LORD PANMURE has this day received a Despatch and its Enclosure, of which the following are copies, addressed to his Lordship by General Sir William Codrington, K.C.B.

Sevastopol, February 26, 1856.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the honour to inform your Lordship that a large portion of the infantry of the English Army paraded, on the 24th instant, on the ridge of the plateau overlooking the plain of Balaklava, where the ground had become sufficiently dry for the purpose.

The troops were formed, by divisions, in a line of contiguous columns of battalions at quarter distance, extending for nearly a mile, and marched past at half distance.

They were subsequently formed on a slope to the rear of the original line, in masses of columns by divisions, and again marched past in quarter distance.

The day was fine, but cold, and the general appearance, cleanliness, and steadiness of the troops afforded all the utmost satisfaction, for the men looked in the finest health and vigour.

Marshal Péliissier, General Durando, and a large number of officers of the French and Sardinian Armies were observers of the fine bearing and efficiency of the troops.

I enclose the Weekly Report of Sir John Hall, Inspector-General of Hospitals, in which your Lordship will see recorded the excellent state of health of the Army generally.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to enclose the weekly state of sick to the 23rd instant, and it affords me

great satisfaction to be able to report not only a continuance of the excellent health which the Army has enjoyed for some time past, but that no death from disease has occurred during the week. I believe one or two deaths from accidents took place out of hospital; but for an army of this strength, on service in the field, to have lost no man by disease for a whole week, is a remarkable circumstance; and when it is taken into consideration that only fourteen men have died in three weeks, little need be said about the character of the diseases that have been prevalent in camp; and as the ratio of sick to well is only four and a quarter per cent, the sanitary condition of the Army may fairly, I think, be pronounced satisfactory.

Some of the divisions of the army have enjoyed unusually good health of late; for instance, the Highland Division at Kamara has had only one death for five weeks, out of a strength of 4,860 men.

In the Third Division in camp no man has died for twenty-eight days, out of a strength of 6,450; and in the Light Division no death has occurred for a fortnight, out of a strength of 6,460.

This favourable state of things does not, I am sorry to say, apply to the Land Transport, in which there is still a considerable amount of sickness amongst the young lads who have been sent out of late.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the session of Parliament holden in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of February, in the year one

thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the session of Parliament, holden in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning the right of patronage of the new parish of Carver-street, in the county and diocese of York.

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, that it should be lawful by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), at any time to assign the right of patronage of any district or new parish constituted under the provisions of the said Act, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as should be approved by the like authority.

"And whereas by an Order made by your Majesty in Council, on the twentieth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, and duly published in the London Gazette, the district of Carver-street was constituted out of the parish of Sheffield, in the said county and diocese, and such district has since become a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, under the provisions of the said Act.

"And whereas the said Order did not make any specific assignment of the whole or any part of the right of patronage and nomination of the minister of the said district, or, so soon as the same should become a new parish as aforesaid, of the perpetual curate thereof, and such right of patronage and nomination has hitherto been exercised in accordance with the general provisions of the said Act in that behalf.

"And whereas a sum of one thousand and twenty pounds has been contributed and expended by Henry Wilson, of Westbrook, near Sheffield, in the county of York aforesaid, Esquire, towards providing a suitable church for the said district and new parish of Carver-street, and for the use and service of the perpetual curate and inhabitants thereof, upon condition that the right of nomination of such perpetual curate should for the next turn be assigned in manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the right of nomination of the perpetual curate of the said new parish of Carver-street for the one turn only which shall occur next after the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall, without any further assurance in the law other than such Order, be assigned to and may be exercised by the said Henry Wilson, his executors, administrators, or assigns.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them,

in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Thorney, in the cathedral church of Chichester, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property herein after described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to

the said prebend of Thorney (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) became vested in us on the vacancy of the said prebend, which occurred on or about the seventeenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, by the appointment of the Venerable George Bland, Archdeacon of Northumberland, the then prebendary, to a canonry in the Cathedral Church of Durham, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Thorney, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.
