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Naples, Octob. 15.

THe Gallies of the Great Duke of Tuscany, which served against the Turks this Summer, arrived the last week at Pozzuolo; the Admiral Guadi, accompanied with his principal Officers, came ashore to visit our Vice-Roy the Marquis del Carpio, which his Excellency returned, and made him a Present of fresh Provisions; The 13th these Gallies sailed again for Leghorn. The Pope's Gallies passed by without stopping in this Port. Those of Maltha are likewise gone home.

Venice, Octob. 26. We have advice by several Vessels arrived from the Levant, that Captain-General Morosini sailed the 2d of the last Month from Napoli di Romania with the Fleet of this State, taking his course towards the Archipelago, where he has already set several of the Islands under Contribution. We are informed by the same way, that some Venetian Men of War coming before Malvasia, the Garrison, which were 250 Men, upon the first Summons surrendered the place, conditioning to be transported to Patrasso. Some Gentlemen who were returned hither from the ~~Navarin~~, confirm the account we had of the death of Signior Fastrin della Riva, Proveditore-General of Napoli di Romania, and that Signior Gaspar Bragadin had succeeded him in that Government; and farther tell us, that they left General Coningmarke ill of a Fever; and that the Prince of Brunswicke was likewise not well, but that he was notwithstanding gone with the Auxiliary Forces of Lunenburg and Saxony to Zant, where they are to winter; The Ships that transported them thither, being commanded by Signior Pezzani, have Orders to go and cruize in the Seas of Safeno, which are very much infested with Pyrats. It is reported that the Captain-General has taken a Castle in the Isle of Scio, in which were 200 Turks, and that he intends to possess himself of some other Fortresses in those Seas, to cut off the communication between the Islands of the Archipelago and the Kingdom of Candia. Several Officers are now here who offer to raise Regiments in Germany and Italy for the Service of this State against the next Campaign, some of which are treating with by order of the Senate.

Genova, Octob. 21. The Pope's Gallies are arrived at Civita Vecchia; and the Gally of this State that served with them this Summer is returned hither. The Master of a vessel arrived from Alexandria reports, that before his departure from thence the Garrisons of Navarin and Modon arrived there, and had greatly increased the consternation that was among those People. That the Bassa of Alexandria had received fresh Orders from the Port, to raise what Men he could, and to send them to the Morea, but that all his endeavors to satisfy the Grand Visier in this particular, were very unsuccess-

ful, not having been able to raise in a very considerable time above 500 Men, and that each of these few, several had deserted; and that the Garrisons of Navarin and Modon had been sent to serve in Candia.

Lisbone, Octob. 7. The King of Portugal has declared to his Council of State, his resolution to demand in Marriage the Princess of Neuburg, and to send the Count de Villar Mayor in the quality of his Ambassador to the Elector Palatin her Father, for that purpose.

Lemberg, Octob. 18. This week arrived here an Express from the Army, with the news of the Victory which the Poles obtained the 4th Instant against the Turks and Tartars; of whom it's said above 6000 were killed upon the place, and 300 taken prisoners, among which were several of their Principal Officers. Prince James was engaged in the hottest of the action, and took one of their chief Commanders prisoner with his own hand; of the Poles there were about 1500 killed in this occasion, and among these divers Persons of quality; but what was said of the Prince of Courland's being of the number of the slain, proves a mistake. His army was encamped the 12th Instant not far from a place called Peschani, between the Niesster and the Pruth.

Vienna, Octob. 27. The Duke of Lorraine is expected here in few days; The last Letters from Buda told us he was gone from thence towards Gran. Of the Troops his Highness brought with him to Pest, the Foot were put into Buda to reinforce that Garrison, and the Horse and Dragoons were sent under the command of General Veterani to joyn the Imperial Forces before Segedin, upon the advice his Highness had received that the Seraskier Achmet Bassa was marching with a Body of Turks and Tartars to relieve that place. The Letters from the Imperial Camp commanded by Prince Louis of Baden, of the 18th Instant, give an account, that having with some difficulty passed the Drave, by reason it was extremely swelled by the Rains, they arrived the 15th before Five Churches; That the same day they lodged themselves in the Town, and when these Letters came away, were advanced to the foot of the Ramparts of the Castle, in which they had made two breaches, so that we doubt not but our next advices will bring the news that this place is surrendered, or taken by Assault. They write from Croatia that Count Joseph de Rabata, Governor of Carestade was marched with 2000 Men towards the Frontiers of Dalmatia, to hinder the design of 6000 Turks, who, he was informed, were drawn together to make an incursion into the Territories of the Republick of Venice. The Republick of Ragusa have sent Deputies hither to pray the Emperor to receive them under his Protection, and to include them in the Peace, which his Imperial Majesty shall make with the Port, that so they may be delivered

