WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Gedney, in the county and diocese of Lincoln:

"Whereas it is by the said first-recited Act enacted, that, except as therein otherwise specified, all the monies and revenues to be paid to us, and all the rents and profits of the lands, tithes, and other hereditaments vested and to be vested in us by and under the authority of the same Act, together with all accumulations of interest produced by and arising therefrom, shall be from time to time carried over by us to a common fund, and by payments or investments made out of such fund, or if in any case it be deemed more expedient, by means of an actual conveyance and assignment of such lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of a portion thereof, additional provision

shall be made by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by Orders your Majesty in Council, ratifying schemes prepared by us), for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required, in such manner as shall, by the like authority, be deemed most conducive to the efficiency of the Established Church; provided always, that in making any such additional provision out of any tithes, or any lands or other hereditaments allotted or assigned in lieu of tithes, so vested or to be vested in us, or out of the rents and profits thereof, due consideration shall be had of the wants and circumstances of the places in which such tithes now arise or have arisen.

"And whereas all the estates and endowments formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of the said parish of Gedney have by the recent avoidance of such sinecure rectory become transferred to and vested in us, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act: And whereas such estates and endowments comprise, inter alia, certain tithes, or rentcharges allotted in lieu of tithes, arising within the said parish, and now held by us in possession:

"And whereas it is by the said secondly-recited Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel, in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part

thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering, or making to us or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons, shall in the mean time, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as hereinafter provided;

And whereas the said parish of Gedney is of great extent and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portion of such parish hereinafter-mentioned and described, such portion not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Gedney described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly, and that the same shall be named "The District of Drove End."

And we further recommend and propose, that the minister for the time being of the district so herein recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the secondly-recited Act, shall be permanently endowed in the manner following; that is to say, there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund in the said first-recited Act mentioned, in each and every year, to such minister the sum of one hundred pounds; and, upon any building, within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the provisions of the secondly-recited Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one

hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that, instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the district or new parish hereinbefore recommended to be constituted, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or rentcharge allotted in lieu of tithe, or other hereditament, should be conveyed in fee to the minister or perpetual curate for the time being of the said district or new parish, to form the endowment thereof or part of the endowment, as the case may be, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

" SCHEDULE.

"The district of DROVE END, being,

"All that portion of the parish of Gedney in the county and diocese of Lincoln situate to the eastward and northward of an imaginary line commencing at a point (marked A on the map or plan hereunto annexed) in the middle of the high road called or known as the Lutton-road, where such road crosses the boundary line dividing the said parish from the parish of Lutton, and thence extending northward along the middle of the said road to the middle of the high road called or known as the Drove End-road, and thence extending westward along the middle of the last-named road as far as a point (marked B on the said map or plan) opposite to the hedge or fence forming the southern boundary of the field or inclosure numbered 353 on the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Gedney, and thence continuing along the middle of the said hedge or fence until it meets the western boundary of the parish of Gedney."

And whereas due notice of the said scheme has been given, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, to the incumbent and to the patron of the said parish of Gedney, and certain observations and objections offered by the incumbent of the said parish have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council, notwithstanding such observations and objections: now, therefore, Her

Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," as enlarged or extended by the nineteenth and twentieth sections of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Church Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Herstmonceux, Warbleton, Wartling, and Dallington, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Bodle-street Green, in the said parish of Herstmonceux, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' as enlarged or extended by the nineteenth and twentieth sections of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Bodle-street Green,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"Commencing at the point where the boundary of the parishes of Warbleton and Dallington meet immediately adjacent to Groveley Farm, then following the said boundary line of the said parishes of Warbleton and Dallington easterly as far as Hovers Farm, then turning southerly past Pear Tree Farm, until the boundary of Warbleton parish approaches Prinkle and enters Wartling, and proceeding south-easterly along the north fence of the field marked A on the plan hereto annexed, and including within the said con-

