7 HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners VV for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect "the reports of the Commissioners appointed "to consider the state of the Established "Church in England and Wales, with refer-"ence to Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues, "so far as they relate to Episcopal Dioceses, "Revenues, and Patronage," of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain " modifications, the fourth report of the Commis-"sioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain "and amend two several Acts relating to the "Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for carrying into effect 'the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues, so far as they relate to Episcopal Dioceses, Revenues, and Patronage,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Com-

missioners for England, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the Bishop of Durham for certain estates

belonging to his see.

"Whereas it was by the secondly and thirdly recited Acts enacted, that, by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the same Acts, or of the said first recited Act, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any bishop, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to the see of such bishop, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward, Bishop of Durham, is seised, in right of his see, of the manor or lordship, lands, and hereditaments, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, subject to the several leases in such schedule mentioned.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce to the improvement of the said fund, that the said manor, or lordship, lands, and hereditaments, should be transferred from the said see of Durham to us, and that an annual money payment to the said Edward, Bishop of Durham, and his successors, should forthwith be substituted for the same.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Edward, Bishop of Durham, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his corporate seal, that from and after the day of the due publication in the London Gazette, of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the manor or lordship, lands, and hereditaments, so described or referred to in the said schedule hereunto annexed (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), and all the estate, right, title, and interest therein and thereto of the said Edward, Bishop of Durham, and of his successors, Bishops of Durham, and of his successors, Bishops of Durham, and shall be absolutely vested in us (subject to any legally subsisting leases or grants thereof), as from the first day of August now last past, for the purposes of the said Acts.

"And we further recommend and propose, that in consideration of and for such conveyance and transfer, and in substitution for the said manor or lordship, lands, and hereditaments, there shall be paid by us to the said Edward, Bishop of Durham, and his successors. Bishops of Durham, the annual sum of one thousand and fifty-eight pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of February, and the first day of August in every year, and that the first of such payments shall be deemed to have accrued due on the first day of February now last past.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity

with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The SCHEDULE to which the above written Scheme has reference.

"All that the manor or lordship, town, and borough of Gateside, otherwise Gateshead, with the appurtenances, in the said county of Durham; and also all manner of houses, edifices, buildings, barns, stables, orchards, gardens, woods, underwoods, mills, mines, quarries, moors, marshes, waste grounds, waters, fishings, watercourses, borough courts, profits and perquisites of courts, commons, furze, heaths, grounds, copyhold lands, and lands demised and demisable by copy of court roll, and all the rents fines and services of the copyholders and copyhold lands, and also of the freeholders and freehold lands, tenements, rents, and services, which were holden by the said bishop and belonging to him within the said manor, town, borough, and lordship aforesaid, or in any of them: and also all goods, chattels of felons and fugitives, felons of themselves, goods of persons outlawed and put in exigent, goods, waifs, strays, deodands, and forfeitures which should happen, chance, or fall within the said manor, lordship, town, and place aforesaid, or in any of them; and also all fines, issues, and amerciaments from time to time taxed, estreated, set or assessed of or upon any person or persons, for or by reason of, touching or concerning, any offence or offences whatsoever which should thereafter be had, committed, suffered, or don; within the said manor, town, lordship, and place aforesaid; and all the mines of coal, as well opened as not opened, or then already found or thereafter to be sought for and found; and also all rents or sums of money whatsoever, theretofore reserved or agreed to be paid to the said bishop or his predecessors, for wayleave in or upon the said premises, or any part thereof; and all easements, profits, ways, wayleaves, right, pre-rogative, privilege, and liberty whatsoever of wayleave over and along the premises or any part thereof, or so claimed or enjoyed commodities, advantages, and hereditaments whatsoever of the said bishop, of what nature, kind, or quality soever, the same be situate, lying, and being, or which thereto-fore had been used and had or enjoyed within the a ud manor, lordship, town, borough, fields, hamlets, precincts, or circuits of Gateside, otherwise Gateshead aforesaid, or any of them; all which said hereditaments, and the appurtenances thereto belonging are or reputed to be (with certain exceptions) now in the tenure or occupation of Cuthbert Ellison, Adam Washington, and James Bulleine, Richard Carnaby Forster and Robert Wheatley, their respective executors, administrators, assigns, or undertenants, or of some or one of them, by virtue of four several indentures of lease, dated respec-tively the nineteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and the ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fiftyfour, granted by the said bishop to the said Cuth-bert Ellison, to the said Adam Washington and James Pulleine, to the said Richard Carnaby Forster, and to the said Robert Wheatley respectively, and their several executors, administrators, and assigns, for terms of twenty-one years each."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property hereinafter described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing duly executed according to law; with a certain proviso respecting the applica-tion of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer; or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes; tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein; and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed; except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

