WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect with

"certain modifications the fourth report of the "Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and "revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical duties and revenues,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for augmenting the income of the Archdeaconry of Lewes, in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted that so soon as conveniently might be, and by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), any archdeaconry might, subject to the consent of the bishop be endowed by the annexation either of an entire canonry, or of a canonry charged with the payment of such portion of its income as should be determined on towards providing for another archdeacon in the same diocese, or with such lastmentioned portion of the income of a canonry, or by augmentation out of the common fund in the same Act mentioned, but not so as in that case to raise the average annual income thereof to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds, and that no canonry should be so charged with a payment of a portion of the income thereof to any archdeacon, unless the average annual income of such canonry, after payment of such portion as aforesaid, should amount to or exceed five hundred pounds, with a proviso that no archdeacon should be entitled to hold any endowment or augmentation or other emolument as such archdeacon under the provisions of the same Act, unless resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry should be situate, but subject to the same provisions as to licenses for non-residence which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices by the Act relating to pluralities and the residence of the clergy in the same Act mentioned:

"And whereas, it has been made to appear to us, that the average net annual income of the said Archdeaconry of Lewes does not exceed the sum

of forty-seven pounds.

"We, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose that, until the occurrence of the vacancy of a canonry in the cathedral church of Chichester, which shall happen next after the canonries in the said church shall have become subject to the provisions of the twenty-fifth section of the said Act, there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said Act mentioned, to the Archdeacon of Lewes for the time being (provided that he shall duly reside in accordance with the provisions of the same Act or shall have obtained license of nonresidence), the annual sum of one hundred and fifty-three pounds on the first day of January in every year, and that a proportionate part of the first such payment shall be made on the first day of January next, and that every such payment shall be made only on production to us of a certificate from the bishop, that the archdeacon claiming the same has duly resided within the diocese of Chichester, according to the provisions of the said recited Act, or has been legally exempt from such residence.

"And we further recommend and propose, that if a vacancy in the said archdeaconry shall occur on any other day than the first day of January, the grant hereby recommended to be made payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the archdeacon, making the vacancy or his representatives, and the archdeacon succeeding to the said archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act 'to carry into effect, with certain modifications, 'the Fourth Report of the Commissioners of 'Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend 'two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical 'Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the parish of Ulceby, in the county and diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas it was by the first recited Act enacted, that arrangements might be made by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), for the apportionment of the income of two benefices belonging to the same patron between the incum-

bents or ministers of such benefices, or the churches or chapels connected therewith, provided that no such arrangement should be made with respect to benefices in lay patronage without the consents of the respective patrons, nor in any case so as to prejudice the interests of any existing incumbent, nor without the consent of the bishop of the diocese.

"And whereas it was by the secondly recited Act declared and enacted, that all the provisions relating to the consent of patrons of benefices contained in the Act passed in the second year of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to abridge 'the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy, should be construed to apply to the consent of patrons under the provisions of the herein first recited Act, as fully and effectually as if the same had been therein repeated and enacted respecting the patrons of benefices affected by such Act, that is to say, that in any case in which the consent of the patron of any benefice should be required to the exercise of any power given by the same Act, and the patronage of such benefice should be in the Crown, and the yearly value thereof should not exceed twenty pounds in the Queen's books, the consent of the Crown to the exercise of such power should be testified by the execution of the instrument by which such power should be exercised by the Lord High Chancellor, Lord Keeper, or Lords Commissioners of the Great Seal, for the time being.

"And whereas your Majesty is patron in right of the Crown of the rectory or benefice of Croxton, in the county and diocese of Lincoln, and also of the vicarage or benefice of Ulceby aforesaid, and neither of the said benefices exceeds the yearly value of twenty pounds in the Queen's books, and whereas the present endowment of the said vicarage is very inadequate to the requirements of the parish, and it has been proposed to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the following arrangement should be made for apportioning the income of the said rectory between the rector thereof and the vicar of the said vicarage.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable Robert Monsey, Baron Cranworth, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as patron in right of the Crown, and of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lincoln, in testimony whereof the said Robert Monsey, Baron Cranworth, and John, Bishop of Lincoln, have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the next avoidance of the said rectory of Croxton there shall be paid by the next succeeding rector thereof and his successors, out of the revenues of the said rectory to the vicar of the said vicarage of Ulceby for the time being, the annual sum or stipend of one hundred and seventy pounds, clear of all deductions except income or property tax, and that such sum shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments, on the twenty-fourth day of June and the twenty-fifth day of December in each and every year; and we also recommend and propose, that such annual sum and each and every instalment thereof be and be hereby deemed to be charged upon all the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments whatsoever and wheresoever to the said rectory belonging, and that the vicar for the time being of the said vicarage who shall be entitled thereto shall have all legal remedies for recovering and enforcing payment of the same.

"And we further recommend and propose, that if a vacancy in the said vicarage shall happen on any other day than the twenty-fourth day of June or the twenty-fifth day of December the annual seed oil.

sum or stipend hereby recommended to be made payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the vicar making the vacancy or his representatives and the vicar succeeding to the said vicarage.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Lincoln.
