SIR

THE sanitary condition of the army continues highly satisfactory, and there has been a decrease in both the mortality and number of sick this week.

Since the furious snow storm of the 3rd instant the weather has been gradually getting milder, and now nothing could be more delightful than it is.

This favourable change in the weather has been marked by a decrease of chest affections, and a slight increase of febrile complaints, but none of them of any great severity, except in the Land Transport Corps, where typhoid fever still prevails, and four out of the five fatal cases of fever which occurred during the week, took place in the Land Transport Corps alone.

Of the sixteen deaths which have occurred during the week,—

Five were from fever ;

Two from apoplexy, the direct effects of drunkenness ;

Five from affections of the lungs ;

Two from chronic bowel complaints ;

One, a sudden death, from the bursting of an aneurism of the aorta ; and

One from the results of an injury of the head received in a drunken brawl six weeks ago.

So that only twelve out of the sixteen are fairly attributable to disease.

The ratio of admissions to strength this week has been 1·81 per cent.

Deaths, to strength, 0·02 ditto.

Sick, to well, 3·87 ditto.

Taking the whole force, the admissions to strength in all the hospitals, both general and regimental, have only been 2·19 per cent.

Deaths, to strength, 0·03 per cent.

Sick, to well, 5·34 ditto

WHEREAS a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Us and Our Allies and His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias was concluded at Paris, on the

thirtieth day of March last, and the Ratifications thereof have now been duly exchanged; In Conformity thereunto, We have thought fit hereby to command that the same be published throughout all Our Dominions; And We do declare to all Our Loving Subjects, Our Will and Pleasure that the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by Sea as by Land, and in all cases whatsoever; strictly charging and commanding all Our Loving Subjects to take notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereunto accordingly.

FOR A PUBLIC THANKSGIVING.

WHEREAS it hath pleased Almighty God, in His great Goodness, to put an End to the Warfare in which We have been engaged against the Emperor of Russia, and to restore Peace to Europe; We, therefore, adoring the Divine Goodness, and duly considering that the great and public Blessings of Peace do call for public and solemn Acknowledgments, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby appointing that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for these His Mercies be observed throughout those Parts of the United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Sunday the fourth day of May next; and We do earnestly exhort all Our loving Subjects that they do religiously observe the said public Day of Thanksgiving; and, for the better and more devout Solemnization of the same, We have given directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving suitable to this occasion, to be used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of Public Worship, and to take care for the timely dispersing of the same throughout their respective Dioceses.

A PROCLAMATION,

FOR A PUBLIC THANKSGIVING IN SCOTLAND.

WHEREAS it has pleased Almighty God, in His great Goodness, to put an End to the Warfare in which We have been engaged against the Emperor of Russia, and to restore Peace to Europe; We, therefore, adoring the Divine

Goodness, and duly considering that the great and public Blessings of Peace do call for public and solemn Acknowledgments, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby appointing that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for these His Mercies be observed throughout that Part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, upon Sunday the fourth day of May next; and we do earnestly exhort all Our loving Subjects in Scotland that they do reverently and decently observe the said Public Thanksgiving, on the said fourth day of May next. Our Will and Pleasure is, therefore, and we charge, that, this Our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all others Places needful, and there, in Our Name and under Our Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies of this Our Proclamation to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies thereof to the several Parish Churches within their bounds.