solidated chapelry the house and offices of Prinkle, then crossing the lane westerly to the eastern fence of the field marked B as aforesaid, then proceeding southerly and westerly along the east and south fences of that field until it meets the boundary of the parish of Herstmonceux, then following the boundary of such last-named parish southerly until it reaches Five Bells River, and following the course of that river, first turning northerly and then westerly, until it reaches the road near Chilshams, then turning south-westerly along the road (passing Chilshams) until it meets the boundary line of a detached portion of the parish of Wartling, then following that boundary line south-westerly, passing through Stunts Green and across Featherbed-lane, continuing along such boundary line in a northerly direction towards Crall Farm, then returning easterly and returning southerly and south-easterly towards Studdings, and again turning northerly until it meets the boundary of the parish of Dallington to Ker River, then following the boundary of the parish of Dallington northerly until it approaches Batsford, where it turns into the parish of Warbleton, and follows the western fence of the field marked D as aforesaid (so as to include the farmhouse and offices of Batsford within the said consolidated chapelry), then turning easterly along the lane until it reaches the road, where it turns northerly and follows such road until it approaches Iwood, where it leaves the road and takes the western fence of the field marked E as aforesaid (so as to include the farmhouse and offices of Iwood within the said consolidated chapelry), it then again enters the road northerly until it reaches the cross roads where, turning easterly for a few yards, it proceeds northerly along the western fences of the field marked F as aforesaid, then easterly along the northern fence of the same field, then northerly along the western fence of the field marked G as aforesaid, then easterly along the northern fence of the same field, and following the northern fences of the fields marked H and I as aforesaid until they reach the river, then following the course of the river northerly until it emerges from the wood marked K as aforesaid, where it turns north-easterly along the north-western fences of the fields marked L and M as aforesaid, and passing round the house and offices of Grovely meets the boundary of the two parishes of Warbleton and Dallington at the point where the boundary line of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Bodle-street Green, commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue, green, pink, and yellow.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend Ashurst Turner, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, of John Jones, of Ruckley Grange, in the county of Salop, Esquire, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Herstmonceux, of the Reverend George Edward Haviland, of Warbleton aforesaid, Clerk, patron (in his own right) of the parish church of the said parish of Warbleton, and of the Reverend Thomas Nattle Grigg, of Wartling aforesaid, Clerk, patron (in his own right) of the parish church of the said parish of Wartling (being a majority of the patrons of the said respective parishes of Herstmonceux, Warbleton, Wartling, and Dallington), have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Bodle-street Green, as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it has been mutually agreed between the said John Jones, George Edward Haviland, and Thomas Nattle Grigg, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, at Bodle-street Green aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said parish church of Warbleton, for the first two turns or rights of presentation and appointment as aforesaid which may happen, that the next or third turn or right of presentation and appointment as aforesaid which may so happen should belong to, be vested in, and be exercised by, the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said parish church of Herstmonceux, and that all subsequent turns or rights of presentation and appointment as aforesaid which may so happen should belong to, be vested in, and be exercised by, the rectors or incumbents for the time being of the said parish churches of Warbleton and Herstmonceux alternately, the said rector or incumbent for the time being of the said parish church of Warbleton having and enjoying two successive turns or rights of presentation and appointment as aforesaid for every single turn by the said rector or incumbent for the time being of the said parish church of Herstmonceux.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of St. John the Evangelist, at Bodle-street Green, in the parish of Herstmonceux, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation, in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the right of presentation and appointment to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the rector or incumbent for the time being of the parish church of Warbleton for the first two turns or rights of presentation and appointment as aforesaid which may happen, that the next or third turn or right of presentation as aforesaid which may so happen shall belong to, and be exercised by, the rector or incumbent for the time being of the parish church of Herstmonceux, and that all subsequent turns or rights of presentation and appointment as aforesaid shall belong to, and be exercised by, the rectors or incumbents of the said parish churches of Warbleton and Herstmonceux alternately, the said rector or incumbent for the time being of the said parish church of Warbleton having and enjoying two successive turns or rights of presentation and appointment as aforesaid for every single turn by the said rector or incumbent for the time being of the parish church of Herst-

