Convention between Her Majesty and the King of Prussia, additional to the Convention concluded at Berlin, May 13, 1846, for the Establishment of International Copyright.

Signed at London, in the English and German Languages, June 14, 1855.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, August 13, 1855].

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the one part, and His Majesty the King of Prussia, as well in his own name as in that of His Majesty the King of Saxony, His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Meiningen, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Altenburg; His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, His Royal Highness the Duke of Brunswick, His Royal Highness the Duke of Anhalt-Dessau-Cöthen, His Royal Highness the Duke of Anhalt-Bernburg, His Serene Highness the Prince of Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt, His Serene Highness the Prince of Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, His Serene Highness the Prince of Reuss (elder branch), and His Serene Highness the Prince of Reuss (younger branch), on the other part, being desirous of extending the scope of the Convention which was concluded between their said Majesties at Berlin on the 13th of May, 1846, for the reciprocal protection of copyright, have resolved to conclude an Additional Convention for that purpose, and have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries; that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable George William Frederick, Earl of Clarendon, Baron Hyde of Hindon, a Peer of the United Kingdom, a Member of Her Britannic Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Her Britannic Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; and the Right Honourable Edward John, Baron Stanley of Alderley, a Peer of the United Kingdom, a Member of Her Britannic Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and President of the Committee of Privy Council for Affairs of Trade and Foreign Plantations;

And His Majesty the King of Prussia, His Privy Councillor and Chamberlain, Albert Count

of Bernstorff, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to Her Britannic Majesty, Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Red Eagle, and of the Orders for Civil Merit of the Bavarian Crown, of St. Januarius of the Two Sicilies, and of St. Stanislaus of Russia, Knight Commander of the Order of Christ of Portugal;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:

ARTICLE I.

It is agreed that all books, prints, and drawings published within the dominions of any other State that has concluded or may conclude, or which has acceded or may accede to, a Copyright Convention with Great Britain, shall, if exported from Prussia, Saxony, Saxe-Weimar, Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Altenburg, Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Brunswick, Anhalt-Dessau-Cöthen, Anhalt-Bernburg, Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt, Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, or Reuss, be considered, for the purposes of this Convention, to have been exported from the country of their publication.

ARTICLE II.

The protection granted by the Convention which was concluded between the High Contracting Parties on the 13th of May, 1846, to original works, is extended to translations; it being, however, clearly understood that the intention of the present Article is simply to protect a translator in respect of his own translation, and that it is not intended to confer upon the first translator of any work the exclusive right of translating that work, except in the case and to the extent provided for in the following Article.

ARTICLE III.

The author of any work published in either of the two countries, who may choose to reserve the right of translating it, shall, until the expiration of five years from the date of the first publication of the translation thereof authorized by him, be, in the following cases, entitled to protection from the publication in the other country of any translation of such work not so authorised by him:

§ 1. If the original work shall have been registered and deposited in the one country within three months after its first publication in the other.

§ 2. If the author has notified on the title-page of his work his intention to reserve the right of translating it.

§ 3. Provided always, that at least a part of the authorized translation shall have appeared within a year after the registration and deposit of the original, and that the whole shall have been published within three years after the date of such deposit.

§ 4. And provided that the publication of the translation shall take place within one of the two countries, and that it shall be registered and deposited in conformity with the stipulations of Article II of the Convention of the 13th of May, 1846.

With regard to works which are published in parts, it will be sufficient if the declaration of the author that he reserves the right of translation shall appear in the first part. But with reference to the period of five years, limited by this Article for the exercise of the exclusive right of translation, each part shall be treated as a separate work, and each part shall be registered and deposited in the one country within three months after its first publication in the other.

ARTICLE IV.

The stipulations of the preceding Articles shall also be applicable to the representation of dramatic works, and to the performance of musical compositions, in so far as the laws of each of the two countries are or shall be applicable in this respect to dramatic and musical works first publicly represented or performed therein.

In order, however, to entitle the author to legal protection in regard to the translation of a dramatic work, such translation must appear within three months after the registration and deposit of the original.

It is understood that the protection stipulated by the present Article is not intended to prohibit fair imitations, or adaptations of dramatic works to the stage in England and Prussia respectively, but is only meant to prevent piratical translations.

The question whether a work is an imitation or a piracy, shall in all cases be decided by the courts of justice of the respective countries, according to the laws in force in each.

ARTICLE V.

Notwithstanding the stipulations of Article I of the Convention of the 13th of May, 1846, and of Article II of the present additional Convention, Articles extracted from newspapers or periodicals published in either of the two countries, may be republished or translated in the newspapers or periodicals of the other country, provided the source from whence such articles are taken be acknowledged.

