AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 19th day of *October*, 1855,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS a Convention, bearing date the thirteenth of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, was concluded between Her Majesty and His Majesty the King of Prussia, whereby due protection was secured within the Prussian Dominions for the authors of books, dramatic works, or musical compositions, and the inventors, designers, or engravers of prints and articles of sculpture, and the authors, inventors, designers, or engravers of any other works whatsoever of literature and the fine arts, first published in the dominions of Her Majesty, or of His said Majesty respectively, in which the laws of Great Britain and of Prussia, did then or might thereafter give their respective subjects the privilege of copyright, and by the said Convention lawful representatives or assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, or engravers, with regard to any such works first published within the dominions of Her Majesty, were to be treated on the same footing as the authors, inventors, designers, or engravers themselves.

And whereas an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, was, by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her reign, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to "international copyright," made by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, for giving effect to the said Convention.

And whereas His Majesty the King of Saxony, His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar, their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Altenburg, and Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, His Royal Highness the Duke of Brunswick, their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Anhalt-Dessau and Anhalt-Bernburg, and their Serene Highnesses the Princes of Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt and Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, Reuss-Greiz, Reuss-Lobenstein-Ebers-Dorf, and Reuss-Schleitz, subsequently acceded to the said Convention, and thereby became parties thereto.

And whereas Orders of Her Majesty in Council, dated respectively the twenty-sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, the twenty-fourth day of April, one thousand eight

hundred and forty-seven, the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, and the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, were, by virtue of the authority aforesaid, and by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, made for giving effect to such accessions.

And whereas, on the fourteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, a convention, additional to the said Convention of the thirteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, was concluded between Her Majesty and His Majesty the King of Prussia, as well in his own name as in that of His Majesty the King of Saxony, His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Meiningen, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Altenberg, His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, His Royal Highness the Duke of Brunswick, His Royal Highness the Duke of Anhalt-Dessau-Cöthen, His Royal Highness the Duke of Anhalt-Bernburg, His Serene Highness the Prince of Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt, His Serene Highness the Prince of Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, His Serene Highness the Prince of Reuss (elder branch), and His Serene Highness the Prince of Reuss (younger branch), whereby the protection granted by the said Convention of the thirteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, to original works, is extended to translations, subject to certain stipulations therein contained.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty "to carry into effect a Convention with France "on the subject of copyright, to explain and extend the International Copyright Acts, and to "explain the Acts relating to copyright in engravings," doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that the authors of any books published, or of any dramatic pieces first publicly represented within the dominions of Prussia, Saxony, Saxe Weimar, Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Altenburg, Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Brunswick, Anhalt-Dessau-Cöthen, Anhalt-Bernburg, Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt, Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, or Reuss, at any time after the day next after the day of the publication hereof in the London Gazette, who may choose to reserve the right of translating such books or dramatic pieces, their executors, administrators,

and assigns, shall, until the expiration of five years from the date of the first publication of the translations authorized by them, respectively, of such books, or from the time at which the translations authorised by them, of such dramatic pieces, are first published or publicly represented, be, subject to the provisions mentioned in the said last-mentioned Act, empowered to prevent the publication in the British dominions of any translation of such books or dramatic pieces, and the representation therein of any translation of such dramatic pieces not so respectively authorized by them.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twentieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that, when the last census was taken, the united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton, in the North Riding of the county of York, and in the diocese of York, contained a population of five thousand three hundred and forty-six persons; that the parish church at Old Malton aforesaid affords accommodation for three hundred persons, all on free seats; that the church or chapel of Saint Leonard, at New Malton aforesaid, affords accommodation for six hundred and fifty persons, including one hundred free seats; and that the church or chapel of Saint Michael, at New Malton aforesaid, affords accommodation for six hundred and thirty persons, including eighty free seats.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the said united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton, it appears to them to be expedient that the same should be divided into three distinct and separate parishes, under the powers contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and that the same should be respectively named 'The parish of Old Malton,' 'The Parish of Saint Leonard, New Malton,' and 'The Parish of Saint Michael, New Malton,' that the present parish church at Old Malton should remain and be the parish church of the said parish of Old Malton; that the said church or chapel of Saint Leonard, which has been duly consecrated, should become and be the parish church of the said parish of Saint Leonard, New Malton; and that the said church or chapel of Saint Michael, which has also been duly conse-

crated, should become and be the parish church of the said parish of Saint Michael, New Malton; and that the boundaries of such three proposed parishes should be as follow; that is to say:

"The parish of Old Malton is bounded on the west by the township of Broughton, on the north partly by the township of Ryton and partly by a detached portion of the township of Pickering Marishes, on the north-east by the parish of Rillington, on the east and south-east partly by the parish of Settrington and partly by the parish of Norton, and on the south-west by a line passing along the middle of the Thirsk and Malton Branch of the North Eastern Railway, from the township of Broughton to the parish of Norton, as such parish of Old Malton is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured yellow.

