A DESPATCH, of which the following is an extract, has been received at the Admiralty from Rear-Admiral the Honourable R. S. Dundas, Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Baltic.

Extract of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Honourable R. S. Dundas to the Secretary of the Admiralty, dated Duke of Wellington, at Nargen, 23rd July, 1855.

I HAVE the satisfaction of transmitting a copy of a report which I have received from Captain Yelverton, detailing the circumstances under which, with the Cossack, Magicienne, and Ruby in company, he has again availed himself of an opportunity to attack, with good effect, a position occupied by troops of the enemy, assembled in considerable force, for the defence of Fredericksham; and I have much pleasure in submitting to their Lordships this additional proof of the zeal and gallantry of the officers and men under his orders, and of their good conduct, especially of Mr. H. G. Hale, Mate, and the crew of the Ruby gun-boat.

Her Majesty's ship, Arrogant,
Sir. off the Crops Islands, July 22, 1855.

I HAVE the honour to inform you that, on leaving the Fleet, I proceeded off the Island of Hogland, where I was joined by the Cossack, Magicienne, and Ruby gun-boat.

Information having reached me that the enemy had sent 3000 troops to Fredericksham, and were making every possible exertion to put the place in a state of defence, I lost no time in getting there.

I arrived on the afternoon of the 20th, and would have attacked them that evening, but that the Ruby got on shore in examining the intricate channel leading to the town, and it was too late to take the ships in by the time she was off.

Early the following morning I succeeded in getting the ships up to the town, and at 9.40 we opened fire. After an engagement of one hour,

the enemy ceased fire, and abandoned their guns, some of which were dismounted.

If I judge by the number of men we saw them carrying away on stretchers, they must have suffered severely.

I am happy to say the injury on our side has been trifling, though our hull bears evidence of the precision with which they fired, but generally speaking their shot fell short.

I regret to say that one man belonging to the Ruby was dangerously wounded by a round shot.

I must not allow this opportunity to pass without mentioning Mr. Hale, Mate, Commanding the Ruby gun-boat, who, together with his gallant crew, deserve the highest praise for the way in which they worked and fought their long gun, so close to this, that I had an opportunity of observing the precision of their fire.

One portion of a suburb caught fire and was destroyed, but I am happy to say the town remained uninjured, owing to the strict observance of an order I gave to fire on the fort only.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with cer-"tain modifications, the fourth report of the "Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and "Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Eccle-' siastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provi-'sion for the spiritual care of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for making better provision for the cure of souls in the parish of Henllan, in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, and for constituting two separate districts for spiritual purposes out of that parish, and out of the parish of Llansannan, in the same county and diocese.

Whereas it is by the said first-recited Act enacted, that, except as therein otherwise specified, all the monies and revenues to be paid to us, and all the rents and profits of the lands, tithes, and other hereditaments vested and to be vested in us by and under the authority of the same Act, together with all accumulations of interest produced by and arising therefrom, shall be from time to time carried over by us to a common fund, and by payments or investments made out of such fund, or if in any case it be deemed more expedient, by means of an actual conveyance and assignment of such lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of a portion thereof, additional provision shall be made by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by orders of your Majesty in Council, ratifying schemes prepared by us,) for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required, in such manner as shall, by the like authority, be deemed most conducive to the efficiency of the established church; provided always, that in making any such additional provision out of any tithes, or any lands or other hereditaments allotted or assigned in lieu of tithes, so vested or to be vested in us, or out of the rents and profits thereof, due consideration shall be had of the wants and circumstances of the places in which such tithes now arise or have

And whereas all the separate estates and

the Cathedral Church of Saint Asaph have by the recent avoidance of such deanery become transferred to and vested in us, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act: And whereas such estates and endowments comprise, inter alia, the tithes or rentcharges allotted in lieu of tithes of the appropriate rectory of the said parish of Henllan, and the greater portion thereof is now in possession.

And whereas the present endowment of the vicarage and parish church of Henllan is very inadequate to the requirements of the parish, and it appears to us to be expedient that the same should be augmented, in manner hereinafter men-

And whereas it is by the said secondly recited Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent and containing a large population, and wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying such scheme,) with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district or any part thereof should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections, upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall in the meantime consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least so soon as such district shall bave become a new parish as thereinafter provided:

And whereas the said parishes of Henllan and Llansannan are respectively of great extent, and contain a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual endowments formerly belonging to the deanery of wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has

been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular parts of such parishes hereinafter mentioned and described, such parts not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted separate districts in the manner hereinafter set forth.

Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Henllan described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, and also all that part of the same parish, and all that part of the said parish of Llansannan, described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are respectively delineated and set forth on the maps or plans hereunto also annexed, and are marked with the names hereinafter recommended to be given to the same respectively, shall be constituted separate districts for spiritual purposes accordingly, and that the same shall be respectively named as follows; that is to say: the district described in the first schedule shall be named "The District of Trefnant," and the district described in the second schedule shall be named "The District of Bylchau."

And we further recommend and propose, that the ministers of the districts herein recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, and, so soon as the same shall have become, according to the provisions of the herein-secondly recited Act, new parishes for ecclesiastical purposes, the perpetual curates thereof, shall respectively be permanently endowed with the portions of the tithes or rentcharges allotted in lieu of tithes of the appropriate rectory of the said parish of Henllan, now vested in us as aforesaid, and respectively set forth in the third and fourth schedules hereunto annexed, and that such portions of tithes or tithe rentcharges, and all our estate and interest therein, shall accordingly, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be respectively transferred and secured to such ministers or perpetual curates, so soon as they shall respec-tively be appointed, and to their successors, in manner following; that is to say: the portion of the said tithes or tithe rentcharges described in the extract from the summary of the apportion-ment of the rentcharges allotted in lieu of tithes in the several townships of Lleweni-isav, Lleweni-uchav, Llan, Rhanhir, Rhan-vawr, Parc, and Uwch Caeran, in the said parish of Henllan, set forth in the said third schedule, shall be transferred to and absolutely vested in and form the endowment of the minister or perpetual curate for the time being of the said district or new parish of Trefnant; and the portion of the said tithes or tithe rentcharges described in the extract from the said summary set forth in the said fourth schedule shall be transferred to and absolutely vested in and form the endowment of the minister or perpetual curate for the time being of the said district or new parish of Bylchau.

And we further recommend and propose that the portion of the tithes or tithe rentcharge of the said appropriate rectory so vested in us as aforesaid, and described in the extract from the

said summary set forth in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, together with all our estate and interest therein, shall in like manner be transferred to and absolutely vested in the Reverend Mdward Smart, Muster of Arts, incumbent of the said vicarage and parish church of Henllan, and his successors, incumbents of the said benefice, as from the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four; and that such last-mentioned portion of the tithes or tithe rentcharge so to be annexed as aforesaid shall be and be deemed to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the yearly stipend or salary of one hundred and twenty pounds, heretofore paid to the incumbent of the said vicarage out of the appropriate rectory aforesaid, and that such annexation shall also include and be in full satisfaction of any claim which the said Edward Smart, us vicar of the said parish of Henllan, may, under the provisions of the secondly-recited Act, have, to compensation for any loss of fees, dues, or other emoluments, which he may sustain by the formation of the districts hereinbefore recommended to be constituted.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

The district of TREFNANT, being -

All that portion of the parish of Henllan, in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, situate on the eastern side of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the old turn-pike-road leading from Saint Asaph over Pont-yrallt-goch to Denbigh.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

The district of BYLCHAU, being-

All those portions of the parishes of Henllan and Llansannan, in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, situate on the southern and eastern sides of an imaginary line commencing at a point marked A on the map or plan hereunto annexed on the eastern boundary of the said parish of Henllan and in the middle of the high road leading from Felin Segrwyd or Egryn Mill to YGroes Fawr, and thence extending towards the north-west along the middle of such road and of the high road leading from YGroes Fawr afore-said to Llansannan as far as the boundary between the parishes of Henllan and Llansannan aforesaid, and thence continuing in a north-westerly direction along the middle of the same road as far as the middle of the bridge called Pont Deunant, which crosses the stream called Afon Deunant, and thence extending southwards along the middle of the course of the said stream as far as the junction of the stream called Afon Uchaf, and thence continuing in a south-easterly direction up the middle of the course of the said last-mentioned stream until it again meets the aforesaid boundary between the parishes of Henllan and Llansannar.
