- be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented, and except also in such of the old footpaths therein as may no longer be required, provided that no ground which has been already buried in be opened for interments.
- DUKINFIELD, and that part of the town of STALEYBRIDGE which is in Dukinfield Township, Cheshire .- It is hereby ordered that in no burial-ground (with the exception of family vaults and graves) shall more than one body be buried in each grave, and that no grave be opened within five yards of any dwelling-house or That burials be forthwith disconschool. tinued bencath Grosvenor-street Chapel, Staleybridge, also in the Roman Catholic Burial-ground, Dukinfield; in Providence Chapel Old Burial-ground, Dukinfield; in the Wesleyan Chapel Burial-ground, Caroline-street, Staleybridge; and in Holy Trinity Churchyard, Staleybridge. That from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, burials be wholly discontinued in the burial-grounds of the following chapels and churches, viz., the Methodist New Connexion Chapel, Dukinfield; Provi-dence Chapel New Burial-ground, Dukin-field; the Primitive Methodist Chapel, Dukinfield; the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, Dukinfield; St. John's Church, Dukinfield; the Independent Chapel, Stalcybridge; the Roman Cotholic Chapel, Staleybridge; the Particular Baptist Chapel, the Primitive Methodist Chapel, Cross Leach-street, Staleybridge; and Grosvenor-street Chapel, Staleybridge. That in the burial-grounds of the Moravian Chapel, the Presbyterian Chapel, and the Unitarian Old Chapel, Dukinfield, in the case of family graves, a layer of earth, eighteen inches in thickness at least, shall be left between each of the coffins interred therein; and that no interment shall take place in any grave without a covering of earth four feet in thickness at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground.
- ABINGDON. Beneath St. Helens Church, beneath the Independent Chapel and Vestry, and in the burial-grounds of the same in St. Helen's parish; beneath St. Nicholas Church, and (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves, which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented) in the ancient part of St Helen's Churchyard, and in the new part within three yards of all buildings; in the Baptist Burial-ground, St. Helens, within three yards of all buildings; and in St. Nicholas Churchyard: and from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, wholly in St. Helen's Churchyard and the Baptist Burial-ground, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves, which shall be used on the conditions above specified.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An "Act further to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may scem fit ;

- In the parish churchyard, and in the burialgrounds of the Independent and Wesleyan Chapels, ALTON, Hants, from the first of June to the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six; In the burial-ground of the Baptist Chapel,
- In the burial-ground of the Baptist Chapel, ASHFORD, Kent, from the first of September next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, provided that only one body be buried in each grave, that no grave be re-opened, and that every grave be made six feet deep at the least;
- In the parish churchyard of AYLSHAM, from the first of June to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six ;
- In the parish churchyard of St. Peter, BENG-WORTH, from the first of June to the twentyninth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six; In the churchyard of the parish of BERKELEY,
- In the churchyard of the parish of BERKELEY, from the fifth of May to the fifth of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six ;
- In the parish churchyard of BERWICK-UPON-TWEED, from the thirtieth of June to the thirty-first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the parish churchyard of BoLTON, in the county of Lancaster, and in the churchyards of St. George, the Hoiy Trinity, All Saints, Christ Church, and Emmanuel Church, and in the burial-grounds of the following chapels, namely the Baptist Chapel Moor-lane, the Wesleyan Chapel Bridge-street, the Wesleyan Chapel Bridge-street, the Roman Catholic Chapel St. Peter and St. Paul Pilkington-street, the Independent Chapel Mawdsley-street, Albert-place Chapel, the Independent Methodist Chapel Fold's-road, the Primitive Methodist Chapel Higher Bridge-street, the Unitarian Chapel Deansgate, and the Refugee Chapel Hauoverstreet, in the Ridgway Gates Wesleyan Burial-ground, and in the Quakers' Burialground, all in the said borough of Bolton, from the first of July next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;
- In the churchyard of the parish of BOWNESS-ON-WINDERMERE, from the first of May to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six ;
- In the parish churchyard of BRADFORD, in the county of Wilts, and in the burial-grounds of the Baptist Chapel, Zion Chapel, the Wes-
