[The following Order in Council is substituted for an Order relating to the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," which appeared in the Gazette of the 5th August, 1856.]

**A**T the Court at *Osborne House, Isle of Wight*, the 28th day of *July*, 1856,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories of any Foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to a subject of such Power, when within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty, that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories belonging to the Republic of Chile :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to citizens of the Republic of Chile, within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships: Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters'

Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is further pleased to order and declare, that upon and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, the Order in Council relating to seamen who desert from merchant ships belonging to citizens of the Republic of Chile, made by virtue of the said Act, on the twenty-fifth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and which was published in the London Gazette on the seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall be revoked, and the same is hereby revoked accordingly.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, in pursuance of the fourth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act concerning hanns and marriages in certain district churches or chapels," have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following, viz. :

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, beg leave humbly to represent that on or about the twenty-second day of October, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, your Majesty's said Commissioners (with the consent signified under hand and seal of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas, Bishop of the diocese of Ripon) made a representation to your Majesty in Council, that it appeared to them to be expedient and they therefore humbly prayed that particular districts should be assigned to the Consecrated Churches of All Saints at Paddock, Saint John at Golcar, Saint Mark at Longwood, and Saint Stephen at Lindley, all in the parish of Hudders-

field, in the county of York, and in the said diocese of Ripon, under and by virtue of power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and that such proposed districts should be named or called 'The Chapelry District of Paddock,' 'The Chapelry District of Golcar,' 'The Chapelry District of Longwood,' and 'The Chapelry District of Lindley,' and that the boundaries thereof respectively should be such as were mentioned or described in the said representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners also represented, that it appeared to them to be expedient, that baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said churches at Paddock, Golcar, Longwood and Lindley, and that the fees to arise therefrom, should be equally divided between the respective ministers or incumbents of each of the four first mentioned churches, and the vicar of the said parish of Huddersfield for the time being.

"That by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, your Majesty was graciously pleased, by and with the advice of your Privy Council, to approve of the assignment of the said districts, and to order that the same should be accordingly made, and also that the recommendations of your Majesty's said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms, churchings and burials, and of the fees arising therefrom, should be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said chapelry districts of Paddock, Golcar, Longwood and Lindley, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that banns of marriage should hereafter be published, and that marriages should hereafter be solemnized in the said churches of All Saints Paddock, Saint John Golcar, Saint Mark Longwood, and Saint Stephen Lindley, and that the fees, dues, offerings and other emoluments to arise therefrom, should be received by the respective ministers or incumbents of the said four last named churches for the time being, on account of, and paid over to, the Reverend Samuel Holmes, now Vicar and Incumbent of the said parish, and parish church of Huddersfield, during his incumbency thereof, and that upon his avoidance of such incumbency, the said fees, dues, offerings and other emoluments, should belong to the respective ministers or incumbents for the time being, of the said churches of All Saints Paddock, Saint John Golcar, Saint Mark Longwood and Saint Stephen Lindley, and that a supplemental order for such purpose should be made pursuant to the provisions of the fourth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act concerning banns and marriages in certain district churches or chapels,' and of all other powers in that respect contained in the Church Building Acts.

"That the consent of the said Charles Thomas, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony

whereof, he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is by this Supplemental Order in Council ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages in the said consecrated churches of All Saints Paddock, Saint John Golcar, Saint Mark Longwood, and Saint Stephen Lindley, in the parish of Huddersfield, and in respect of the fees, dues, offerings, and other emoluments to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Supplemental Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.
