IT is hereby notified that the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received, from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, an official communication from Rear-Admirals Penaud and Dundas, commanding the Allied Naval Forces in the Baltic, and acting in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty and of Her Ally, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, announcing that on the 15th of June instant, all Russian ports, roads, havens, and creeks, on the coast of Finland, from Nystad, in latitude $60^{\circ} 46'$ north, longitude $21^{\circ} 20'$ east of Greenwich, to Hangö Head, in latitude $59^{\circ} 46'$ north, longitude $22^{\circ} 55'$ east of Greenwich, including especially the port of Abo, and including likewise all the islands and islets fronting the said coast, and all channels and passages leading amongst the said islands towards the said coast, that is to say, more especially the channels leading to and amongst the islands between Nystad as aforesaid and the island of Landtö, in latitude $60^{\circ} 23'$ north, longitude $20^{\circ} 47'$ east of Greenwich, and the several channels respectively leading between and to the eastward of the islands of Landtö, Enklinge, Kumblinge, Seglinge, and the Kokar Rocks in latitude $59^{\circ} 52'$ north, longitude $21^{\circ} 0'$ east of Greenwich, and thence all channels leading to the coast of Finland between the Kokar Rocks and the Outö Lighthouse, and between Outö and Hangö Head as aforesaid, were placed in a state of strict Blockade by a competent force of the Allied Fleets; and it is hereby further notified, that all measures authorised by the Laws of Nations and the respective Treaties between Their Majesties and the different Neutral Powers, will be adopted and executed with respect to all vessels which may attempt to violate the said Blockade.

WHEREAS by the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that "Her Majesty may, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time reduce all or any of the Dues for the time being payable in respect of existing or future Lighthouses, Buoys, or Beacons, for the time being under the management of the General Lighthouse Authorities," therein mentioned (that is to say, the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, and the Port of Dublin Corporation);

"And may also, by and with the like advice, from time to time increase or vary any of such Dues, so that no Dues payable in respect of any Lighthouse, Buoy, or Beacon, existing at the time when the said Act came into operation, should be made to exceed the amount which had at any period previous to such time, been received in respect thereof, or to which the said Dues might during any part of such period as last aforesaid lawfully have been raised."

And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted that "Tables of all Light Dues, and a Copy of the Regulations for the time being in force in respect thereof, shall be posted up at all Custom Houses within the United Kingdom, and that each of the said General Lighthouse Authorities shall from time to time as occasion requires, furnish copies of such Tables and Regulations to the Commissioners of Customs in London, and to the principal Officers of Customs resident at all places where Light Dues are collected on account of such Lighthouse Authority, and that such copies shall be posted up by the Commissioners at the Custom House in London, and by such Officers at the Custom Houses of the places at which they are respectively resident."

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is expedient to alter and amend the existing Tables of Light Duties levied by the said General Lighthouse Authorities respectively, so as to admit of their consolidation into one Table.

And whereas consolidated Tables of Light Duties in the form hereunto annexed, together with the subjoined statement of the reductions

and other alterations proposed to be effected, has been submitted for Her Majesty's approval.

And whereas the said consolidated Tables and the said reductions and alterations appear to be proper and reasonable.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve, the said Tables of Light Duties, and the said reductions and alterations submitted as aforesaid.

Statement of the Reductions and other Alterations proposed to be effected by the New Tables of Light Duties, submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

REDUCTIONS.

Irish Oversea Lights to be charged three-sixteenths of a penny per ton, instead of four-sixteenths, and only one abatement of twenty-five per cent. to be allowed, instead of the two abatements, one of twenty, and a second of twenty-five per cent., now existing.

The exemption from dues of vessels under twenty tons register, as now existing in the Irish Table, to be extended to the dues of the Three Boards, instead of continuing the English and Scotch exemptions at fifteen tons.

The Fern not to be chargeable from or to ports north of Aberdeen to or from ports between the Sleeve and Eyder.

The Fern, Tinmouth, and Flambro' not to be chargeable from or to ports north of Aberdeen to or from ports between the Eyder and the Texel.

Lights north of the Tinmouth not to be chargeable on vessels from or to Seaham and ports south to or from ports between Bergen and the Naze of Norway.

Vessels trading between the Isle of Man and ports in the United Kingdom to be treated uniformly as coasters.

ALTERATIONS.

An entire alteration in the form and statement of the Tables of Dues consequent upon the consolidation of the three existing Tables into one, together with the special alterations rendered necessary by the foregoing Reductions.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to limit the time for proceeding to election in counties and boroughs in England and Wales, and for polling at elections for the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and for other purposes;" it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, hereafter,

on petition from the justices in quarter sessions assembled of any county, riding, parts, or division of any county, other than any county of a city, or of a town in England and Wales, representing that it would be expedient that any polling place or places mentioned in the said petition should cease to be such and that any other place or places mentioned in the said petition should be substituted in lieu thereof, and praying that such alteration and substitution might be made, to declare that the said alteration and substitution shall be made in respect of all or any of the places mentioned in the said petition; and the said declaration shall be certified under the hand of one of the clerks in ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and when so certified, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall then be of the same force and effect as if the same had been expressly made by the authority of Parliament.