And whereas, all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, formerly belonging to the said prebend of Langtoft (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) became vested in us on the vacancy of the said prebend, which occurred in the month of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred ond forty one, by the decease of the Honourable and Reverend Archibald Hamilton Catheart, the then prebendary, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof. "And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments, heretofore belonging to the said prebend, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns; or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable:

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner

as shall appear to us to be advisable:

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Adlingfleet, in the West Riding of the county of York, and in the diocese of York, and out of the parishes of Crowle and Luddington, in the county and diocese of Lincoln:

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it should be made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it should be lawful by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel, in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it was by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district should be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, might have an opportunity of offering, or making to us or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme should not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy should have been so delivered or

patrons, should in the mean time, consent to the same; and it was by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we should recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, should be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same should be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district should have become a new parish as thereinafter provided;

"And whereas it was by the said Act further enacted, that it should be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any Ecclesastical Corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person, or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as should be approved by the like authority:

And whereas it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular parts of the said parishes of Adlingfleet, Crowle, and Luddington, hereinafter mentioned and described, such parts not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner

hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas an annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds has been permanently secured to us by Dame Mary Strickland, of Wassand, in the county of York, and Henry Strickland, of Wassand aforesaid, Esquire, by means of a rent-charge issuing out of certain lands and hereditaments situate and being in the township of Eastoft, in the said parish of Adlingfleet, upon trust, to be applied towards the permanent endowment of the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the said Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, of the perpetual curate thereof; and the said Dame Mary Strickland hath also provided a church which is intended to be offered for approval by us, and for consecration, as the church of the said district and new parish, and for the use and service of the minister or perpetual curate, and the inhabitants thereof:

" And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that, in consideration of the benefactions aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of, and nomination of the minister or perpetual curate to, the said district or new parish should be assigned in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed:

" Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Thomas, Archbishop of York, and of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Crowle, and also all that part of the said parish of Luddington described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Bartholomew, Eastoft,' and shall be included in and form part of the deanery of the city of York and Ainsty, and of the archdeaconry and diocese of York.

And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the said Act, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, to the perpetual curate thereof, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister or of such perpetual curate as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such district or new parish in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish herein recommended to be constituted, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereto, shall be assigned to and absolutely vested in, and shall and may, from time to time, be exercised by, the said Dame Mary Strickland during her lifetime, and after her decease by the said Henry Strickland, his heirs and assigns for

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The above Beacon is situated in the following landmarks and bearings:—

The church of Haamstede on the east slope of the long white sand-hill, a little to the west of the level.

The steeple of Goedereede on the most westerly summit of the sand-hill, to the east of the five boulders of the westhoofd (Westhead).

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the stamp "duties on newspapers, and to provide for the "transmission by post of printed periodical pub-"lications," it was enacted, amongst other things, that it should be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, to allow any printed newspaper (British, colonial, or foreign) to be transmitted by the post between places in the United Kingdom and Her Majesty's colonies, or foreign countries, either free of postage, or subject to such rates of postage, not exceeding two pence, for each newspaper, as the Commissioners of the Treasury, or the Postmaster-

General, with their consent, should from time to time think fit.

And whereas by a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 30th day of June, 1855, it was ordered and directed that the several printed newspapers and publications therein mentioned might be transmitted by the post between any part of the several places mentioned in the schedule thereto annexed, either free or at the rates of postage in the now reciting Warrant expressed and contained.

And whereas it is expedient that the newspapers hereinafter mentioned should be transmitted

by the post, free of postage.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power reserved to us in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and consent that British newspapers shall and may be transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom to Prussia, Hamburgh, Bremen, Lubeck, or Oldenburgh (the sea conveyance between the United Kingdom and such countries being direct by private ship) free of postage, any thing in the said recited Warrant of the 30th day of June, 1855, contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

And we do further order and direct that the British newspapers hereinbefore mentioned shall be transmitted by the post under this Warrant in conformity with and under and subject to the several orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions under which British newspapers, posted in the United Kingdom, are now or may hereafter be transmitted by the post to places beyond

the seas.

And we further order and direct, that the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter, alter or revoke any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other regulations, conditions, and restrictions in lieu thereof.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of "postage," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, and at any time after the passing of that Act, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners by the authority of the statute in

that case made and provided), order and direct that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight transmitted by the post direct by British packet-boat between any ports in the British colonies, or between any ports in the British colonies and any foreign port (not in any such cases passing through the United Kingdom) there shall be charged and taken (in lieu of the rates heretofore chargeable for the sea conveyance of such letters) a packet postage of four pence.

And we direct that on every letter, transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as

follows (that is to say):

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six

rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight, above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

And we further direct, that the rates of postage chargeable on such letters as aforesaid, for the sea conveyance thereof, shall be charged in addition to any inland colonial rates that may be payable

hereon.
