THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Monte Video, enclosing the translation of a Decree issued by the Monrevidean Government, respecting the establishment of a new Lighthouse at Colonia; copy of which is subjoined.

(Translation.)

The Senate and Chamber of Representatives of the Oriental Republic of Uruguay, &c., &c., have sanctioned the following law.

ARTICLE I. An impost of forty centimes per ton is established, which shall be paid by the following vessels:—

1st. Vessels going from Montevideo to Colonia, to the interior of the River Plate, or its affluents.

2nd. Vessels which, on entering the said rivers, may have touched at Montevideo or Colonia.
3rd. Vessels coming down from the said rivers, which may touch at Colonia or Montevideo.

Article II. Any vessel which shall have paid the impost on coming in, will not have to pay it on going out, and vice versâ.

Article III. Vessels employed as packets between Montevideo and the ports of those rivers, shall pay half the imposts.

Article IV. This law shall be in force from the day that the illumination of the lighthouse, situate at Colonia, begins.

Article V. The proceeds of the present impost are to be applied to finishing the lighthouse at Colonia, and to lighting the same.

Article VI. Five years after this law is put into execution, the impost mentioned in the first Article will be reduced to the half.

The impost of the first five years may be alienated by the executive power for the fulfilment of the objects of the fifth Article.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE Minister of Marine hereby gives notice that in the Blauwe Slenk (the navigable channel from Vlie to Harlingen), to facilitate the navigation, a floating beacon has been placed, with two heads or baskets, in 36 palms' depth at low water, on the west shore, between the white buoy, No. 4, and the southern floating beacon, in the following courses: the steeple of Sexbierum E.S.E., and the steeple of Surig S. ½ E., per unadjusted compass.