"The parish of Saint Leonard, New Malton, is bounded on or towards the east by a line drawn along the middle of the said Thirsk and Malton Branch Railway, from the township of Broughton to the parish of Norton, on the north-west by the said parish of Broughton, on the west and south-west by a line drawn in a south-easterly and southerly direction from the boundary line of the said township of Broughton at the point where the Broughton-road from Malton enters such parish, and proceeding along the middle of that road to Newbiggen-street, continuing along the middle of Newbiggen-street, Wheelgate, and Butcher-corner, to Wells-lane, then southerly along the middle of Wells-lane as far as the parish of Norton, and on the south by the said parish of Norton, as such parish of Saint Leonard, New Malton, is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed and is thereon coloured pink.

"The parish of Saint Michael, New Malton, is bounded on the north and north-east by a line drawn in a south-easterly and southerly direction from the boundary line of the township of Broughton, at the point where the Broughton-road from Malton enters such parish, and proceeding along the middle of that road to Newbiggen-street, continuing along the middle of Newbiggen-street, Wheelgate, and Butcher-corner, to Wells-lane, then southerly along the middle of Wells-lane as far as the parish of Norton, on the south-east by the said parish of Norton, on the south by the parish of Hutton, and on the west by the said township of Broughton, as such parish of Saint Michael, New Malton, is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that after such division as aforesaid the parsonage house and garden or glebe now belonging to the incumbent of the said parish and parish church of Old Malton, but which are situate within the proposed limits or boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Michael, New Malton, should, after such division as aforesaid, cease to belong to the incumbent of the said parish and parish church of Old Malton, and should thenceforth belong to and form part of the revenues or endowments of the incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Saint Michael, New Malton.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient, that after such division as aforesaid, all the glebe land (except that lastly hereinbefore mentioned) which now belongs to the incumbent of the said church at Old Malton aforesaid, and which is situate partly in the respective parishes of South Cave and Blacktoft, in the East Riding of the county of York, and partly at Old Malton afore-

said, should continue as at present to belong to the perpetual curacy and parish church of Old Malton aforesaid, or to the incumbent thereof for the time being. That there are no tithes or moduses arising within the said united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton, or within any of the said three proposed divisions thereof, belonging to the perpetual curate or incumbent of Old Malton and New Malton. That there are two annual sums, one amounting to fifty-six pounds, sixteen shillings, and eight pence, and another to forty-two pounds, fifteen shillings and four pence, payable and granted to the incumbent or perpetual curate of the said church at Old Malton aforesaid, as augmentations thereof by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, which said two sums it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient should continue to be payable to, and received by, the incumbent or perpetual curate of the said church at Old Malton aforesaid, for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that the said churches of Saint Leonard and Saint Michael, at New Malton aforesaid, have no endowment whatever, and in order, therefore, that a competent provision may be made and secured for the future incumbents of those two churches, or of the parishes thereof, the Right Honourable Charles William Earl Fitzwilliam (patron of the said parish church of Old Malton), has agreed to purchase of the Right Honourable and most Reverend Thomas, Archbishop of York (with the concurrence of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England), certain tithes (part of the possessions or revenues of the impropriate rectory of Old Malton, belonging to the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, in right of his see), and to annex certain proportions of the same tithes in perpetuity to the said churches of Saint Leonard and Saint Michael, at New Malton aforesaid, as an endowment for the future incumbents thereof, and which in each case will amount to one hundred and seventy pounds per annum, but which said purchase and annexation of tithes as aforesaid, it has been represented to your Majesty's said Commissioners cannot be properly made and effected until the proposed division of the said united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton into three distinct and separate parishes, as hereinbefore mentioned and set forth, shall have been approved and ordered by your Majesty in Council. That in addition to the said tithes so to be purchased for, and annexed to, the said churches of Saint Leonard and Saint Michael, at New Malton aforesaid, a certain annual sum of fifty pounds (being an augmentation reserved for the benefit of the incumbent of the said church at Old Malton aforesaid, by a certain indenture of lease of the great tithes of Old Malton aforesaid, granted by the said Archbishop of York to the said Charles William Earl Fitzwilliam, but which said annual sum of fifty pounds is divisible in any manner the said archbishop may think fit), will, upon your Majesty's approving and ordering the said divisions of the said united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton into three distinct and separate parishes as aforesaid, no longer be payable as at present to the incumbent of the said church at Old Malton aforesaid, but will be paid to, or equally apportioned between, the future incumbents of the said churches of Saint Leonard and Saint Michael, at New Malton aforesaid.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that the relative and respective proportions of fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues which will arise and accrue to

