**L**ORD PANMURE has received from the Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief, the Report and its Enclosure, of which the following are copies, addressed by Major-General Dacres, commanding the Royal Artillery in the Crimea, to General Simpson.

SIR,

*Camp before Sevastopol,  
14th September, 1855.*

WITH the successful close of the siege of Sebastopol, it becomes my duty to bring before you the share borne by the Royal Artillery in operations protracted to an unparalleled extent amidst extreme difficulty and hardship.

Notwithstanding the great and frequent obstacles to maintaining a constant supply of ammunition in the batteries, with roads almost impassable, for weeks together, and with a very precarious and insufficient transport, there has been no instance in which the Commander-in-Chief has required the Artillery to act where they have been found unprepared, and at the close of each bombardment they have always possessed the means of continuing the fire.

The officers and men of the Siege Train have shown unflinching zeal and cheerfulness in their arduous duties of arming the batteries, frequently under circumstances of great difficulty, and of directing and serving the guns. The ruined state of the enemy's works, and the silencing of their guns, have frequently testified to the excellence of our artillery practice, of which the number of dismounted ordnance found in the captured works opposed to us affords another convincing proof. Our fire has on several occasions rendered important assistance to our Allies, which their Chiefs have always warmly acknowledged. The state of the parapet of the Redan, which presents throughout one battered and ruined slope, from the interior crest to the foot of the counterscarp, is a remarkable instance of the effect of a well-directed fire against strong earth-works.

I have had frequently to lament the loss of valuable officers, among whom I wish to particularize the late Captain Oldfield, who was most zealous and indefatigable in his services in the left attack.

The great duration of the siege operations, and the number of officers who have come under my notice, forbid me to specify all whom I could wish; and besides the names of some who had served a

considerable period before Lieutenant-Colonel St. George took command of the siege train, I will only add to the enclosed report from that officer, that while some who have served through the entire period have necessarily executed their duties under circumstances of unusual hardship, all have shown the greatest zeal and ardour. The arrival of reinforcements from time to time up to the last day's fire, of course causes great disparity in the amount of service rendered by different officers and companies, and the earlier period involved much greater toil and endurance than the last few months. These circumstances I have carefully distinguished in a detailed report to the Adjutant-General of Artillery, but I wish to particularize the following officers who have served with great assiduity throughout the siege: Captains Hope, Luther, W. J. Bolton, and Owen; Lieutenants Ruck, Keene, Addison, and Tillard.

From Lieutenant-Colonel St. George, commanding the siege, and his Brigade-Major, I have received the greatest assistance in carrying out the operations of the siege.

The duties of the Artillery Staff have of course been constant, arduous, and important. From Lieutenant-Colonel Adye, Assistant Adjutant-General, I have received every assistance that zeal and energy could offer. Captain Field came out with the army in 1854, but from ill-health he was obliged to leave it, and joined me in January, 1855, since when he has performed the duties of Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, which have been very onerous, assisted by Majors Portescue and Gage, very much to my satisfaction.

To my personal Staff, Majors Hamly and Gordon, I am much indebted for the assistance they have rendered me at all times by their activity and professional knowledge.

The numerous sick and wounded of the siege Train have been attended to with a degree of skill and interest which I have never seen exceeded, and which has given me particular satisfaction. The state of comfort and order in which Surgeon Bent who superintended the Medical Department of the right attack, and Surgeon Fogo, of the left, assisted by Assistant-Surgeon Taylor (who has served in the trenches through the whole siege and whose gallantry was most conspicuous as well as his skill) have, by their judicious arrangements, kept their hospitals during the greatest pressure of casualties from the enemy's fire and epidemic cases, has frequently called for my thanks and approbation, and I beg to recommend these officers to your notice. The

whole Medical Department has been, since his promotion, under the charge of Surgeon Elliott, who previously had charge of the left attack, and his efforts at all times to provide comforts, and his attention to the sick and wounded were unremitting.

The Field Batteries have at all times rendered me important assistance in the conduct of the siege, in conveying guns and ammunition to the trenches, on many occasions under a heavy fire; and officers and gunners supplied by this portion of the force, have frequently done good service on emergencies, during the different bombardments.

