Her Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Most Noble Henry Pelham, Duke of Newcastle, to be Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the county of Nottingham, his Grace this day took the oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the oaths of allegiance and supremacy.

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS, by an Order of Her Majesty in Council "for the government of Her "Majesty's subjects, being within the dominions of "the Emperor of China, or being within any "ship or vessel at a distance of not more than a "hundred miles from the coast of China," bearing date the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, Her Majesty was pleased, amongst other things to order that if any party charged with an offence committed against the treaties, or rules and regulations therein referred to, should escape or remove from the consular district within which such offence was

committed, and should be found within another consular district, it should be lawful for the Consul within whose district the party should be found to proceed against him in the same manner as if the offence had been committed within such district: And whereas, in and by the said Order in Council, provision was made for the manner in which British subjects, convicted of crimes and offences committed within the dominions of the Emperor of China, or being required and being unable, or wilfully omitting, to give sufficient security to keep the peace, or to find security for their good behaviour, might be sent out of the dominions of the Emperor of China to the colony of Hong Kong, and also for the manner in which the expenses of so sending such persons to the said colony of Hong Kong should be defrayed: And whereas, it is expedient to make further provision in respect of the matters aforesaid:

I.—Now, therefore, in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament in the said Order in Council of the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, recited and referred to, and in execution of the powers thereby in Her Majesty in Council vested, Her Majesty is pleased, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and doth hereby order, that the Chief Superintendent or Consul within whose jurisdiction any party charged with having committed any offence against such treaties, or such rules or regulations as aforesaid, and who shall have escaped or removed from the consular district within which such offence was committed, shall be found, may lawfully, if such Chief Superintendent or Consul shall think fit, cause such party to be taken into custody, and sent back to the consular district from which he shall so have escaped or removed, to be there dealt with according to the provisions of the said Order in Council of the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fiftythree.

II.—And it is further ordered, that all removals whatsoever of prisoners or other parties from or to the said colony of Hong Kong, or from or to any port or place in China, under the authority of the said Order in Council of the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, shall be effected, and the expenses of all such removals shall be defrayed in like manner as by Articles 20, 21, 22, and 23, of the said Order in Council of the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, is provided with respect to the embarking, conveying, delivering, commitment, and expenses of persons deported under the authority of the said Articles respectively, so far as the provisions thereof respectively shall be applicable to the circumstances of each particular case.

III.—And it is further ordered, that this Order shall be read and construed with and as being a part of the said Order in Council of the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three.

IV.—And it is further ordered that this Order shall take effect from and after the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, and the Right Honourable Henry Labouchere, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the " burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning "the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstance may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following

modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-eighth of November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fourteenth of January last; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the

> BODVARI, FLINTSHIRE.—In the parish church and within three yards thereof, and in the rest of the churchyard, except in graves not less than five feet deep; and it is further ordered, that no grave previously buried in be reopened unless free from undecomposed remains, nor except to bury another of the

same family.

OLD.—In the parish church, and in Pont-blydden Chapel of Ease; and also (except in now existing family vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be imbedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an airtight manner) in the old part of the churchyard, and in the rest of churchyard, and in Pontblydden Chapelyard, except in vaults and walled graves used with the like precautions, and in other graves so far as is compatible with the following regulations, viz.: that one body only be buried in one grave; that no grave be reopened within fourteen years, except to bury another of the same family, in which case a layer of earth half a yard thick shall be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin; that no coffin be placed less than four feet below the surface; and that no new grave be within half a yard of any other grave.

Barnsley, in the Parish of Silkstone.—In the Roman Catholic Chapel, Barnsley, in the Primitive Methodist Chapel, Westgate, also in St. George's Burial-ground within six yards of the National School and Playground, and (with the exception of now existing brick graves) in all parts of the ground which have already been buried in; and it is also ordered, that, with the same exception, no grave be reopened; that from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves), burials be discontinued in the two churchyards of St. Mary, and in the burial grounds of Salem Chapel, the Roman Catholic Chapel, the Methodist New Connexion Chapel, and the Independent Chapel, Sheffield-road; that the now existing vaults and brick graves in all the above burialgrounds, and also the brick graves in St. George's Churchyard, be used on the following conditions; viz.: that when required they be used without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and that each coffin be imbedded in powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued with the following modifications, from and after the tenth day of this instant February (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows;

BASFORD, NOTTS. - In the parish church of Old Basford, and also (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each

coffin shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in an air-tight manner) in the following burial-grounds of Old Bas-ford, namely: in the Old Churchyard, and in the burial-grounds of the Methodist New Connexion Chapel, and of the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel; also in the following burial-grounds of New Basford, namely: in the burial-grounds of the Scotch Baptist Chapel, and of the General Baptist Chapel. And it is further ordered, that in no burialground in this parish shall any burial take place within five yards of any dwellinghouse or school, nor without a covering of four feet six inches of earth, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the general surface of the ground, and that, with the exception of family graves, only one body

be buried in each grave.