the incumbent of the said parish of Old Malton, after such division of the said united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton as aforesaid, into three distinct and separate parishes as aforesaid, will be to those similarly arising and accruing to the incumbents of the said parishes of Saint Leonard, New Malton, and Saint Michael, New Malton, in the proportion of three-fifteenths of the whole of such fees, or other ecclesiastical dues, at Old Malton aforesaid, and of six-fifteenths of the same fees or dues, to each of the incumbents of Saint Leonard and Saint Michael, at New Malton aforesaid.

"That the consents of the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, and of the said Charles William Earl Fitzwilliam, patron of the said united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton, have been severally obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division of the said united parishes of Old Malton and New Malton into three separate and distinct parishes, to be called respectively "The parish of Old Malton," "The parish of Saint Leonard, New Malton," and "The parish of Saint Michael, New Malton," be accordingly made, and that all the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of such division be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant, under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas another Act was passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas, by a certain Warrant, under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 19th day of September, 1855, certain rates of postage were fixed on letters transmitted direct by British packet-boats between any ports in the British colonies, or between any ports in the British colonies and any foreign port (not in any such cases passing through the United Kingdom). And whereas it is expedient that so much of the said recited Warrant as extends to or affects the postage on letters transmitted between any of Her Majesty's colonies and any port in Peru, or any other port on the western coast of South America should be repealed.

1. Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the several before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order and direct, that so much of the said recited Warrant of the 19th day of September, 1855, as extends to or affects the postage on letters transmitted between any of Her Majesty's colonies and any port in Peru, or any other port on the western coast of South America, not passing through the United Kingdom (the conveyance thereof being by British packet-boat direct, or *viâ* Panama), shall be, and the same is hereby, annulled and repealed.

2. And we do further order and direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, brought into the United Kingdom by packet-boat from the British squadron on or off the Western Coast of Africa, without passing through any post-office, or coming from any foreign port on that coast, there shall be charged and paid, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable thereon, a rate of postage of sixpence.

3. And we do further order and direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted between any of Her Majesty's colonies and any port in Peru, or any other port on the Western Coast of South America, without passing through the United Kingdom (the conveyance being by British packet-boat direct or *viâ* Panama), there shall be charged and paid in lieu of any rates of postage now payable thereon (or which but for the repeal hereinbefore contained, would be hereafter payable thereon), a rate of one shilling and four pence.

4. And we do further order and direct, that on every letter transmitted as is hereinbefore respectively mentioned, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged and paid progressive and additional rates of postage, as follows; (that is to say):

On every letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every letter exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

5. And we do further order and direct, that nothing hereinbefore contained, shall be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by or under the said recited Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, and that all such exemptions and privileges shall remain in full force.

6. And we do further order and direct, that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to repeal, alter, or affect three certain Warrants, respectively under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date respectively the 23rd day of November, 1852, the 15th day of March, 1854, and the 31st day of March, 1855, or any or either of them, or any of the rates of postage thereby respectively fixed and established.

7. And we do further order and direct, that on every letter not exceeding one-quarter of an ounce in weight, sent from or to any commissioned or non-commissioned officer, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier in Her Majesty's regular forces, artillery, or royal marines, or from or to any commissioned or warrant officer, midshipman, master's mate, or seaman



in Her Majesty's navy, or any of Her Majesty's ships, transmitted by the post between any of the British hospitals at or near Smyrna or the Dardanelles, and any ports or places in Turkey or the Black Sea (the sea conveyance being by French packet-boat), there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such letters, a rate of two pence (which shall include any foreign packet postage that may be payable thereon).

8. And we do further order and direct, that on every letter transmitted, as is lastly hereinbefore mentioned, exceeding a quarter of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such letters, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows (that is to say):

On every letter exceeding a quarter of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding half an ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding three-quarters of an ounce in weight, three rates of postage.

