RIPON.—Wholly in *Ripon Cathedral*, and also in the *churchyard*, except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in powdered charcoal, and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and also except in that part which lies eastward of the cathedral, in which part the regulations for new burial-grounds shall be observed. And whereas certain Orders in Council have been issued for the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned; and it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said Orders should be varied;

And whereas by an Order in Council of the eleventh August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the undermentioned burial-grounds in STOCKPORT, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said Order be varied in respect of such burial grounds as follows, viz.:—

That interment be discontinued in the churchyard of *St. Mary the Virgin Stockport*, except in now existing family vaults and graves, in which each coffin shall be covered with powdered charcoal four inches thick, and that interment be wholly discontinued in the said churchyard from and after the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

That interment be discontinued in the burial-ground attached to the *Hanover Chapel, Heaton Norris, Stockport*, except in now existing vaults in which each coffin shall be embedded in powdered charcoal and separately entombed with cement in an air-tight manner, and in existing family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of remains, and in graves which have never been previously opened;

That interment be discontinued in the *Wesleyan Chapel Burial-ground, Edgeley, Stockport*, except in now existing family vaults, in which each coffin shall be imbedded in powdered charcoal and separately entombed with cement in an air-tight manner, and in existing family graves which can be made five feet deep without the exposure of remains, and in graves never previously opened, in which one body only shall be interred;

And whereas by an Order in Council of the eleventh of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the *Friends' Burial-ground, Wigton*, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said Order be varied as follows, viz.: that interment in the *Friends' Burial-ground, Wigton*, be discontinued, except in the part north of the meeting house, in graves which have never been previously opened.
