Benjamin Brock Jones (formerly Benjamin Brock the younger, he having in accordance with directions in the will of late Mr. William Jones taken the surname of Jones in addition to his previous names), who enlisted in the name of John Peters in the Land Transport Corps, stationed at Bristol, in the month of November, 1855,

formerly of the county of the borough of Carmarthen, Articled Clerk, and afterwards Attorney-at-Law and out of business, and staying at different times at No. 12, Cecil-street, Strand, No. 14, Bedford-square, No. 23, Cecil-street, Strand, Featherstone-buildings, Holborn, No. 2, Serjeant's-inn, Fleet-street, Grosvenor-street, King-street, St. James', the George Coffee-house, Strand, the Angel Hotel, St. Clement's, Strand, all in Middlesex, Stamford-street, Surrey, Danstephan, Carmarthenshire, No. 6, Albert-terrace, Paddington, Desborough-terrace, Harrow-road, and No. 12, Albert-terrace, Paddington, all in Middlesex, then a Prisoner for Debt in the Queen's Prison, Surrey, and afterwards lodging in the Southwark-bridge-road, Surrey, and No. 2, Storey's-gate, Westminster, and Walpole-street, Chelsea, both in Middlesex, and out of business, then of No. 45, Waverley-road, and No. 17, Alfred-road, both in Harrow-road, Middlesex, Clerk to the South Wales Railway Company, then a Prisoner for Debt in the Queen's Prison aforesaid, Surrey, afterwards staying at Danstephan aforesaid, Carmarthenshire, out of business; then of Sale-street, Paddington, out of business, and staying under the name of John Peters at the Goat, St. Phillips, Bristol, during a portion of the months of November and December, 1855, and late a Prisoner for Debt in the Debtors' Prison for London and Middlesex.

Sir Henry Chudleigh Oxenden, Baronet (sued as Sir Henry Chudley Oxenden, Baronet, and committed as Henry Chudley Oxenden), formerly of Broome Park, near Canterbury, Kent, then of Rock Gardens, Brighton, Sussex, then of the Queen's Prison, Southwark, Surrey, then of Montpellier Villas, Brighton aforesaid, then of Lower Phillimore-place, Kensington, Middlesex, then of The Cathedral Yard, Gloucester, and then of Weymouth, Dorsetshire, at all the aforesaid places of no occupation, then of Lexden, near Colchester, Essex, then of Addiscombe Villas, Croydon, Surrey, then of No. 8, Park-place, Upper Baker-street, Middlesex, Manager of The General Live Stock Insurance Company, No. 5, Waterloo-place, Pall Mall, Middlesex, and part of the said time Chairman and Director of The Universal Provident Life-Association, No. 52, King William-street, London, and then and now of No. 11, Abbey-place, Abbey-road, St. John's Wood, Middlesex, of no occupation.
