T is hereby notified that the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty an official communication from Captain Thomas Baillie, R.N., Senior Officer of the White Sea Squadron, acting in the name and on the behalf of Her Majesty and Her Ally, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, announcing the establishment, on and from the 11th June, 1855, of a strict Blockade of the Russian ports and places therein mentioned, and especially of the ports of Archangel and Onega, by a competent force, which communication is to the following effect:

"It is hereby notified, that on and after the "11th day of June, 1855, all the Russian ports, " roads, havens, and creeks in the White Sea, from " Point Orlofka, in latitude 67° 11' 30" N., longi-" tude 41° 22' 12" E., to Cape Kanoushin, in lati-"tude 67° 11' 30" N., longitude 43° 48' 42" E., "including especially the ports of Archangel and "Onega, are placed in a state of strict Blockade " by a competent force of Her Britannic Majesty's "ships and vessels under my orders. And it is " further notified that all the measures authorized " by the law of nations and the respective treaties "between Her Britannic Majesty and the dif-"ferent neutral powers will be adopted and " executed with respect to all vessels which may " attempt to violate the said Blockade.

And it is hereby further notified, that all measures authorized by the laws of nations, and the respective treaties between Her Majesty and His Majesty the Emperor of the French, and the different neutral powers, will be adopted and executed on behalf of Her Majesty and of Her Ally, with respect to all vessels which may attempt to violate the said Blockade.

DESPATCHES, of which the following are copies or extracts, have been this day received from Rear-Admiral the Honourable R. S. Dundas, Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's ships and vessels in the Baltic.

Duke of Wellington,
Tolboukin Lighthouse, July 7, 1855.
"THE Magicienne returned this morning from
Lovisa, and I annex a report which I have received from Captain Yelverton, of Her Majesty's

ship Arrogant, who has been again successful in destroying a well constructed fort at Svartholm, in the entrance of the Bay of Lovisa, but their Lordships will observe, with regret, that, notwithstanding the humane desire of that officer, the town of Lovisa was unfortunately destroyed by fire, which occurred accidentally, on the night following the visit of Her Majesty's ships. Captain Vansittart informs me that the authorities of the town have themselves admitted and explained the accidental origin of the fire."

Her Majesty's ship Arrogant, off Hogland, July 8, 1855.

I HAVE the honour to inform you, that I reached Lovisa on the afternoon of the 4th instant, and anchored the vessels close to Fort Syartholm.

The enemy must have had intelligence of our movements and quitted the fort on our approach, for they had been at work but a few hours before unroofing the barracks and taking away stores. The guns and ammunition had been previously removed.

Svartholm was in good condition, and a work of great strength, entirely commanding the approaches to Lovisa; it has had important additions of late years, can mount 122 guns, and had accommodation in casemated barracks for about 1000 men, with governor's house and garden, and excellent officers' quarters. I made immediate arrangements for blowing up the fort and completely destroying the barracks; these have since been fully carried out.

On the 5th, I made a reconnaissance of the town of Lovisa, in the Ruby, accompanied by the boats of the Arrogant and Magicienne. A strong detachment of Cossacks made their appearance at one time, but they were dispersed by the fire from the beats, the rockets particularly throwing them

into great confusion. On landing at Lovisa, sent for the authorities and explained the object of my visit; some demur was caused by our not having a flag of truce. I told them they had no right to such a guarantee, as the respect due to it had been so grossly violated at Hangö. I then proceeded to the barracks and Government stores within the town, which I destroyed, but did not set fire to them, as by so doing the whole town must have been burnt.

This precaution was not destined to save Lovisa, for during the night an accidental fire occurred in a portion of the town where we had not been, and before morning the whole place was reduced to ashes.

Extract of a letter from Rear-Admiral Honourable R. S. Dundas, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, dated—

> Duke of Wellington, Tolboukin Lighthouse, July 7, 1855.

I CANNOT conclude this letter without calling the particular attention of their Lordships to the active exertions of Captain Storey, of Her Maje-ty's ship Harrier, which led a few days later to the destruction of a large amount of shipping, discovered afterwards in another anchorage near Nystad, as detailed in the enclosure to Captain Warden's report of the 2nd instant.

> Harrier, off Little Wahas, June 24, 1455.

I HAVE the honour to inform you that the boats of this ship destroyed 47 ships belonging to the enemy, varying from 700 tons to 200 tons, on the nights of the 23rd and 24th instant.

On the first night the ships destroyed were one mile from the town of Nystad, and about three miles from the ship, and we were enabled to bring one barque, the Victoria, of about 450 tons, off with us.