MANSFIELD. — In the parish church, in the Independent Chapel, the Baptist Chapel, the Unitarian Chapel, and in the Friends' Burial-ground, within three yards of all dwelling-houses; and from and after the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves), in the parish churchyard, and in the burial grounds of the Independent, Baptist, Unitarian, and Wesleyan Chapels. And it is further ordered, that the above-named vaults and brick graves be used only on the following conditions, viz.: that, when required, they be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in; that each coffin be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and that the only bodies interred be those of husbands, wives, parents, unmarried children, and brothers, and sisters of those already buried therein.

CAMPSALL, YORKSHIRE.—In the parish church Campsall, and from and after the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the churchyard.

ASKERN, YORKSHIRE. - In the parish churchyard of Askern within three yards of the walls of the church; and it is further ordered that burials be conducted in the rest of the said churchyard in accordance with the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th Official Regulations for New Burial-grounds.

WILLENHALL.—In the parish churchyard from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, except in now existing vaults and walled graves which can te opened without the disturbance of soil that has been buried in, in which each coffin shall be imbedded in powdered charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the "laws concerning the burial of the dead in "England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with

the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burialgrounds be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the Great Synagogue Jewish burial-ground, in the parish of St. Matthew, BETHNAL-GREEN, from the first of January to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of the parish of EYNESBURY, Hunts, from the first of February to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fity-seven;

In the parish churchyard of Godalming from the first of February, to the sixteenth of March, one thousand eight hundred and fiftyseven:

In the churchyard of the parish of HITCHIN, Herts, from the first of January to the twenty-fifth of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard, and in Ebenezer Chapel burial-ground, Mill End, near RICKMANS-WORTH, from the first of January to the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and

In the old churchyard of the parish of SARRATT, Herts, from the first of February to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyards of St. Giles and St. Mary, and in the burial-grounds of the Baptist and Independent Chapels, STONEY STRATFORD, from the thirty-first of January to the thirtyfirst of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eighteenth of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of the parish of ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE, from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and such time was afterwards extended to the first of October in that year, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the said churchyard of Ashton-under-Lyne be discontinued, except in graves never previously buried in, and except in family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet and a half without exposure of remains, provided no coffin be placed within a foot of any other coffin, unless buried in a vault or walled charcoal, and separately entombed in an airtight

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the twenty-fourth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, burials were directed to be discontinued, with certain exceptions therein mentioned, in the GENERAL CEMETERY in the old parish of BIRMINGHAM, from and after the sixth of October then next, and it was also thereby directed that from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, no grave but a family-grave should be re-opened in the said cemetery within a period of fourteen years, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the operation of the said Order, so far as it relates to the said General Cemetery in Birmingham, be postponed until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the twenty-ninth of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the old churchvard of the parish of Broadwater, Sussex, from and after the eighth of April then next, and it seems fit that so much of the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, in lieu thereof, that burials be discontinued in the said old churchyard, except in now existing vaults and

brick graves, provided that, when required, they be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and that each coffin be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work cemented in an airtight manner, and except in reserved earthern graves, provided they be opened without disturbing human remains,

and that no body be buried without a covering of four feet six-inches of earth.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the twenty-first of May one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, burials were directed to be discontinued as therein mentioned in the two parish churchyards, and in the burial-grounds of Ivend Chapel, the Friends' Chapel, Zion Chapel, the Union Chapel, and of the General Baptist Chapel, in CHATTERIS, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that the rights of burial in all the family vaults, catacombs, and brick graves, now existing in the said two churchyards (including those catacombs in the old churchyard not yet disposed of) and in the said burial-grounds, be reserved, provided that, when required, such vaults, catacombs, and brick graves, be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, that each coffin be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented.

And whereas by an Order in Council, of the eighth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty four, burials were directed to cease entirely from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the burial-ground attached to the church of Christchurch, in St. Clements, Norwich, and it seems fit that the said order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, in lieu thereof, that with the exception of family vaults and graves, only one body be buried in each grave, grave in which each coffin shall be embedded in and that, with the same exception, no grave be re-opened, and that from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, burials cease entirely in the said burial-ground attached to the church of Christchurch, in St.

Clements, Norwich.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the twenty-first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials were directed to be discontinued on and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the old and new churchyards of St. Chad, SHREWS-BURY, except as was therein excepted, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that the use of the eleven walled graves, hereinafter named, be permitted, subject to the conditions contained in the said Order of the twenty-first of August last, viz. ; -brich graves in the old churchyard belonging to Mrs. Susannah Parry, Mr. John Harrison, Miss Bowman, and Mr. John Wynne;—brick graves in the new churchyard belonging to William Cowper, Esq., Mr. Robert Carden, Mrs. Harding and Mrs. Robert Rogerson, Mr. Richard Clarke, Mr. Thomas Davies, Mr. John Edwards, and Mrs. Peplow.

Lights at the Lofoten Islands.

The Royal Norwegian Marine Department at Christiania has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of January, 1857, the following lights will be established at the Lofoten Islands, on the northwest coast of Norway.