I have this moment received two notes from General Officers—Windham and Straubenzie, mentioning the gallantry of Captain Williams, during the attack on the Redan, on the 8th instant, when he was acting as aide-de-camp to the latter; it was equally conspicuous on the 18th of June, when he commanded the spiking party. I have great pleasure in bringing it to your notice.

I will merely add that to the whole of the very large proportion of the corps I have the honour to command, my best thanks, frequently expressed to them before, are again due, for the good, zealous and intelligent services which, conspicuous throughout this trying period, have contributed to the great result a share that will form a most memorable page in the annals of the Royal Artillery.

*Siege Train Office, Sevastopol,  
September 12, 1855.*

SIR,

THE sixth bombardment of Sevastopol, which commenced on the 5th instant, and lasted until the 8th, having successfully terminated in the occupation of the place by the Allies, it becomes my duty, at the close of this long and arduous siege, to lay before you the names of a few of the many who have distinguished themselves, during the time I have had the honour to command the Siege Train of this army.

From Captain Campbell, commanding the Artillery of the right attack, who has served in the batteries through five bombardments, and exercised his present command in three of them, I have always received the greatest assistance; and the admirable arrangements and indefatigable exertions of Lieutenant-Colonel Barker, C.B., commanding the left attack, entitle him to the highest commendation. He has represented to me the able and zealous aid he has received throughout from his Adjutant, Captain N. O. S. Turner.

Among those, whose gallant conduct has been perhaps most conspicuous, I beg leave to mention the names of Major Strange (who has served in the siege from the opening of the trenches to the last hour of the attack), of Captain Arbuthnot (who has been twice severely wounded), of Captain Philip Dickson (who has served throughout the siege), of Captains Broughton, Hastings, Clifford, and Williams; and of Lieutenants Ward, Rideout, and C. O. Brown; all of whom have displayed a coolness and a zeal which cannot be overlooked.

In a siege of so long duration, where every officer in his turn had frequent opportunities of distinguishing himself, which were never neglected, it is almost impossible to point out the most deserving.

I cannot speak too highly in praise of Captain Reilly, my Brigade-Major. Until the termination of the siege he continued the only Staff Officer of this large and responsible command; and his able performance of his various and difficult duties has already, I know, received from you the warm approval it deserved.

I had the pleasure, on the 22nd of August, of representing the gallant conduct of Captains Fitzroy, Hawkins, and W. J. Bolton, on a former occasion; on which representation the Commander of the Forces made a minute that these officers should not be forgotten. I deeply regret to add that one of them, Captain Fitzroy, was mortally wounded in the batteries on the 8th instant, and died yesterday.

Captain G. Davis, with 20 men, volunteered to accompany the storming party, on the 8th instant, with spikes; but, as the infantry did not enter the Redan en mass, his services were not required. He remained at the head of the advanced sap, where 5 of his party were wounded.

I have to thank Major Alexander, Royal Marine Artillery, who with his detachment joined the siege train in June, for his zealous assistance in the duties of the siege.

I have much pleasure in calling your notice to the untiring zeal and energy of Deputy Assistant-Commissaries Hayter and Yellon, in conducting the onerous duties of their branch of the service. The former officer, who was a most valuable public servant, was, I grieve to say, killed in the batteries on the 8th instant.

The Medical Department of the Siege-train, under the able and careful supervision of Surgeon Bent at the right attack, and Surgeon Fogo at the left, assisted by their juniors, of whom I would especially mention Assistant-Surgeon Taylor, has been such as to give me the greatest satisfaction. The air of comfort in their hospitals, and the happy appearance of their patients, are sufficient proof of their admirable arrangements and unceasing attention.

In conclusion, I have the greatest satisfaction in representing the manner in which every officer, non-commissioned officer and gunner under my command, have made themselves remarkable during the siege, for bravery, discipline, and endurance. The state of the enemies' works and the ruin of the city, show the precision and the vigour with which the fire was maintained by them; the effect of which has undoubtedly been to compel the evacuation by the enemy of a place no longer tenable.

