NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty will hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on Wednesday the 27th instant, at two o'clock.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock on the Monday previous* to the Levee, or upon any *earlier* day between the hours ~~of eleven~~ *and four*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levee, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock, on the Monday previous* to the Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the Prebendary of Ashill, in the cathedral church of Wells, for the property belonging to him as such prebendary:

"Whereas by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the said prebend of Ashill, will (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), upon the first avoidance of the said prebend become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

"And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the

purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the hand of any prebendary of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such prebend, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments:

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend Richard Peter Whish, the present prebendary of Ashill, that, with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council:

"We, therefore, with the consent of the said Richard Peter Whish, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose, that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and after the day of such gazetting all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) now belonging to the said Richard Peter Whish as such prebendary as aforesaid, or to or in which he has or ought to have any estate, right, title, or interest, shall, together with all such estate, right, title, and interest therein (except as aforesaid), be and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from the said Richard Peter Whish to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that, in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, there shall be paid by us to the said Richard Peter Whish the sum of one thousand and seven hundred pounds sterling; provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease, of the said lands, tithes or other hereditaments, or of any part thereof, shall since the thirteenth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eleven, have been or shall be granted or made by the said Richard Peter Whish, or by any of his predecessors in the said prebend.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.

THIS day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor and the Deputation of Aldermen and Common Councilmen of the city of London waited upon His Royal Highness Prince Albert with the following address, which was read by the Right Honourable J. A. Stuart Wortley, M.P., the Recorder, and which His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:—

To His Royal Highness PRINCE ALBERT.

May it please your Royal Highness,

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the

city of London, in Common Council assembled, desire by the warmest expression of our gratitude to testify to your Royal Highness the value which we attribute to your gracious presence on this occasion.

The proceedings of this day are of deep interest and importance to the great community of the metropolis, and to the country at large.

These costly and extensive works have been undertaken by the Corporation of the city of London, in deference to the suggestions of the National Legislature, and under a strong sense of the responsibility accompanying the powers and the means confided to them by their fellow citizens.

If the transfer of the Chief Metropolitan Market to this new and spacious locality shall be successful it will not only have removed all ground of complaint arising from the character of its ancient site, but will also have conferred essential benefits upon the population of this vast capital as well as on those important branches of our national industry which are concerned in supplying with food the increasing masses of its inhabitants and the countless numbers who frequent it.

In the happiness and prosperity of all classes of Her Majesty's subjects, your Royal Highness has always evinced the warmest and most active interest, and we know nothing more likely to secure success to this great undertaking than the sanction and encouragement afforded in its inauguration by the illustrious Consort of our Queen.

My Lord Mayor and Gentlemen,

"Accept the expression of my hearty thanks for your kind welcome, and for the gratifying assurance of your loyal and affectionate attachment to the Queen and Her family.

"I have been much pleased by the opportunity which your kind invitation has afforded me of seeing and admiring the great work which you this day open to the public; a work which not only deserves all admiration in itself on account of the excellence of the arrangements and the magnificence of the design, but which will, I trust, be found eminently conducive to the comfort and health of the city of London.

"That its success will be commensurate with the spirit in which it has been undertaken and carried out, I cannot doubt.

"A certain dislocation of habits and interests must inevitably attend the removal of the great City Market from the site it has occupied for so many centuries, and this may possibly retard for the moment the fullest development of the undertaking. This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Com-

mons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to empower the Commissioners of Sewers to expend on house drainage a certain sum out of the monies borrowed by them on the security of the rates, and also to give to the said Commissioners certain other powers for the same purpose.

An Act to amend the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications.

An Act to make further provision for the registration of births, deaths, and marriages in Scotland.

An Act to provide that the Property or Income Tax payable in respect of the income from ecclesiastical property in Ireland shall be a deduction in estimating the value of such property for the purpose of taxation by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners.

An Act to amend and extend the jurisdiction of the Stannary Court.

An Act to prevent doubts as to the validity of certain proceedings in the House of Commons.

