminished regard for this National Church, and in the expressed resolution to maintain this Ecclesiastical Establishment in the possession of its ancient rights and privileges, we recognise a solemn pledge on which we rely with that entire confidence which is due from subjects to a Sovereign whose determination it is to make the long established Laws and Constitution of the State the unvarying and inviolable rule of her Government.

We are also cheered and encouraged, in the labours of our several vocations, by the satisfaction which your Majesty has been pleased to express with the frequent proofs given by former Assemblies of anxiety to promote the interests of true religion and piety; and we earnestly pray that our deliberations may, through the aid of Divine Grace, contribute effectually to the present happiness and the everlasting welfare of the people committed to our charge.

We are seriously impressed by the momentous considerations to which your Majesty has called our attention, as incitements to the zealous performance of our sacred functions at a time when the Sovereign and the subjects have equal cause to implore the protection and counsel of the Almighty God in the war which the general voice of the nation has pronounced to be just and necessary. Participating fully in the sympathy which your Majesty feels with the suffering inevitably resulting from war, we at the same time cherish the most earnest desire that the sacrifices so cheerfully made by the people may be the means, under the guidance of Providence, for obtaining an honourable and lasting peace.

Your Majesty's Royal Warrant for two thousand pounds to be applied to the Reformation of the Highlands and Islands of Scotland has been most gratefully received; and it shall be our earnest study so to distribute this substantial boon as to effect the pious and benevolent purposes for the accomplishment of which it has been so liberally bestowed.

The reappointment of the Right Honourable Lord Belhaven as your Majesty's representative in this General Assembly, is regarded by us as a special proof of your royal favour, as we have hitherto found that distinguished nobleman to be a firm and ardent friend of this National Church, and in all respects highly entitled to our respect and confidence.

That the Lord God Almighty, the Father of

our Lord Jesus Christ, may, in the good pleasure of His unspeakable goodness, multiply to our beloved Queen the choicest blessings of the present life, with the higher glories and felicities of the life everlasting,—that the same rich and unfading benefactions may be abundantly vouchsafed to the Prince Albert, to the Prince of Wales, and to all the Royal Family,—that the vast population of the British Empire, now living under the mild and beneficent rule of a Sovereign so justly endeared to every loyal and patriotic heart, may, through the ages to come, enjoy the same inestimable privileges; and that the time may soon arrive when the people of every land, rejoicing in the light of the Gospel, shall universally be actuated by the pure, holy, and beneficent principles of Christian truth which alone can purify their souls from the influence of every hostile and hateful passion, and make them meet for the enjoyment of the incorruptible inheritance of heavenly places in Christ, is the earnest prayer of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, dutiful, and loyal subjects,

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, convened in General Assembly, embrace the opportunity, afforded by our meeting, to approach the Throne with the humble expression of our warm attachment to your Majesty's person, and family, and Government.

We beg to convey to your Majesty the assurance of our heartfelt sympathy in the present trying and anxious state of the Nation over which your Majesty rules, as still engaged in a protracted war with an enemy of great power and resources, as well as unbounded ambition.

While, as subjects of the Prince of Peace, we regard war as a great evil, and devoutly recognize in it the chastisement of a Holy and Righteous God, yet we know that he can overrule it for good; and we are fully persuaded that the present contest has been engaged in by your Majesty for just ends, such as we trust the just King and Judge of all may approve.

We deplore the many painful events that have occurred during its continuance, and the sacrifice that has been incurred of many lives, valuable to your Majesty and the Nation. While we recognize the hand of God in those events, and would strenuously inculcate on the flocks committed to our care, resignation to the Divine Will under such inflictions, together with the exercise of repentance and amendment of heart and life, we would venture to express to your Majesty our congratulations on the patient endurance and dauntless bravery which have been displayed by your Majesty's Forces by sea and land, and the hope which we are encouraged to entertain that their efforts may ere long be crowned with triumphant success; and it is our earnest prayer, which we will not fail, along with our people, to prefer at the Throne of the Heavenly Grace, that, through your Majesty's wise administration, and the blessing of God on the councils and arms of your

Majesty and your Allies, the ends for which the present war was undertaken, may be speedily attained, and a safe, honourable, and lasting peace secured.

