established under the provisions of the Act passed

in the session holden in the ninth and tenth years
of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-five, in
respect of actions upon bills of exchange and pro-
missory notes, where the plaintiff claims a sum
not exceeding fifty pounds.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with
the advice aforesaid, to direct that the powers
and duties incident to the provisions of the said
"Summary Procedure on Bills of Exchange Act,
1855," with respect to matters in the said Courts
of Record, shall and may be exercised by the
Judges of the said Courts respectively, or their
respective deputies, for the time being, or in their
absence by the respective Clerks of the said
Courts for the time being; and that the enact-
ments, Secretary of State's orders, practice, and
forms, in force and used in the said Courts of
Record, shall be adopted with reference to pro-
ceedings had under the said last-recited Act, so
far as the same are applicable, *mutatis mutandis*.

THE Minister of Marine hereby gives notice, that as the masts of a brig, sunk in the middle of the Goeree Channel at a cable's length distance from the black buoy, No. 6 (which casualty was advertised in the *Netherland Staats Courant* on the 3rd December last), have since been cut down or taken out of the vessel, a black and white checked or so-called wreck-buoy has now been placed, about 12 clls to the west of the sunk wreck, to indicate the place of danger for shipping.
