WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in "populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for "the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to "churches or chapels augmented by the Governors "of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other "purposes," have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation bearing date the eleventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following, viz. :—

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Milton-next-Gravesend, in the county of Kent, and diocese of Rochester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate in the said parish of Milton-next-Gravesend, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named "The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Milton," and and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :

"The said district chapelry is bounded by a

line commencing in the middle of the road at the western-end of King-street, where the boundary line separating the parishes of Milton and Gravesend meet, and proceeds southerly along such boundary line as far as the old London-road, and then proceeds easterly along the middle of that road as far as Parrock-lane, it then proceeds in a northerly direction along the middle of Parrock-lane and Parrock-street, as far as the boundary fence of Christ Church, round which said fence it proceeds and reaches Love-lane, and then proceeds northerly along the middle of Love-lane into the Milton-road ; it then turns westerly, and proceeds along the middle of that road and King-street to the point where the boundary line commenced, as such district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend George, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken, the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a particular district to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate in the parish of Milton-next-Gravesend, in the diocese of Rochester, to be named "THE DISTRICT CHAPELRY OF CHRIST CHURCH, MILTON," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the

solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, in the said church, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into their consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Cradley, in the county and diocese of Hereford, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Storridge, in the said parish of Cradley, under the power and authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, at Storridge,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :

"The district is bounded on the north partly by the parish of Suckley, and partly by the chapelry of Alfrick, on the east by the parish of Leigh, on the south partly by the consolidated chapelry of Saint James, North-hill, and partly by the parish of Mathon, and on the west by the remaining part of the parish of Cradley, from which it is separated by a line commencing from Slippy Coppice, and proceeding northwardly along the middle of a bridle-road, as far as its junction with Tinker's-lane, being a distance of five-eighths of a mile, or thereabouts, from this point the

boundary-line continues along the middle of Tinker's-lane, in a westwardly direction, as far as the latter skirts the southern side of Whitman's-hill Wood, being a distance of eighteen chains, or thereabouts, from Tinker's-lane where it diverges from Whitman's-hill Wood, the boundary-line continues along the southern side of the same wood, and still in a westwardly direction, till it joins a small stream of water, being a distance of twelve chains, or thereabouts, throughout which the external boundary is a piece of land, part of the Lower Vinesend Estate; the boundary-line then proceeds along the last-mentioned stream as far as the turnpike-road leading from Worcester to Hereford, at a point called the Brookhouse, this being a distance of about a quarter of a mile; the boundary-line then crosses the turnpike-road, and continues about due north along a fence through land belonging to Thomas Summers, Esquire, till it joins a bridle-road being a distance of sixteen chains, or thereabouts; it then continues along the middle of the last-mentioned bridle-road to a house called Wildgoose Hill, being a distance of eighteen chains, or thereabouts; the boundary-line then makes a detour through land of Mrs. Archer (which here forms the boundary), so as to include this house in the district; and thence continues, in a northwardly direction, along the middle of an occupation road to where it joins a bridle-road, and from this point crossing the bridle-road the boundary continues about due north, along the western side of the Great Halesend Wood, which it skirts for a distance of about seven-eighths of a mile, as far as a meadow called Foxhole Meadow, part of the Halesend Estate, and being bounded on the west, between these two points by other part of the Halesend Estate aforesaid; the boundary line then turns at right angles, and runs about due west, skirting Bears Wood Common, as far as the parish road leading from the village of Cradley to Barrow Mills (but making a slight detour to include a house numbered 65, on the map), being a distance of nearly three-tenths of a mile; and from the point of junction with the road the boundary-line again turns northwards, curving so as to include Barrow Mills aforesaid, till it reaches Cradley Brook, at its junction with another small stream of water, being a distance of twelve chains, and reaches the parish of Suckley on the north, as the same district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon tinted yellow.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at Saint John's Church, Storridge aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such Church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Renn Dickson, Bishop of the said diocese of Hereford, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and

(No. 42.) NORTH AMERICA—WEST COAST.

Light on Cape Hancock, Columbia River.