We unite in praying Him, who is King of Kings and Lord of Lords, to enrich your Majesty with every temporal and every spiritual blessing, and, in His goodness to this Nation, to spare your Majesty long to reign in righteousness and with true glory over a loyal, happy, and religious people.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the thirteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for punishing mutiny and desertion of officers and soldiers in the service of the "East India Company, and for regulating in such "service the payment of regimental debts, and "the distribution of the effects of officers and "soldiers dying in the service," it is amongst other things enacted, that Her Majesty may, by any Order or Orders to be by Her from time to time made, with the advice of Her Privy Council, appoint any place or places beyond the seas, within Her Majesty's dominions, to which felons and others may be conveyed:

And whereas, it is expedient that provision should be made for the transportation of offenders sentenced under the provisions of the said recited Act.

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in Her Majesty by the said Act, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from the ninth day of June, in this present year, Her Majesty's settlements in Western Australia shall be places to which felons and other offenders sentenced to transportation under the provisions of the said Act shall be conveyed.

And the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Commissioners for the Affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend "an Act for the regulation of municipal corporations in England or Wales," it is, amongst other things enacted that if the inhabitant householders of any town or borough in England or Wales, shall petition Her Majesty to grant to them a charter of incorporation, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by any such charter, if she shall think fit by the advice of Her Privy Council to grant the same, to extend to the inhabitants of any such town or borough, within the district to be set forth in such charter, all the powers and provisions of the Act of the fifth and sixth William the Fourth, cap 76, for regulating corporations, whether such town or borough be or be not a corporate town or borough, or be or be not named in either of the schedules to the said Act, provided nevertheless, that notice of such petition and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, one month at least before such petition shall be so considered.

And whereas the inhabitant householders of the town of SUTTON COLDFIELD, in the county of Warwick, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, praying that a charter of incorporation may be granted to the said town; now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such petition, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the 10th day of July next.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial "of the dead in England, beyond the limits "of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require;

And whereas Her Majesty has been pleased, by various Orders in Council, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made certain representations stating that he is of opinion that the time for closing the said churchyards and burial-grounds may be extended ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken such representations into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the undermentioned churchyards and burial-grounds, as follows ; viz. :

In the parish churchyard of **AYLSHAM** from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first September next.

In the churchyard of the parish of **NEW BRENTFORD**, wholly from and after the first October, instead of from the thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In **St. Peter's Churchyard** (with the exception of private vaults), in **Holy Trinity Churchyard** (except in existing private vaults and graves), and in the burial-grounds of **Ebenezer Baptist Chapel, Zion Chapel, and Bethesda Independent Chapel**, all in the town of **BURNLEY**, Lancashire, from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the twelfth May and first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard of the parish of **CHELMSFORD**, from and after the first September, instead of from the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard and in the burial-ground of the Baptist Chapel, **GREAT GRIMSBY**, from and after the first August, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the churchyard of the parish of **GWENNAF**, from and after the first August, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In that portion of the churchyard of **St. Matthew, HOLBECK**, in the borough of **LEES**, situate on the north-west side of the churchyard, and containing an area of six hundred and fifty square yards and upwards, in which no interments have taken place, from the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first July next.

In the parish churchyard and in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan and Baptist Chapels, **GREAT TORRINGTON**, from and after the first of September, instead of from the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

In the New Parish Burial-ground and in **Beechen Chapel Burial-ground**, in the parish of **WATFORD**, from and after the first June, instead of from the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

And it is further ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and upon a representation of the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that so much of Her Majesty's Order in Council of the thirty-first of March last as regulates burials in the churchyard of **St. Mary, SHEFFIELD**, and directs their discontinuance in that churchyard, from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, be and the same is hereby repealed.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the city of **BATH**, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications; viz. :—

To be forthwith discontinued in *St. Michael's Church*, in *Bathwick Church*, beneath *St. Saviour's Church, Walcot* (provided, nevertheless, that persons standing in the relationship of husband, wife, son, or daughter to persons already buried under this church, may be buried beneath the same on condition that each body to be buried be enclosed in an air-tight metallic coffin, and that each coffin be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed in brickwork, well cemented), in the *Abbey*, in *St. James's Church*, in *Widcombe Church*, in *Magdalen Chapel* in the parish of *Lyncombe and Widcombe*, in the *Roman Catholic Chapel* in *St. James's parish*, in the *Roman Catholic Chapel, Prior Park*, and in the *Baptist Chapel*, both in the parish of *Lyncombe and Widcombe*, in *Walcott Church*, in the *Wesleyan Chapel* and *Chapel-yard*, before or at the side of the chapel, in the *Independent Chapel*, in the *Baptist Chapel* and *burial-ground*, and in *Lady Huntingdon's Chapel*, the last four chapels being in the parish of *Walcott*.