AT the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 28th day of *April*, 1856,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts; or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Surrey, in general quarter session as-

sembled at Reigate, on the eighth day of April, instant, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the eastern division of the said county of Surrey is insufficient, and praying that Godstone, in the hundred of Tandridge, may be a polling place for the said division, within which such place is situate:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Godstone, in the hundred of Tandridge, shall be a polling place for the eastern division of the county of Surrey; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," as enlarged by the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," have, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the united parishes of Melcombe Regis and Radipole, in the county of Dorset, and in the diocese of Salisbury, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate in the said united parishes of Melcombe Regis and Radipole, under the powers contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other

' purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named ' THE DISTRICT CHAPELRY OF SAINT JOHN, WEYMOUTH,' and that the boundaries thereof should be as follow; that is to say:

" The boundary line commences at the Backwater, near the " Higher Town's Pump," at the lower end of King-street, and proceeds easterly along the middle of the latter street as far as the south end of Crescent-street, when it turns and proceeds in a northerly direction along the middle of Crescent-street and Belvedere-mews to the north end of the Belvedere, when it turns easterly and proceeds across the turnpike-road to the Sea Wall of the Esplanade; it then proceeds in a north-easterly direction along the sea shore, passing immediately before the Narrows, Brunswick-buildings, Somerset-place, Greenhill, and Gordon-place, to the boundary-stone fixed against the Sea Wall, north of the Icehouse, near the Lodmoor Sluice, and close by the point of junction of the Old and New Sea Wall, from whence it proceeds in an imaginary straight line, north-westerly, and crosses obliquely the Weymouth and Preston turnpike road, between the culverts and across the south end of the Lodmoor to the boundary-stone in fence; from thence continues in a straight line through the arable land to the boundary-stone at back of the outbuildings north of, and belonging to, Radipole New House, passing through the south end of the said outbuilding and continues in a straight line to the boundary-stone on the west side of the Weymouth and Dorchester turnpike road, north of Union-place, when it proceeds in a straight line, south-westerly, on the north side of the stone wall, south of the occupation road, down to the lower boundary-stone at the bottom of the cliffs, close to the water's edge, from which point it proceeds in a southerly direction along the edge of the Backwater to the Black Rock, where it takes the angle of the Sea Wall, and proceeds along the same, until it reaches the " Higher Town Pump " at the point at which the said boundary-line commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured yellow.

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that baptisms and churchings should be performed in the said church of Saint John aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should belong to the minister or incumbent for the time being of such church.

" That the consent of the Right Reverend Walter Kerr, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore-mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of SAINT JOHN, WEYMOUTH, in the united parishes of Melcombe Regis and Radipole, be accordingly made, and that the

recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms and churchings in the said church, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled " An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England " it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the churchyard at DODDINGTON, Cambridge-shire, from the first of April to the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the parish churchyard KEIGHLEY, in the burial-ground of the Independent Chapel, of the Bethel Baptist Chapel, and of the Roman Catholic Chapel, and in the Quakers' Burial-ground in that parish, from the first of May to the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

In the burial-grounds in the parishes of Saint Peter in Eastgate, and Saint Margaret, in the city of LINCOLN, from the first of May to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyard of Saint Peter and All Saints, MONKWEARMOUTH, from the first of May to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyard of SUNDERLAND, from the first of May to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

WHEREAS, by the 37th section of the "Passengers Act, 1855," the Emigration Commissioners, acting under the authority of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, may, by a notice issued under the hands of any two of them, and published in the London Gazette, authorize the issue of provisions in any passenger ship according to such dietary scale, other than that prescribed in the Act, as the said Commissioners shall consider to contain in the whole an equivalent amount of wholesome nutriment; and after the publication of such notice, it shall be lawful for the Master of any passenger ship to issue provisions to his passengers according to the scale prescribed in the said Act, or according to the scale authorized by the said Commissioners, whichever may have been set forth in the contract tickets of the passengers.

Now, in exercise of the power thus vested in us, we, the undersigned Emigration Commissioners, having obtained the requisite authority in that behalf of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, do by this Notice authorize, from this date, the issue of provisions in any passenger ship proceeding on any voyage of which the length computed, as in the said Act mentioned, shall exceed eighty-four days for ships propelled by sails only, or fifty days for ships propelled by steam, or steam in aid of sails, according to the subjoined scale marked C, instead of according to the scale marked B, in the 37th

section of the said Act ; provided that such substituted scale be set forth in the contract tickets of the passengers.