Nevertheless, this permission shall not be construed to authorize the republication or translation in one of the two countries, of articles from newspapers or periodicals published in the other country, the authors of which shall have notified in a conspicuous manner in the journal or periodical in which such articles have appeared, that they forbid the republication thereof.

This last stipulation shall not, however, apply to articles of political discussion.

ARTICLE VI.

The present additional Convention shall come into operation as soon as possible after the exchange of the ratifications thereof. Due notice shall be given beforehand in each country by the

Government of that country, of the day which may be fixed upon for its so coming into operation, and its stipulations shall apply only to works published after that day.

ARTICLE VII.

The present additional Convention shall have the same duration as the Convention of the 13th of May, 1846. It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as may be within two months from the date of signature.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the present Convention, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS a Convention, bearing date the thirteenth of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, was concluded between Her Majesty and His Majesty the King of Prussia, whereby due protection was secured within the Prussian Dominions for the authors of books, dramatic works, or musical compositions, and the inventors, designers, or engravers of prints and articles of sculpture, and the authors, inventors, designers, or engravers of any other works whatsoever of literature and the fine arts, first published in the dominions of Her Majesty, or of His said Majesty respectively, in which the laws of Great Britain and of Prussia, did then or might thereafter give their respective subjects the privilege of copyright, and by the said Convention lawful representatives or assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, or engravers, with regard to any such works first published within the dominions of Her Majesty, were to be treated on the same footing as the authors, inventors, designers, or engravers themselves.

And whereas an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, was, by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her reign, intitled "An Act to amend the law relating to "international copyright," made by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, for giving effect to the said Convention.

And whereas His Majesty the King of Saxony, His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar, their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Altenburg, and Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, His Royal Highness the Duke of Brunswick, their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Anhalt-Des au and Anhalt-Bernburg, and their Serene Highnesses the Princes of Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt and Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, Reuss-Greiz, Reuss-Lobenstein-Ebers-Dorf, and Reuss-Schleitz, subsequently acceded to the said Convention, and thereby became parties thereto.

And whereas Orders of Her Majesty in Council, dated respectively the twenty-sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, the twenty-fourth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, and the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, were, by virtue of the authority aforesaid, and by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, made for giving effect to such accessions.

And whereas, on the fourteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, a convention, additional to the said Convention of the thirteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, was concluded between Her Majesty and His Majesty the King of Prussia, as well in his own name as in that of His Majesty the King of Saxony, His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Meiningen, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Altenberg, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, His Royal Highness the Duke of Brunswick, His Royal Highness the Duke of Anhalt-Dessau-Cöthen, His Royal Highness the Duke of Anhalt-Bernburg, His Serene Highness the Prince of Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt, His Serene Highness the Prince of Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, His Serene Highness the Prince of Reuss (elder branch), and His Serene Highness the Prince of Reuss (younger branch), whereby the protection granted by the said Convention of the thirteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, to original works, is extended to translations, subject to certain stipulations therein contained.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to carry into effect a Convention with France on the subject of copyright, to explain and extend the International Copyright Acts, and to explain the Acts relating to copyright in engravings," doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that the authors of any books published, or of any dramatic pieces first publicly represented within the dominions of Prussia, Saxony, Saxe Weimar, Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Altenberg, Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Brunswick, Anhalt-Dessau-Cöthen, Anhalt-Bernburg, Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt, Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, or Reuss, at any time after the day next after the day of the publication hereof in the London Gazette, who may choose to reserve the right of translating such books or dramatic pieces, their executors, administrators, and assigns, shall, until the expiration of five years from the date of the first publication of the translations authorized by them, respectively, of such books, or from the time at which the translations authorised by them, of such dramatic pieces, are first published or publicly represented, be, subject to the provisions mentioned in the said last-mentioned Act, empowered to prevent the publication in the British dominions of any translation of such books or dramatic pieces, and the representation therein of any translation of such dramatic pieces not so respectively authorized by them.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Com-

 closing copy of a communication addressed to him

 duties on merchandize imported into Egypt from
 Darfur and the White River, and intended for
 exportation, have been reduced to three per cent.,
 payable at the place of lading. It is necessary,
 however, that on passing Assonan, such merchan-

 order to prove its being intended for exportation.

Goods imported into Egypt and destined for
 the commerce of the countries in question, are
 placed on the same footing as if imported for
 consumption in Egypt.

Goods imported into Egypt from provinces
 under the Egyptian Government, and situated
 beyond Assonan, will be exempt from duty at the
 Custom House of Assonan, and regarded as the
 produce and manufactures of Egypt.