On the following morning the steam was got up and we proceeded to sea to anchor the prize off Enskov Lighthouse.

At 5 P.M., however, we steamed towards the land and anchored at about 7.30 P.M., and at 8 P.M. the boats were ag in despatched.

During the night and following day we discovered 42 ships, the whole of which we either burned or scuttled.

I have the greatest pleasure in being able to state that these proceeding were so successfully carried out without any casualty.

Owing to the distance we got away from the ship (10 or 11 miles) and the blowing weather, accompanied with rain, that came on during the morning, we were prevented from bringing any vessel out with us.

We did not get back to the ship until after 6 P.M. this afternoon, the men having been on their oars twenty-two hours.

I think, Sir, I am only doing common justice to the men when I state how pleased I was to see the zeal and perseverance with which they worked for so many hours, neither can I omit stating my belief that this arose in a great measure from the good example of the officers, especially the senior Lieutenaut, Mr. Annesley, from whom I have ever received the most active assistance.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners VV for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect "the reports of the Commissioners appointed "to consider the state of the Established "Church in England and Wales, with refer-"ence to Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues, "so far as they relate to Episcopal Dioceses, "Revenues, and Patronage," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain " modifications, the fourth report of the Commis-" sioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues, and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain "and amend two several Acts relating to the "Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues, so far as they relate to Episcopal Dioceses, Revenues, and ' Patronage,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Eccle-'siastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Com-' missioners for England,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol for certain estates belonging to his see.

"Whereas it was by the secondly and thirdly recited Acts enacted, that, by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the same Acts, or of the said first recited Act,

made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any bishop, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to the see of such bishop, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments.

"And whereas the Right Reverend James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, is seised, in right of his see, of the hereditaments and premises particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, subject, nevertheless, to the

subsisting leases thereof.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce to the improvement of the said fund, that the said hereditaments and premises should be transferred from the said See of Gloucester and Bristol to us, and that an annual money payment to the said James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and to his successors, should forthwith be substituted for the same.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his corporate seal, that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and after the day of such gazetting, the hereditaments and premises so described and referred to in the said schedule hereunder written, and all the estate, right, title, and interest therein of the said James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and of his successors, Bishops of Gloucester and Bristol, shall be and become transferred and conveyed from the said bishop and his successors, Bishops of Gloucester and Bristol, to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be, for the purposes of the said Acts, absolutely vested in us, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, as from the twenty-fifth day of December last past.

"And we further recommend and propose, that in consideration of and for such conveyance and transfer, and in substitution for the said hereditaments and premises, there shall be paid by us to the said James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and to his successors, Bishops of Gloucester and Bristol, the annual sum of three hundred and sixty-five pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, and that the first of such payments shall be payable on the twenty-fifth day of June

now next ensuing.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease, dated the thirteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, granted to them by the said Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol for the term of three lives, subject to an annual

"And also all that the rectory of Much Cowarne, in the county of Hereford, with certain other lands and tenements there, commonly called 'Newman's Lands,' with the appurtenances thereunto belonging, all which are now (with certain exceptions), in the tenure or occupation of Francis Henry Thomas, his heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease, dated the twentieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, granted to him by the then Bishop of Gloucester, for the term of three lives, subject to annual payments in respect of reserved rent and redeemed land-tax, amounting together to twenty-six pounds, three shillings, and four pence.

"And also all those the rectories, churches, and chapelwicks of Deyveynock Ystrod Velk and Ystrod Lynlais, in the county of Brecon, with the appurtenances thereunto belonging, all which are now (with certain exceptions), in the tenure or occupation of Sir William Clayton, Baronet, and Watkin Watkins, their heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the twenty-first day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and four, granted to them by the then Bishop of Gloucester, for the term of three lives, subject to annual payments in respect of reserved rent and redeemed land-tax, amounting together to twenty pounds, two shillings, and two pence three farthings."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the two several registries of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, at Bristol and at Gloucester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, "with certain modifications, the fourth report of "the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and "Revenues," and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to explain and amend two several Acts relating "to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to alter and amend the law relating to Ecclesiastical houses of residence," duly prepared and

laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Eccle-'siastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two 'several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Com-'missioners for England,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend the law re-' lating to Ecclesiastical houses of residence,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for substituting a money payment for certain property belonging to the dean and chapter of the Cathedral Church of Gloucester.

