NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty will hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on Wednesday the 12th of March next, at two o'clock.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards; with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock on the Monday previous* to the Levee, or upon any *earlier* day between the hours of *eleven and four*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levee, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Monday previous* to the Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

LORD PANMURE has received a Despatch, of which the following is a copy, addressed to his Lordship by General Sir William Codrington, K.C.B.

Sevastopol, February 20, 1856.

MY LORD,

I HAVE to acknowledge the receipt of your telegraphic message from the Judge-Advocate-General in England, in reference to the man of this Army under sentence of death for murder.

There are no palliating circumstances to interfere with the just punishment due to such a crime, committed on a helpless wounded man in hospital. Painful though the duty may be, with a sense of the responsibility attaching to human life, but with the conviction that the decision is just and necessary, I have ordered the execution of this man on Saturday morning next, the 23rd instant, in conformity with the sentence of the court.

[The following Order in Council is substituted for an Order which appeared in the Gazette of the 29th February last.]

AT the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 25th day of *February*, 1856,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehend-

ing seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories of any Foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to a subject of such Power, when within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty, that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories belonging to the Republic of Chile :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to citizens of the Republic of Chile, within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships: Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Paddington, in the county of Middlesex, and within the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated

church called Christ Church, situate at Craven Hill, in the said parish of Paddington, under and by virtue of the power and authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and also in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be called 'the District Chapelry of Christ Church Paddington,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line of the district chapelry of Christ Church Paddington commences in the middle of the Uxbridge-road, opposite to Elms-lane, and thence proceeds northerly along the middle of Elms-lane and Craven-terrace, crosses Craven-hill, and proceeds along the middle of Devonshire-terrace to Charles-street, where it turns to the west and proceeds along the middle of the road forming the south side of Cleveland-square; thence, turning to the north, extends along the middle of Leinster-terrace, including the houses on the east side of Leinster-terrace, to James-street, and turning to the west proceeds along the middle of James-street into Porchester-terrace; then turning southward along the middle of Porchester-terrace to Porchester-gardens, thence through the middle of Porchester-gardens to the Queen's-road, and turning to the south proceeds along the middle of the Queen's-road to the Uxbridge-road, thence turning to the east along the middle of the Uxbridge road to the point opposite Elms-lane, where the boundary line commenced, as such district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and thereon coloured red.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church called Christ Church, at Craven Hill, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be equally divided between the incumbent thereof for the time being and the Reverend Archibald Montgomery Campbell, the present incumbent of the parish church of the said parish of Paddington, during the existing incumbency of such parish church, and that upon the first or next avoidance of such parish church the whole of the said fees should belong to the incumbent for the time being of the said church called Christ Church.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the two before-mentioned Acts and sections, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed,

into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called CHRIST CHURCH, at Craven Hill, in the parish of PADDINGTON, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the district parish of Tunbridge Wells, in the county of Kent, and within the diocese of Canterbury, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate in the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the twelfth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual the Church Building Acts,' and extended by the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of Ec-

"The boundary line of the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Tunbridge Wells, commences at the eastern side of the garden and premises belonging to Arthur Thompson, Esquire, and proceeds southerly along the middle of Mount Pleasant-terrace to a point opposite to a fence dividing the property of Messrs. A. and N. Ward from the property of George Landgridge, Esquire, then proceeds along such fence easterly and southerly into Grove-hill-road, and along the middle of that road easterly into Camden-park-road, and then along the middle of the last-mentioned road as far as Hawkenbury-road, where it meets a stream dividing the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells from the parish of Frant, as likewise being the line of division between the county of Kent and the county of Sussex, and proceeds westerly along such stream until it reaches the boundary line separating the parish of Speldhurst from the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, along which the boundary line of the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Tunbridge Wells, proceeds northerly and westerly as far as the road called Rose-hill, then along the middle of that road northerly until it reaches the fence of the garden and premises belonging to Arthur Thompson, Esquire, along which said fence it proceeds southeasterly, north-easterly, northerly, and easterly to the point where the boundary line commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be reserved for, on account of, and paid over to, the Reverend Edward Hoare, Master of Arts, Incumbent of the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, during his incumbency thereof, and that upon his avoiding such incumbency the said fees should belong to the minister or incumbent of Christ Church aforesaid, for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend John Bird, Archbishop of the said diocese of Canterbury, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, and also the consent of the said Edward Hoare, as Incumbent of the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, as required by the Act and section secondly hereinbefore mentioned, in order that the subdivision of such district parish by forming thereout a district chapelry as aforesaid, should take effect from the assignment of such district chapelry, in testimony whereof the said John Bird, Archbishop of Canterbury, and Edward Hoare, have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed,

Regulations for the admission of Candidates for the appointment of Assistant-Surgeon in the Service of the East India Company.

