

those whom the eagerness of Plunder had scattered, He marched back towards *Segedin*, but had not marched far, when the Enemy began to appear again, upon which the Imperialists made an halt, and put themselves in Battalia, the *Turks* and *Tartars* advanced, and charged them, whereupon a Fight ensued between them of above two hours. The *Turks* (who were 12000 strong, besides the *Tartars*) seeing the Courage and Resolution of the Christians, retreated, to draw them under the Fire of their Cannon, which they had left with 600 *Fanisaries* at some distance from the place of Fight; The *Imperialists* following the Enemy accordingly, were saluted with 12 pieces of Cannon, but not at all discouraged thereat, they pressed on, beat the *Fanisaries* from their Cannon, and put the Enemies whole Body to flight; General *Veterani* did not think fit to pursue them, and returned the 21st into the Imperial Camp before *Segedin* with 12 pieces of Cannon, a great deal of Baggage, many Standards, 3000 Horses, and a great many Mules and Camels taken from the Enemy, of whom above 3000 were slain, and that with little loss on the side of the Christians. The 22^d, General *Walvis* caused *Te Deum* to be sung in the Camp for this Victory, which was followed with a discharge of all the Cannon, and other publick declarations of joy; by which the Besieged understanding the defeat of the Success they expected, they began to Capitulate; and having it afterwards confirmed by some Prisoners that were taken, they agreed to surrender the Place, upon condition that they should be conducted with what they could carry to *Temeswager*; The Town was the next day surrendered to the Imperialists, who found it in a condition to have supported a longer Siege. On Tuesday last arrived here an Express from Prince *Louis* of *Baden*, with an account, that the Castle of *Five Churches*, was surrendered the 22nd instant at Discretion; That the *Bassa* and 2000 *Turks* were made Prisoners of War, but that the Women and Children were conducted to *Valpo* on the other side of the *Drave*. This Express adds, that the Prince of *Baden* having put 4000 men into the Town and Castle, and given the necessary orders for the repairing the Fortifications, had taken his march towards the Bridge of *Esfcke*. The Duke of *Lorraine* returned hither two days ago from *Hungary*.

Ratisbonne, Octob. 31. The States of the Empire assembled here have, after divers Debates, made choice of this place for the Conference that is to be held with the Plenipotentiaries of the Crown of *France* for the settling the Limits, in pursuance of the late Treaty of Truce.

Hamburgh, Novemb. 8. The last Letters from *Postdam* told us, That the Elector of *Brandenburgh* had ordered several Regiments to march towards *Cleves*, to reinforce his Garisons on that side; And that his Electoral Highness was under some Indisposition, which obliged him to keep his Chamber. The freshest Advices from *Poland* say, That the Army of that Crown not being able to subsist any longer in *Moldavia*, was marching back towards the Frontiers of *Poland*; where the Ambassadors of *Moscow* were expecting the King's return.

Cologne, Octob. 29. Our Elector has summoned the States of this Diocess to meet the 7th of the next month at *Bonne*. The States of the Dutchy of *Cleves* and the Contry of *Marke* have been assembled since the 26th of this month; The Elector of *Brandenburgh* has demanded a Supply of them towards the maintaining the Forces he is obliged to keep on foot. Count *Ferdinand de Furstenberg* is returned from *Leige*, whither he went to compliment the Cardinal of *Furstenberg* his Uncle upon his Promotion.

Hague, Novemb. 12. The States of *Holland* are to meet to morrow; The first business they will enter upon, is the settling the State of the War for the year ensuing. The Deputies of the respective Admiralties; and those of the *East-India* Company are expected here at the same time to confer with the Deputies of the said States. The Heer *Van Amerongen* parted from hence this morning for *Utrecht*, to be present in the Assembly of the States of that Province. The Heer *Vin Dieft*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, is expected here to morrow from *Cleves*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 31 of the last month, do not only confirm the News of the taking of *Segedin*, and the defeat of the *Turks* and *Tartars* that came to relieve it, but give an account of the Surrender of *Five Churches* at discretion; And of the march of Prince *Louis* of *Baden* to burn the Bridge of *Esfcke*.