To be discontinued in the *Abbey Cemetery*, in *St. Peter St. Paul and St. James Burial-ground*, in the *Baptist Burial-ground*, in the *Workhouse Burial-ground*, in the *Unitarian Burial-ground*, in the *Friends' Burial-ground*, and in the *Jews' Burial-ground* (the said cemetery and burial-grounds being in the parish of *Lyncombe and Widcombe*), and in *Lansdowne Cemetery* in the parish of *Walcott*, except so far as is compatible with the observance of the regulations for new burial-grounds.

To be discontinued in *Bathwick Churchyard*, in *Widcombe Churchyard* and *Burial-ground*, in *Walcott Burial-ground*, and in the *Wesleyan, Independent, and Lady Huntingdon's Burial-grounds* in the parish of *Walcott*, within five yards of any dwelling, and in such parts of the remainder of the said churchyards and burial-grounds as are not completely drained, and have been previously opened, provided that burials may be continued in such family graves or vaults in the said churchyards and burial-grounds as can be opened without the exposure of remains.

To be discontinued from and after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in *St. Michael's* Burial-ground, in *St. James's* Burial-ground, and in *Walcott* Churchyard, except in vaults or walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the eighteenth day of July next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said eighteenth day of July.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Heads of the Colleges and Hall hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the city of OXFORD, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

To be forthwith discontinued beneath the chapels and ante-chapels of the following colleges, namely; *Magdalen*, *Queen's*, *University*, *All Souls*, *Brazenose*, *New*, *Wadham*, *Exeter*, *Trinity*, *Balliol*, *St. John's*, *Worcester*, *Christchurch*, *Oriel*, and *Corpus Christi* Colleges, and of *St. Edmund's* Hall, subject to the qualification that burials should not be prohibited in the cloister or ante-chapel of any of the above-mentioned colleges or hall, provided such burials are limited to the head of any such college or hall, or to any member of its foundation, dying within the precincts of the college or hall, and that they should be subject to the following regulations as to the mode of burial, viz., that every coffin be enclosed in lead, embedded in charcoal, and entombed in an air-tight manner.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the eighteenth day of July next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the chapels affected by such representation, one month before the said eighteenth day of July.

To be forthwith discontinued in *St. Peter's* College Chapel, in *Pembroke* College Chapel and Cloisters, in *Queen's* College Chapel, in *Corpus Christi* College Chapel, in *St. Catherine's* Hall Chapel and Ante-Chapel, in *King's* College Chapel, in *Clare* Hall Chapel, in *Trinity* College Chapel, in *Trinity* Hall Chapel and Ante-Chapel, in *Gonville and Caius* College Chapel and Ante-Chapel, in *St. John's* College Chapel, in *Sidney Sussex* College Chapel, in *Magdalen* College Chapel, in *Jesus* College Chapel and Cloisters and Cloister Court, in *Emmanuel* College Chapel and Cloister, and in *Christ's* College Chapel and Ante-Chapel, subject to the qualification that burials should not be prohibited in the Cloister or Ante-Chapel of any of the above-mentioned colleges or halls, provided such burials be limited to that of the master or any member of the foundation dying within the precincts of any such college or hall, on condition that each body to be buried be enclosed in an air-tight metallic coffin, and that each coffin be separately entombed in brickwork, and well cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the eighteenth day of July next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the chapels affected by such representation, one month before the said eighteenth day of July.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of

postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time by Warrant as aforesaid to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof.

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom and the colony of Victoria (direct or through any foreign country), there shall be charged and taken in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, a uniform British rate of one shilling, if the sea conveyance be by packet boat, and a uniform British rate of eight pence if the sea conveyance be by private ship.

And we direct that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between the colony of Victoria, and any other of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom (whether through any foreign country or not) there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, the rates of British postage following; that is to say:

For the conveyance of every such letter between the colony of Victoria and any part of the United Kingdom, the sea conveyance being by packet-boat, a rate of one shilling; and, if the sea conveyance be by private ship, a rate of eight pence, and for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and any such colony or foreign country.

And we direct that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as one additional ounce, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

And we direct, that in all cases in which any letter, in respect of which any rate of postage is chargeable by this Warrant, shall pass through a foreign country, any foreign postage payable thereon shall be charged and paid thereon in addition to the British postage.

And we further direct, that nothing in this Warrant contained shall in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege granted by the said recited Act in favour of petitions and addresses, forwarded to Her Majesty by the post, nor the privilege, granted by the same Act, to members of each House of Parliament, to receive by the post petitions and addresses to Her Majesty, and petitions addressed to either House of Parliament, not exceeding thirty-two ounces in weight, exempt from postage, nor shall anything in this Warrant contained in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's Service, and seamen and soldiers employed in the service of the East India Company, now by law enjoy of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.