An Act for enabling the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, to purchase and maintain waterworks and for other purposes.

Marine Notification of the Alteration of the Provisional Regulation, which was published on the 22nd of September, 1852, for the Pilotage of the Bar and Bay of San Marcos, in the Province of Maranham.

No. 61, Rio de Janeiro, Minister of the Affairs of the Marine, December 19, 1854.

MOST EXCELLENT SIR,

HAVING laid before His Majesty the Emperor, the Despatch which your Excellency addressed to this Department, under No. 24, and dated the 11th May last, relative to the alterations proposed by the Captain of the Port of the Province of Maranham, as being necessary in the provisional regulations of the pilotage of the Bar and Bay of San Marcos, according to his experience of upwards of a year, the said august Lord has been pleased to approve of the said alterations, some of them being modified, as your Excellency will perceive, and consist as follows:—

The Articles 15, 16, and 18, of the Provisional Regulation, to which the notice of the 22nd of September, 1852, refers, relative to the Pilotage of the Bar and Bay of San Marcos, in the Province of Maranham, are thus altered.

Article 15. National and foreign vessels are to pay for pilotage outwards; those with three masts, 46 mil 400 reis (5l. 4s. 4d.); those with two masts, 40 milreis (4l. 10s.); and for pilotage inwards

27 mil 200 reis (3*l.* 1*s.* 2*d.*), besides 6 mil 400 reis (14*s.* 5*d.*) for mooring; 8 milreis (18*s.*) for taking the vessel to the beach or ship yard, if requiring repairs; and 12 milreis (1*l.* 7*s.*), if to the place named "Madre de Deos."

For each succour afforded by the pilots from the ridge of rocks of the lake to the shallows of the bar, inclusive, 120 milreis (13*l.* 10*s.*); if upon these shallows, 60 milreis (6*l.* 15*s.*); if on these shallows near to Guimarães, Pirajuba, and Corva Grande, 240 milreis (27*l.*); and the like sum when the vessel is taken by the Bay of S José, Rio Mosquito, and Itaqui, to cross the bar.

Article 16. Those vessels which do not choose to take a pilot, are to pay half the tax established for pilotage in the preceding Article, as well on taking their departure as on entering. The coasting vessels whose masters dispense with the service of the pilots, from being themselves pilots of the coast and bar of the province, and as such registered in the respective Captain of the Port's Office, are exempted from this half tax.

Article 18. There is to be a box, with two keys, under the charge of one of the pilots, to be selected by the others, with the approval of the Captain of the Port, one of which keys is to be kept by the chief pilot and the other by the responsible pilot. The latter is also to keep a book stating the receipt and expenditure of the money produced by the pilotage, which is to be always regularly posted up, and according to the orders and under the inspection of the Captain of the Port, a yearly account of such receipt and expenditure to be sent to the office of the Secretary of State for Marine Affairs, through the Captain of the Port. For this charge, the said pilot is to be remunerated monthly, with the sum of 6 milreis (13*s.* 6*d.*), out of the respective chest.

The above-mentioned chest will serve for keeping the amounts received for the labour of the pilots, as is provided for in the Articles 15, 16, and 17, of this regulation; and the sum which may exist in the said chest, after deducting all expences, is to be distributed monthly in equal shares amongst the chief and the other pilots.

The following Articles are added to the said regulation.

Article 19. Those pilots who shall render any extraordinary services, not mentioned in this regulation, or any other person doing so, are to be paid according to the award of arbitrators to be named by the Captain of the Port.

Article 20. If any one of the pilots, from reasons unconnected with the pilotage, excepting in the case of illness, should omit performing the duty which in his turn devolves upon him, during the course of one month, he will have no right to the respective share, which is to be divided only amongst the other pilots.

Article 21. The pilot who should be addicted to inebriety, or be habitually ill behaved, is to be imprisoned from one to eight days for the first time, as many as fifteen days for the second time, and in the case of his not reforming, he is to suffer the penalty of dismissal.

All of which I communicate to your Excellency for your information, and that you may cause it to be executed.