"Whereas it was by the said recited Acts enacted and declared, that, by the authority of a scheme prepared by us and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the said first recited Act, any sum of money which should have been invested in the public funds, or in other security or securities, in trust, for any ecclesiastical body corporate, aggregate or sole, might, upon application in writing to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the hand and seal of such body corporate, and in the case of any chapter with the consent of the visitor thereof, be directed to be sold, and the same should be sold accordingly, and that the produce of such sale should be applied to such purpose and in such manner as should appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such body corporate; and also that for any like purpose any arrangement might be made, with the consent in writing, under the corporate seal of any chapter, for the sale, transfer. or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments; and that the aforesaid provisions relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested, in trust, for any ecclesiastical body corporate, did and should include and apply to all moneys and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government funds, or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer, or of any individual or individuals for or to the credit of or in trust for any bishop, dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise.

"And whereas the said chapter now consists of a dean and four canons; two canonries having been suspended under the provisions of the said firstrecited Act.

"And whereas the said dean and chapter are now seized in fee of divers manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, the whole or the greater part of which have been heretofore demised on leases for years or lives, at small annual reserved rents and upon payment of fines, and they are also beneficially interested in, or otherwise entitled to, certain sums of stock and cash invested or held in trust as aforesaid, and particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A.

"And whereas by an order and decree of the said dean and chapter, bearing date the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and duly confirmed as a statute by their visitor, and registered in the registry of the diocese, it was provided that one moiety of the yearly sum of eight thousand four hundred and sixty pounds hereinafter mentioned, or of the net annual proceeds of the estates which may be substituted for the same, should be appropriated to, or for, the several persons or objects connected with the said dean and chapter, and enumerated and set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked B.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and the said dean and chapter have proposed to us with the consent of their visitor, that the said manors, lands, tithes, ten ments and hereditaments (except as hereinafter excepted), should be dealt with in manner hereinafter mentioned, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce, as well to the improvement of the said fund, as to the permanent benefit of the said dean and chapter, that the same should be deal with accordingly.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the dean and chapter of the Cathedral Church of Gloucester, and of the Right Reverend James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, as visitor of the said dean and chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals, we humbly recommend and propose that in consideration of the money payments hereinafter mentioned, to be paid by us to or on account of the said dean and chapter, and of our relinquishing all our right and claim in respect of the said suspended canonries to and in the estates and property to be retained by the said dean and chapter, and to any participation in the rents and profits thereof, or in the money payments hereinafter mentioned, or the estates to be substituted for the same, all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, which now belong either in possession or reversion to the said dean and chapter (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage, and any property situate within the precincts of the said cathedral church, and excepting also the lands, tenements, and hereditaments described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked C), and all the estate and interest therein of the said dean and chapter, shall upon, and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any other conveyance or assurance in the law, become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon become and be absolutely seised of the same in fee, and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fiftyfive, and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, we shall surrender all right and be excluded from all participation in respect of the said suspended canonries to and in the property to be excepted from such transfer to us as aforesaid, and that there shall on the first day of January, and the first day of July, in every year, be paid by us to the said dean and chapter in respect of the half year then last past, the sum of four thousand two hundred and thirty pounds, and also until the said dean and chapter shall have been put into possession of real estates as hereinafter mentioned, the further sum of one hundred | Company.

and seventy pounds (such last-mentioned sum to be by them appropriated and paid to the chapter clerk for the time being, in respect of the profits which would have accrued to him on account of the management of the estates hereby proposed to be transferred to us), and that the first payment of each of such half-yearly sums, respectively, be made on the first day of July next, and that the receipt or receipts of the treasurer for the time being of the said dean and chapter, shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all, or any, and every, such sum or sums of money as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us, under the authority of this scheme, when ratified as aforesaid.

Article I.—The produce of the Republic exported from the ports of the Uruguay, Colonia, and Rosario, to pay the following duty:—Ox and cow hides, dry, 200 cents each, and if salted, 175 cents; horse hides with hair, 100 cents each, and if salted, 75 cents; salt meat, 300 cents per quintal.

Article 2.—All other produce of the Republic to pay four per cent. upon its market value.

Article 3.—The duty established in the fore-

going articles shall not be paid when the exports are from the ports of Monte Video or Maldonado.

Article 4.—The following is to be excepted from the duty established in the 2nd Article:—grains, pulses, flour, lime, bricks, tiles, and stones, exported from any port in the Republic.

Article 5.—This law to come into force twenty

days after its promulgation.

Article 6.—All laws opposed to the present law are repealed.