delivered from the Tyranny of the *Turks*, and the Tribute they have been forced to pay them. In *Transylvania* there appears now a general disposition to cast off entirely their Engagements with the *Turks*, and to put themselves under the Emperor's Protection, and Ambassadors are coming hither for this purpose. The *Bavarian* Cavalry, as likewise that of the Circles begin to pass by this place, on the other side of the *Danube*, being to winter in their own Country. The Emperor has given the Regiment lately commanded by the Baron *de Merco* to the Prince *de Commercy*, who signalized himself in so many occasions during the course of this Campaign. And the Regiment vacant by the death of the Marquis *de Vignerot* is given to the Sieur *Seraffer*, at present Governour of *Gran*. This day arrived here an Express with an account, that the Grand Visier having commanded 3000 *Spathis*, and 3000 Janitaries, with 4000 *Tartars* to march with several pieces of Cannon, under the Orders of the *Seraski*er to relieve *Segedin*, they advanced within three miles of that place, and dividing themselves into two Bodies, the *Tartars* passed the River *Thayse* to attack the *Imperialists* on that side, while the *Turks* did the like on this. The *Christians* had notice of their march, and in pursuance of the resolution taken in a Council of War that was held thereupon, the Cavalry and Dragoons marched out of the Camp to meet the Enemy; the first shock was with the *Tartars*, who after some resistance were put to flight; then the *Imperialists* charged the *Turks*, who is probable were willing the *Turks* should bear the first onset; The Fight here was maintained with more resolution, and lasted longer, but at last the *Turks* were likewise forced to quit the Field, leaving their Cannon and Baggage, and above 2000 slain, and many prisoners behind them; the *Christians* lost here 200 Men in this action. The Besieged being informed of this great success, from whom they expected relief, began to capitulate, and when this Express came away, the Hostages were exchanged, and the Articles drawing up.

Ratisbona, Novemb. 1. At the same time that we began to doubt of the success of the Enterprize upon *Segedin*, because of the Season and brave defence of the Garrison which was composed of 2600 Men, under the Conduct of an experienced Commander, the news arrives of the surrender of that place, after the defeat of a Body of 10000 *Turks* and *Tartars*, who were sent by the Grand Visier to relieve it; and no wonder the *Turks* made this Effort to succor a place of so much importance; for the *Imperialists* by being Masters of it, will not only secure their Winter Quarters, but likewise block up *Vienna*, which is the only place of strength the *Turks* remain possessed of in *Upper Hungary*. We hope our next Letters will give us as good an account of the Siege of *Five Churches*, the Besiegers, according to the last news we had, being almost ready to give an Assault to the Castle.

Copenhagen, Octob. 27. The King of *Denmark* returned hither the 22 Instant from *Holstein*. An Envoy from *Sweden* has since had Audience of his Majesty, concerning, as it's believed, the Affairs of the City of *Hamburgh*.

Vienna, Novemb. 2. The States-General have by their Deputies the *Heer Van Werckendam* and the *Heer Scheltz* complimented the Prince of *Brandenburg* upon his arrival here, who has likewise received the Visits and Compliments of all the Foreign Ministers; he intends to remain here the whole Winter. The Sieur *Hunnick* has acquainted the States, that the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and the City of *Hamburgh* are accommodated. The Letters from *Venna* of the 27th past tell us, that the *Imperialists* had defeated

10000 *Turks* and *Tartars* who attempted to relieve *Segedin*, and that the Garrison had thereupon capitulated.

Brussels, Novemb. 8. The Court returned hither the 2th Instant from *Teroveren*, where they had kept the Feast of *St. Hubert*. The 6th being the King of *Spain's* Birth-day, was observed here with much Solemnity. The Letters from *Venna* of the 27th of the last Month give an account that the *Christians* having defeated a Body of *Turks* and *Tartars* that came to relieve *Segedin*, the Garrison, which were about 2000 Men, thereupon surrendered.

Paris, Nov. 9. The 6th Instant the Cardinal *Ranucci* received the Cap from the King's hands in the Chapel at *Fontainebleau*, which was performed with the Ceremonies practised in the like occasions, after which he had the Honor to Dine with his Majesty, being Seated by the Comptroller-General of the King's Household. The States of *Languedoc*, who are assembled at *Nismes*, have granted the King 700 thousand Crowns. They write from *Lisbon* that the King of *Portugal* had declared his intended Marriage with the Princess Palatin of *Neubourg*, Sister to the Empress.