THE Lords of the Council, having taken into consideration the expediency of extending the prohibition to export from the United Kingdom, certain articles used in the manufacture of

military and naval stores, in pursuance of Her Majesty's proclamation of the 18th February, 1854, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the officers of Her Majesty's Customs do prevent the exportation of saltpetre, nitrate of soda, sulphate of potash, muriate of potash (chloride of potassium), and chlorate of potash, to all foreign countries; and that the officers of Her Majesty's Customs do permit the articles herein mentioned to be carried coastwise to any port in the United Kingdom, or to be exported to any of Her Majesty's colonies, plantations, or possessions abroad, or to the territories of the East India Company, upon taking from the persons exporting the same a bond, that the said articles shall be landed and entered for use and consumption within such of Her Majesty's dominions, or within the territories of the East India Company.

Whereof the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and officers of Her Majesty's Customs, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to direct that the powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said Act, with respect to matters in the said Court of Record, shall and may be exercised by the Recorder of the said Court for the time being, and in his absence by the Registrar of the said Court for the time being, and by their respective deputies.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at San Domingo, transmitting copies of the laws on maritime commerce, and of the new tariff.

By the first of these the tonnage duty of 50 cents, Spanish (2s. 1d.), per ton, formerly levied on national vessels, or vessels belonging to a country having a treaty of reciprocity with the Dominican Republic, is raised to 1 Spanish dollar (4s. 2d.) per ton. Vessels belonging to a nation not in treaty with the Dominican Republic paying 1 dollar 50 cents (6s. 3d.), per ton.

The coasting trade is reserved to national vessels. Foreign vessels are, however, permitted to load on the coast, on payment of the same charge (2s. 1d. per ton) hitherto made.

The anchorage rates have been altered from £1 5s. per vessel to 3d. per ton. The same alteration has taken place in the pilotage charges.

The entry charge, which was formerly 16s. 8d. per vessel for all vessels of over 20 tons burden, is altered by the existing law to 3d. per ton.

The charge for stage has been altered to 8s. 4d. per day, in lieu of 16s. 8d. previously charged, for the whole time occupied in unloading the cargo. This charge is, however, only made in the event of the accommodation being required.

The wharfage duty, formerly levied at  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on the total duties payable by the vessel, has been raised to 1 per cent., rated in the same manner.

The interpreter's charge of 8s. 4d. per vessel, has been altered by the new law to 16s. 8d. for vessels of above 100 tons burden, vessels of less burden paying the same amount as formerly. Each vessel also will have to pay 8s. 4d. towards the maintenance of the telegraph. The Health Officer's fee remains unaltered.

Watering, formerly charged at the rate of 2d. per cask, has been raised to 4s. 2d. per cask.

All vessels of less than 20 tons burden, coming from abroad, are subject only to the tonnage duty, wharfage duty, and the duty for coast loading.

By the new tariff, the ad valorem duties payable on articles having a fixed value have been raised on the average 40 per cent.

The export duties although nominally the same as previously to the promulgation of the present tariff have virtually been raised  $12\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. in consequence of the deterioration of the Dominican paper currency, which is now reckoned at 62 $\frac{1}{2}$

pesos to the Spanish dollar, in lieu of the former rate of 50 pesos, its value being thus diminished  $12\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., and the new tariff having established that such duties as are desired to be paid in paper must be settled at the market-rate of this currency.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE Minister of Marine hereby gives notice, that, at the mouth of the Maese, an anchor-buoy shaped beacon, painted with horizontal red and white borders, has been placed in the following landmarks and bearings:

The steeple of Brielle and Oostvoorne in one line; the steeple of Goedereede a handspike's length to the east of the large wood; and in bearings—the steeple of Brielle S.E.  $\frac{1}{3}$  E., and the steeple of Goedereede S.S.W., by unadjusted compass, in a depth of 57 palms, or 3 fathoms' water, at ordinary low water.

The object of this beacon, which greatly differs from the other in shape and colour, is to give a true mark in entering this mouth, as also to be able to calculate the depth of water on the Maese shallows.

And we do further order and direct, that all letters transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom and the colony of Victoria (direct or through any other colony, or through any foreign country), and between the colony of Victoria and any other of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom (whether through any colony or foreign country or not), shall, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable on such respective letters, be charged and chargeable with the same single and progressive rates of postage, and be under and subject to the same orders, directions, and regulations as such respective letters were liable and subject to under or by virtue of a certain Warrant under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 21st day of June, 1854.

And we do hereby further order and direct, that this Warrant shall come into operation on the 7th day of November, 1855.
