And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by an Order in Council, of the ninth day of March, one

thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to order that the said Act should be put in force in the counties and places therein specified, and the same was put in force accordingly:

And whereas by certain other Acts made and passed in the thirteenth, in the fourteenth, in the sixteenth, and in the twentieth years of the reign of Her Majesty, the provisions of the said recited Act have been amended and extended:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by a further Order in Council, of the fourth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, to order that the County Court of Berkshire, known by the name of "The County Court of Berkshire holden at Reading," should be held at Henley-on-Thames, as well as at Reading, and that the County Court of Somersetshire, known by the name of "The County Court of Somersetshire holden at Weston-super-Mare," should be held at Axbridge, as well as at Weston-super-Mare, and the same was put in force accordingly:

Her Majesty having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the twenty-fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six—

That the parishes of Henley-on-Thames, Rotherfield Grays, Rotherfield Peppard, Harpsden, Shiplake, Remenham, Fawley, Hambledon, Medmenham, Bix, Pishill, Swincombe, Pirton, Watlington, Nettlebed, Hurley, and Wargrave, now in the district of the County Court of Berkshire, holden at Reading, shall cease to be within the district of the said Court holden at Reading, and shall form the district of a County Court of Oxfordshire, to be holden at Henley-on-Thames, and a County Court for the purposes of the above mentioned Acts shall accordingly, from and after

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Anne, Westminster, in the county of Middlesex, and diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary the Virgin, situate in Crown-street, in the said parish of Saint Anne, Westminster, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose, contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render

'more effectual an Act passed in the last session 'of Parliament, for building and promoting the 'building of additional churches in populous 'parishes,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District 'Chapelry of Saint Mary, Crown-street, 'Soho, Westminster,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Saint Mary, Crownstreet, Soho, Westminster, is bounded on the north, by the parish of Saint Marylebone, on the east, by the parish of Saint Giles-in-the-fields, on the south-east, and partly on the south, by the parish of Saint Martin-in-the-fields, and on other part of the south and west, by the remaining part of the said parish of Saint Anne, Westminster, from which the said district chapelry is separated by a line commencing in the middle of Castlestreet, opposite to Little Newport-street, and from thence proceeding north-westerly and northerly along the middle of Little Newport-street to the southern end of Hayes-court, then northerly along the middle of that court, and across King-street into Grafton-street, and along the middle of that street into Soho-square, then along the middle of the carriage way on the eastern side of that square, to the northern side thereof, then westerly along such carriage way as far as Charles-street, then northerly along the middle of Charles-street, into the middle of Oxford-street, to the boundary line separating the said parish of Saint Anne, Westminster from the parish of Saint Marylebone, as the said district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Mary, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a particular district to the consecrated church of Saint Mary the Virgin, situate in Crown-street, in the parish of Saint Mary, Chapelry of Saint Mary, Crown-street, "Soho, Westminster, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms and churchings, in the said church, and in respect of

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Hampstead, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Saviour, situate at Haverstock Hill, in the said parish of Hampstead, under the power for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual 'an Act, passed in the last session of Parlia-'ment, for building and promoting the build-'ing of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to 'make better provision for the assignment of 'Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels 'augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of ' Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed District should be named 'THE DISTRICT CHAPELRY OF SAINT SAVIOUR, SOUTH HAMPSTEAD,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Saint Saviour, South Hampstead, is bounded on the east and south-east by the parish of Saint Pancras, on the south by the parish of Saint Marylebone, as far as Queen'sroad, Avenue-road, on the west, north-west, and north by the remaining part of the parish of Hampstead, from which such district chapelry is separated by a line commencing in the middle of Queen's-road, and proceeding from the boundaryline of the said parishes of Hampstead and Saint Marylebone, north-easterly, along the middle of State for Foreign Affairs.


Cape Race Light, Newfoundland