On every letter exceeding three-quarters of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, four rates of postage.

And for every quarter of an ounce in weight above the weight of one ounce, there shall be charged and taken one additional rate of postage, and every fraction of a quarter of an ounce above the weight of one ounce, shall be charged as an additional quarter of an ounce, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum of two pence.

9. And we do further order and direct, that the term "by the post" used in the said recited Warrant of the 19th day of September, 1855, shall, so far as respects the conveyance of letters sent between Malta, Gibraltar, or the Ionian Islands, and Her Majesty's colonies and possessions in the East Indies or the Chinese Sea without passing through the United Kingdom, include the conveyance through Egypt, but all letters sent between any of Her Majesty's colonies and any port or place in Egypt, or between Her Majesty's colonies and any foreign country through Egypt, without passing through the United Kingdom, shall be charged and chargeable with the same rates of postage as if the said Warrant of the 19th day of September, 1855, had not been signed.

10. And we do further order, direct, and consent that printed British Newspapers and printed colonial and foreign Newspapers, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies mentioned in the schedule to this Warrant annexed, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be sent by the post to the United Kingdom, at a rate of one penny each, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable thereon.

11. And we further order, direct, and consent that all such printed newspapers shall be sent by the post in conformity with and under and subject to the several orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereinafter contained; that is to say:

1. Every such newspaper shall be sent without a cover or in a cover open at the sides.

2. There shall be no word or communication printed on any such newspaper after the publication thereof, or upon any cover thereof other than and except the name and address of the person to whom sent, but the name and address of the publisher, news-vender, or agent by whom the same is sent may be printed on the cover of any such newspaper.

3. There shall be no paper or thing enclosed in or with any such newspaper.

4. Every such newspaper shall be put into the post office at such hours in the day, and under all such regulations as the Postmaster General may appoint, including therein the payment of postage when put into the post office, if the Postmaster General shall so require.

12. And we do further order, direct, and consent, that Her Majesty's Postmaster-General shall and may charge all or any newspapers sent by the post from the colonies mentioned in the said schedule to the United Kingdom, otherwise than in conformity with the terms, conditions, and regulations established by this present Warrant, with such rates or rate of postage not exceeding in amount such rates or rate as would be chargeable upon the same as letters or a letter, as to him shall seem fit.

13. And we do further order, direct, and consent, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any newspapers sent through France, or any other foreign country, to which a transit rate of postage would be payable thereon.

14. And we do further order and direct, that the term "by the post," used in the 10th, 11th, and 12th clauses of this Warrant, shall include the conveyance by any British, foreign, or colonial packet-boat, and also by private ship; and that the term "British Newspaper," shall mean newspapers printed in the United Kingdom, whether they bear a newspaper stamp or not; and that the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had, if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, hereinbefore recited.

15. And we do further order and direct, that the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 41.) *Norway—South-east Coast.**Fixed Light on Stang-Holm.*

The Norwegian Government has given notice, that a Fixed Light has been established on Stang-holm, on the south-east coast of Norway, to light the southern passage to the harbour of Osterrisör, and that it would be first exhibited on the 27th of October instant.

The Light is a fixed *Red* channel light; it is placed on the eastern point of the island of Stang-holm, at an elevation of 34 English feet above the sea, and will be visible 10 miles in clear weather from N.  $\frac{3}{4}$  E. round easterly to S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.

The Lighthouse stands in lat.  $58^{\circ} 42' 40''$  N., and long.  $9^{\circ} 15'$  east of Greenwich.

Vessels approaching from the south-west, by keeping this light in sight, will clear the rocks and shoals lying outside of Fisund.

To clear the shoals lying about two cables' length south of Little Stang-holm, on the east side of the passage, masters of vessels, when within four cables' length of the entrance, must take care not to bring the light more westerly than N.W. by N.

After having passed the light in proceeding towards Osterrisör, the mariner will observe that the limits of the light in that direction do not fall more westerly than about half a cable's length clear of Tangen, the most southern part of the town of Osterrisör.

The centre of the light is 35 feet above the ground, and 54 feet above the level of high water, and the light will be visible at a distance of 12 miles in clear weather.

The illuminating apparatus is a Fresnel lens of the fourth order, and the light will be a fixed light until the 1st January, 1856, when it will be changed to a fixed light *varied by flashes*.
