

of Lorrain's. A great many Women and Children, and 4 or 500 Jews were likewise saved. These are commanded to bury the Turks that were slain, and to cleanse the Streets. We found in the Place above 4000 Pcs of Cannon and Mortars, of the first we are fit for Service, but most of them dismounted) with a great quantity of Arms, Cannon-Bullets, Bombs, Grenades, and Carcasses; and other sorts of Ammunition. Of the Christians these were not killed in the Assault above 100 of the Duke de Lorrain's Attack, among which were the Marquis Spinozzi, and the Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of Spremont; But at the Bavarian Attack the Loss was greater, 300 being killed, and about 800 wounded. The Grand Visier, who encamped within a Mile of Buda, had possessed himself of a Hill from whence he pretended to intend to march with his Cannon, understanding the Town would choose Esterhazy to command and march towards the Royal Palace, upon which, the Duke of Lorraine sent out 6000 Hungarians, commanded by the Count de Busigny, and 3000 Imperial Guards under the Order of Genl & Caprara to attack their rear. And it was intended that a Council of War should be held at 10000 Foot Buda, and about 10000 Foot Buda with several pieces of Cannon towards the Bridge of Esterhazy, and that Orders should be given to the Forces of Graudt to join him, in order to cut off the Enemies retreat, whereto he called the Imperial and Auxiliary Forces (except those which are posted a Garrison into Bratislava, under the Command of Major-General Beck) should march after the Grand Visier.

Edinburgh, Sept. 17. This Ceasation is protracted till the 20th Instant. The 4th arrived here 2000 Brandenburgers, and, with these and his other Auxiliary Troops we have now a Garrison of 9000 Men. The Brandenburgh and Lunenburg Troops, as well as those of the Landgrave of Hesse, continue their march, and will together make an Army of 20000 Mens. A Camp has been marked out for them by some of the Brandenburgh and Lunenburg Generals near Fukls-Burke. On Saturday last arrived here the Duke of Holstein. Upon the Confusions of Festrin and Skipter, several others have been apprehended, and among the rest the old Burghmaster Scherer. The Siegr Fr., the Brandenburg Minister, returned hither yesterday from the Camp, having, as we are told, obtained a Promise from the King of Denmark, to withdraw his Forces to a greater distance from this place, upon his representing that it would very much contribute to the success of the Treaty, for accomodating the Difference between His Majesty and this City. The Danes begin to carry off their Artillery.

Hague, Sept. 20. An Envoy who sat ved here some days ago from the Emperor of Morocco, had yesterday Audience up the 3d General; His Business is to make a Comptiment of Friendship from his Master; and to offer an Exchange of Slaves for so many Guns. The Letters from Edinburgh give great hopes of an Accommodation. Those from Vienna of the 8th Instant say, That above 3000 Turks had been killed at the taking of Buda; That the Visier Bassa was of the Number who was slain, after having received sixteen wounds upon the Beach; That the Vice-Bassa, the Aga of the Janitaires, the Mifti, and several Officers of Note, and about 1500 Soldiers and 500 Jews were Prisoners; That there was in the Town at the beginning of the Siege a Garrison of 1000 Men, besides the Inhabitants that bore Arms; That the Christians had found a great deal of rich Plunder; That many of the common Soldiers got 2000 Ducats; and a Servant of the Duke de Croz had robbt made a Booty of 8000 Ducats. It is said that the Grand Visier, so soon as he knew the Town was taken, retired towards Alba Regalis, and leaving a sufficient Garrison in that place, continued his Retreat towards the Bridge of Esterhazy; That the Duke of Lorraine had sent out great Detachments to attack his Rear, and intended to march after him with the whole Army.

Brussels, Sept. 17. We have had here for ten days together such Publick Rejoycing and Feasting, that the like hath not been known. On Sunday Night, the Prince de la Tois treated our Generals, and the whole Court very sumptuously, and afterwards entertained them with very fine Fire-works. And yesterday his Excellency gave a very magnificent Diner to all the Grandees, Ministers, Generals and Councillors of State. Our last Letter from Vienna informed us, That the Duke of Lorraine had sent Detach-

ment of 8000 Horse, under the Command of General Caprara, to pursue the Grand Visier, who retired with all the baggage he could towards the Bridge of Esterhazy, and that his Highness was preparing to follow with the whole Army. These Letters say, That the most considerable Jews of Buda had during the Night, gotten into Boats, hoping to escape with their Wives down the Danube, but that they were discovered, and taken by the Hungarians, who got a Booty of uncomputable value.

Brussels, Sept. 20. We have received by an Extraordinary Courier Letters from Vienna of the 12th Instant, which give us account, That the Duke of Lorraine having detached 12000 Imperial Horse, Hussars, Dragoons, and Croats, under the Command of the Counts de Caprara and Budham, to attack the Turkish Army in their march, followed the 6th Instant with 20000 Horse, 6000 Hungarians, and 15000 Foot, with several Field pieces and Provisions for 13 days, leaving a Garrison of 5000 Men in Buda, under the Command of Major-General Becke; That the day before 14000 Foot, with 30 pieces of Cannon, several Mortars, and the necessary Ammunition and Provisions, parted from Buda, passing down the Danube in large Boats, with Orders to fortify themselves in some convenient Post near the Bridge of Esterhazy, to hinder the Enemies passing in, till such time as the Elector of Bavaria and Duke of Lorraine arrived there with the main Body of the Imperial Army; And that Orders have been sent to the Forces in Croatia, to march towards the Bridge of Esterhazy, to join the said Body of Foot. These Letters add, That the Turkish Prisoners, which were about 3000 (besides the principal Officers who were sent to Vienna) were employed in emptying the Ditches, and repairing the Ramparts of Buda, and in levelling the Lines and other Works made during the Siege.
