

With their Cannon, the 20th they had made a breach and began three Mines; and it was resolv'd in case they succeeded, to give an Assault, for which all things were accordingly disposed. The Prince of Baden summoned the Besieged, threatening not to give them any Quarter if they did not immediately Surrender; They returned no answer that day, but the next Morning by a Letter, desired some Person might be sent to them. Hostages were demanded of them, and the 22d, an Aga with another Officer came into the Camp, and at the same time two Officers were sent into the place. The Aga Declared, he had no power to Treat, but only to hear what Conditions would be granted them; he was answered, that they must Surrender at discretion; To which the Besieged at last submitted, wanting Ammunition, but desired that their Wives, Children, and Christian Slaves might be sent to the neighboring places, under the Obedience of the Grand Signior; This was refused, and the Bassa and the whole Garrison were made prisoners of War, and the Inhabitants conducted to several places in *Syria*; The Prince of Baden having put a Garrison into the place, divided his Forces into two Bodies; With one he marched himself towards *Darda*, and the Count de *Scheffenberg* advanced with the other to *Sycol*; In his march he understood that the *Turks* had removed their best Goods from thence to *Darda*; The 25th the Count de *Scheffenberg* arrived before the place, and sent a Summons to the *Turks*, who were retired into the Castle; but they answered, That they were resolv'd to defend themselves; The next day the *Imperialists* began their Attack against the Castle, which they continued till the 31st, with that success, that their Mines being ready to spring, the Besieged Surrendered at discretion: The Garrison were made prisoners, and the Women and Children were conducted to other places; The *Imperialists* host in the Siege 309 Men, of which number was the Lieutenant-Colonel of *Scheffenberg*, with some other Officers of inferior rank. After the taking of *Sycol*, the Count de *Scheffenberg* marched to rejoin the Prince of Baden; Two Batta's were posted with 3000 Horse near *Darda*, to cover that Fortress; but upon the first Notice of the approach of the *Imperial* Forces, they retired in great disorder upon which the *Turks* abandoned *Darda*; and the *Imperialists* advancing, burnt the Bridge of *Essecke*, as we have already told you.

*Munich*, Nov. 13. Their Electoral Highnesses of *Bavaria* returned hither the 5th Instant from *Venna*; They made their entrance into this City with much Solemnity. The Elector has given Orders for the recruiting his Troops that served in *Hungary* this Campaign. d 11 1

*Hamburg*, Nov. 29. We are told from *Zell* that General *Quoyet* was gone to take a Review of the Forces of *Lunenburgh*, in their respective Garrisons. And that those Princes intend to raise some new Troops against *Spring*.

*Cologne*, Nov. 23. The Bishop of *Strasbourg*, now Cardinal of *Furstberg* is still at *Bonn*, and will continue there till the States of this Archbishoprick separate.

*Hague*, Decemb. 7. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 21st, and 24th past, confirm the news of the burning of the Bridge of *Essecke* by the *Imperialists*, and give withal an account, That the Prince of *Baden* had after an attack of several days, and with the loss of about 200 Men, taken *Capotuar*,

which was Surrendered the 12th of the last Month, the Garrison marching out according to the Capitulation, with Bag and Baggage, and were conducted to *Sycol*: The *Imperialists* found in the place 24 pieces of Cannon; after which the Prince of *Baden* sent his Troops to their Winter Quarters.
