The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Tuesday, February 3, 1857.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

WE are commanded to assure you, that Her Majesty has great satisfaction in recurring again to the advice and assistance of Her Parliament.

We are commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, that difficulties which arose in regard to some of the provisions of the Treaty of Paris delayed the complete execution of the stipulations of that treaty.

Those difficulties have been overcome in a satisfactory manner, and the intentions of the treaty have been fully maintained.

An insurrectionary movement which took place in September last in the Swiss canton of Neuchâtel, for the purpose of re-establishing in that canton the authority of the King of Prussia as Prince of Neuchâtel, led to serious differences between His Prussian Majesty and the Swiss Confederation, threatening at one time to disturb the general peace of Europe. But Her Majesty commands us to inform you, that, in concert with Her august Ally the Emperor of the French, she is endeavouring to bring about an amicable settlement of the matters in dispute, and Her Majesty entertains a confident expectation that an honourable and satisfactory arrangement will be concluded.

In consequence of certain discussions which took place during the conferences at Paris, and which are recorded in the protocols that were laid before you, Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French caused communications to be made to the Government of the King of the Two Sicilies, for the purpose of inducing him to adopt a course of policy calculated to avert dangers which might disturb that peace which had so recently been restored to Europe.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you, that the manner in which those friendly communications were received by His Sicilian Majesty was such as to lead Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French to discontinue their diplomatic relations with His Sicilian Majesty, and they have accordingly withdrawn their missions from the Court of Naples.

Her Majesty has directed that papers relating to this subject shall be laid before you.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you, that she has been engaged in negotiations with the

Government of the United States, and also with the Government of Honduras, which she trusts will be successful in removing all cause of misunderstanding with respect to Central America.

Her Majesty has concluded a treaty of friendship and commerce with Siam, which will be laid before you.

Her Majesty commands us to express to you Her regret that the conduct of the Persian Government has led to hostilities between Her Majesty and the Shah of Persia.

The Persian Government, in defiance of repeated warnings, and in violation of its engagements, has besieged and captured the important city of Herat.

We are commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, that a British naval and military force, despatched from Bombay, has taken possession of the island of Karrack, and of the town of Bushire, with a view to induce the Shah to accede to the just demands of Her Majesty's Government.

Her Majesty has seen with satisfaction that the naval and military forces employed on this occasion have displayed their accustomed gallantry and spirit.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you, that acts of violence, insults to the British flag, and infraction of treaty rights committed by the local Chinese authorities at Canton, and a pertinacious refusal of redress, have rendered it necessary for Her Majesty's officers in China to have recourse to measures of force to obtain satisfaction.

Those measures had, up to the date of the last accounts, been taken with great forbearance, but with signal success as regards the conflicts to which they had led.

We are commanded to inform you, that Her Majesty trusts that the Government of Pekin will see the propriety of affording the satisfaction demanded, and of faithfully fulfilling its treaty engagements.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

Her Majesty has directed the estimates for the ensuing year to be laid before you. They have been prepared with every attention to economy, and with a due regard to the efficient performance of the public service at home and abroad.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Her Majesty commands us to inform you, that Bills will be submitted to your consideration for the consolidation and the amendment of important

portions of the law ; and Her Majesty doubts not that you will give your earnest attention to matters so deeply affecting the interests of all classes of Her subjects.

Her Majesty commands us to recommend to your consideration the expediency of renewing for a further period the privileges of the Bank of England, the conditions imposed on the issue of bank notes in the United Kingdom, and the state of the law relating to Joint Stock Banks.

Her Majesty commands us to express the gratification which it affords Her to witness the general well-being and contentment of Her people, and to find that, notwithstanding the sacrifices unavoidably attendant upon such a war as that which has lately terminated, the resources of the country remain unimpaired, and its productive industry continues unchecked in its course of progressive development.

Her Majesty commits with confidence the great interests of the country to your wisdom and care, and she fervently prays that the blessing of Almighty God may attend your deliberations, and prosper your councils, for the advancement of the welfare and happiness of Her loyal and faithful people.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the third day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words following ; that is to say :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of 'populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the see of Carlisle, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned

(being the Acts under which the property herein-after described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein ; and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same :

"And whereas, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and duly published in the London Gazette on the first day of the following month of July, all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, formerly belonging to the said see of Carlisle (excepting certain portions thereof in such Order particularly decreed), became vested in us, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments ; and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable :

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said see of Carlisle and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Carlisle.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Mary, Newington, in the county of Surrey, and within the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate in the parish of Saint Mary, Newington, under the powers for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and of all others power in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Newington,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned :

"The district chapelry of Saint Paul, Newington, shall consist of so much of the said parish of Saint Mary, Newington, as will be comprised within a line drawn from the centre of the Walworth-road, opposite Manor-place, and to proceed southward, along the centre of the Walworth-road, to the north side of Arthur-street, near the Camberwell-gate, and from thence westward, along the centre of Arthur-street and Graham-street, to Montpelier-street; then southward, along the middle of that street, as far as midway between Hill-street and Beresford-street; then south-westward, midway between Hill-street and Beresford-street, to the boundary of Lambeth parish, in Boundary-lane; from thence, in a north-west-erly direction, along Boundary-lane, to the corner of the Vitriol Works, opposite Kennington Park; from thence, in a north-easterly direction, to the end of Newington-terrace, opposite South-place, from thence, down the centre of South-place to Grove-street, along the centre of Grove-street, turning to the right, and down the centre of Dod-dington-grove, north-eastward, to New-street,

along the centre of New-street, south-eastward, to the private road leading to the Surrey Gardens; then north, along the boundary of the said gardens, into Penton-place; from thence, along the centre of Penton-place, in a south-easterly direction, to the centre of Manor-place, and from thence east-ward, along the centre of Manor-place, to the centre of the Walworth-road, where the boundary-line commenced, as the said district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured pink :