monceux, the said rectors or incumbents being the persons mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the sixteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Mary, in the city and county of Chester, and in the diocese of Chester, and of the parish of Hawarden, in the county of Flint, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said two parishes and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of the Holy Epiphany, at Lache, in the said parish of Saint Mary Chester, under the power for such purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Lache-cum-Saltney,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary commences at a point in the centre of the stream of the River Dee, where the parishes of Saint Mary-on-the-Hill and Hawarden meet, and thence proceeds in an easterly direction to the southern bank of the said river, at the north-western corner of a field marked No. 8 in the Tithe Commutation Map of Saint Mary's parish, where a ditch falls into the river dividing the said field from a field marked No. 31 on the same map, thence following the western fence of field No. 8 in a south-easterly direction till it abuts upon another field No. 25, the hedge of which field it follows westerly along a steep brow to the western corner of the last-named field No. 25, adjoining 'Red-hill,' and thence along the south-western fence of the same field No. 25, till it reaches the point where Hough-green and Red-hill meet, from which point it crosses in a straight line southerly the Brick Kiln ground on Hough-green across the Chester and Mold Turnpike-road direct to the eastern corner of a field marked No. 43 in the said tithe-map, and proceeds along the south-eastern fence thereof, and also of field No. 42, in a south-westerly direction, until it reaches the eastern fence of field No. 41, which last-mentioned fence it follows, and also the eastern fence of field No. 67, and crossing the Lache-road or lane in the same direction, proceeds along the eastern fence of another field No. 100, and also of

No. 99, and then along the southern fence of the said field No. 99, until it reaches and follows the eastern fence of field No. 14, and then along the southern fence of No. 14 to the eastern fence of field No. 18, and along that fence southerly, until it abuts on field No. 17, which last-mentioned field it crosses in a southerly direction to the point where a little runlet passes under the Chester and Wrexham Turnpike-road, which runlet it follows along the eastern fence of field No. 18, to its south-eastern angle, where the boundary of the parish of Saint Mary-on-the-Hill meets the boundary of Eccleston Parish, thence following the boundary of the parish of Saint Mary-on-the-Hill and the parish of Eccleston in a south-westerly direction, until they meet the parish of Dodleston, then in a northerly direction along the boundary line of the said parishes of Saint Mary-on-the-Hill and Dodleston, until it reaches the north-western angle of the meadows, called 'Lache Eyes,' at a point called 'Mitchell's Nooke,' No. 19 on the said tithe-map where it turns easterly, still following the boundary of the same parish of Saint Mary-on-the-Hill, till it comes to a brook at the north-eastern corner of field No. 94, along the middle of which brook the boundary line of the said consolidated chapelry proceeds (at the western side of fields Nos. 441, 445 and 457, in Hawarden Parish), north-easterly to the point where a lane, called Sandy-lane, joins the Chester and Mold Turnpike-road, and thence along the middle of the same brook, passing under the said turnpike-road, by a bridge called Stone Bridge, until such brook reaches a flood gate of eight sluices, from the centre of which flood gate the boundary proceeds to the middle of the River Dee, along the middle of which said river it proceeds in an easterly direction, until it again reaches the point where the boundary line of the said consolidated chapelry of Lache-cum-Saltney commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue and pink.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, of the Most Honourable Richard, Marquis of Westminster, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Saint Mary, Chester, and of Sir Stephen Richard Glynné, of Hawarden Castle, in the county of Flint, Baronet, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Hawarden have been obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Lache-cum-Saltney, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Richard, Marquis of Westminster, and Sir Stephen Richard Glynné, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said John, Bishop of Chester, and Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church of the Holy Epiphany, at Lache aforesaid should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the Bishop of the said diocese of Chester for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal

consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned, for the consecrated church of the Holy Epiphany, at Lache, in the parish of Saint Mary, Chester (to be called "the Consolidated Chapelry of Lache-cum-Saltney), be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the bishop of the diocese of Chester for the time being, he being the person mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the dioceses of Chester and Saint Asaph respectively.