#### Glopen.

This light is a fixed white light of the sixth order. It is placed at a height of 140 English feet above the mean level of the sca, and should be visible from the deck of a ship in clear weather at a distance of 12 miles, from S.W. round southerly and easterly to N.W. It will be lighted from the 1st January until the 14th April.

from the 1st January until the 14th April.

The lighthouse stands on the south side of the entrance of Sörvaagen, and serves to point out the fairway into that harbour. It is in lat. 68° 3′ N. long. 13° 4½ East from Greenwich. Vessels approaching Sörvaagen between the light and Kraaken islet (which lies to the N.N.E.) must keep close to Glopen, as there are three blind rocks on the S.E. side of Kraagen. If approaching to the north of Kraagen, they should keep close to that islet. When the light has been brought to bear to the eastward of S. by E. there is anchorage in from 8 to 10 fathoms.

#### Svinö, near Balstad.

This light is a fixed red light of the sixth order. It is placed at a height of 200 English feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible from the deck of a ship in clear weather at a distance of from 8 to 10 miles, from N.W. round southerly to N.E. It will be lighted from the 1st January until the 14th April, and will serve chiefly as a guide for the passage between Henningsvaer and Sörvaagen.

The lighthouse stands in lat. 68° 3' N. long.

13° 34½' east from Greenwich.

#### Henningsvaer.

This light is a white light of the fourth order, varied by a flash every third minute, seen all round the compass. It is placed at a height of 120 English feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible from the deck of a ship, in clear weather, at a distance of from 12 to 14 miles. It will be exhibited from the 15th August through the winter until the 1st May.

This light is placed on the Quitvaerden near Henningsvaer, and serves chiefly to point out the fairway across the West-fiord; also for making for the anchorage in Saltvaering Sound. To reach the latter, the light must be brought to bear N.E. by N., and that course kept until about 3 cables' length from the lighthouse; then altered a little more easterly, in order to pass south of the light, and when 2 or 3 cables' length to the castward of it, the vessel may be brought up in from 5 to 6 fathoms' water. The anchorage is narrow, and cannot be recommended for large vessels.

Pioneer about 3 miles south of King Cays, on the Coast of Mosquito, at 10 miles off shore. The following magnetic bearings were taken from the centre of the shoal:—Sand Cay, N.W.\(\frac{1}{4}\text{W}\).; North Cay, north; Eastern or Little King Cay, N.E. by N. The lead gives no warning of the shoal, as there is a depth of 9 fathoms at less than a ship's length off. Lat. 12° 41′ 45″ N., long. 83° 24′ W. of Greenwich, nearly.

#### Greytown Harbour, Nicaragua.

A recent survey of Greytown Harbour by Messrs. Scott and Thomas, Masters, Royal Navy, has shown that the sandy spit named by the Spaniards Punta Arenas, has advanced a cable's length to the south-westward during the last three years, thereby reducing the width of entrance to little more than two cables' length. A black beacon buoy has been placed off the north-western angle of the breakers, and a red buoy at a cable's length to the westward of the dry sandy point. The leading mark into the harbour at present is the flagstaff on the beach in front of the town, in one with a conspicuous tree to the south-enstward of the town, bearing S. 63° 30' E., magnetic.

Fixed White Light near Crescent City.

The United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that on and after the 10th day of December, 1856, a light would be exhibited from a tower recently erected on the south-western side of the harbour of Crescent City, on the coast of California, in the Pacific Ocean.

The light is a fixed white light, varied by flashes. The illuminating aparatus is a lens of the fourth order. The light is placed at a height of 80 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible from the deck of a ship in clear weather at a distance of 14 miles.

The building consists of a keeper's dwelling of grey stone of one story and a half high, with a low tower of brick, plastered and whitewashed, rising from the centre, and surmounted by a lantern, painted red, and is about 40 feet high from base to vane. It stands on the seaward extremity of the Island Point forming the southern and western sides of the harbour, in lat. 41° 44′ 34″ north, long. 124° 11′ 22″ west from Greenwich; the magnetic variation in November, 1853, being 17° 45′ east, as determined by the coast survey.

#### Fixed Red Light near Santa Barbara.

The Lighthouse Board has also given notice, that on and after the 1st day of December, 1856, a light would be exhibited from a tower recently erected on the bluff near Santa Barbara, on the coast of California, in the Pacific Ocean.

The light is a fixed red light. The illuminating apparatus is a lens of the fourth order, and lights up the seaward half of the horizon. #### Cortez Shoal, near San Nicholas.

The Commanding Officer of the United States Coast Survey in the Pacific has notified the position of a dangerous locality on Cortez shoal, where there is a depth of only  $2\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms' water. It lies to the southward and nearly equidistant from the islands of San Clemente and San Nicholas, in lat.  $32^{\circ}$  25' 40'' north, long.  $119^{\circ}$  5' 7'' west from Greenwich.

It appears to be a sharp point of rock approaching thus near the surface, with deep water around it. It is near the eastern extremity of the shoal, which, within the 50 fathoms' curve, extends about 16 miles W.N.W. and E.S.E., and is about 4 miles wide.
