Legborne, Odob. 25. Y a Veffel arrived this week from the Levant, we have Letters of the 18th of September from Constantinople, which fay, that on the 11th an Express arrived there with the News of the Surrender of Napoli di Romania, and the Defeat of the Serafquier, who attempted to relieve it: That the 13th an Olac or Messenger arrived from Hungary, and the day following another, with that of the taking of Buds by Aflault; And though all poffible care was taken to conceal this ill News, yet it quickly got abroad, and ipread a Confternation among all forts of People, that cannot be expressed. The Galhes and Galiots which our great Duke feat to the Affiltance of the Venetianthis Summer are returned from the Levans, but & Bark, having on Board Captain Sebo ini and 60 Soldiers, which was feparated from them in bad weather is not yet arrived; And it's feared the may be fallen into the hands of the Corfairs of Barbary.

Genous, Octob. 28. The Gally of this Republick, which forved in the Levant with the Pope's Squadron, is returned hither, the Captain having been prefented by his Holmes's Order with a Medal of Gold to the value of 300 Pistols; The inferior Officers had likewife Medals of a leffer value. The Senate have, it's faid, commanded a general Review to be made of all their Garifons in order to the making fome Reform. We have advice that the Pyrats have lately taken a Barque that was going from hence to the lile of Cor-The Senate have given the Governfica. ment of that Island to Signior Agoltino di Franchi, who is accordingly upon his departure thither.

I conce, N-vemb, 2. This week failed feveral Veffels with Provisions, and the new raifed Men which lately arrived at the Lido, for the M reas And another Convoy is preparing, which will be ready in few days. The Senate having refolved to raife feveral new Regiments against the next Campagne, they have begun to give out Committions

•for that purpole. We have Advice from Dalmatia, That the Proveditor-General Cornaro continued at Spalatro, to observe the Enemy, who seemed to have some defign in hand.

Sambor, Octob 22. We have not yet received a particular Relation of the Victory which the Forses of this Crown obtained the 4th of this month against the Turks and Tartars; And it's feared the Courier that was fent with it, is fallen into the hands of the Tartars of Cammiec, who are continually abroad in finall Parties, and have of late ta-, ken feveral Prifaners; In the mean time we have Advice that the Army is come back to Sniary, and that the Forces are going to feparate, to enter into their Winter-quarters.

Dantrick, Nov. 6. The laft letters from Poland, tell us that the Campagne was ended on that fide; that the Forces were going into their winter quarters, and that the King was on his return to Sambor. Its faid that his Majeity has refolved to call a Dyet to meet at Warfing about the middle of January. They write from Molcovy, that the Czars will have a great. Army in the Field the next Summer against the Tartars.

Copenhagen, Novemb, 1. The King of Denmark has, fince his return hither from Holitein, fent the Sieur de Leliencroon to Vienna, and the Count de Reventian to the Court of France; It is faid that his Majefty intends to make fome new Levies, and to have a confiderable Squadron of Ships, at Sea in the Spring.

Ratubanue, New II. The feveral Colledges of the Dyet have, upon the Memorials of the Deputies of Mecklenburg and Laurenburg, complaining that those Countries are charged by some of the Neighbouring Princes with Quarters for their Troops, contrary to the Conflictutions of the Empire, resolved humbly to represent the fame to the Emperor, and to pray his Imperial Majeffy to give fuch Orders thereupon, that not only the Countries abovementioned, but all the other States of the Empire, which lie at present under the like burthen, may be forthwith freed from it, without being obliged to give any money in lier thereof. We are told from Municke, that above 2000 Turkes Prifoners had been bronght thither, many of which were Officers and perfons of fome confideration among the Turks. The laft Letters from *yiemul* are of the feventh inflant they given an account of the furrender of Sycios and of the march of the Prince of Baden towards the Bridge of Effecke: These are fome advices which fay the Turks had upon the approach of the Imperiabilis abandoned the Forthes of Darda, and burnt part of the faid Bridge; which we hope our next will confirm.

Struburgh, Novemb. 4. The Sieur des Vauhan, Ingenier General of France, arrived here

here the goth of the last month from Lux-"emburgh, having in his way hither visited Longwi, Saar-Louis, Humburgh, Bith, Laudan, and Haguenam, and the 1st Instant he parted again from hence to visit Schleftadt, Brifac, and Friburg. Yefterday arrived here Lieutenant-General Monclar, to take a review of this Garifon. Two Battalions marched from hence fome days ago, who will be followed by two more, to work, as we are told, on a new Fort, which is going to be built on the Rbine near Lauterburg.

Hamburgh, Novemb. 15. The Letters from Stockholme of the 26th past tell us, That the States of that Kingdom, which had been allembled there, were separated, after having granted the King of Sueden very large Supplies for the maintaining his Forces, as well by Sea as Land, and for the difcharging the Debts of the Crown. The Corps of the late Burgermaster Schluter, who dyed in Prison, was buried on Saturday last without any manner of Ceremony. The Imperial and Luuenburgh Ministers reliding here, are very well fatisfied with the Election of the Burgermaster Van Meurer; who, we told you in our last, was chosen into the Vacancy, occasioned by the Death of the faid Van Schluter.

Culorne, Novemb. 12. The Elector Palatin has fent-one of his Officers to Bonne, to demand of our Elector the Inveiture of the Caftle of Stalech, fcituated near Bacharach, which depends on this Arch-bifhoprick. The Imperial Sub-Commiffioners have condemned the late Magistrates to pay a confiderable Sum of Money for their misbehavior during their Magistracy. The Elector of Bran-denburgh has demanded of the States of the Dutchy of Cleves, and the County of Marke, altembled at Cleves, a Supply of 220 thousand Ryx Dollars for the Subliftence of his Troops. There are Letters from Hungary, which fay, that the Iniperial Troops on the Theyffe were gone to attack Gyula, though it's more probable, confidering the prefent Seafon as well as the Strength of that place, which is in a condition to fland out a long Siege, that they will leave that Enterprize to a more favourable time, and betake themfelves to their Winter-Quarters. They write from Vienna, that feveral Officers had already received their Money to make their Recruits.

Westminster, Nov. 16. Samuel Jobnson. who was Convicted the last Term upon an Information of High Misdemeanor, for Writing and Publishing two most fcandalous and feditious Libels, to ftir up His Majesties Subjects to Rebellion, being this day brought to the Kings Bench-Bar, and Mr. Attorney General moving for Judgment against him, the Court awarded Judgment as followeth; That he stand in the Fillory on Monday next at Westminster; Wednesday following at Charing-cross; And ł

the Monday after at the Royal Exchange That be pay a Fine of 500 Marks; And that he be Whipt from Newgate to Tyburn.

He will be degraded before the execution of this Sentence.

Mr. Attorney General moving likewife for Judgment against Edward Whitaker, who was Convicted in Easter Term 1682, for justifying the Rebellion of Forty One, and the Murder of the Bleffed Martyr King C HARLES I. who having fled for the fame, has abfconded ever fince. The Court adjudged him to pay a Fine of 1000 Marks, and to remain in Prison, when taken, till the fame be paid.
