CEREMONIAL OF THE PROCLAMATION OF PEACE,
TUESDAY, 29TH APRIL, 1856.

IN pursuance of directions issued by the Earl Marshal, in obedience to a Royal Warrant, to him directed, the Officers of Arms, Serjeants at Arms in their Collars, with their Maces, the Serjeant Trumpeter with Mace and Collar, the Trumpets, Drum-Major and Drums, and the Marshals' Men, assembled this day, at half-past Eleven o'Clock in the forenoon, in the Stable Yard, St. James's; and the Officers of Arms, being habited in their Tabards, and having mounted their horses, proceeded to the Palace Gate, in front of which, Sir Charles George Young, Garter Principal King of Arms, on foot, read the Proclamation of Peace, whereupon a Procession was formed, which proceeded to Charing Cross in the following order:—

At Charing Cross, Norroy King of Arms read the Proclamation, looking towards Whitehall; after which the Procession moved on to Temple Bar, the Gates of which being shut, Rouge Croix, junior Pursuivant of Arms, going out of the rank, between two Trumpeters, preceded by two of the Life Guards, rode up to the Gates, and after the Trumpets had sounded thrice, knocked thereat. Being asked by the City Marshal from within, "Who comes there?" he replied, "The Officers of Arms demand entrance into the City to publish Her Majesty's Proclamation of Peace." The Gates being opened, he was admitted, and the Gates were immediately closed. The City Marshal, preceded by his Officers, conducted him to the Lord Mayor (who, in his carriage and accompanied by the Aldermen, Sheriffs, and other Officers, attended within the Gates), to whom he presented Her Majesty's Warrant, which his Lordship having read, returned, and gave directions to the City Marshal to open the Gates, who attending the Pursuivant back, said on leaving him, "Sir, the Gates are opened." The Trumpets and Life Guards being in waiting, conducted him to his place in the Procession, which then moved on into the City (the High Bailiff and other Officers of Westminster filing off, and retiring at Temple Bar), and at the end of Chancery Lane, Lancaster Herald read the Proclamation for the third time.

Then the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, joined the Procession, immediately after the Officers of Arms, and it moved on to the end of Wood Street, Cheapside, where the Cross formerly stood; the Proclamation having been there read by York Herald, the Procession was continued to the Royal Exchange, where the Proclamation was read for the last time by Windsor Herald.

The Trumpets sounded thrice previously to and immediately after each reading. The streets through which the Procession passed were thronged with spectators, who received each Proclamation with loud and repeated acclamations. The Park and Tower Guns were fired upon the occasion.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the third day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Gates, in the cathedral church of Chichester, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property hereinafter described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said prebend of Gates (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) became vested in us on the vacancy of the said prebend, which occurred on or about the first day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, by the decease of the Reverend Sir John Ashburnham, Baronet, the then prebendary, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should

be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said Prebend of Gates; and to vest in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the session of Parliament holden in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hun-

dred and thirteen, and of the Act of the session of Parliament holden in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the parishes of Darowen and Llanbrynmair, in the county of Montgomery, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, and for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the said parishes, and the parish of Penegoes, in the same county and diocese, and out of the parish of Tref Eglwys, in the aforesaid county and in the diocese of Bangor.

"Whereas it was by the said first-mentioned Act enacted, that if in any case it should appear to be expedient, on account of the extent or population or other peculiar circumstances of any parish or district in which any ecclesiastical rectory without cure of souls, the estates and endowments of which should have become vested in us under the provisions of the same Act, should be situate, or from the incompetent endowment of the vicarage or vicarages or perpetual curacy or curacies dependent on such rectory, to annex the whole or any part of the lands, tithes, or other hereditaments or endowments belonging to such rectory, to such vicarage or vicarages, curacy or curacies, such annexation might be made, and any such vicarage or curacy might be constituted a rectory with cure of souls by the authority therein provided; (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same):

"And whereas it was by the said first-mentioned Act further enacted that, except as therein otherwise specified, all the monies and revenues to be paid to us, and all the rents and profits of the lands, tithes, and other hereditaments vested and to be vested in us by and under the authority of the same Act, together with all accumulations of interest produced by and arising therefrom, should be from time to time carried over by us to a common fund, and by payments or investments made out of such fund, or if in any case it should be deemed more expedient, by means of an actual conveyance and assignment of such lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of a portion thereof, additional provision should be made by the authority aforesaid for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required, in such manner as should, by the like authority, be deemed most conducive to the efficiency of the Established Church; provided always, that in making any such additional provision out of any tithes, or any lands or other hereditaments allotted or assigned in lieu of tithes so vested or to be vested in us, or out of the rents and profits thereof, due consideration should be had of the wants and circumstances of the places in which such tithes now arise or have arisen:

"And whereas it was by the said secondly-mentioned Act enacted, that if at any time it should be made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent and containing a large population, and wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it should be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, with the consent of the

bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it was by the same Act provided, that the draft of any Scheme for constituting any such district should be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district out of which it is recommended that any such district or any part thereof should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron, or patrons might have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme should not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy should have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons should in the meantime consent to the same; and it was by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we should recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, should be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same should be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least so soon as such district should have become a new parish as therein-after provided:

"And whereas it was by the same Act further enacted, that it should be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons, or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as should be approved by the like authority:

"And whereas all the estates and endowments formerly belonging to the sinecure rectories of Darowen and Llanbrynmair have become transferred to and vested in us under the provisions of the first-mentioned Act, and of another Act of the session of Parliament holden in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, chapter seventy-seven: And whereas such estates and endowments comprise, inter alia, certain tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes arising within the said parishes, and now held by us in possession:

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular parts of the said parishes of Darowen, Llanbrynmair, Penegoes, and Tref Eglwys, respectively herein-after mentioned and described, such parts not at present containing within their

limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in the manner herein-after set forth; and it also appears to us to be expedient that the other arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed with a view to making better provision for the cure of souls in the parishes of Darowen and Llanbrynmair should likewise be carried into effect :

“ And whereas a church or chapel has been provided and offered for approval by us, to the intent that the same may be consecrated as the church or chapel of the said district, hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof : And whereas certain of the principal contributors towards the cost of the said church or chapel have, by an instrument in writing under their hands, nominated to us the Bishop of Saint Asaph for the time being as the patron in perpetuity of the said district, and, so soon as the same shall have become a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, under the provisions of the herein-before secondly-mentioned Act, then of the said new parish :

Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, and of the Right Reverend Christopher, Bishop of Bangor, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all those parts of the said parishes of Darowen, Llanbrynmair, Penegoes, and Tref Eglwys respectively delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and comprised within and bounded by the red line marked on the said map or plan, shall be together constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly, and that the same shall be named ‘ The District of Dylife,’ and shall be included in and form part of the deanery of Ceifiliog, and of the archdeaconry of Montgomery, and diocese of St. Asaph.

And we further recommend and propose, that the minister of the district so recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the said secondly-mentioned Act, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish as aforesaid, the perpetual curate thereof shall be permanently endowed with the tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parishes of Darowen and Llanbrynmair respectively, and now vested in us as aforesaid, and under and by virtue of certain orders of exchange of tithe rent-charges within the last-named parishes made by the Inclosure Commissioners for England and Wales under the provisions of “ The Acts for the Inclosure, Exchange, and Improvement of Land,” and bearing date respectively the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and that such tithes or tithe rent-charges and all our estate and interest therein, shall accordingly, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred and secured to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district of Dylife so soon as he shall be appointed, and shall become absolutely vested in and form the endowment of such minister or perpetual curate for the time being.

And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district and new parish so recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, shall be assigned to and absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, and his successors, bishops of Saint Asaph.

And we further recommend and propose, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the second and third Schedules hereunto annexed, which formerly belonged to the said sinecure rectories of Darowen and Llanbrynmair respectively, and also arise out of or upon lands situate within the said parishes of Darowen and Llanbrynmair respectively, and are so vested in us as aforesaid, together with all our estate and interest therein, shall in like manner and upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, that the tithes or tithe rent-charges described in the said second Schedule shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the Reverend David Parry, incumbent of the vicarage of Darowen, and his successors, incumbents of the same benefice; and that the tithes or tithe rent-charges described in the said third Schedule shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the Reverend John William Kirkham, incumbent of the vicarage of Llanbrynmair, and his successors, incumbents of the same benefice; and that such last-mentioned tithes or tithe rent-charges so to be vested in the said John William Kirkham, and his successors as aforesaid, shall, with the consent of the said John William Kirkham testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, be and be deemed to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of seventy pounds now payable by us to the incumbent of the said vicarage of Llanbrynmair under the provisions of a scheme prepared and laid before your Majesty in Council by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, bearing date the nineteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six.

And we further recommend and propose, that by the like authority, and upon and from the date of the gazetting of any Order ratifying this scheme as aforesaid, the said vicarages of Darowen and Llanbrynmair shall be respectively constituted and shall become and be and be deemed to be rectories, and that the incumbents thereof for the time being shall be the rectors of the said benefices, and as such rectors shall be entitled to receive and enjoy the respective grants hereby recommended to be made payable, together with all other endowments and emoluments whatsoever now belonging to the said vicarages respectively, and shall likewise have and enjoy all rights and privileges now appertaining to the same.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”