ALL natural-born subjects of Her Majesty, between 22 and 28 years of age, and of sound bodily health, may be candidates for admission into the service of the East-India Company as Assistant-Surgeons.

They must subscribe and send in to Dr. Scott, the Physician to the Honourable East-India Company, 10 days before the period fixed for each examination, a declaration to the following effect: "I (christian and surname at full length), a candidate for employment as an Assistant-Surgeon in the service of the East India Company, do hereby declare that I was _____ years of age on the _____ day of _____ last, and that I labour under no constitutional disease or physical disability that can interfere with the due discharge of the duties of a medical officer; and I also attest my readiness to proceed on duty to India within three months of receiving my appointment."

This declaration must be accompanied by the following documents.

1. Proof of age, either by extract from the register of the parish in which the candidate was born, or by his own declaration, pursuant to the Act 5 and 6 William IV., cap 62.

2. A certificate of moral character from a magistrate or a minister of the religious denomination to which the candidate belongs, who has personally known him for at least two preceding years.

3. A diploma in surgery; or a degree in medicine, provided an examination in surgery be required for such degree; from some body competent by law to grant or confer such diploma or degree.

4. A certificate of having attended two courses of lectures, of six months each, on the practice of physic, and of having attended for six months the practice and clinical instruction of the physicians at some hospital, containing at least, on an average, one hundred in-patients; or of having attended one course of lectures of six months on the practice of physic, and clinical instruction for twelve months.

5. A certificate of having attended for three months the practical instruction given at one of the public asylums for the treatment of the insane.

6. A certificate of having attended for three months one of the institutions, or wards of an hospital especially devoted to the treatment of ophthalmic disease.

Candidates who may not have been able to attend the practice of an asylum for the insane, or of an ophthalmic hospital, for three months previous to their offering themselves for examination, will not be excluded from examination, but will, if successful in obtaining recommendation for appointments, be required to produce certificates of having attended such practice during the interval between the examination and the time of proceeding to India.

7. A certificate of having attended a course of lectures on midwifery, and of having conducted at least six labours.

8. A certificate of having acquired a practical knowledge of cupping.

Candidates may also, at their option, send in certificates of attendance at any hospitals, or on any course of lectures, in addition to the above. Attendance on a course of military surgery, and the practical study of surgical operations on the dead body, are recommended.

1. Surgery in all its departments.
2. Medicine, including the diseases of women and children, therapeutics, pharmacy, and hygiene.
3. Anatomy and physiology, including comparative anatomy.
4. Natural history, including botany and zoology.

Zoology and Comparative Anatomy:

Outlines of the Structure of the Animal Kingdom, by Rymer Jones, or,
Cours Élémentaire d'Histoire Naturelle, par Milne Edwards.

Botany:

Lindley's School Botany, or,
Lindley's Elements of Botany.

The Examination will be conducted—

1. By means of written questions and answers.
2. By object examinations and experiments, when the subject admits of such tests.
3. By practical examination of patients, and by operations on the dead body.
4. By vivâ voce examination.

The persons who shall be pronounced by the examiners to be the best qualified in all respects, will be appointed to fill the requisite number of appointments as Assistant-Surgeons in the East India Company's service; and, so far as the requirements of the service will permit, they will have the choice of the presidency in India to which they shall be appointed, according to the

order of merit in which they stand on the list resulting from such examination.

All Assistant-Surgeons are required to subscribe to the military or medical, and medical retiring funds, at the presidencies to which they may be respectively appointed, and to the Military Orphan Society also, if appointed to Bengal.

All Assistant-Surgeons who shall neglect or refuse to proceed to India under the orders of the Court of Directors, within three months from the date of their appointment, will be considered as having forfeited it, unless special circumstances shall justify a departure from this regulation.

The examinations will take place in the months of January and July in each year, and due notice will be given by public advertisement of the days appointed, and of the probable number of candidates to be selected.

The general examination in these sciences will be elementary, and will embrace a very limited range of technical terms. At the written examination, a considerable number of questions will be put, with the view of allowing each candidate to select such subjects as he has attended to, and, thereby, of enabling the examiners to ascertain the particular departments of science in which the verbal examination should be conducted.

With those candidates who have attained proficiency in any branch of these sciences, the verbal examination will be pursued in the branch selected, so as to ascertain the full extent of their knowledge.

It is now announced that the next examination will be held at this House on the 14th of July next, and succeeding days, and that the probable number of vacancies in the Medical Establishment of the East India Company, to be then filled up, will be thirty.
