His Morning arrived here a Felucca, with Letters from Captain-General Moroffui, wherein he gives the Senate an account of the taking of Napoli di Romania, which was furrendred the 29th of the last Month, after the deseat of the Serasquier, who the day before, having drawn all the Forces he could together, attempted to relieve it, but was entirely routed with the loss of 4000 Men killed upon the place, and in the Pursuit; the Unctians lost about 400, among which was the Nephew of General Caning mark, and several Officers. The Garifon capitulated to be transported to Egypt, but left the Jews that were in the Town to the fury of the Venerian Soldiers, who, having been the occasion that the Belieged held out much longer than they would otherwise have done, put, it's said, 3000 of them to the Sword. From the Polish Comp near Jasti in Moldavia, suggest 18. The Army after having marched several days through a very Desert Country, encamped the oth Infant near the ruines of Stefanou, 17; a City hererefore very famous, which has now nothing left but the name of what it was in former time. Here it was, that the Hospodar of Moldapia sent Deputies to the King to excuse his retiring from Hass, and his not joyning his Forces with those of his Majesty, seeing he could not now openly declare stimself without exposing his Children, whom he had been forced to give as Hostages to the Turky, to certain destruction; The King answered, That the Hospodar could never meet with a truck favourable conjuncture to only of the Otto. more favourable conjuncture to cast off the Ottoman Yoke, he being come in Person to free him from it; That he expected the performance of his repeated promises, and that if he did not now manifest the fincerity of them, he would treat him as his declared Enemy. The 11th we decamped, and continued our march towards faffi, passing near Czecora the King viewed that Place, which was formerly very well fortified, but is now to inconsiderable that his Majesty thought not fit to put any Garison into it. The 13th we encamped near this City, which not only the Hospodar, but likewise all the Garison and principal Inhabitants had abandoned upon our approach: Those that remained open-'ad their Gates to the Troops his Majesty sent thither, and furnished us with some Provisions; The same day one of our detachements that had been fent out, thefeated a Party of Tartars, of whom 80 were killed, and 18 taken prisoners; These reported, that the Serasquier had passed the Danube near Axiopohis with 15 or 16000 Men, that he expected 6000 more, and intended of foon as this reinforcement was come up to him, to march towards Befferaber

to joyn the Tartars commanded by Sultan Maradin. To Morrow it's believed we sh. !! decamp again, and having passed the Pruth, continue our march towards Besterabia and Bialagrod.

Lemberg, Septems. 8. The Army of the Crown

was encamped the 23 of the last Month at a place called Prade, near the River Pruth.