And whereas the justices of the peace for the county of Surrey, in general quarter session assembled, at Reigate, on the 3rd day of April, 1855, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, setting forth that a notice in writing had been delivered one month at the least before the holding of the above-mentioned quarter session, to the clerk of the peace of the said county, signed by John Edward Johnson and Thomas Sydenham Clarke, Esqrs., two of Her Majesty's justices of the peace in and for such county, and which said notice stated that the Court at the quarter session above-mentioned would be moved to make petition to Her Majesty, praying Her Majesty would be pleased, by the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to declare that the parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, in the said county, might be substituted as a fit and proper polling place for the polling district, including the said parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, and the parishes of Streatham and Clapham, both in the said county, in lieu of Kennington Common, also in the said county, which Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department had intimated might no longer be used as a polling place for the above-mentioned district; that the said clerk of the peace had ten days, at the least, before the holding of such general quarter session as above-mentioned, caused a copy of such notice to be inserted twice, at the least, in two of the newspapers published or commonly circulated in the said county, together with a notice of the day upon which the above-mentioned quarter session would be held; and that the above-mentioned motion was agreed to in open Court at the said general quarter session: and praying that Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, would be pleased to declare that the parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, in the said county of Surrey, might be substituted as a polling place for the polling district, including the said parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, and the parishes of Streatham and Clapham, both in the said county, in lieu of Kennington Common, also in the said county.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, in the county of Surrey, shall be a polling place for the polling district, including the said parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, and the parishes of Streatham and Clapham, both in the said county of Surrey, in lieu of Kennington Common, also in the said county.

Parish of Saint Mary.—Wholly in *St. Mary's Church* and churchyard, and in *St. Mary's New Burial-ground*.

Parish of Sculcoates.—Wholly in *Sculcoates Church* and churchyard, in *St. Paul's Churchyard*, in the *Baptist Chapel George-street*, in the *Tabernacle Sykes-street* and in the vaults connected therewith, and in the vaults under the *Roman Catholic Chapel*.

Parish of Drypool.—Wholly in *Drypool Parish Church* and churchyard, in the vaults under *Kingston Chapel*, and under the *Holborn-street Chapel*.

Parish of Sutton.—Wholly in *St. Mark's Churchyard*, and in the *Quakers' Burial-ground*, from and after the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

Extra-parochial.—Wholly in the vaults under the *Charterhouse Chapel*.

HALSTEAD, ESSEX.—From and after the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the *Baptist Burial-ground*.

CRICKHOWEL, BRECON.—Forthwith in the *church*, and in the *churchyard* except so far as is compatible with the observance of the regulations for new burial-grounds.

CHIPPING NORTON.—Forthwith within the *church*, and also within the *mausoleum* attached thereto, unless all communication with the church be intercepted by an air-tight partition, and all coffins separately entombed in an air-tight manner; also (except in existing vaults and brick graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner,) in the old part of the *churchyard*; and in the last consecrated part of the *churchyard*, and in the *Wesleyan* and *Baptist Chapel-yards*, the regulations for new burial-grounds are to be observed.

WITNEY, OXFORDSHIRE.—Forthwith in the *Parish Church*; and (except in now existing walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner,) in the *churchyard* from and after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

GRANTHAM, LINCOLNSHIRE.—Forthwith in the *Parish Church*, and in the *Roman Catholic Chapel* in the parish of Manthorpe cum Little Gonerby; and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the *Parish Churchyard*, in the *Burial-ground*, *Grantham*, situated in the parish of Manthorpe cum Little Gonerby, and in the *Ebenezer Chapel Burial-ground* in the parish of *Spittlegate*.

LITTLE DEAN GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—Wholly in the *churchyard* and *church* on and after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five. In the *Independent Burial-ground*, the regulations for new burial-grounds are to be observed.

SWINDON, WILTS.—Wholly within five yards of the churches, chapel or other building in the *Parish Churchyard*, *St. Mark's District Churchyard*, and the *Independent Chapel-yard*; and in the other parts of these *grave-yards*, the regulations for new burial-grounds are to be observed, and also in the burial-grounds of *Providence Chapel* and of the *Primitive Methodist Chapel*.

STOW-ON-THE-WOLD, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—Forthwith in the *Parish Church*; and (except in now existing walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed with masonry in an air-tight manner,) in the *churchyard* on and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

ROYSTON.—Forthwith within five yards of all dwelling-houses in the *Parish Churchyard* of Royston, Herts and Cambridgeshire, in *Kneesworth Chapel Burial-ground*, and in the *Friends' Burial-ground*, Royston, Cambridgeshire; and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, wholly in the ancient portion of the *Parish Churchyard*.

WHITWICK, LEICESTERSHIRE.—Forthwith in the *Parish Church*, and in the *General Baptist Chapel Burial-ground* within five yards of the Chapel Day School; and from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the *Parish Churchyard*; (provided nevertheless, that Mrs. Sarah Bonnett may, at her decease, be buried in the family vault belonging to Mr. Bonnett, in Whitwick Church, on condition that the body be enclosed in an air-tight metallic coffin, and that the coffin be embedded in brickwork, well cemented).

LOSTWITHIEL, CORNWALL.—Forthwith beneath the *Parish Church*; and (except in existing vaults and brick graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner,) in the *churchyard* on and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

BOWNESS, WESTMORLAND.—Forthwith in the *church*; and from and after the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the *churchyard*.