THE United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of October, 1856, a light would be established on Cape Hancock, on the north side of the mouth of the Columbia River, Washington Territory.

The light is a fixed white light, of the first order, illuminating the entire horizon. It is placed at a height of 230 feet above the level of the sea; and should be visible, in clear weather, from the deck of a ship at a distance of 22 miles.

The light tower is whitewashed; it is 40 feet high, and stands on the pitch of the Cape, at about 190 feet above the sea. According to the United States Coast Survey it is in lat. $46^{\circ} 16' 35''$ N., long. $124^{\circ} 2'$ west of Greenwich. Variation of the compass $20^{\circ} 45'$ east in July, 1851.

A fog bell of 1,600lbs. weight has also been placed on the bluff in advance of the light tower, and will be sounded during foggy or thick weather, day and night, from the same date. The distinctive mode of striking the bell will be published hereafter. The machinery is in a frame building, on a level with the ground, with the front open to receive the bell, and is also white-washed.

(No. 43.) NORTH SEA—RIVER WESER.

Fixed Light on the Hohe Weg Flat.

THE Senate of the Free Hanse-Town of Bremen has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of December, 1856, a light will be established in a lighthouse recently erected in the place of the Bremen Beacon on the flat named Hohe Weg, at the entrance of the River Weser.

The light will be a fixed white light; the illuminating apparatus being a catadioptric lens of the second order. It is placed at a height of 112 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from the deck of a ship at a distance of 15 miles, and may therefore be seen from the first or outer buoy of the Weser, called the Schlüssel-*tonne* or Key buoy. The light will be only visible from N.W. by W. round northerly and easterly to south.

The lighthouse is an octagonal structure of brick on a stone basement, its whole elevation being about 120 feet; at a height of about 40 feet above the mean tide level it is surrounded by a terrace with an iron railing. It stands on the site of the old wooden Bremen Beacon, in lat. $53^{\circ} 42' 51''$ N., long. $8^{\circ} 14' 52''$ east of Greenwich. From the lighthouse the outer light vessel bears N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., and the church of Langwarden bears south.

On the day it is first lighted the inner light vessel will be removed from her station.

For the convenience of mariners entering the Weser, but by no means to induce them to neglect the use of the lead, a small white light will be

shown from the lighthouse at a height of 44 feet above the mean tide level, visible in clear weather at the distance of 7 miles. This light will disappear to those who are nearing too much the black buoy (or starboard side) on entering, near buoys H and J. To those entering the channel named the *Dwasgat*, the light will assume a reddish colour, in a line with the red buoy, and will disappear when they reach the line of the black W & A buoy. This low light will be only visible from N. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. round northerly to E. by S.

All bearings magnetic. Variation $18^{\circ} 0'$ W. in 1856; decreasing $6'$ yearly.

(No. 44.) NORTH SEA—ENTRANCE OF THE WESER.

Revolving Light on Wanger-Oog.

THE Government of Oldenburg has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of October, 1856, a light would be exhibited from the new tower recently erected near the eastern extremity of the Island of Wanger-Oog, on the west side of the entrance of the river Jade and Weser, instead of the old light on that island.

The light is revolving, showing a bright face once every two minutes, and is of the fourth order. It is placed at a height of 100 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible from the deck of a ship in ordinary weather at a distance of 12 miles.

The new tower stands in lat. $53^{\circ} 47' 26''$ N. long. $7^{\circ} 54' 14''$ east of Greenwich.

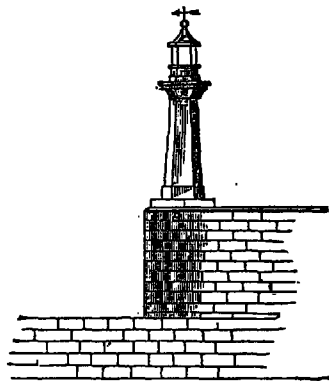

ARTICLE 2.—That a salary of one hundred pounds per annum shall be paid to the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in such behalf and this Order, by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish.

ARTICLE 3.—That the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual Feast days in the
