The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Arthur John Pack, Esquire, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Lieutenant-Colonel in Her Majesty's Army, and Assistant-Quartermaster-General to the Army in the Cork District, Her royal licence and authority that he and his issue may take and henceforth use the surname of Reynell, in addition to and before that of Pack.