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed at Saint Paul's Church aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be received on account of the Reverend Arthur Cyril Onslow, Rector and Incumbent of the said parish of Saint Mary, Newington, during his incumbency thereof, and that upon his avoidance of such incumbency the said fees should belong to the incumbent for the time being of Saint Paul's Church aforesaid.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal con-sideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Isleworth, in the county of Middlesex, and within the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate in Brazil Mill-lane, in the said parish of Isleworth, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Saint John Isleworth,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :

"The boundary-line to commence at the south-eastern end of Pound-lane, and proceed southerly along the middle of the Twickenham-road to the bottom of Mogden-lane, then westerly up the middle of that lane as far as Queen's-bridge, and from that bridge, along the middle of the Mill River, as far as the boundary-line separating the parishes of Isleworth and Twickenham, and then proceed along such boundary-line as far as the Hanworth-road, when it meets the boundary-line of the consolidated chapelry of Hounslow, then along that boundary in a northerly and easterly direction as far as Worton-lane; then along that lane southerly as far as the loop-line of the South-Western Railway, then along the northern side of the said railway as far as Wood-lane; then to proceed easterly along the middle of Wood-lane, crossing the Great Western-road, and then along the middle of Pound-lane to the south-eastern end thereof, to the point where the boundary-line of the district chapelry of Saint John Isleworth commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured lilac.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint John Isleworth, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be received on account of, and paid over to, the Reverend Henry William Parry Richards, vicar and incumbent of the said parish of Isleworth, during his incumbency thereof; and that upon his avoidance of such incumbency the said fees should belong to the minister or incumbent for the time being of Saint John's Church aforesaid,

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereof as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Charleston, enclosing copy of an Amended Law of South Carolina relating to Coloured Seamen, a copy of which is annexed.

(Copy.)

SECT. 1.—Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, that free negroes and persons of colour, brought into this State in any vessel not bound to any port in this State, but which shall be driven into any port of this State by stress of weather, or compelled to enter the same by mutiny, or any other cause which makes said entry involuntary on the part of those controlling the said vessel, shall be and the same are hereby declared from and after the passing of this Act, exempt from the operation of an Act entitled "An Act more effectually to prevent free negroes and other persons of colour from entering into this State, and for other purposes," passed on the 19th day of December, 1835, and all other Acts subjecting such persons to imprisonment: Provided always that such free negroes and persons of colour so brought into any port of this State shall remain on board the vessel in which they shall be introduced, or in such other place as may be selected for their accommodation by the mayor or chief magistrate of the nearest municipal corporation.

SECT. 2.—That from and after the passing of this Act, whenever any free negro, or person of colour, shall come into this State in any vessel not driven into a port of this State by stress of weather, or compelled to enter by mutiny, or other cause which makes such entering involuntary on the part of those controlling said vessel, as a cook, steward, mariner, or in any other employment on board such vessel, it shall be the duty of the master, owner, or person having control of such vessel, immediately on his arrival in port, to report to the mayor, or other chief municipal officer of such port, and if there be no such municipal officer, then to the nearest magistrate, the name, description, and capacity, of any such free negro or free person of colour, and shall enter into bond to the mayor or other chief municipal officer or magistrate as aforesaid, in the penal sum of five hundred dollars, with two sufficient sureties, being freeholders, in the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars each, conditioned that each and every such free negro or coloured person shall remain on board of such vessel, and shall in all respects obey the laws of the State, and ordinances and regulations of the city or town; and such bonds shall be deposited with such mayor or chief municipal officer, or magistrate, to be sued upon in case such condition shall not be observed and performed; and in case of suit and recovery upon any such bond, *half the amount recovered shall go to the informer, and half to the city or town treasury.*

SECT. 3.—That a compliance with the requisitions of this Act on the part of the master,

owner, or person in controul of any vessel entering into any port of this State, *within twelve hours after entering such port* shall exempt the free negroes and persons of colour as aforesaid, in such vessel, from the provisions of the 2nd Sect. of the Act aforesaid, entitled "An Act more effectually to prevent free negroes and other persons of colour from entering into this State, and for other purposes:" provided *such free negroes or other persons of colour shall so remain on board said vessel*; but on failure of the master, owner, or person in control to comply with said regulations, or having complied therewith, on failure of said free negroes and persons of colour to remain at all times on board such vessels, the said bond shall be forfeited, and the said free negroes and persons of colour shall be as heretofore subject in all respects to the provisions of the Act aforesaid.

SECT. 4.—That it shall be the duty of the sheriff of the district in which such port is situated, on the arrival of any such vessel as aforesaid, to go on board the same, and ascertain whether the above provisions have been complied with, and in case he shall find that such requisitions have not been complied with, *he shall be entitled to receive from the captain of such vessel a fee of twenty-five dollars for each free negro or person of colour found therein*: Provided, that in case there be no sheriff residing at such port, it shall be the duty of the chief municipal officer of such port, and if there be no such municipal officer, then it shall be the duty of the nearest magistrate to perform the duties required of the sheriff by this section.
