had Advice That the Grand Vifier had removed his Camp about a Mile nearer to us, and that he was refolved to make another. Attempt to velieve the Place. The Duke of Larray, to prevent a Stra-prize, detached he Squadronstand he Battalions under the Command of Lieutenant-General de Mercy, Lieutenant-General Souches, and Major-General Heufler, who continued in Arms till the next. The 25th, we fortified with feveral Morning. Rows of Paliladoes the Rondel towards the River and 400 Germans and 200 Hungarians were posted there under the Command of the Baron d'Afti, to. hinder the Enemy from putting Succors into the Town on thaufide. The 26th, an Hunganin Rea negado, who was taken carrying Letters to the Grand Visier, was Empaled in the Camp. The same day the Bavarlans were again attacked in the Lodgment they had made on one of the principal Towers of the Caltle, which they were forced to abandon, after having had many men killed and wounded. The\_ following hight they endeavoured to recover that Polt, but were repulsed with the loss of feveral men killed and wounded. We made a Bridge on the fide of the Dike of Lorrain's Attack that the Troops might pais with the more cafe when they gave the Affault; and the bext day we fecured it with a large Redoubt. The Befieged fired upon us with feven Pieces of Cannoh, all they had left' mounted. A Deferter came into the Camp, and affured us that the Grand Vifier was reinforced with 10000 Tartars; That he was refolved to attack our Camp, and had caufed a Battery of five Pieces of Cannon to be raifed on the fide of the Danube to facilitate the pallage of the Troops he defigned to put into the Town on that fide. In the evening the Bavarians repolleffed themfelves of their Lodgment on the Tower of the Calle, but with the loss of 130 men killed and wounded; They raifed there a Bat-tery of fix pieces of Cannon to batter the Wall of the the Town. Our Army was the whole night in Arms, and continued to till the next day at Noon, upon the Advice we had received of the Grand Vilier's defign to attack us, but the Enemy did not appear fill the 28th toward's Evening, when we faw their whole Army march towards a Hill on the Right of our Camp; The Imperial Horfe was thereupon drawn out, but there only paffed fome light Skirmishes. We took a Tink who was going with Letters to the Grand Vifier, wherein the Baffa of Buda acquainted him, That he had engaged the Garifon to promife him to defend the Place to the laft Extremity However that he defpaired of keephig them in that Refolution without a fpeedy Relief which he defired him to attempt on the fide of the Caftle. The 29th, in the Morning, 1000 Spahi's, 2000 Janifaries, and 1500 Taitars, commandedby two Baffa's, descended from the Hills on the fide of the Lower Town, but 2000 Musqueteers, who were posted there, feconded by the Regiments of Horfe of Mercy, Heusler, and Neubourg, charged them with that Vigor, that the Enemy were put to Flight, and most of them flain, four Men only getting into the Town; In this occasion we took 30 Colours and Stangards, and lost about 30 Men; The Baron de Mercy was wounded with a Sable in the Head, and with a fhot of a Piftol in the Shoulder; during this Action the Belieged made a-Sally, but were repulsed with the Lofs of 10 Men. The Grand Vifier was all this while at the Head of his Army drawn up in Battalia, but he retired, fo Toon as he perceived General Piccolomini, who pafleft the Bridge over the Danube with 3 Regiments of Cingalitiers and two of Dragoons. The Count de Schuffenberg is expected here this day or to morrow<sup>e</sup> with the reft of the Troops that were in Translovania. Paris. Sept. 21. The 13th Infant the Count

de Lobcountz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Em-peror, had Publick Audience of the King, to ac-quaint his Majefty with the News he had received of the taking of Buda. The 14th the King, accom-panied with the Dauphin, went to Maintenon, to vifit the Works of the River d'Eure ; And the 17th, his Majesty returned to Verfailles. The Dauphin has been feveral days at Anet, where the Duke de Vendofme has entertained him with Hunting and an Opera. All the Advices from Italy affure us, that the Venetians have belieged Napoli di Romania.

Windfor, Sept. 13. His Majefty has Graciously re-ceived the Address of the Colony of Rhode Island, and Providence Plantation in Act - England, Humbly Re-prefenting, That upon the fignification of a Writ of Quo Warranto against their Charter, they had Refolved, in a General Affembly, not to ftand Suit with His Malefty, but wholly to fubrit to His Royal Pleas fure themfelves and their Charter ; whereof His Majefty has thought fit to accept the Surrender
