DESPATCHES, of which the following are copies or extracts, have been received at this Office from Rear-Admiral the Honourable R. S. Dundas, Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's ships and vessels on the Baltic Station.

Duke of Wellington, at anchor off Tolboukin Lighthouse, July 2, 1855.

"THE Arrogant arrived here from the neighbourhood of Biorko on the 28th ultimo, and returns to-day to the same station. I have directed Captain Yelverton to extend his examination of the coast as far westward as Lovisa; and I beg leave to direct their Lordships' attention to a report, herewith transmitted, which I have this day received from Captain Vansittart, of the *Magicienne*, through whose activity and zeal, with the aid of the *Ruby* gun-boat, a large number of vessels, laden with granite blocks, have been successfully destroyed in Werolax Bay."

*Her Majesty's ship Magicienne,
Off Nerva Beacon, July 1, 1855.*

SIR,
I HAVE the honour to report that, in obedience to orders received from Captain Yelverton, I left the anchorage of Biorko on the 28th of last month, with Her Majesty's ship *Magicienne* under my command, and *Ruby* gun-boat, in search of a number of vessels said to be freighted by the Russian Government to carry blocks of granite, and in the neighbourhood of the Island of Lukar.

Having arrived off the Island of Kyskykyla the same evening, early on the 29th I proceeded in Her Majesty's gun-boat *Ruby*, and boats of Her Majesty's ship *Magicienne*, under the First Lieutenant H. B. King, to the very end of the bay, looking well in about the Island of Lukar, and in boats ascending some little distance up the River of Kyskykyla, finding only four vessels, which, being both new and empty, I left unhurt.

The following morning, the 30th, I proceeded with Her Majesty's ship *Magicienne* and *Ruby* gun-boat, to the next large Bay of Werolax, where anchoring Her Majesty's ship *Magicienne* at the entrance, I proceeded to the very end of Werolax Bay, a distance of about nine miles, where I found a large granite quarry with near two hundred men at work, who at our approach went off,

Anchoring the *Ruby*, so as to command the whole place with the boats, I had the various vessels at anchor, consisting of thirty large galiots, boarded.

Twenty-nine being laden with granite blocks, I had them destroyed by fire.

With the exception of three or four rifle shots being fired upon us, which were quickly returned by rockets and rifles, we met with no resistance.

The head of Werolax Bay was evidently the rendezvous for the granite vessels, as, with the exception of one, all their sails were unbent, colours and papers secured, and most of their vessels were slung and buoyed, so as to be ready for scuttling if discovered, which many had commenced doing on the present occasion.

SIR,
I HAVE the honour to acquaint you with my proceedings since the 18th instant.

On the 20th I anchored at Rotsinshalm, and took immediate steps for blowing up the fort, which was accomplished on the following day.

On the afternoon of the 20th I made a careful reconnoissance of Kotka, in the *Ruby*, and discovered at the back of the island, where I had not been before, large government buildings, with barracks fit to contain about 5000 men, stables, storehouses, and hospital, all of which I destroyed. The buildings had evidently been very recently occupied. I met no troops except a few Cossacks, who retired on our approach.

And whereas it is expedient to extend the provisions of the said recited Warrant of the 22nd day of February, 1855, except as hereinafter mentioned, to packets of a like kind to be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the colony of Western Australia.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct that all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of

printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or any of the Colonial Legislatures, may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the colony of Western Australia, and that on every such packet so transmitted under the provisions of this Warrant as aforesaid, if not exceeding half a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage of sixpence, and that on every such packet exceeding half a pound in weight there shall be charged, taken and paid such progressive and additional rates of postage as are directed to be charged, taken, and paid on, and in respect of, the several packets mentioned and contained in, and authorized to be transmitted by the post, under the provisions of the said recited Warrant of the 22nd day of February, 1855.

And we do further order and direct that all such respective packets to be transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this present Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions contained in the said recited Warrant of the 22nd day of February, 1855, with respect to the several packets therein mentioned (except such as relate exclusively to packets posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales, addressed to the United Kingdom) and that all such respective packets so to be transmitted under the provisions of this present Warrant shall be subject as well to the several progressive and additional rates of postage aforesaid, as also to the said several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions (except as aforesaid) respectively mentioned, expressed and contained in and by the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 22nd day of February, 1855, in like manner in all respects and as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as if the said several progressive and additional rates of postage and the said several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions (except such only as relate exclusively to packets posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales, addressed to the United Kingdom), respectively mentioned and contained in the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 22nd day of February, 1855, were contained, inserted, expressed, and repeated in this present Warrant, and as if the said colony of Western Australia, with a single rate of postage of six pence, set forth against such place, had been and was mentioned and contained and included in the said Schedule B, annexed to the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 22nd day of February, 1855.

And we do further order and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant duly made at any time hereafter, to alter, repeal, or revoke, any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

West London Union.—Parish of Saint Dunstan in the West.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the parish of Saint Dunstan in the West, in the liberty of the City of London;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of St Dunstan in the West, in the liberty of the City of London, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas at a meeting of the Vestry, held at the vestry-room of the said parish, after public notice in that behalf, on Friday, the thirtieth day of March last, it was resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to
“issue an order, under their seal of office,
“directing that the Act passed on the 5th
“August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57),
“entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of
“vestry or other meetings in churches, and
“for regulating the appointment of Vestry
“Clerks,’ shall be applied to, and put in
“force within, this parish, as regards the ap-
“pointment and payment of the Vestry
“Clerk.”

And whereas one of the Churchwardens only, the other being deceased, and the Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish, have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution.

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, do hereby order and direct, that so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, shall forthwith be applied to, and put in force within, the said parish of Saint Dunstan in the West.

And we hereby order and direct, that a salary of one hundred and fifty pounds a year shall be paid to such Vestry Clerk by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish, and that the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual feast days in the year, namely, Michaelmas day, Christmas day, Lady day, and Midsummer day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

That every person appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk in the said parish shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the West London Union, in the liberty of the City of London, a bond, in the penal sum of two hundred pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties,

and shall, when required by the said Guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or insolvent; provided that the Guardians may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company expressly authorized by statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any Poor Law officer.

That the Auditor of the District comprising the said Union shall, in the statement required by the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the seventeenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Board, of the securities of the officers of the said Union, include the name of the Vestry Clerk for the time being appointed under the authority hereof, together with the particulars in the said General Order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

And we direct, that a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
