Leghorne, Octob. 25.

BY a Vessel arrived this week from the Levant, we have Letters of the 18th of September from Constantinople, which say, that on the 11th an Express arrived there with the News of the Surrender of *Napoli di Romania*, and the Defeat of the Serasquier, who attempted to relieve it: That the 13th an Olac or Messenger arrived from Hungary, and the day following another, with that of the taking of *Buda* by Assault; And though all possible care was taken to conceal this ill News, yet it quickly got abroad, and spread a Consternation among all sorts of People, that cannot be expressed. The Gallies and Galiors which our great Duke sent to the Assistance of the Venetians this Summer, are returned from the Levant, but a Bark, having on Board Captain *Sebini* and 60 Soldiers, which was separated from them in bad weather is not yet arrived; And it's feared she may be fallen into the hands of the Corsairs of *Barbary*.

Genova, Octob. 28. The Gally of this Republick, which served in the Levant with the Pope's Squadron, is returned hither, the Captain having been presented by his Holiness's Order with a Medal of Gold to the value of 300 Pistols; The inferior Officers had likewise Medals of a lesser value. The Senate have, it's said, commanded a general Review to be made of all their Garisons in order to the making some Reform. We have advice that the Pyrats have lately taken a Barque that was going from hence to the Isle of *Corsica*. The Senate have given the Government of that Island to Signior *Agostino di Franodi*, who is accordingly upon his departure thither.

Lenze, Novemb. 2. This week sailed several Vessels with Provisions, and the new raised Men which lately arrived at the *Lido*, for the *Mrea*; And another Convoy is preparing, which will be ready in few days. The Senate having resolved to raise several new Regiments against the next Campaign, they have begun to give out Commissions

for that purpose. We have Advice from *Dalmatia*, That the Proveditor-General *Cornaro* continued at *Spalatro*, to observe the Enemy, who seemed to have some design in hand.

Sambor, Octob. 22. We have not yet received a particular Relation of the Victory which the Forces of this Crown obtained the 4th of this month against the *Turks* and *Tartars*; And it's feared the Courier that was sent with it, is fallen into the hands of the *Tartars* of *Camniec*, who are continually abroad in small Parties, and have of late taken several Prisoners; In the mean time we have Advice that the Army is come back to *Sniatym*, and that the Forces are going to separate, to enter into their Winter-quarters.

Danzick, Nov. 6. The last letters from *Poland*, tell us that the Campaign was ended on that side; that the Forces were going into their winter quarters, and that the King was on his return to *Sambor*. It's said that his Majesty has resolved to call a Dyet to meet at *Warsaw* about the middle of *January*. They write from *Moscow*, that the *Czars* will have a great Army in the Field the next Summer against the *Tartars*.

Copenhagen, Novemb. 1. The King of *Denmark* has, since his return hither from *Holstein*, sent the *Sieur de Leliencroon* to *Vienna*, and the Count *de Reventan* to the Court of *France*; It is said that his Majesty intends to make some new Levies, and to have a considerable Squadron of Ships, at Sea in the Spring.

Ratubonne, Nov. 11. The several Colledges of the Dyet have, upon the Memorials of the Deputies of *Mecklenburg* and *Lawenborg*, complaining that those Countries are charged by some of the Neighbouring Princes with Quarters for their Troops, contrary to the Constitutions of the Empire, resolved humbly to represent the same to the Emperor, and to pray his Imperial Majesty to give such Orders thereupon, that not only the Countries above-mentioned, but all the other States of the Empire, which lie at present under the like burthen, may be forthwith freed from it, without being obliged to give any money in lieu thereof. We are told from *Municke*, that above 200 *Turkish* Prisoners had been brought thither, many of which were Officers and persons of some consideration among the *Turks*. The last Letters from *Vienna* are of the seventh instant they given an account of the surrender of *Sybor* and of the march of the Prince of *Baden* towards the Bridge of *Essecke*. These are some advices which say the *Turks* had upon the approach of the Imperialists abandoned the Fortress of *Darda*, and burnt part of the said Bridge; which we hope our next will confirm.

Strasbourg, Novemb. 4. The *Sieur de Vauban*, Ingenier General of *France*, arrived here

here the 30th of the last month from *Luxemburg*, having in his way hither visited *Longwi, Saar-Louis, Humberg, Bich, Landau,* and *Haguenaw*, and the 1st Instant he parted again from hence to visit *Schlestadt, Brisac,* and *Friburg*. Yesterday arrived here Lieutenant-General *Monclar*, to take a review of this Garrison. Two Battalions marched from hence some days ago, who will be followed by two more, to work, as we are told, on a new Fort, which is going to be built on the *Rbine* near *Lauterburg*.

Hamburg, Novemb. 15. The Letters from *Stockholme* of the 26th past tell us, That the States of that Kingdom, which had been assembled there, were separated, after having granted the King of *Sueden* very large Supplies for the maintaining his Forces, as well by Sea as Land, and for the discharging the Debts of the Crown. The Corps of the late *Burgermaster Schluter*, who dyed in Prison, was buried on *Saturday* last without any manner of Ceremony. The *Imperial* and *Luxemburg* Ministers residing here, are very well satisfied with the Election of the *Burgermaster Van Meurer*; who, we told you in our last, was chosen into the Vacancy, occasioned by the Death of the said *Van Schluter*.

Cologne, Novemb. 12. The Elector Palatin has sent one of his Officers to *Bonne*, to demand of our Elector the Investiture of the Castle of *Stalech*, situated near *Bacharach*, which depends on this Archbishoprick. The *Imperial* Sub-Commissioners have condemned the late Magistrates to pay a considerable Sum of Money for their misbehavior during their Magistracy. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has demanded of the States of the *Dutchy of Cleves*, and the County of *Marke*, assembled at *Cleves*, a Supply of 220 thousand *Ryx Dollars* for the Subsistence of his Troops. There are Letters from *Hungary*, which say, that the *Imperial* Troops on the *Theisse* were gone to attack *Gyula*, though it's more probable, considering the present Season as well as the Strength of that place, which is in a condition to stand out a long Siege, that they will leave that Enterprize to a more favourable time, and betake themselves to their Winter-Quarters. They write from *Vicna*, that several Officers had already received their Money to make their Recruits.

Westminster, Nov. 16. *Samuel Johnson*, who was Convicted the last Term upon an Information of *High Misdemeanor*, for Writing and Publishing two most scandalous and seditious Libels, to stir up His Majesties Subjects to Rebellion, being this day brought to the *Kings Bench-Bar*, and *Mr. Attorney General* moving for Judgment against him, the Court awarded Judgment as followeth; That he stand in the Pillory on Monday next at Westminster; Wednesday following at Charing-crofs; And

the Monday after at the Royal Exchange That he pay a Fine of 500 Marks; And that he be Whipt from Newgate to Tyburn.

He will be degraded before the execution of this Sentence.

Mr. Attorney General moving likewise for Judgment against *Edward Whitaker*, who was convicted in *Easter Term 1682*, for justifying the Rebellion of *Forty One*, and the Murder of the Blessed Martyr King *CHARLES I.* who having fled for the same, has absconded ever since. The Court adjudged him to pay a Fine of 1000 Marks, and to remain in Prison, when taken, till the same be paid.
