NOTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness Prince Albert will, by the desire of Her Majesty, hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Thursday the 12th of March next, at two o'clock

It is Her Majesty's pleasure, that presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levee shall be considered equivalent to presentations to The Queen.

Addresses to The Queen may either be forwarded to Her Majesty through the Secretary of State for the Home Department, or may be reserved until Her Majesty shall hold a Levee.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend the Levee at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock on the Tuesday previous to the Levee, or on any earlier day between the hours of eleven and four, in order that they may be submitted for approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy-seven, sections one, two, and three, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter seventyseven, sections one, two, and three, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for permanently annexing a canonry residentiary in the cathedral church of Llandaff to each of the archdeaconries of Llandaff and Monmouth, in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirty-first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and duly published in the London Gazette on the sixth day of February, in the same year, the said archdeaconry of Monmouth was founded in the diocese of Llandaff, and it was by the same order provided, inter alia, that the suid archdeaconry, and also the archdeaconry of Llandaff aforesaid should be temporarily endowed by augmentation out of the common fund mentioned in the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, until arrangements should be proposed by us, and ratified by your Majesty in Council, under the provisions of the herein firstly mentioned Act, for permanently annexing canonries residentiary in the said cathedral church of Llandaff to the said archdeaconries :

"And whereas, one of the canonries residentiary in the said cathedral church is held by the present Archdeacon of Llandaff:

"We, therefore, with the consent of the Venerable Thomas Williams, the present Archdeacon of Llandaff, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose, that, immediately upon and from the day upon which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London

Gazette, the canonry residentiary in the cathedral church of Llandaff, now held by the said Thomas Williams, shall become and be permanently annexed and united to the said archdeaconry of Llandaff, and be held by the archdeacon of the said archdeaconry; and we further recommend and propose that the canonry residentiary in the same cathedral church which shall next become vacant, shall in like manner, and immediately upon and from the vacancy thereof, become and be permanently annexed and united to the said archdeaconry of Monmouth, and be held by the archdeacon of the said last-named archdeaconry, and that the then and every future Archdeacon of Monmouth, and also every future Archdeacon of Llandaff shall, as such archdeacons, be entitled to installation to such canonries respectively, and shall be invested with, and so long as they shall respectively remain archdeacons of the said archdeaconries, but no longer, shall hold and enjoy all the rights, privileges, and emoluments of canons of the same church :

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said mentioned Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council, now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Llandaff.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act 'to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the Fourth Report of the Commissioners of 'Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of ano-ther Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the canon of the fourth canonry in the cathedral church of Durham, for the property belonging to him as such canon.

Whereas by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the said fourth canonry will (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), upon the first avoidance of the said canonry, become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

"And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the hand of any canon of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, belonging to such canon, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, titles, or other bereditaments :

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Venerable Charles Thorp, Doctor in

holder of the said fourth canonry, that, with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council:

"We, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles Thorp, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and after the day of such gazetting, all the lands and hereditaments which are particularized in the underwritten Schedule, and which form part of the lands and hereditaments now belonging to, or forming part of, the endow-ment of the said fourth canonry, shall, together with all the estate, right, title, and interest therein of the said Charles Thorp, as such Canon as aforesaid, be and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from the said Charles Thorp as from the twenty-ninth day of September last, to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that, in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, there shall be paid by us to the said Charles Thorp, in each and every year, so long as he shall continue to live, and until the end of the capitular year in which he shall die, the annual sum of three hundred and seventy-five pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the twenty-ninth day of September and the twentyfifth day of March; and that the first of such half-yearly payments shall be made on the twenty-fifth day of March next; provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease of the said lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of any part thereof, shall, since the twenty-fourth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred, and fiftysix, have been or shall be granted or made by the said Charles Thorp.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"And also all those the lands, hereditaments, and premises, belonging to and forming part of the endowment of the said fourth canonry, which are situate in the township and parish of Aycliffe, in the said county of Durham."
